### Gold and silver item worth €10k

**GARDAI** are investigating the theft of a Limerick mavoral chain - believed to be worth €10,000 - from the glove box of a politician's car.

Independent councillor Frankie Daly, who was deputising for the metropolitan mayor of Limerick over the weekend, left the chain of office in his car overnight in readiness for an event this Monday.

But he was left reeling after realising the gold-andsilver insignia had been stolen from the car parked outside his home in the Irish Estates, Corbally.

He has formally reported

the theft to the gardai. And the car - a 2003 Toyota Avensis – has been sent for a forensic examination, and gardai are appealing for the safe return of the chain. "It's unbelievable. Mv

heart sank into my boots when I realised it had gone. I was in total shock," Cllr Daly said, "This chain belongs to the people: It's an attack on the people of Limerick."

Metropolitan mayor Cllr Sean Lynch called the theft an "act of desperation" so close to Christmas.

Cllr Daly said he believed his car key was cloned, as his vehicle did not appear to have had any damage done to it.

A number of other items were taken from the motor, including Christmas

# Crash survivor 'shining a light'

A UNIVERSITY of Limerick student has dedicated his time to helping the homeless community, after a chance encounter in the United States last Christmas while recovering from a near fatal car crash.

Padraic Rocliffe, from Westport, Mayo, broke his neck, back and foot in a serious road accident in Death Valley, while living and working in the States last summer.

"I was on my own in the States for Christmas while I was recovering."

"There's a serious homelessness problem over in the States," Mr Rocliffe told the Limerick Leader.

"I met two homeless people, a mother and her son, begging on the street so I brought them a meal in a dinner and got chatting to them about their lives."

"I was very happy to have their company," he added.

"I found out they had been evicted because they had been unable to pay their rent."

"I said if I could do any-

thing to make a difference when I was recovered, I would."

Inspired by this experience, Mr Rocliffe set up 'Shine a Light' - a group of volunteers who are determined to raise awareness on the current the homelessness crisis in Ireland.

Mr Rocliffe and a team of 50 volunteers hit the streets of Dublin last weekend, distributing 140 packages to rough sleepers.

Theses packs included hats, scarfs, gloves, socks, trousers, plasters and other necessities that were all donated to the group following an appeal.

"The crash was definitely

a tough experience. I was basically stuck in a wheelchair. It totally changed my perspective on life."

" I definitely knew that I would recover, and I'm still in recovery. I knew I would organise something but I have been blown away by the response. It goes to show there's such a big interest in our homelessness crisis." Mr Rocliffe is now organ-

Mr Rocliffe is now organising a second 'Shine a Light' campaign to run in the New Year in Cork City.

"I'm very disappointed this would happen in a quiet neighbourhood, that Limerick people would try and profit from stealing from other's property," he said. Metropolitan mayor


Metropolitan mayor Lynch appealed for the safe return of the chain.

"It's just desperation, the time of year that is in it."


The ex-detective garda warned people against leaving items in cars overnight.

# **Community 'devastated' at murder of 'beautiful soul'**

THE SCENE of the murder of an elderly widow in Limerick city will remain closed until Wednesday afternoon, as gardai continue to investigate the circumstances surrounding Rose Hanrahan's horrific death.

On Monday morning, local passers-by observed garda forensics units exit their vehicles and enter the home of the late Rose and Michael Hanrahan, both of whom have been described as "great members of the community".

In response to the loss felt by many in Thomondgate, the community is expected to soon show their solidarity with an evening vigil outside the 78-year-old victim's New Road bungalow.

Leading the vigil will be parish priest Fr Donal Mc-Namara, who said that Rose - who attended Mass every Saturday evening at St Munchin's Church — "had tremendous faith".

"She was always very upbeat, very reassuring, very affirming, and very appreciative for anything that was ever done," he told the Limerick Chronicle on Monday afternoon.

Fr McNamara described the murder as "totally uncalled for, unnecessary, and

I just can't explain it. Words can't explain what went on". Since gardai cordoned off

the small bungalow with white tape and a patrol of vehicles last Friday afternoon, loved ones and friends paid tribute have with flowers and heartfelt notes outside Rose's home,

just 10 minute walk from the Treaty Stone.

One neighbour penned: "For a beautiful soul, a lovely person and a great friend. Hope you are happy now that you are reunited with your husband Mick."

Rose acted as Michael's carer until he died less than five years ago.

Gardai at Mayorstone and Henry Street initiated the murder probe after Rose's body was found at her home on Friday afternoon. It is believed that the woman died violently, possibly after a break-in to her home.

Superintendent Derek Smart told the Chronicle that gardai were granted an additional 48-hour extension of the scene. He said that it has been "devastating" for everyone in the community, and is appealing for people to come forward with information.

# Councillors will get to see €150m plans

COUNCIL boss Conn Murray will present plans for the €150m Project Opera to councillors ahead of submitting them to An Bord Pleanala.

It has emerged in recent weeks that following legal advice, members of Limerick City and County Council will not decide on the high-rise office proposal for the city.

However, this move has enraged some members, and Cllr Cian Prendiville wants to see councillors hold a meeting on this in January, in the hopes some housing can be included

At this month's metropolitan meeting, he had a notice of motion heard calling on councillors to discuss the new planning application.

"The result of this is that the 27 submissions were, as Novas said, now 'null and

void'. It's wrong that metropolitan councillors will not have the final say, I suggest we correct this by requesting a full meeting of the council to discuss this. My primary concern is the issue of including social and residential houses there," he said.

However, meetings administrator Christy O'Connor told the northside councillor that the fresh application to An Bord Pleanala – although several months away – will be brought to council meeting.

Despite this, Cllr Prendiville is still likely to seek a public meeting on the matter. He needs the support of four fellow members for this.

However, Cllr Daniel Butler, Fine Gael, said: "We do not need a full council meeting on this. The public have made their submissions. What the council has presented to us is a masterplan which may change."

Cllr John Gilligan, Independent, said while he would be supportive of his colleague's motion, he did not back housing in Opera.

"Just because it's a huge site does not mean there needs to be housing. There are no homes in Patrick Street, the Eastlink buisness park, the National Technology Park and the Crescent. They are designed for different things," he said.

Cllr Joe Leddin, Labour said: "It's unfortunate right as it comes to the end of the project, we are cut out."

### Personal dispute led to violent street encounter

TWO men who were involved in a number of violent incidents on the northside of the city have avoided immediate prison sentences, *writes David Hurlev*.

David McCarthy, aged 25 and John Stanners-Mc-Carthy, aged 20, both of Cliona Park Moyross, pleaded guilty to charges relating to two separate incidents which happened 18 months apart.

Limerick Circuit Court was told the first incident happened outside a house at Distillery View, Thomondgate on March 28, 2014, while the second happened at Cliona Park on September 22, 2015

September 22, 2015. Judge Tom O'Donnell was told a personal dispute was at the centre of the incident at Distillery View which led to a verbal and physical altercation taking place.

A number of weapons were produced during the incident and a woman sustained a hand injury during the melee.

During the second incident, which happened at around 5pm on September 22, 2015, the defendants were part of a group which approached a house in an aggressive fashion.

A stand-off followed during which the accused men can been seen on CCTV armed with a baseball bat and a hockey stick.

Both men made admissions when arrested a number of days later and the court was told there have been no further difficulties since.

Judge O'Donnell noted that John Stanners-Mc-Carthy has no previous convictions and that he had acted out of a "misguided sense of loyalty" to his older brother.

David McCarthy, who has a number of previous convictions, has drug addiction issues but is looking to get on with the rest of his life.

The judge said there was an "element of mob rule" to what happened and he said he was concerned there was a feud in the background.

He sentenced John Stanners-McCarthy to two years and six years' imprisonment, suspending the sentence in its entirety.

David McCarthy received a similar sentence with the judge directing that he receive full credit for all of the time which he has served in custody since 2015.

# Man forced student to withdraw money from cash point

#### A YOUNG man has admitted falsely imprisoning a student and forcing him to withdraw a quantity of cash from an ATM near his home.

When arraigned at Limerick Circuit Court, Jason Power, aged 20, of Collins Avenue, Ballinacurra Weston also pleaded guilty to a burglary charge relating to a break-in at College Court, Castletroy in the early hours of June 7, last.

Judge Tom O'Donnell was told a mobile phone and around  $\epsilon_{40}$  in cash were taken during the burglary which happened at around 1.40am.

Having considered the garda file relating to the incident, the Director of Public Prosecutions directed trial on indictment and the matter was sent forward for trial to the circuit court once a book of evidence was completed and a copy served on him.

After John O'Sullivan BL, instructed by state solicitor Padraig Mawe, indicated that Mr Power's guilty pleas were

acceptable to the State, he said it was a case where the victim had been taken from his home to the ATM machine where he was forced to with-draw money.

Pat Whyms BL, instructed by solicitor Sabina Hegerty, said his client had entered an early plea and he submitted a probation report would be of benefit to the court.

Judge O'Donnell agreed and he directed that a report be prepared ahead of a sentencing hearing in February.

Mr Power, who has a number of previous convictions, faces a maximum possible sentence of life imprisonment.

Another person is before the courts charged in connection with the same offences.

# Suspended jail sentence for man embroiled in violent fight in city

A MAN involved in a violent melee, in which an individual was stabbed in the face, has received a suspended prison sentence after entering an early guilty plea.

John Bardon, aged 30, who has an address of Cliona Park, Moyross, pleaded guilty to one charge of violent disorder relating to an incident outside Fine Wines off-license on Parnell Street on March 16, 2014.

The accused appeared in court in December 2016 after being extradited from the UK on foot of an uncontested European Arrest Warrant on October 12, 2016.

During a sentencing hearing last year, Sergeant Brian O'Connor said the defendant was one of a number of men who were involved in a fight outside an



offlicence at around 6.30pm.

He said while the four men initially exchanged verbal insults, the dispute quickly got physical culminating in another man being stabbed in his left cheek.

During related proceedings, Judge Tom O'Donnell was shown a photograph of the victim's blood-stained face with the knife still protruding from his face.

Detective Garda O'Connor accepted that Mr Bardon, who fled to the UK following the incident, was not the main protagonist and did not stab the other man.

However, he said there was "clear evidence of violent disorder" on CCTV footage of the incident.

The court heard that Bardon had been working in the UK.

The court heard that the accused "expressed remorse" and that there "has been no trouble since 2014".

Judge Tom O'Donnell suspended a 16-month prison sentence "on the condition that he keeps the peace", and on his own bond of  $\varepsilon 100$ .

# Hospital faces bill of €2,400 bill for automatic doorway

Following the repairs, the UL Hospitals Group has plans to install a revolving door at its entrance, with a wheelchair-accessible side door.

Until then, patients, visitors and staff have continue to access the main reception area through an adjacent door.

A spokesperson for UL Hospitals Group said: "The

automatic door at the main entrance to UHL has been out of order for approximately four weeks.

"The failure of the operator resulted from a water ingress issue which has since been resolved. A replacement operator has been ordered and is due to arrive within two weeks. The cost of repairs is approximately €2,400." He added: "The surf.

He added: "The automatic entrance door is periodically disabled, particularly during times of inclement weather, in the interests of the comfort of patients, visitors and staff in the main reception/coffee dock area."

The spokesperson said that its plans for a revolving door are "subject to a planning application and capital funding that has been applied for under the 2018 estimates process".

Reacting to UHL's faulty automatic door, Sinn Fein councillor Malachy Mc-Creesh told the Chronicle:

"Based on the reasons outlined by hospital management as regards the inadequate effectiveness of the current doors, the installation of the revolving door would appear to be the best option. The cost to repair the existing "operator" appears excessive so obtaining the planning permission and appropriate funding in the short term would be the better solution."

# Robbery accused on Central Mental Hospital waiting list

A JUDGE has expressed concern that a man who is accused of robbing €200 from a jewellery store in the city remains in prison despite having been declared unfit to stand trial.

It is alleged the 30-year-old defendant threatened a female member of staff with a large knife after he entered Seoidin, Thomas Street at around 11am on March 10, last.

During a hearing in October, Consultant Forensic Psychiatrist Anthony Kearns, who is attached to the Central Mental Hospital in Dublin, said he had examined the defendant a number of times after concerns were expressed about his mental health and his ability to enter a plea.

He said the accused man suffers from a Schizo defective disorder and that he also has an intellectual disability. He added he has an IQ which places him the lowest percentile in the country.

Dr Kearns told Mark Nicholas SC, defending, he found the defendant "to be very incoherent" and that he was not able to consider the charges "in any reasonable way" when he examined him.

The witness said he did not believe the defendant is

capable of instructing his legal advisers or of following court proceedings.

When asked by Mr Nicholas, Dr Kearns agreed the accused man's problems are 'chronic' and are comI'm completely uncomfortable with the fact he is still in prison Judge Tom O'Donnell

pounded by his use of illicit drugs.

He said he did not believe that detaining him at the Central Mental Hospital was an option as it would not be "an effective use of resources".

However, during a review of the case, Judge Tom O'Donnell was told the defendant's clinical position has since detonated and that he has now been placed on a waiting list to be admitted to the Central Mental Hospital.

Mr Nicholas said it's accepted by all parties that his client will require long term care in the appropriate setting and that he is likely to be admitted to the CMH early in the new year.

"Clearly everyone is moving in the right direction," he said adding that he may have to "take action" if there is any further delay.

Adjourning the matter to the new year, Judge Tom O'Donnell said he has enormous concerns,

"I'm completely uncomfortable with the fact that he is still in prison when he should be in hospital," he said.

The judge directed that an up-to-date report be prepared for the court ahead of the next date.

Previously, he was told the defendant's illnesses can be treated with regular medication but Dr Kearns said he did not believe he would attend any outpatient appointments to receive his medication.

While not disputing the medical evidence, John O'Sullivan BL prosecuting, pointed out that suffering from a mental disorder does not, in itself, preclude someone from going on trial.

The matter may proceed at a future date if the defendant's condition improves to such an extend that he is declared fit to stand trial.

## Funding still the issue amid new community centre calls

THE issue of funding will still need to be addressed if Garryowen is to get a longawaited permanent community centre.

That's according to Council official Seamus O'Connor, responding to a motion from Solidarity councillor Paul Keller over the provision of a facility for one of the largest estates in the city. At present, the Garryowen Community Development Project (CDP) is based in a unit just off Mulgrave Street, originally slated for retail.

Nearing the end of a twoyear lease, staff of the CDP – who provide a variety of services to the estate – expressed a desire to move into the area proper. At this month's metropolitan district meeting, Cllr Keller lodged a notice of motion calling for a report from Council bosses in getting the "long-promised" facility for the area.

"The people of Garryowen have long been calling for their own community centre, similar to those in Moyross, St Munchin's, Kileely, Southill and Queen of Peace. Lobbying from local politicians, councillors and the business community seems to have failed over the years. Fiftyfive years since it was built, the community is still looking for a proper, purposebuilt local community centre," Cllr Keller said.

Over the years, efforts to open a centre at the Markets Field stadium and the former Brannigans Bar have come to nothing.

Fellow City East councillor Séighin Ó Ceallaigh, Sinn Fein, added: "Garryowen is an example of what we mentioned earlier, a big estate with no amenities. It is not much to ask for such a huge housing development to have its own community centre."

Cllr Marian Hurley, Fine Gael, suggested the Alzheimer resource centre at Kilmurry Court move to St Joseph's Hospital and allow the community centre move in there.

But Fianna Fail councillor Kieran O'Hanlon said: "There is only one solution and that is to build on a greenfield site. It's not just Garryowen where there are no community centres: you have Hilltop, Norwood, Rhebogue and Singland too."

Cllr Michael Sheahan, Fine Gael said: "In some areas of the county, the community centres are sitting idle, while the local population is fading away. It's a real contradiction in terms."

#### **CRUELTY: DONKEY PUT IN CARE AFTER HEAD COLLAR INCIDENT**

# **ISPCA seeking help** over horrific injuries

A DONKEY that had suffered horrific head injuries caused by a rope collar has been rescued in Limerick and removed into care.

The animal was rescued from the Southill area of Limerick city by the ISPCA after a report was made to National Animal the Cruelty Helpline.

Irish Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ISPCA) inspector Emma Carroll, who investigated the report, said the donkey's injuries were caused by a head collar which was "severely embedded on the donkey's nose, chin and poll area".

"The smell of infection from the donkey's face was so overpowering and he was visibly distressed. I immediately called for help and the donkey was removed into the care of the ISPCA Equine

Rescue Centre where he received urgent veterinary treatment before being transported to the Donkey Sanctuary," said Insp Carroll. the

Unfortunately donkey was not microchipped and the ISPCA is appealing to the public for information in relation to its origin.

This is an injury caused by sheer neglect, lack of observation and care on an owner's behalf. There is absolutely no excuse for the pain and suffering caused to this defenceless animal. It is paramount owners check the welfare of their animals daily. It is also a stark reminder why rope should never be used to make headcollars as they can cause horrific injuries," said Inspector Carroll.

The ISPCA inspector thanked the donkey sanc-tuary and the local people of Southill who assisted her in catching the animal.

### Three facing jail for street attack on two brothers

THREE young men who attacked two brothers have been ordered to present themselves at Limerick Prison early in the new vear after they each received lengthy prison sentences. writes David Hurley.

Terry Harris, aged 20, of Lord Edward Street; Dylan O'Leary, aged 20, of Upper Carey's Road and David Johnson, aged 26, of Upper Carey's Road pleaded guilty to robbery and violent disorder relating to an incident at Denmark Street at 4am on February 1, 2015.

Limerick Circuit Court was told one of the brothers was followed and "viciously assaulted" by a group of up to seven youths after he confronted them for emptying rubbish bins onto the footpath near the restaurant.

Judge Tom O'Donnell was told when the man's brother, who works as a taxi driver, intervened he was attacked and robbed of around €1,200 in cash and an iPhone 5.

One of the brothers sustained bruising as a result of being repeatedly kicked and punched while the second sustained cuts to his face.

The victims, who were

described in court as "extremely hard working citizens" were said to be traumatised following the incident as they could not understand why they had been targeted.

CCTV footage was obtained as part of the garda investigation and the defendants made admissions following their arrest.

Imposing sentence, Judge O'Donnell described as "sinister" footage which showed the men swapping their clothing after they fled the scene.

Describing what happened as an "unprovoked attack on two defenseless victims" he said the use of the violence, the randomness of what happened and the theft of property were all aggravating factors.

He said the defendants' admissions and guilty pleas and the positive contents of probation reports were mitigating factors along with their youth and genuine remorse.

He sentenced Johnson to three and-a-half years' imprisonment suspending the final 12 months. Harris and O'Leary each received three year sentences with the final 18 months suspended.


Think vegetables first!

# The Autonomy Project looks to harness the power of youth

NEW music project has been launched in Limerick which will harness the power and the resurgence of activism within young people.

The Autonomy Project is a bold and exciting initiative that focuses on a global resurgence in art and Youth activism, providing a platform to explore how we can express individual autonomy in our society. This project proposes to provide a platform to the young people of Limerick to explore, through art, how they can express themselves across a range of issues such as identity, gender orientation, social justice and voice.

UNGRET local Emma Mullane has been bringing joy to women in Limerick with her specially made chemo care pouches. Emma, a stylist with Stella & Dot decided to start putting together the pouches after one of her American colleagues came up with the idea.

In 2016, Emma made 30 pouches and in the past year, she donated 56 pouches to clinics in Limerick. The pouches are given to women when they arrive at the clinics before they start chemotherapy.

Each pouch contains items designed to bring a little bit of comfort to women who are about to start the process of chemotherapy. Emma got advice on what sort of things she should include in the pouches based on what symptoms women experience while receiving chemotherapy. Emma explained: "I heard that their hands and their feet could get quite cold, so I included fluffy socks and gloves, a natural hand cream because they don't include any chemicals, lip balm, a notebook and a pencil because a friend of mine who went through treatment said she became very forgetful so it would be handy to have a notebook to write things down. I also included a magazine, ginger tea bags, ginger sweets to help with nausea. Bellissimo also donated 60 €10 vouchers and information packs about the fabulous wig clinic that they have.'

Emma is a stylist with Stella & Dot, an accessories company and it was her own customers who donated the funds for Emma to purchase the items needed for the pouches.

"I thought that because the pouches would be going to women local to me that I would be helping the local community which really appealed to me. A lot of stylists around Ireland have actually got on board with the idea too and around 500 pouches have been donated to units around the country." Well done Emma!





IN-FORM Munster switch their focus back to the Guinness Pro14 and a glamour St Stephen's Day interprovincial derby with arch rivals Leinster at Thomond Park, 3.15pm, following their Champions Cup heroics at Welford Road.

Munster took control of Pool 4 of the Champions Cup, moving four points clear of second-placed Racing 92, after scoring an impressive 25-16 victory over Leicester Tigers on Sunday.

Munster's St Stephen's Day clash with Leinster in the first of three interprovincial derbies last season's beaten Pro14 finalists will play over the Christmas and New Year's period.

Munster travel to Belfast to take on Ulster in Kingspan Stadium on New Year's Day, 5.35pm, before hosting Connacht at Thomond Park on January 6, 7.45pm.

Keith Earls is set to make his return from injury for Munster in the December 26 clash with Leinster.

Earls, who has been sidelined with a hamstring injury, was on the bench for Munster's Champions Cup fixture with Leicester Tigers on Sunday.

Earls is excited about the prospect of returning to play after being sidelined for six weeks.

Earls said: "I am delighted, it is not going to be as long as originally first thought.

"It was a hamstring tear. It was a Grade 2. They first thought the tendon was gone with it as well, which would have been massive, would have made it a lot longer.

"Thankfully in the second scan it either healed or didn't tear, so it won't be as long. "It is a tough schedule playing three interpro fixtures over Christmas and the New Year, but that is great for the supporters. Around Christmas having a few beers, watching a game, people home from other countries who have been working away.

"I suppose we will sacrifice the Christmas dinner for the supporters!

Earls will be hoping for an injury free run through a crucial period for Munster in January as the 6 Nations Championship looms large.

"I think when I look back on all my injuries a lot of them have been bad timing. It haven't been massive months long, bar one or two, they have been four weeks and get getting to game time before the November international series or 6 Nations and you can't really put your hand up to get back in, but that is sport for you.

"I am delighted now that I am back on the road, hopefully get a few games before the 6 Nations so I can put my hand up because the boys were flying it in November.

"When I was younger I picked up a lot of injuries. I think this is my first serious injuries in the bones of three years.

"You do get used to injuries and you get used to the view that this is sport and these things happen. It is not the worse thing in the world and it gives you the chance to work on something else as well."

The capacity of Thomond Park will be increased to 26,267 for the Leinster clash as a result of the additional seating.

Ticket sales have already surpassed 22,000 for the Guinness Pro 14 clash. The East and West Stands are now sold out for the festive fixture. **SPORT**


