GAMBIA TRIP

JANUARY 2020 the manager of Castlecomer Credit Union Gerry Reynolds visited the Gambia along with three other managers-Michael Byrne Core Credit Union, Bernie Moran Roscommon Credit Union and Mary O' Reilly The Lough Credit Union in Cork. The visit was part of an initiative by the ILCU foundation to assist with the development of the credit union movement in the Gambia.

During the two week period Gerry and the team visited up to 10 Credit Unions along with local compliance officers. They looked at the day-to-day running, management and operation of these Credit Union's and provided advice and initiatives and not just how they can improve but on the things that they were doing well also.

In addition to the above they also Hosted a workshop for both the compliance officers, Credit Union management and boards of the 10 Credit Union visited. The Visit was a resounding success.

The Gambia is a small country of approximately 11 thousand square kilometres with a population of 1.9 million people. The credit union movement is in a developing stage as it would've been in Ireland in the 1950s, 60s and indeed 70s. The support and assistance provided by the Irish credit union managers and the foundation will allow credit unions to grow become stronger and provide the same benefits and support to the local communities in the Gambia that the credit union movement has in Ireland for many years.

"I found The whole experience to be very rewarding and satisfying. It is good to know that the skills that I have honed over the past 40 years can be passed on to younger ambitious generation of managers staff and volunteers in another country and can assist in allowing them to grow the credit union movement that maybe someday will parallel the one we have in this country"

Davy wins Ireland's strongest man - ten years after shedding 12 stone!

A Kilkenny man has been crowned Ireland's Strongest Man almost ten years to the date he decided to get in shape and shed 12 stone.

Davy Jones from Glenmore, who owns Davy Jones Fitness in Kilkenny, won Ireland's Strong Man recently in a gruelling competition featuring arduous categories such as a 375kg deadlift, carrying a 160kg sand bag a distance and holding a 300kg deadlift for over a minute. He beat 20 other contestants from around Ireland to take the title.

TRANSFORMATION

And for Davy, the win was all the sweeter, as it came 10 years to the date he tipped the scales at more than 24 stone and embarked on a personal plan to shed the weight and get fit. It has led to a massive transformation and changed his life, leading to him becoming a personal trainer and opening up his own gym to help others.

Earlier this year, Davy hit the headlines after helping Callan Man Jason Foran shed a massive 17 stone the equivalent of a professional rugby player. In addition, an interview on the Ray Darcy Show on RTE Radio 1 went viral when Jason then in training for the competition – picked Ray up by the belt with one hand and lifted him high into the

MOTIVATED

"I used to do no exercise and went out at weekends eating rubbish. I used to be terribly shy too and had very little confidence. I just got sick of being overweight and decided to make a change. I am proof that it is possible to change and reach your goal, no matter how difficult it is. Just keep going, one step at a time", said Davy.

TRAINING

Training for Ireland's Strongest Man took exceptional commitment from Davy who trains for three hours a day, seven days a week with

regular physio sessions and ice baths, and maintains a strict diet. He eats 7,000 calories a day, costing €250 a week with 3.5kg of red meat part of his daily meal plan.

"In preparation for Ireland's Strongest Man, I had to eat eight times a day, every two hours", commented Davy.

With the title of Ireland's Strongest Man under his belt, Davy goes back to the day job training clients at his business Davy Jones Fitness, based at Hebron Industrial Estate. He offers weight loss, weights, strength, flexibility and mobility training in both groups and one-to-one sessions.

"I will continue training and look to compete in bigger international competitions from now one and focus in getting better with every competition. In the meantime, I'm delighted to be able to help my own clients with their weight loss and fitness goals. I'm proof to them that anything is possible", said Davy.







SEAFOOD CHOWDER AND GUINNESS AND TREACLE BREAD

Seafood chowder is a warming dish suited well to a cold winter's day. It's a great dish that gives you an opportunity to cook with a selection of fresh fish and shellfish. This dish has a great balance of flavour from the smokiness of the haddock to the salt sea taste of the fresh prawns,

Preperation time: 40 mins

INGREDIENTS CHOWDER

ılb 50z/600g fresh fish (Smoked haddock, salmon, cod, prawns) diced in 1 cm cubes

20z/50g Celery, diced 20z/50g Spanish Onion, diced 50z/150g Carrot, diced 4 Garlic cloves, crushed 1 tbsp. olive oil 500ml double cream 1 litre Fish Stock 80 ml White wine Salt and pepper

INGREDIENTS BLACKROCK STOUT BREAD

300g Wholemeal flour
75g Plain flour
40g Oatmeal
1½ tsp bread soda
20g Butter
240ml Milk
100ml Treacle
145ml Dungarvan Blackrock
Stout

METHOD

Preheat oven to 170C. Grease a large loaf tin and dust with flour.

In a large mixing bowl, add all dry ingredients and combine using

a wooden spoon. Once mixed add in all wet ingredients until a wet consistency is achieved.

Transfer bread mixture to loaf tin and bake at 170C for 30 minutes. The bread should feel hollow to touch on the bottom when cooked.

Cool on a wire rack.

Cook the chowder in a large, heavy-based pan. Sauté the celery, onions, carrots, fennel and garlic in olive oil on a medium heat until translucent.

Add white wine and let the alcohol burn off before adding the flour. It's important to make sure the flour is cooked before adding anyliquid because that's how lumps form in the sauce.

Add cream gradually, stirring constantly. Bring to the boil, add fish stock and simmer for 15 mins.

In a separate saucepan poach the fish in simmering milk for 1-2 minutes then transfer fish and milk into chowder base, incorporate well let simmer for five minutes then turn off heat.

Divide the chowder between bowls, garnish with chopped parsley and crispy fish skin shards and serve with stout bread.


SUGGESTED RECIPE MODIFICATIONS

If you don't have a steamer for the fish skins, place a ban marie of water at the bottom of the oven to incorporate steam into the cooking process.

Substitute potato for flour as the thickening agent in the chowder.

Storage

Store chowder in airtight container for up to three days. Stout Bread will keep for four days.

You're in exam mode now. You're learning to remember for an exam. KEEP FIT



Virus: Don't panic over stock market

Then I started off writing this article last week, markets had reduced by 6% over the space of two days.

By the end of that particular day, markets dropped by a further 4% which meant it was one of the fastest declines in stock market history.

The Dow Jones Index, for dropped 1,191 points, its worst one day drop in its history. This index has now dropped more than 10% below its most recent peak, by which definition a market correction has just occurred -it's not a crash though.

Because we are in a period of bad news with the Covid-19 outbreak, markets are reacting very negatively. However, it isn't the first time that an unforeseen, shocking external event has happened. History is full of disasters which is why I thought it would be useful to start out by some historical context into what's right happening because it might provide us with some guidance and re-assurance. While no-one can predict the future, it's comforting to know that within months, sometimes even days, markets rally after something terrible happens.

Let me give you some examples.

I can't compare every single market, because there are just too many of them, so I'm going to use just one as a reference, and it being the S&P 500. It's a good benchmark to use and we can look at what happened to it, during and after a serious event occurring. Since 1950, there has been

34 instances when it lost more than 6% of its value in two consecutive days and given there were 17,655 trading days during this time what is happening now has only occurred 0.2% of all trading days, or on average, once every two years.

So, what happened last week has been quite rare.

Let's look at events that may have triggered some of those sharp declines and what happened to markets following them.

When JFK, was shot dead in November 1963, markets

an immediate 2.90% loss, but 22 days later it had increased by 7.2%.

Over a two-week period in October 1987, the stock market recorded a loss of 34.2% but again just 22 days later it had recovered 11.5% of that loss.

Iraq invaded When Kuwait in August 1990 markets reduced by 13.3% but 126 days later, markets were up 16.3%.

Immediately after 9/11, markets dropped by 14.3% but 63 days later, they were up

Of course, there were instances when it took a lot longer for markets to recover most noticeably, the crash of 2008/09, when it took six years before markets returned to their previous all-time highs, but if your time horizon is long enough, it doesn't matter that selloffs are occurring right now, because time is your friend and don't forget that.

The stock market is very fickle, and fear is always the driving force behind why traders panic and start selling. Investors like Warren Buffett know this hysteria will pass. Only last week he was on CNBC telling people they shouldn't sell their shares or go into cash, simply because they read or listened to apocalyptic headlines. His reasons for saying this, by the way is to stop you from locking in losses and giving up gains when the market

As I see it, the approach of

the large news outlets around the world, to reporting financial news is about scaring people, because fear makes people pay attention and fear sells. Unfortunately, being scared makes you make rash decisions. One minute you're fine and happy with how your fund is structured, because markets are going up, and then bang something happens, the news is bad, and you think your savings are going to be wiped out because of what you read or heard.

Will Covid-19 have an effect on the adverse economy and impact your pension or investment values? Of course, it will in the short term, but in the long term markets will recover as will your account balance. So my advice is not to panic, this storm will pass.

Even though markets have dropped and your fund impacted, try having the mindset of someone like Buffett who believes he's now buying equities that are on sale, and you're doing exactly the same thing if you stand firm, and continue to buy percentage rate you did last

This is the approach some investment managers are taking right now. One very large financial institution told me last week that with the large sell off we've seen, rather than reduce their exposure in equities, which people might think someone like them would do, they've done the opposite and have increased their exposure in across multi-asset funds by 5%.

Volatility is a constant in the market whether you know it or not, and on average the S&P 500 index falls 10% once every 11 months. If people were aware of this, they would be less worried, knowing how common these fall in values occur.

Here's something else you should remember. Despite the big decline, the market is only back to where it was in Mid-October '19. If you were invested in a reasonable fund, let's say one that has a risk rating of 4, you're probably only back to the level you were at four and a half months ago.

Keep reminding yourself you're in this for the long haul, and corrections in the market take place all the time, this one is just getting more airtime because of the underlying reason, which is an infectious disease that is spreading throughout the world and taking the lives of those who are already sick with underlying illnesses.

Even if you're coming close to retirement, you're still in this for the long run. The plan is to continue living for the next 25 or 30 years. And that's plenty of time for your fund, which should be only partially exposed to equities, to bounce back from declines like this one.

I read an excellent analysis of the Coronavirus virus last week by a very well respected equity strategist in the US, and what he thought its impact on markets would be. He said that while he didn't want to diminish the seriousness of the virus, and how people's lives are being lost because of it, he didn't believe the negative impact would last very long.

His reasoning was, from an economic perspective, viruses, natural disasters, assassinations etc. represent demand deferred, not demand destroyed. Which means, the coronavirus may disrupt the supply chain for things like the iPhone, meaning the newest version may not be released in September, but if it comes out in December, people are still going to buy it, just later than planned.

The goal of most people is to save money that will grow over time, outpaces inflation, and never goes to zero, and being invested in a well-diversified managed fund is generally the best way to achieve that goal.

If you're still confused and don't know what to do, reach out to someone with experience, who can talk you through the anxiety you could be feeling, which is perfectly normal by the way. And if you'll sleep better by moving some of your portfolio into cash or bonds, then do so. But I'd caution you against making big changes. Don't forget being invested in the stock market is a good thing, it's your protection against inflation.

If markets fall by another 5% or 10% and they flatline for a while, when they start to rise again, their values are likely to be greater than the average price you paid for them over the past decade, and again that's something that can be lost on people.

Finally, I want to put this reduction into perspective and run some numbers for you, because I'm hoping once you see them, you mightn't feel as bad as you may have last week.

If you earn €50,000 and started a pension five years ago where your employer contributed 5% of your salary and you matched it, and assuming you earned a modest growth of 5% per annum, the amount in your pension fund would now be €28,408.

The amount personally contributed each month after tax relief was €125. Which means over that five-year period, your input was €7,500.

through n of But, combination an contribution, employers' annual growth and tax relief, the amount in your fund grew by €20,908.

So, over five years, you've effectively achieved a growth of 279%, because that's what it would take turn €7,500 (the cost to you) into €28,408.

Okay, your fund may have gone down in value by 10% because of the coronavirus. meaning your fund reduced in value by €2,841. But don't forget, in this example you've only personally contributed €7,500 so you're still up €18,067 which is an increase of 241% over five years.

So, you can look at this impact in two ways (a) be upset that your fund has gone down in value by 10% or (b) be happy that even though markets are down, your fund has still grown by 241% over the past five years, when you consider the actual amount you put in.

And if you didn't have any contributions, employer you're still up 170% over the past five years, even with this recent fall.

You can run the same scenario for people who have been contributing for 35 years, and they're still way ahead of what they've personally contributed, which is sometimes forgotten by people. But unfortunately, it's just the way we are, because losses make us feel worse than gains make us feel better by a factor of 2:1.

I'll leave you with a wise comment by the great Jim Rohn, a superb motivational speaker and author, who used to say when he was alive, that good news usually follows bad news.

And, we are in a period of bad news with the Covid19 outbreak, and markets are reacting negatively. But as I said already, history is full of disasters, but here's the thing: markets recover and I've sure the same will happen in this instance. THURSDAY, MARCH 5, 2020

How to make your hair look thicker

've written quite a lot about hair and hair loss over the years because it's a subject that comes up a lot when you ask guys what they'd like to read about or learn more about.

In a recent Instagram Q&A, I was once again asked for some tips on how to make thinning hair look thicker so in the spirit of giving the people what they want – here are some tips and treatments that will help combat thinning hair.

First of all, my hair is thinning and so is yours. That's not a revelation or an insult, but an absolute fact of life. Some guys will go balder a lot earlier compared to others but once we reach adulthood our luscious locks are only going one way.

By the age of 50, 85% of men will have experienced hair loss to some degree. It's all down to a hormone called DHT (dihydrotestosterone), which is converted from testosterone and causes fair follicles to miniaturise, contributing to thinning hair and baldness.

Whatever your hair type or degree of hair loss the most important piece of advice I can give

is to speak to your GP/dermatologist before taking any form of action

before taking any form of action.

Despite what you might have seen on The Simpsons or a popup ad on the internet, the solution is never as simple as splashing a potion or taking a tablet to get an overnight afro.

While there are natural stimulation treatments that involve applying topical lotions to the scalp to stimulate blood flow to the scalp and stimulate the root, they don't work for everyone and it's very important to have a proper consultation with a medical professional before trying them.

GROOMING

The next piece of very basic advice I can give is don't groom yourself bald. Men are a lot more image-conscious these days and some guys even get their hair cut every couple of days.

Keeping a well-groomed head of hair can take a bit of work and upkeep, but some heating, drying and styling techniques can harm your hair in the long run. Treatments such as colouring, blow-drying, straightening and getting hair extensions can all damage your hair and contribute to thinning.

If you're already thinning then are ways to style it to look thicker but it's not as simple as growing your hair as long as possible.

While it's easy to think that the longer hair will cover the thinning areas, the hair actually tends to separate, making the scalp visible and the thinning hair look even finer.

Keeping your hair short is the better way to go as it will look fuller and asking your barber to "cut your hair blunt" will make it look thicker. Another good tip is the keep the sides cut shorter – that sick fade if you will – as the appearance of shorn scalp at the sides will give the appearance that the hair on top is thicker.

Don't go too heavy on the styling products and definitely avoid anything "wet-look". Thick styling clays and pastes can weigh down finer hair making the scalp more visible and making the hair more vulnerable to damage. A little sprinkle of volumising powder goes a long way.

TREATMENTS

HAIR TRANSPLANTS

Hair transplantation is the process of moving hair follicles from an area of thicker hair – usually the back of the head – to balding areas. Hair transplants have come a long way since the days of "plugs" and long linear scars on the back of the head.

Not only is the process less invasive (and brutal), but the results are more natural-looking than ever. It's also becoming more affordable and no longer just an option for rich celebrities and sports stars. Thinned areas can be filled in and recession can be treated effectively. But don't start booking flights to Turkey just yet.

Do your research and find a reputable skilled surgeon, not just a cheap one. Also, know that a hair transplant is not a universal quick fix and it doesn't work on everyone.

It's also a bad idea to undergo a hair transplant at too young an age as your hair may continue to thin and recede which means multiple surgeries and a hefty bill. Finally, be aware that the results won't be fully visible for 12 months and will require some up-keep.

MINOXIDIL

Minoxidil is the name given to

the active ingredient in Regaine/Rogaine. It helps combat male pattern baldness by reversing miniaturisation and stimulating blood flow around hair follicles, to extend the follicle's growth phase.

It's been proven to work in helping guys to hold onto the hair they have by slowing down the process but it won't regrow hair or bring back lost hair and if you stop using it at any point, the result can be rapid and severe hair loss. Again, consult your GP before starting treatment.

FINASTERIDE

Considered by many to be the next step after Regaine. Finasteride is a drug that blocks the conversion of testosterone into DMT. It also increases hair density but be warned, it can have side effects and there have long been concerns about its effect on the sexual and mental health of some users. It's sold under the names Proscar and Propecia and you do need a doctors prescription.

SHAMPOOS

There are some effective shampoos available that contain a protein molecule that attaches to the hair making it appear thicker and fuller. Nioxin was specially developed for finer hair while products such as Aussie Aussome Volume and Bumble & Bumble Full Potential will give a cosmetically thicker look to your hair.

PLATELET RICH PLASMA

PRP is a treatment where blood is taken from your arm and spun in a centrifuge to separate the red blood cells, plasma and platelet-rich plasma. This is then injected into

the thinning areas to increase hair density. You obviously have to have this done in a clinic and each to their own, but if you're willing to do this then you should probably look into having a hair transplant.

LASER THERAPY

Low-level laser light therapy boosts blood flow to the scalp and follicles. It also improves cellular metabolism and increases the diameter of miniaturised hairs. It involves sitting under a laser light a few times a week for 20/30 minutes

HAIR FIBRES

Sold under the name Toppik, cotton fibres are sprinkled over the thinning area and they bond with the hair follicles to give a denser look with near-instant results. Toppik is commonly used in movies and TV to give the appearance of full hair coverage. Google "Alan from Two And A Half Men Toppik" for evidence of same.

COSMETIC HAIR SYSTEMS

Also known as a 21st Century wig but that seems a little simplistic as cosmetic hair systems are far more sophisticated then and old fashioned weave.

Cosmetic hair systems are very hard to tell apart from real hair as they use high-quality human hair bonded to a polyurethane base that comes ready styled.

As with all of these options and solutions, do your research. Avoid anything that puts a lot of tension on your hair and scalp and try to look for breathable solutions that don't smother the scalp with adhesive or require existing hair to be shaved on application.

Probiotic support for flu season

TTH wild winter storms passing the batton and our health threatened by both local and now foreign viruses, the best you can do is to look after your immune system.

There are innumerous nutrients and herbs available in your health store that might come in handy, but neither would be any good unless your gut is healthy. It might surprise some that we need to start the immune

support from the belly. This long tube, called the digestive tract is our first line of defence against microbial invaders and houses up to 80% of our immune cells.

The little crossover that roars with power

Ford Puma: leaps into dealerships

FORD has resurrected the Puma nameplate for its new five-door small crossover which has just arrived in Ireland.

Ford Ireland believe new Puma will prove very popular in the Irish market, competing in the small crossover/SUV segment which is the fastest growing segment in Ireland. They say the car has the attributes to stand out from among its many competitors with its mild hybrid technology, enhanced fuel efficiency, performance and fun to drive character, its class leading cargo space, up-to-the-minute technology, and its really good driveability.

At the Puma's launch last week, John Manning, Ford Ireland Market Lead said: "Put all of these attributes together and that is a winning formula."

Ford already has its Kuga competing in this segment.

Size-wise in the Blue Oval's line-up, the five-door Puma sits above the EcoSport small SUV.

Puma's SUV-inspired proportions deliver a raised ride-height which many consumers appreciate as such cars allow ease of getting in and out and deliver better visibility than most hatchbacks or saloon cars.

Puma also represents a new chapter in Ford's design identity with styling cues including distinctive wing-top mounted headlamps and athletic lines....

The car is powered at launch only by a three-cylinder EcoBoost 1.0 petrol engine with mild-hybrid technology that uses regenerated energy to give an electrical boost on acceleration. The power output is 125hp. Co2 is 127g/km for all trim levels.

Puma's styling belies unprecedented compact crossover practicality with flexible stowage solutions including best-in-class load space of 456 litres. A flexible load compartment can comfortably fit a box 112cm long, 97cm wide and 43cm high with the second row of seats folded down flat.

We discovered a very useful surprise below the boot floor. Ford's MegaBox provides a deep storage space with a capacity of 80 litres. Measuring 764 mm wide, 753 mm long and 306 mm deep, this MegaBox is a storage solution than can house unstable items up to around 115 cm tall, houseplants, or even two golf bags in an upright position and they won't fall over in transport. Alternatively, with the lid down, the space can be used to hide away dirty sports equipment or muddy Wellies. As the MegaBox has synthetic lining and a drain plug in the bottom, it is easy to clean with water.

For even greater versatility, the boot floor can also be easily adjusted using just one hand to suit your load requirements, and to hold one of three positions in the cargo area. In the lowest position, you can have the maximum storage volume available while concealing the MegaBox; in the high position, the area underneath increases to create a cargo floor that is level with the fold-flat second-row seats; when removed, the floor can be securely stored vertically against the back of the second-row seats for full 456 litre capacity.

Loading the Puma is made easy Ford's segment-first hands-free tailgate technology that we've previously seen in the Kuga. This system allows you access the boot space even when your arms are full of groceries, small children or sports equipment, by using a simple kicking motion under the rear bumper. There's also a parcel shelf in the tailgate solving the problem of what to do with the parcel shelf when loading, unloading or carrying large items. tailgate-mounted luggage cover moves in unison with the

Titanium trim includes 17-inch alloys, machined headlamps with LED day time running lamps; auto high beam; 8-inch SYNC with Navigation and FordPass Connect modem; keyless start; electronic air con; lumbar massage driver and passenger seats; wireless charging, cruise control etc, and a rear spoiler. The ST-Line adds sports body kit; a large rear spoiler; fog lamps with cornering; ST-Line sports exhaust; 12.3-inch digital cluster; flat bottom steering wheel; alloy pedal and gear knob. The top spec adds 18-inch alloys; SYNC Gen 3 8-inch



premium sound system; partial leather sports trim; and privacy glass. Advanced driver assistance

technologies include Adaptive Cruise Control, and new local hazard information which can inform the driver of hazardous situations in the road ahead before they become visible to the driver or via the car's sensors.

Premium specification Puma Titanium X and ST-Line X Vignale variants are also available.

At the launch, John Manning of Ford Ireland said while Puma has missed out on the important January 201 sales period that represents 50pc of sales, he anticipates its sales for the rest of 2020 to reach four digits and the car to account for a more substantial share of Ford sales in Ireland next

Driving the car from its launch at Newlands Cross Golf Club in south Dublin down the N7 proved the car's driving credentials and good acceleration. We also liked the high driving position. The interior was stylish, sporty and comfy and 6-speed manual gearbox worked a treat.

We look forward to a longer test drive in the near future.

Road noise is well insulated from the cabin too, while overall ride comfort is impressive.

The Rifter's small octagonal steering wheel is similar to that found in other Peugeot models, and is very responsive to driver inputs,

while the smooth, short-throw manual gearbox adds a sporty feel to the mix.

The distinctive personality of the new Rifter is visible everywhere – from the rugged wheel-arch and body cladding, to the durable materials used in the cabin, and its charismatic and robust build quality.

Based on Peugeot's award-winning Partner panel van (International Van


