Call for disabled parking spaces to be policed to stop abuse

Motorists who park in the disabled parking bays at Kildare County Council's offices (Aras Chill Dara) and at the K Leisure centre have come under fire.

A call for action to be taken against people who use the spaces despite not being entitled to was made by Naas councillor Bill Clear at a Naas Municipal District meeting on Tuesday of this week.

He said he had himself been verbally abused by motorists when he challenged them about using the spaces without permission.

He wanted Kildare County Council to instruct APCOA, the parking management company contracted by the council, to police the bays at both locations.

Cllr Clear said the Naas Access and Disability Group, which campaigns on behalf of disabled people, had expressed concern about people parking in two sites, and he added:

"people shouldn't be doing it.".

Cllr Clear also said K Leisure had tried to tackle the issue and it may be that it could be dealt with by erecting

He suggested that stickers be placed on vehicles if parking tickets cannot be issued.

However it emerged that because both car parks are legally defined as private car parks (staff car parks) and not public car parks for the general public, they cannot be regulated by KCC's roads section.

Instead, that regulation is done by the Facilities Section.

Naas district manager Eoghan Ryan said it may be possible to use stickers and if a staff member parks "it is followed up".

He said there was a case of a ticket being issued by a garda in one of the car parks who was not legally empowered to do so.

Cllr Anne Breen, who is on the board of K Leisure, said she would raise the issue with the board at the next earliest opportunity.

Burglary in Kilcullen

Cannabis seized in Monasterevin

Gardaí have arrested a man in

his 30s and seized a quantity of cannabis in an operation in Monasterevin, on Monday December 9, shortly after 10pm.

Gardaí attached to Kildare Drugs Unit carried out the search on foot of a warrant at a house at Old Grange Wood, Monasterevin.

"In the attic of the house Gardaí discovered a number of mature cannabis plants and a number of seedling plants growing in tents. The estimated street value of the drugs is in excess of €11,000," a garda spokesperson said. A man in his 30s was arrested at the scene and taken to Kildare Garda Station where he was detained under Section 4 of the Criminal Justice Act, 1984. He has been released without charge and a file will be prepared for the Director of Public Prosecution.

Quads stolen in Hollywood

Three bikes worth an estimated €15,000 were stolen from a shed in Hollywood area on the Kildare/Wicklow border in the early hours of Monday morning. The vehicles were two kids'

quad bikes and an adult's Honda motorbike. Five men were involved in the robbery which began at around 3am.

CCTV images who the men entering via the back wall of the galvanised shed and then unlocking the front door. The Honda was later driven towards the Ballymore Eustace / Dunlavin direction at 3.40am followed by a black-coloured hatchback car. The owners said: "If anybody comes across these bikes

Warning about burglaries

Gardaí are advising people to Lock Up and Light Up as most burglaries occur between 5pm and 11pm in winter months and over 50% of burglaries take place either through the front or back door.


Operation Thor is a multi-strand approach to tackling burglaries with an emphasis on preventing the crime from happening in the first instance.

Operation Thor actively targets organised crime gangs and repeat offenders through co-ordinated crime prevention and enforcement activity based on intelligence and the latest burglary trends. Analysis from the Garda Analysis Services shows that residential burglaries increase between the hours of 5pm and 10pm during winter. On average 1 in 5 intruders enter through an unsecured door or window. Homes that look unoccupied are more vulnerable to burglary. The most likely entry point for a burglar is a door - 27% of burglaries take place through the front door and 25% through a rear door. Access through a rear window accounts for 28%. Burglars tend to target cash and jewellery when breaking

Garda appeal over M9 crash which killed dad

Gardaí have renewed appeals for information on a collision in which a pedestrian died near Kilcullen late on Saturday night last.

Tragic father-of-one Stephen O'Driscoll, aged 34, was walking on the M9 southbound motorway at Greenhills when he was struck by a vehicle.

The male driver of the car, who was aged in his 20s, was uninjured.

The M9 Southbound was closed between Junction 1 and Junction 2 for a Garda forensic investigation for several hours afterwards.

Gardaí renewed appeals yesterday (Wednesday) for information on the incident. Gardaí are appealing to any motorists who may have travelled on the M9 southbound between Junction 1 and Junction 2 prior to the collision or who may have witnessed the collision or who may have camera footage of the incident.

Debate about 2019's unspent Local Property Tax money

There was much debate at this month's Kildare-Newbridge Municipal District meeting about the allocation of 2019 unspent Local Property Tax (LPT).

According to Director of Services, Joe Boland, €292,000 of LPT was not spent, and on the agenda councillors were asked to approve the transfer of this money to the 2020 fund.

However, Cllr Fiona McLoughlin Healy proposed a motion that money be allocated to Building and Development Control to carry out work required to bring a number of estates in the Municipal District area up to a standard to be taken in charge by the council.

She proposed the remaining money be allocated to emergency works before the end of the year, like Christmas lights for Eyre Street in Newbridge.

The Development Control Section asked that a €15,000 investment be allocated to Walshestown Abbey, Newbridge; €10,000 be allocated for Beechmount, Newbridge; and €10,000 be allocated for White Abbey Court in Kildare.

A report issued by Chief Fire Officer, Celina Barrett said Millfield Manor in Newbridge is more complex than the other developments above and would require funding over two to three years to resolve an issue with a retaining wall.

"The Development Control section are in the process of getting quotes for this work at the moment.

"Millfield also has a management company in place for the whole development and this company would have to be reduced to cover just the apartments before the estate could be taken in charge. A request to take the estate in charge has not yet been received."

Cllr Fiona McLoughlin Healy said this is an opportunity to help estates where the developers and bonds are gone.

Cllr Kevin Duffy said his preference would be that the money be allocated to the roads department, saying it was a bigger benefit to the community.

Cllr Peggy O'Dwyer said there are estates where roads need to be fixed, and added that she was in favour of the money going to roads.

Cllr Rob Power said he would be keen to see where the money could be spent before finalising. He proposed the money be transferred over to the 2020 fund.

Cllr Noel Heavey proposed that the $\ensuremath{\mathfrak{e}}$ 35,000 be allocated to the three estates in question.

Cllr Mark Stafford said the issue with



Millfield Manor is that it is a mixed development and this causes severe problems.

Cllr Stafford said he would require further information on the estates proposed for LPT funds in relation to bonds and levis outstanding. He added that the issue needs further consideration and discussion.

A spokesman for Building Control said if they got extra money, they would have to look and see how they would spend it.

He said a lot of money is required to resolve

the issue in Millfield Manor, estimating that it could cost @=120,000 to 130,000.

Cllr McLoughlin Healy said Millfield Manor houses have been "abandoned" because of the State's failure to make them safe. She said the issue of the retaining wall is a big obstacle to the estate being taken in charge.

Councillors voted on the motion; seven members voted in favour of Rob Power's proposal to have all the unspent LPT monies transferred to the 2020 fund.

Murder trial hears baby died from head injuries in Clane home

A 20-month-old baby died from head injuries which were most likely caused from his head impacting at least three or four times against a hard surface such as a wall or floor, a murder trial has heard.

The jury was also told that the nature and severity of the toddler's head injuries could not have been caused accidentally such as by a fall.

Former Northern Ireland State Pathologist, Professor Jack Crane, was giving evidence yesterday (Wednesday, December 11) in the trial of Yusif Ali Abdi, who is charged with murdering 20-month-old Nathan Baraka Andrew Ali at The Elms, College Road, Clane, Co Kildare on April 17, 2001. Mr Abdi (46), with an address at Charleville Road, Phibsboro, Dublin 7 has pleaded not guilty to the charge.

The Central Criminal Court has previously heard that Mr Abdi came from Somalia to Ireland in 1997 and was granted refugee status in 2000. He married Irish woman Amanda Bailey and they had a son Nathan, who was born in August 1999.

The trial is being heard before Mr Justice Alexander Owens and a jury of seven men and five women. The State has told the jury that the matter of insanity is at issue in the case but that there is a large amount of agreement between both the prosecution and defence in relation to this.

Prof Crane told prosecution counsel Seamus Clarke SC that he is a consultant pathologist and was instructed to prepare his own report having reviewed an autopsy report prepared by former State Pathologist Dr John Harbison.

The witness testified that baby Nathan was just over one-and-a-half years of age when he died. The mother and child had slept upstairs on the night of the killing and the accused was sleeping downstairs, said Prof Crane. At some stage during the night, the accused man brought his son downstairs, he remarked.

In his evidence, Prof Crane said Dr Harbison had carried out a post-mortem on the deceased on April 17, 2001 and noted the child was well nourished. The child's scalp was swollen in two areas above the ears and there was bruising on the right side of his forehead, remarked Prof Crane. There was also swelling and bleeding

underneath the child's scalp at the back of the head, he said.

Prof Crane said there was multiple fractures on the deceased's skull and death had occurred rapidly

The witness said that Dr Harbison had concluded that Nathan died from "gross brain damage with disruption of the brain" and the internal head injuries were consistent with the head impacting against a hard surface.

Prof Crane said it was his opinion that death was due to head injuries and the nature and severity of the child's head injuries could not have been caused accidentally by a fall. They were most likely caused by the head impacting against a hard, unyielding surface such as a wall or floor, he explained. In summary, the witness said there were at least three or four "forceful impacts" of the child's head against this hard surface.

Seoirse O' Dunlaing BL, prosecuting, read the statement of Pat O'Brien, who worked for the ambulance service in Naas. Mr O'Brien said he received a call from a male non-national on the night of April 17. The man said he wanted an

ambulance for his child, who had fallen. An ambulance arrived at the scene at 4.43am, said the witness, adding that he later rang Naas Garda Station to inform gardai about suspicious circumstances surrounding the call.

Barry White SC, defending the accused, made a number of admissions of fact to the court yesterday (Tues) on behalf of his client including that the accused man caused fatal injuries to his son on April 17, 2001.

The court has heard that on the night of the killing, Ms Bailey and Nathan visited Mr Abdi in his apartment at Clane. Mr Abdi removed his son from his mother's bed around 4 am and took him to the living room, where he locked the door and a number of loud bangs were subsequently heard. When Ms Bailey gained access to the room, the child's body was limp, his head was swollen and he had blood in his nose. Ms Bailey failed to find a pulse on her son.

In his opening address, prosecution counsel Seamus Clarke SC said Mr Abdi was tried before the Central Criminal Court in 2003 for the murder of his son and found him

guilty by a majority verdict.

Dr Damian Mohan, a consultant psychiatrist at the Central Mental Hospital (CMH), had given evidence on behalf of the prosecution at Mr Abdi's trial in 2003 and was not of the view he was suffering from paranoid schizophrenia, said Mr Clarke.

RETRIAL ORDERED

In February 2019, his appeal was heard in the Court of Appeal and a retrial was ordered on the basis of newly discovered facts, outlined Mr Clarke. Mr Clarke said these newly discovered facts were that when Mr Abdi was imprisoned for this offence in 2001, he was later brought to the CMH on a number of occasions, where in October 2013 it was determined that Mr Abdi was diagnosed with paranoid schizophrenia.

"In the meantime, Dr Mohan has looked at the case and is of the view that Mr Abdi had early signs of paranoid schizophrenia in 2001," emphasised Mr Clarke, adding that the jury will hear evidence that the accused was legally insane in 2001.

The trial continues this week in Dublin.



Nobody should be without a home in Ireland in 2019

A record total of 10,514 people are now homeless across Ireland and nearly 4,000 of these are children. Focus Ireland Services Strategy Manager and Kildare native **John O'Haire** writes about the deepening housing and homelessness crisis facing the country.

What does home mean to you? Many would say their home means comfort, safety, security.

Sadly, not everyone has this. The harsh reality is that three families lost their home in Ireland today.

A number of individuals will have also become homeless on the same day. It's shocking that a record total of 10,514 people are now homeless and that nearly 4,000 are children.

There are now 184 adults homeless in Kildare, with 86 families homeless, including 191 children, in the Mid-East region, includes Kildare, Meath and Wicklow. It is wrong that any family or individual has to suffer the trauma caused by losing their

One young mother Louise, who tells her story in our Christmas Appeal campaign tells how her family lost their home while she was pregnant. She was then homeless when her baby boy was born.

She said: "My little Luke was born at 5.02am. But the first call I made wasn't to family. It was to Focus Ireland."

Idid not ever think that things could get this bad but they sadly have done.

I am glad to say we were able to help Louise and her family to find a home, but it is truly shocking that we are now seeing babies being born into homelessness. Hotel rooms are no place for newborn babies. The solution to this crisis is, in some ways, very simple- we need more housing and we need it

I know that thousands of people in Kildare are struggling to pay ever-rising rents and are finding it hard to save for a mortgage.

The building of more social and affordable housing in Kildare is vital if we are to help free up supply of private rented accommodation

reduce these skyrocketing

Focus Ireland is not sitting on the sidelines of this crisis; we make a difference. In partnership with the State, and our generous supporters, we helped over 1,200 families to escape from homelessness and to secure a home in the last two years, much of this through the work of our Family Homeless Action Team.

We helped over 15,500 people in 2018 who were homeless or at risk and we're on track to help

even more this year. We also provide over 80 vital services nationwide and over 1,100 homes, including 26 homes in

I am particularly proud as a Johnstownbridge-native that we been able to provide support services Kildare, across including essential mental health support services for people who are homeless or at

We are also working hard to continue to develop realistic policy solutions to help end homelessness.

The current situation would be even worse without the vital services and housing we provide.

Ballymore Eustace community celebrates with centenarian Eithne Daly

The red carpet was literally laid out for Ballymore woman, Eithne Daly, last weekend as she celebrated her 100th birthday on December 5. Saturday last saw the local Resource Centre dressed for a community reception for Eithne, where a red carpet, royal chair and photographic display were laid out by local business woman, Elizabeth Deegan. An open invitation was issued to the wider community and from 2-5.30pm, hundreds of people drifted into the parish hall to pay tribute to this remarkable woman.

Eithne is remarkable in that she is still hale and hearty, lives independently, keeps a little flock of hens – and is still washing the club jerseys (three sets) for Ballymore Eustace GFC! Only last year, she told the Kildare Post, her son said "The battery is running flat, Ma – wellit's never been replaced, I think they just wanted me off the road!"

Indeed, Eithne's late introduction to driving is hilarious; after her husband Joe died, she finally plucked up the courage and put the key into the ignition of the car locked up in the garage. "All I did the first day was turn on the engine. A few days later, I moved the gear stick and found reverse. It was ages before I tried to move it but eventually I did and into the field behind. I'd say Cookes up the road could smell the clutch being burnt out as I did some 'practice'. I probably burnt out a few clutches

But drive she did, and as with every phase of her life, she tackled whatever came her way and never wanted for ought nor felt she missed out on anything.

Born Eithne Mulvanny to parents Mary and John, she grew up in Paddenstown, three miles from Ballynacargy, Co Westmeath, with four brothers and two sisters. Joe hailed from Mabrista, in Ballinagore, near Kilbeggan

Hilariously, her first date with her future husband, the late Joe Daly, was an accidental double date.

"I was helping my sister out after she gave birth to twins. A grand chap, McLoughlin I think was his name, asked me to a dance and I agreed. But he got delayed attending to a job on the farm. Joe Daly came into my sister's house in the

meantime, he was going to the dance too so Joe says 'come with me'. I didn't care who I went with, we were dancing away when the other fella arrived and glared at me.

"Out of good manners, I went home with my original date, and passed a polite 10 minutes chatting to him while Joe hid up in the loft and after yer man left, Joe came down and we stayed yapping for an hour. There was no hanky panky in them days so don't go thinking that! We dated for seven years before we married, and up to the day he died, we were still a couple of lovebirds, we were happy out. Lord, I miss him still".

Eithne's childhood and all her life is a tale of self sufficiency. Growing up, she says the family grew turnips, potatoes, onions, mangles for the cattles, oats, etc. "We had our own wheat, made our own brown bread on the open fire; I was a dab hand at making the butter – my brothers all took off when they saw my mother take out the hand churn, it was hard work but I enjoyed it".

After marrying Joe, the couple went to work on a farm, not far from Tallaght, which was all farmlands in those days, before they eventually came to work at Booth's in Ballymore Eustace.

"At that time we had Tommy, our eldest son. Joe ran the farm and I did the milking, about 50-70 cows. I had a name for everyone of them, I brought them in three by three, washed their udders and linked them up to the milking machines. I'd have the next three ready, and sure they knew me so well, they were like pets, the minute they'd see the light switched

on in the milking parlour, they'd queue up in line.

"I'd prepare the next three, and I did that twice a day, at 5am and again in the evening. Hard work never killed anyone and I honestly believe the reason I have such good health is that I spent so much time outside in the great outdoors".

A second son arrived, Liam, and both were keen GAA fans, the late Joe also having been a talented hurler. When Tommy complained one day that a jersey he played in felt damp, Eithne offered to wash the children's jerseys. Within a few years, Michael Lawlor asked her to wash the senior jerseys "with a few bob in it for you". At one stage, she washed six sets of jerseys for the club and she was renowned for her ferocious care of the local GAA jerseys -

woe betide anyone who had a number missing or an item returned with a tear! She still looks after the senior jerseys to this day.

Her life is one of hard work and she utilised her skills to boost the family income, renowned for her knitting. Her son Liam noted she often stayed up all night contract knitting. After she and the late Joe bought a family home at Morganstown, she took up the role as housekeeper to a neighbouring widower, the late Brendan Headon of Sillagh and his four children.

When Brendan remarried, and young Mark and Laura arrived, Eithne continued in her role as housekeeper. At last Saturday's community celebration, she was joined by her sons Tommy and Liam, her six grandchildren,

daughter in law Jackie, and tribe of great grandchildren, along with family from Westmeath. Notably, the extended Headon family were present, as were her many friends from Ballymore Eustace GFC. The senior team arrived clad in their jerseys as washed by Mrs

Daly; she was totally overcome when club Chair Natasha Graham presented her with a framed club jersey, Number 100.

A fitting end to the celebrations for 100 year old Eithne Daly, who is regarded so highly within the parish.

When you use it, you'll get to experience some deep Shiatsu and Swedish massage, combined with a mind experience that promises to decrease stress and anxiety, help your long-term memory, relax you and which claims to be a substitute for up to two hours

If you haven't been at the Osprey Spa for a couple of years, it's definitely worth a fresh look. Sure, it's a noted destination for weekend girlie breaks and hen parties, but this urban retreat has got quite a lot to offer Kildare locals nipping in too.

It was given a €1.2 million makeover under celebrity architect Hugh Wallace, which opened last year, and is now a quiet oasis of gorgeous-smelling luxury with a mix of Irish and Scandi-style design. These days it's even got a separate elevator upstairs from the leisure centre, so you don't get the guilts passing the treadmills or weights room while on the way to your luxury spa treatment!

Robe and fluffy slippers on, I slathered myself in the complimentary handcream in the dressing

room — it's great to see them supporting Irish with the liberal use of this Sligo brand everywhere in the spa. Before my treatment, I wound down for a bit while tucked up in a fluffy blanket on a day bed in the relaxation room — I'll be honest, I could have nodded off and stayed there for a couple of hours.

But it was time to get introduced to the BrainLight chair. It's tucked into a small, private treatment room just off the reception area, which is reassuring, as you are alone during your session, but in easy earshot of assistance if you need it.

And then the chair itself. It's huge — no recliner with a back roller this.

I was handed some large, comfortable headphones and a special eye mask, before I sat down into the chair and was tucked up warm with a

I say sat down. In fact, I was rather enveloped legs, head, back and sides by this high-tech chair.

The treatment, which lasts around half an hour, starts with a Shiatsu massage. Again, it's not a

mechanical back roll like you'd get at the hairdressers. It was like nothing I'd experienced before. The chair seems to adjust itself to your proportions enveloping and squeezing and kneading, firm but never to the point where it feels strange or uncomfortable. As an aside, I tested to see if I could get out of the chair quickly if I felt uncomfortable which would be an important thing to note for someone who might worry about becoming claustrophobic — and that wasn't a problem.

But back to that glorious massage. My legs were squeezed, my back kneaded with nobbles and my bottom occasionally wobbled from side to side (does that sound dodgy? It wasn't!). Great for getting out knots and strains.

All the while, soothing natural water-type sounds were playing on the headphones. You can pick your own programme to target different areas or needs, and I enjoyed the chill-out general relaxation one.

Then the second part of the programme kicked in. Having been nicely kneaded and relaxed, the chair then reclined automatically and I stretched out, and lights started flickering behind the mask. You're told to keep your eyes closed for the whole treatment, so it looks like there's sparks or fireflies dancing behind your eyelids.

You can discern patterns and waves, and it's certainly different — like having your own fireworks show behind



Mercedes-Benz GLB brings seven-seat option to compact SUV segment

With the launch of their new GLB – which arrives on the market here early 2020 - Mercedes-Benz has raised its SUV range offering to an entirely new level of desirability.

One of 22 newcomers from the luxury carmaker that are set to arrive here in 2020, its appeal has been made even greater with the availability of a 7-seater version that is likely to prove attractive to families with children to transport.

Kilcullen native Dennis Hogan is considering his next following unsuccessful world title bid in Brooklyn on Saturday night.

The Australia-based boxer was knocked out in the seventh round by WBC middleweight champion Jermall Charlo at the Barclays Center having moved up a weight for his shot at glory.

Hogan said he will no take a break for Christmas and the New Year before making his next move. sometime in 2020.

He will be hoping to make it third time lucky in a world title fight, having lost out to Jaime Munguia in a WBO light middleweight world title fight last April.

Hogan said on his

Facebook account this week: I'll be back as the mission has not been completed. I will always be proud to represent the two greatest countries on earth."

He continued: "I aimed for greatness and fell short. I am healthy and good. Thank you so much for that support. The journey isn't over yet. Time to spend a few weeks away from

Hogan said after Saturday night's fight that he could not compete with Charlo's power throughout the seven rounds the 12-round championship bout.

"It started well, but I could really feel that middleweight power when he landed that first shot, and after that, he knew that he had an advantage, Hogan told Showtime Boxing.

Hogan normally fights in light-middleweight

division but moved up from 154lbs to 160lbs to fight the champion.

"I'll go back, regroup, rest up for a while and spend some time with my daughter my partner, and then come back

after the ferocious left uppercut landed.

"It didn't faze me all that much and I tried to land more and that first knockdown warmed me into the fight."

It was the first time that Hogan has been knocked down throughout his 32-fight professional career, and when he hit the canvas for the second time in the seventh round, the referee took the decision to end the contest.

"I then tried to get back into it and find ways to get ahead but in the seventh round, that shot, I didn't even see it, it came out of nowhere.

"So big props to Charlo for catching me with that."

Hogan said that he will return to the lighter division and confirmed that he has been invited back to fight on the US Showtime network in the future.
