the farcical situation of two mayors, and the sooner that changes, the better. What will be interesting to find out is what executive powers the new mayor will have and other details about the job, including salary and term.


We believe the position is for five years and there is bound to be huge interest, but it does throw up a tantalising prospect of candidates from

Bambu on 0' Connell Street is fabulous. I love an Indian and their food is top quality, really reasonable as well. Limerick does have some great food options though


depending on what you're looking for. An honourable mention must go to the Glen Tavern at lunchtimes as they even know my order at this stage!

Teenager assaulted by group of men at taxi rank in city

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No arrests have been made in connection with an assault on a teenager in Limerick city centre in the early hours of Sunday morning.

The incident took place near a taxi rank on O'Connell Street near

Bedford Row at around 3am on Sunday, September 30.

It is understood that the 18-year-old victim witnessed a man being attacked by a group of men, and attempted to intervene.

The young man was then attacked by the group, and it is understood he sustained kicks to the head and hand.

The 18-year-old was taken to University Hospital Limerick, where his injuries were treated as "minor" according to gardai.

According to a source, the victim suffered a broken nose, damage to thumb ligaments and a split lip. The 18-year-old, who is a college student, was discharged on Sunday morning.

Gardai launched an investigation

into the assault on Sunday afternoon, however no individual or individuals have been arrested in connection with the early morning incident. A spokesperson said that investigations are ongoing. Ground investigation works cost €443k

Contract: One company tendered for O'Connell St project

MORE than €400,000 was spent on ground investigation works as part of the multi-million euro revitalisation of O'Connell Street, it can be revealed.

Documents, including invoices, obtained by this newspaper under the Freedom of Information Act show just one company tendered for the contract to carry out the works after it was publicly advertised early last year.

Tender documents state the purpose of the contact was to "identify in greater detail the location and nature of existing buried services in the street, as well as the extent and details of the existing basements in the street and the existing obsolete sewer tunnel under the street".

The works, which involved the

creation of 85 "slit trenches" were carried out along the full length of O'Connell Street from its the junction with Newenham Street and Barrington Street to Patrick Street.

"The site (O'Connell Street) is heavily trafficked with a number of junctions and access to adjoining side streets. The site is underlain by various services and is also underlain by vaulted basements and a Victorian sewer," stated briefing documents which were issued as part of the tender process.

Following the conclusion of the tender process in February 2017, Priority Geotechnical Limited was awarded the contract by Limerick City and County Council.

Internal correspondence between officials within the council state the tender from the Cork-based company was deemed to be "the Most Economically Advantageous" after it was assessed by ARUP Consulting Engineers on behalf of the local authority.

Priority Geotechnical Limited was also approved to act as Project Construction Superviser Stage on the works.

The cost of the works, which were carried out over several months last year, totalled €443,762. 29 (including VAT).

The monies were paid in full by Limerick City and County Council earlier this year.

Plans for the multi-million euro revitalisation of O'Connell Street are set to come before An Bord Pleanala in the coming months as the planning process is to proceed outside of the normal Part 8 process.

The project, which will cost around €9m in total is being part funded by the European Union with the remainder of the money coming from local and national sources.

In her 'searing testimony', Ms McCabe will recall how she was fully sure that his killers would be given life sentences, and her shock when they were convicted for manslaughter rather than murder.

Ms McCabe will also reflect on how she took a stand for the memory of her deceased husband when 'whispers' started circulating that his killers would be released under an early release programme under the Good Friday Agreement.

Speaking in the programme, Ms McCabe says that she misses her husband

very day.

"When you lose the love of your life the way I lost Jerry, it makes you a totally different person. You never get over losing them," she says.

"We were a very private family, just a normal family, but we were thrown into the very deep end of the politics.

"And, sadly, Jerry was part of it even though he shouldn't have been. Jerry was just doing his job," Ms McCabe says.

Following Detective McCabe's death, Ms McCabe suffered "sleepless nights",

"I still cry quite a bit. I attended a psychiatrist for eight years after."



TD's 'grave concerns' over ban on garda overtime

DEPUTY Maurice Quinlivan has expressed grave concern at the ban on garda overtime and the implications it could have in Limerick.

The ban on discretionary overtime was implemented last week by Commissioner Drew Harris last week in a bid to keep within budget.

"Due to the lack of frontline gardaí, overtime has become a fact of life, essential just to keep a station and a district functioning on a basic level. Stations cannot function properly without it," said Deputy Quinlivan.

"There are three months in the year left, including the Christmas period, which often sees a significant spike in police work, in increased public

order issues, and burglaries," he added.

Figures released under the Freedom of Information Act show more than €1.56m was paid in overtime across the Limerick garda division during the first half of 2018.

A total of €839,684 was paid between January and March while € 722,712 was paid between April and June.

The total overtime paid to gardai in Limerick during all of 2017 was €2,501,551.



120 house fires tackled in 2017

LIMERICK Fire Service tackled more than 120 house fires in 2017, it has stated this week.

In a social media post to promote Fire Safety Awareness Week, Limerick Fire Service has offered a number of tips to the public on how to make homes more safe. "One such danger is overloaded sockets and damaged electrical goods. Each socket is only rated for 13 amps. If

you have an extension lead with four sockets on it, it doesn't necessarily mean it can take four plugs."

Limerick Fire Service warns the public

Limerick Fire Service warns the public not to use electrical items with frayed or damaged cables; avoid using spurious phone chargers and cables; don't use plugs or sockets which are damaged; and always get a registered electrician to carry out any work.

UL study links acne with 'psychological distress'

ACNE sufferers struggle with psychological distress as a result of "perceived social stigma" around their skin condition, a new study by the University of Limerick has found. A survey of 271 acne sufferers found that their own perception of how society views their appearance is associated with higher distress, with those who perceived high levels of stigma more likely to experience anxiety and depression.

Researchers Aisling O'Donnell and Jamie Davern found that acne sufferers also report further physical symptoms such as sleep disturbance, headaches and gastrointestinal problems. The study also found that more women than men reported acne as negatively impacting their wellbeing.

Cocaine, cannabis herb and ecstasy tablets are seized

GARDAI in Limerick have seized approximately €2,000 euro worth of suspected cocaine, cannabis herb and ecstasy tablets from a man that was "acting suspiciously"

Limerick made the seizure
from a man on Upper
Denmark Street on Monday.

"Shortly after 4pm a man in his 20s was stopped acting

suspiciously on Upper Denmark Street. He was searched and found to be in possession of suspect cocaine, cannabis herb and ecstasy tablets, all pending analysis, with an estimated street value of €2,000," said a garda spokesperson.

"A caution statement was taken from the man and the investigation remains on-going," added the spokesperson.



Is a directly elected mayor on the way?

Plebiscite: Local voters will be asked for views on plans

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GOVERNMENT plans to ask Limerick voters for their views on proposals for directly elected mayors have been given a cautious welcome

The decision to hold a plebiscite (vote) was agreed by the Cabinet last week and announced at the weekend by John Paul Phelan, the Minister of State for Local Government and Electoral Reform.

The plebiscite will take place next May on the same day as the local and European elections.

The exact powers and functions of any directly elected mayor have not yet been confirmed and it is not known how the idea will work in practice or what will happen with the current mayors.

The current Mayor of Limerick city and county, Cllr James Collins, says the proposal to institute a directly elected mayor for Limerick is a unique opportunity that must be grasped by the people.

"This is a real game changer for Limerick. I believe that for far too long our community has been held back by a central government that was not in tune with the wishes of local Limerick people," said the general election candidate.

"He or she will speak for the people of the

entire city and county and can drive forward the changes and improvements we all want to see. However, it is crucial that any directly elected Mayor has the executive powers

needed to drive change," he added.
Former Mayor of Limerick, Diarmuid
Scully has cautiously welcomed the
proposal.

proposal.

"A directly elected mayor will have a popular mandate, but without a majority on the council she/he will have no power," he said

However, Sinn Fein councillor Seighan O'Ceallaigh says there are questions that need to be answered before the plebiscite takes place.

"There are a lot of questions still to be answered about this proposal in relation to Limerick. It's a nice headline but we need to see the details. How many mayors will there be in Limerick? How many cathaoirligh? What type of role will it be and what relationship will the Mayor have with the Council?" he asked.

A government spokesperson says further details on the proposals will be announced nearer to May.

nearer to May.

"Further detailed proposals on the plebiscites and the questions to be put to the electorate, as well as the specific powers to be given to executive mayors, are to be brought to government in the coming months."

to government in the coming months."

If the plebiscite is approved by voters in Limerick, it is likely the first vote to elect a mayor will take place in 2021.

Voters in Cork city and in Waterford will also be asked to vote on the proposals next May while votes in Galway and Dublin have been put back.

Victim slashed across the face in 'personal' attack

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A MAN is recovering after he was slashed and stabbed repeatedly during an altercation in the city.

The victim received over 200 stitches and spent three days in hospital following the vicious attack which happened near Punch's Cross in the early hours of September 21, last.

The alleged culprit – Stephen Curtin, aged 27, of Salvia Court, Southill – was refused bail after he appeared in court charged with assault causing harm.

Detective Garda Dean Landers told Judge Marie Keane the defendant made no reply when the charge was formally put to him following his arrest.

He said the charge relates to an offence which occurred at a property at Rosbrien Terrace, Rosbrien Road, at around 4.30am.

The court was told gardai were alerted after numerous 999 calls were received in relation to a "blood-soaked" man who was in a distressed state at Punch's Cross.

Gardai later established the man had been slashed across the face three times and was also stabbed in the abdomen, back and legs.

A knife was located near the property where Mr Curtin was staying on the night and a blood-soaked tee-shirt was found inside the house.

Solicitor Tom Kiely said his client had co-operated with gardai and had given an alternative version of events to them when questioned.

He said it will be defence case that his client had been "confronted and set upon" and that he was defending himself.

In reply, Detective Garda Landers said he believed what happened was a "close personal attack".

Judge Keane was told CCTV has been obtained and that a number of items, including a car, have been seized and are to be forensically examined.

Bail was refused.

Serial offender pleads guilty to spate of shoplifting offences

A SERIAL offender has admitted stealing hundreds of euro worth of property from several stores and businesses in the city centre, *writes David Hurley*.

When arraigned at Limerick Circuit Court, Adam Hayes, aged 32, of Lee Estate, Island Road, pleaded guilty to nine separate theft charges.

Judge Tom O'Donnell was told handbags worth a total of €234.50 were stolen from Allens, William Street, on four separate occasions in January and February as well as cosmetics worth €330 from the Body Shop, O'Connell Street, on three separate dates.


The other offences, which Hayes has

admitted, relate to the theft of pizza worth €42 from Garvey's SuperValu, Grove Island, and beauty products worth €42.96 from Charlotte Quay pharmacy.

Previously, Limerick District Court heard the defendant was identified on CCTV and that he made admissions following his arrest,

Seeking an early sentencing date, barrister Brian McInerney said his client, who has more than 100 previous convictions, has been in custody since February.

Judge O'Donnell adjourned the matter to next month when he will hear evidence.



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Door now open to future concerts after Gaelic Grounds performance

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THE DOOR is now open for large scale concerts and events at the Gaelic Grounds following the hugely successful National Geographic Symphony Orchestra performance at the weekend.

It was the first ever major concert to be staged at the Ennis Road stadium, attracting upwards of 8,000 awestruck spectators.

The thousands in attendance were serenaded by the 80-strong orchestra who were accompanied by the Limerick Chamber Choir, performing to authentic National Geographic footage on some of the continent's largest high definition screens.

Gaelic Grounds chairperson Paul Foley said this Tuesday that said the success of the concert means that "the door is opened for further large-scale events" at the grounds in the future.

He said that the idea of a large scale concert had been mooted for a number of years, but the biggest challenge had been securing acts to perform at the venue.

He said Irish production company CWB were central to the performance, and also to the All-Ireland final screening and homecoming in late August.

"We learned a lot during the year of City of Culture, and Limerick does have a real interest in these sort of events, and it was great to see that manifested again through the National Geographic show on Saturday night.

"It means we have been able to demonstrate such a show can be delivered and, in fact, this is the third large scale ticketed event delivered at the Gaelic Grounds this year, over six weeks," he said.

Conductor Kevin Zakresky took social media by storm for leading the orchestra while donning the green and white Limerick jersey for the entire performance.

Mr Foley said that "was a really nice touch". He added that the orchestra and personnel thoroughly enjoyed their experience in Limerick.

"They were very, very positive about Limerick. They stayed in Limerick over the last few days. They were very, very positive about the city and the reaction of the crowd. They had great fun," he told The Leader this week.

Mayor of Limerick City and County, Cllr James Collins praised the event as a "triumph", adding that it brought significant economic impact to the region.



City rents increase by 12.4% annually

Expensive: Average monthly rent rises to €880

AVERAGE monthly rents in Limerick city have risen by more than 12% over the past year, new figures have revealed.

According to the latest Rent Index published by the Residential Tenancies Board (RTB), the average monthly rent in the city was €880 at the end of June.

This compares to $\[\epsilon 783 \]$ at the end of June 2017 and represents an increase of $\[\epsilon 36 \]$ per month (4.3%) from the end of March 2018.

The Rent Index is produced by the RTB in conjunction with the Economic and Social Research Institute (ESRI) and is based on more than 18,000 tenancies across the

country which have registered with the RTB.

The Index shows standardised average rents in the Limerick City West electoral district (city centre, Raheen, Southill) are €1,010.78 compared to €932.89 in Limerick city north (Caherdavin, Moyross, Thomondgate) and €1,084.75 in Limerick city East (Garryowen, Castletroy, Rhebogue).

Nationally, average monthly rents grew 7.6% annually and by 3.4% quarter-on-quarter.

"Affordability remains a significant issue in the rental market with continued economic and population growth contributing to rising demand. We can see rents have continued to increase with growth rates back up in Dublin,"

said Rosalind Carroll, Director of the Residential Tenancies Board.

The latest Rent Index shows average monthly rents across County Limerick as a whole have risen by 10.8% year-on-year and now stand at

Outside of the Metropolitan District of Limerick, the highest average monthly rent of €837.31 is being paid in the Adare/Rathkeale Municipal District.

An average of €691.04 is being paid in the Cappamore/Kilmallock Municipal District while average rents in the Newcastle West district are €556.73.

According to the RTB, annualised rents have increased by 7% for at least three consecutive quarters in all parts of Limerick.

Report shows property prices on the rise

THE latest Daft.ie property report has shown that houses prices have increased by 8% in Limerick and by 12% in the county.

In Limerick city, according to the latest House Price Report released by Daft.ie, prices in the third quarter of 2018 were 8% higher than a year previously, compared to a rise of 9% seen a year ago. The average house price is now €191,000, 61% above its lowest point.

In the rest of Limerick, prices in the third quarter of 2018 were 12% higher than a year previously, compared to a rise of 8% seen a year ago. The average house price is now €191,000, 45% above its lowest point.

House prices nationally rose by 1.3% in the third quarter of 2018. The website said there was a "muted price gain" for the three month period between June and September in Limerick of 1%.

Gangster had mobile phone in prison cell

GANGLAND figure Gerard Dundon has been sentenced to one months' imprisonment for having a mobile phone in jail.

Gerard Dundon, aged 32, who has addresses at Prospect, Limerick and in the UK pleaded guilty to the offence when he appeared before Portlaoise District Court.

Those charges relate to a garda operation in the village on February 26, 2017 and a related high-speed pursuit which resulted in a

Dundon has been subjected to internal prison discipline for the offence. He has been removed from the general population in the prison, but has also lost his privileges.

Man in court over alleged sex attack

Bail: Defendant released despite garda objection

A NIGERIAN man was granted bail after he appeared in court charged with sexually assaulting a woman during a house party in the city.

The 34-year-old is accused of grabbing the woman and dragging her into a bedroom in the early hours of September 30, 2017.

Opposing bail, Detective Garda Barry Moylan said it will be alleged the assault lasted for several minutes.

He said it will be alleged the man waited on the upstairs landing while the woman was in the bathroom and that he threatened her before grabbing her and assaulting her.

He said the woman, who is

married and aged in her early 30s, did not know the man prior to encountering him at the party.

The detective said the defendant has no ties to Limerick and he expressed "serious concerns" he would attempt to leave the jurisdiction if released on bail.

He said the alleged victim has identified him as the culprit and that a number of independent witnesses stated he made "several attempts" to dance with the woman and that he persistently tried to talk to her during the party.

Solicitor Sarah Ryan noted the woman did not make a formal complaint until a number of weeks after the incident and that her client was arrested and questioned earlier

She said her client, who is studying at UL, was arrested at his home address after the DPP directed he be charged having reviewed the garda investigation file.

"He was at his address, he had made no effort to leave (since his initial arrest)," she said.

Judge Marie Keane was told there was an altercation between the defendant and the woman's husband in recent months which is the subject of a separate investigation.

Judge Keane said while the defendant is facing a "very serious charge" he is entitled to the presumption of innocence.

She granted bail subject to strict conditions and adjourned the matter until next month.

Woman threatened to 'kill' her ex-partner

 $A\,WOMAN\,shouted\,she\,would\,kill\,her\,ex-partner\,after\,a\,judge$ indicated she was refusing a garda application to revoke his bail, writes David Hurley.

Following her outburst during a sitting of Limerick District Court, the woman was physically removed from the courtroom by gardai.

The 36-year-old defendant, who is facing charges in relation to an incident over the summer, was brought before the court as gardai

had concerns he was not complying with the terms of his bail.

Judge Marie Keane was told he had failed to answer his mobile phone when called and that gardai believe a message sent from his Facebook account to his ex was an attempt to intimidate her.

Addressing the court, the defendant said he did not answer the calls as the 'ringer' on his phone was broken. He said he later phoned the garda station and insisted he did not

 $send\ the\ message\ on\ Facebook$ Messenger.

As the man was giving evidence, the woman began shouting at him as she sat in the public gallery.

She claimed her ex-partner had previously threatened to kill her and she shouted if he was not remanded in custody she would "kill him myself".

Judge Keane refused the garda application and affirmed the man's original bail conditions.

Suspected arson attack condemned

THE METROPOLITAN Mayor of Limerick has condemned an arson incident allegedly caused by a group of anti-social youths in the outskirts of the

Mungret Lodge, a 150-year-old protected structure that sits at the entrance of Mungret College, sustained exterior fire damage on Friday night.

Limerick Fire Service dispatched two units to the scene at 9.25pm and quenched the flames within an hour, The Leader was told this week.

Gardai at Roxboro Road are investigating the criminal damage incident, though no arrests have been made yet as investigations are ongoing.

It is understood that, at the time of the incident, a group of youths appeared to be intoxicated while lighting fireworks in the area.

According to distressed residents, a number of youths were throwing firecrackers at homes in the Mungret Woods area on Friday night.

The suspicion, according to locals, is that a firecracker was thrown at the

historic gate lodge, built in the 1860s. Mayor Butler has condemned the suspected arson.

"It's completely unacceptable. It's an incredible resource in Mungret College, and there are some residents living beside it that deserve respect and to live quietly in their homes, rather than this kind of activity happening. But it has been ongoing.

"And I appeal to parents of all teenagers who are gathering on a regular basis, drinking heavily and engaging in behaviour that is not suitable for where they are at."

Twelve quizzed as part of ongoing child abuse probe

Investigation: Suspects detained at various garda stations

TWELVE people remained in garda custody this Tuesday night following their arrest as part of a major investigation into the alleged abuse of a large number of children in Limerick.

The arrests were made at a number of locations across the south west on Monday as part of an ongoing operation which involves gardai from the Limerick division and other parts of the southern region.

There are strict reporting restrictions in place meaning further details of the allegations and the arrests cannot be disclosed in order to protect the alleged victims.

"Gardai have arrested a number of people in relation to an ongoing investigation. They are currently detained in garda stations in the southern and western regions of An Garda Siochana," a garda spokesperson told the Leader.



Twelve people were arrested

It's understood those arrested include men and women across a number of age groups.

It is not known if any of those arrested were detained at garda stations in Limerick.

The case was highlighted in the Dail earlier this year and a "serious incident" review into the handling of allegations has been commissioned by Katherine Zappone, the Minister for Children and Youth Affairs.

The terms of reference for the review have been drawn up and it's hoped it can get underway before the end of the year.

Eleven adults were arrested by gardai from the Limerick division in March as part of the same criminal investigation.

A number of children have also been placed in State care.

To date, nobody has been charged connection investigation and it's expected a file will be prepared for the Director of Public Prosecutions.

There are a lot of people involved in this success, observed the principal.


"Each player on the panel had family support. They had the support of their parish, their clubs, their primary schools and all the various secondary schools, that played a crucial role in their success.

STATE OF THE ART CORONARY INTERVENTION AT MATER PRIVATE CORK

On Tuesday 28th August 2018 the first intracoronary lithotripsy procedure in the Republic of Ireland was performed by Dr. Barry Hennigan and Dr. Ronan Margey, consultant interventional cardiologists, and the team at the cardiac catheterisation laboratory in the Mater Private Hospital, Cork.

Heavily calcified arteries are amongst the most difficult vessels to treat with a stent especially when the calcium fully encases the vessel and the artery is very twisted/tortuous. The ShockwaveTM balloon delivers pulsatile sound waves which disrupts and fractures the calcium which is embedded inside the internal lining of the artery as well as deep within the wall of the artery enabling the cardiologist to subsequently deploy stents in vessels that are so restricted by calcium deposits and plaque that it may be impossible to do so safely otherwise. Conventionally these patients would previously undergo a "drilling" (rotational atherectomy) procedure which may be associated with greater potential for vascular injury especially in tortuous arteries. In cases where drilling was considered high risk these patients would conventionally be referred for open heart surgery.


Dr Barry Hennigan described the case: "In this specific case our patient presented with a heart attack having had a stent a year prior in another country but unfortunately the initial procedure proved extremely difficult at the time and despite the cardiologists best attempts with drilling they were unable to achieve a satisfactory result and the patient was left with a very small under-sized stent with a significant residual blockage which was always destined to manifest itself at some point down the line.

"On our first attempt we barely managed to introduce a wire into this vessel never mind a balloon in order to perform angioplasty in order to address the problem. As the calcific disease was encasing the patient's stent, particularly at the very beginning of the vessel, this was a particularly challenging situation to deal with. I spoke with a colleague in the U.K. who had experience with this device and had heard a lot of excellent reports at international meetings. Following discussion at our multidisciplinary team meeting we decided that a reattempt at a coronary intervention was appropriate with the Shockwave™ balloon instead of sending this patient for open heart surgery.

"Thankfully this patient had an excellent result with an almost a doubling in size of her stent and complete clearance of the obstruction at the beginning of her artery following use of the device with disruption of her concentric calcification. Certainly she has avoided a coronary artery bypass operation given her procedural success."

Ms. Karen Heard, the patient who underwent this ground breaking procedure, spoke to the Mater Private Cork's Chief Operating Officer John Mulhern on the day of her discharge from hospital:

"Since first experiencing, and receiving treatment for heart issues in Hong Kong 18 months ago, this is the first time that I feel completely confident that my health situation has been fully understood. The Cath Lab and Cardio team at Mater Private Hospital Cork are an

amazing group of people, who display fantastic skill as well as a unique human quality. All the people - consultants, nurses, care workers, and cleaning/food team - are a credit to you. A big thank you."

At Mater Private Cork, we strive to provide our patients with the latest up to date technology and another recent advancement for the unit and a first in Cork was another procedure performed by Dr. Margey and Dr. Hennigan involving a high risk multivessel coronary intervention using a specialised heart pump (Impella CPTM) inserted via the leg artery which enabled a patient with severely reduced heart pump function who was deemed too high risk for bypass surgery to undergo a complete repair of his severely diseased vessels which would have proved impossible otherwise or likely to result in cardiac arrest due to his long standing heart pump failure.

"I have experience in using this device in the U.S. previously and was delighted that we were able to secure it for our catheterisation laboratory and perform this procedure safely and effectively. When we were ballooning the narrowing's all of the patient's blood flow was being generated by the Impella pump and I am certain the patient would not have survived with conventionally available treatment," said Dr. Ronan Margey.

The Mater Private Cork is the first private hospital in Ireland and one of only three units in the country that have the Impella CP device available. It provides up to 4 litres of blood flow per minute through a tube inserted in the groin which mechanically pumps blood out of the heart and into the major blood vessel of the body (Aorta) using an axial flow pump.

This can essentially take over the function but can also provide valuable support to the heart pump in patients at high risk during procedures when a patient has already been identified as having "pump failure" prior to their angioplasty and stenting procedure.

Woman confronted men racially abusing diner

A WOMAN who witnessed a black British man being racially abused at a popular Limerick city restaurant said she believed the group of men insulting the man were talking about the film Twelve Years A Slave.

Derek Burnett of Saffron Walden, Essex, wrote a letter to the Limerick Leader describing how he was racially targeted by a group of nearby diners in early September.

He said one of the men said he "hated n*****s" and that he would like to "take a baseball to every one of them".

It emerged on RTE Liveline with Joe Duffy that the restaurant was Texas Steakout on O'Connell Street.

The Leader made attempts to

contact the restaurant. Mr Burnett told RTE that he had to leave halfway through his meal and that he was "almost metaphorically chased out".

The witness, Natalia, told RTE that the group of men, who have not been identified, said "he should be eating off the floor".

"We were in a restaurant and there was a group of men behind me, and Derek would have been right behind me. They were talking really loudly, but I heard them saying: "They should be slaves' and all this, but I didn't think for a minute that Derek would have been beside them for them to be talking about someone like that. My aunt was looking and spotted that they were slagging the man.

"I thought they were actually on about the film Twelve Years a Slave. I

didn't think someone would actually talk like that." She said she confronted the men and said: "You should hang your head in shame" and offered to pay for Mr Burnett's meal.

"Grateful as I certainly was for the intervention of these good people, and deeply touched by their humanity, the reality is when you are on the receiving end of such bitter animosity, and for no reason other than the colour of your skin, amplified all the more in being away from home and in a foreign country, it is still deeply disturbing and immensely debilitating and you're left unsure what to think and in deciding the best course of action to take," he wrote.

He added that it is "high time that Ireland and the public confront the issue of racism.




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

Dimensions exhibition at Limerick Museum

A NEW exhibition by one of Limerick's best-known contemporary artists Cindy Fogarty has opened at Limerick Museum.

Dimensions is overarching depiction of our post-modern experience, which crosses the boundaries of age, education, race, creed, culture and language by generating the same disorientating physiological sensation in each viewer, illuminating our commonalities as opposed to our differences.

Running until October 15, it is the latest in a programme of exhibitions which have been curated by Dr Matthew Potter and renowned artist Maurice Quillinan since Limerick Museum moved to the Old Franciscan Friary on Henry Street.

Man appears in court accused of damaging Lidl store

A JUDGE has refused jurisdiction in the case of a homeless man who is accused of causing thousands of euro worth of damage at a store in the city, writes David Hurley.

Thomas O'Brien, aged 30, who has an address at St Vincent's Hostel in Cork City, appeared before Limerick District Court charged in connection with an incident at Lidl, Childers Road in the early hours of Monday

The store was closed at the time and the suspect was arrested at the scene a short time after the alarm was raised and gardai alerted.

It is alleged the defendant threw stones at the front of the store resulting in significant damage being caused to three large windows.

The total amount of damage

caused was around €3,000.

Following his arrest Mr O'Brien was detained overnight at Roxboro Road garda station before he brought before Limerick District Court.

Judge Brian O'Shea refused bail and having heard details of the alleged facts, he refused jurisdiction which means the matter will now proceed on indictment at the circuit court.

Investigations are ongoing and a file is to be prepared for the Director of Public Prosecutions in relation to the matter.



PET OWNERS are invited to bring their loyal and trusted friends along for a very special religious event, due to shortly take place in the city.

Limerick Animal Welfare (LAW), in conjunction with the Church of Ireland Limerick City Parish, have arranged for a 'Blessing of Animals' to take place on Saturday October 13 at 2:30pm

in St. Michael's Primary School.

The animal-welfare charity believes it is quite a number of years since a ceremony like this has taken place in Limerick, according to Rev Paul Fitzpatrick, curate of St Mary's Cathedral.

"So with the cooperation of Limerick Animal Welfare, the clergy and the parish community, a lively and fitting service is once again offered," Rev Fitzpatrick said. "We invite owners of pets to come along with their dependable, loyal, trusted and faithful friends for the occasion," he added.

"Of course the safety and the welfare of all will be paramount.
The site will be well marshalled on the day.

"It is noted also that city hall and an garda siochana are encouraging and supporting the event. A very special thank you is extended to St. Michael's National School for their support and assistance."

LAW has a 'No Kill' policy which means it provides a 'safe haven for

stray, abused and abandoned animals' until a suitable home can be found. If a suitable home is not found, animals stay in LAW's care for their lifetime, according to the charity.

Running costs for the 27-acre LAW sanctuary in Kilfinane total approximately €60,000 per month. "We have only a core staff and depend very much on volunteers," a LAW spokesperson said

"We now run three charity

shops in the city which bring in a third of our expenses and are ran by volunteers, which is wonderful. Without these shops we could not have raised a loan from the bank to complete phase two at the Sanctuary."

Sanctuary."

"In 2003/2004 we purchased 27 acres of land in Kilfinane, with a interest free loan from a very kind supporter, and set about building phase one of our Sanctuary that we call 'the field of dreams'. We now have completed phase two."

Vaccines in stock as flu scare nears

At risk: UL Hospitals Group urges public to take up flu jab

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THE UL Hospitals Group is encouraging members of the public to get the flu jab, after developing its seasonal flu vaccination plan for its thousands of staff.

Hospitals, pharmacies and GP clinics nationwide have received their annual stock of vaccines, as flu season approaches.

And though no flu outbreak has occurred, visitor restrictions at University Hospital Limerick remain in place since last season's outbreak in January.

These restrictions are also compounded by the latest outbreak of the CPE superbug at UHL, where a total of 24 have been detected with the multi-drug resistant bug.

Speaking on the UL Hospitals Group's action plan for the imminent flu season, a spokesperson said it is being overseen by a steering committee of staff from multiple disciplines and departments.

"Vaccination clinics will be offered by colleagues in occupational health and by volunteer peer vaccinators who will vaccinate colleagues within the group. Vaccination clinics will commence in the first week of October and will continue until December.

"As well as seeking to maximise the uptake among staff through enhanced access to the vaccine, UL Hospitals Group will be working with colleagues in the Department of Public Health, HSE Mid West Community Healthcare and the HSE nationally to promote the flu vaccine among the general public."

The spokesperson said flu-like symptoms are "very general in nature" and it is not unusual for patients to present to UHL on a regular basis.

UL Hospitals Group is urging those in at-risk groups to get vaccinated against influenza this year. Those most vulnerable to complications arising from flu include the over-65s;

patients with certain chronic illnesses; pregnant women and residents of nursing homes and other long-stay facilities. The vaccine is made available free of charge by the HSE to patients in these categories.

The spokesperson said that it is currently developing its winter initiative plan and are looking "to finalise plans as quickly as possible to ensure preparedness for winter".

for winter".

"One of the ongoing challenges during the winter period, due to flus and other serious illnesses, is the demand for critical care beds. We are currently in the process of training HDU/ICU staff to open two additional beds for the winter period. Eleven staff have been trained to date. The first bed opened in August with the second bed to open at the end of September once the remaining staff are fully trained," she added. UHL was the most overcrowded hospital in the country last month, with 894 patients treated on trolleys.

€1,200 raised for 'cruelly abandoned puppies'

MORE THAN 70 good Samaritans have raised over €1,200 for the treatment of three "cruelly abandoned puppies" that were rescued by a couple walking in Cratloe Woods, writes Fintan Walsh.

In a statement issued by Limerick Animal Welfare on Sunday, the Kilfinane-based organisation said: "A couple out walking in a remote part of Cratloe Woods could not believe their eyes when they spotted three puppies huddled together under some bushes. The puppies were shivering and frightened with no chance of survival had they not been found. The puppies are very thin, covered in mange and have a huge worm burden. They have received veterinary treatment and are under the care of Law. Please donate towards their veterinary care, vaccinations

and neutering. All donations big or small are very much appreciated."

This comes a week after Law rescued a seriously-ill, blind puppy that was abandoned in forestry in County Limerick last week. The puppy, named Lilly, required a vet check, vaccinations and a worm dose.

A total of \in 1,676 was raised for Lilly. A total of \in 1,281 was raised for the three puppies.



Shannon welcomes new 'sensory room'

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WELCOMING the news that Gatwick Airport has set-up a 'sensory room', Shannon Airport has called on other European airports to follow suit.

Shannon opened Europe's first sensory room in March of last year for children and adults with neurodevelopmental challenges including autism.

The room has prompted many visits from major airports, including Gatwick, who are interested in following Shannon's lead, according to Shannon Group plc chief-executive Matthew Thomas.

"We know from opening our own airport sensory room in March 2017 that the Gatwick sensory room will be a tremendous assistance to passengers with autism and special needs," Mr Thomas said.

"We already have well-established Ryanair services between Shannon and Gatwick airports, and the new Gatwick sensory room means that a trip between the two airports will be even more user-friendly." he added.

even more user-friendly," he added.

"With the sensory rooms in operation at either end of the journey to and from the UK, we are making it easier for passengers who need these facilities.

"Having them can mean a huge difference for passengers with neurodevelopmental challenges."

Designed by Adam and Friends, the Shannon Airport sensory room is tailored to be a soothing place, away

from the activity of a busy airport.

The room includes facilities like an aquatic bubble tube, an undulated wavy wall, colour changing LEDs, wheel projector and other items.

"We realised that it was one thing for Shannon to put these provisions in place but if other airports participated in this programme, then it would mean that when the passenger arrives on the other side, they also get special treatment," Shannon Airport managing director Andrew Murphy said.

"That would be a huge gift to people with special needs and their families," he added

he added.

"The response this drew from the aviation community was astounding,"


Mr Murphy added.

The Must-Read Guide To Saving Money

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Make an informed choice about your mortgage

Once you've made an application for a mortgage and it's approved, and you have identified a property and have your offer accepted, you would like to think the hard work is over

Deposits are paid, the house secure, and the relief is palpable. Yes, it's a time for celebration, but don't relax too much, because what you do next is crucial and can impact your finances for a long time to come. And that is choosing the terms of your mortgage.

Many are confused about their options and given all the effort that has gone into getting a house, often make a rushed decision that ends up costing

One first-time buyer (FTB) contacted me recently, advising he went sale agreed on a property, notified his lender and then asked for advice regarding interest rate options. He was sent a link directing him to rates on their website and told to pick one and let them know.

Pretty shocking, but based on the number of people who contact me with similar experiences, not unusual.

He was new to this, didn't know whether to choose a three-year fixed rate over a five year one. He wasn't sure what happens at the end of the fixed rate period. Was he better off with a variable rate? Are rates going to go up? What term should he choose? All these questions were swirling around in his head and he wanted to make the right decision, but he was being left to his own devices, which made him nervous.

So, we met and talked through his options for 20 minutes and he was glad we did, because in that short period of time, the insights he discovered were profound for him.

We spoke about the term of his new mortgage. He was thinking about a 26-year term which would bring him to age 65 when completed, but wondered if it was better to opt for a shorter term? A longer term would mean a lower monthly repayment, so his instinct was edging him towards that.

If we didn't meet, he admitted he would probably have chosen the longest term possible.

That, in my opinion, would have been a mistake and I'll tell you why. My advice was to proceed with a term of 20 years.

Your mortgage term doesn't have to run to what once was the age you retired and received the state pension. This is something people tend to benchmark their mortgage term; we've got to stop this way of thinking.

Based on the amount he was borrowing, the difference in monthly repayments between a 20 and 26-year term was €202, a 16% differential between both.

Could he afford to pay the higher monthly repayment if he chose the shorter term? Absolutely, and even if it was tight, my advice would have been to find the money somewhere and incorporate it into his budget.

This gentleman will end up paying €100,206 in interest payments over a 20-year term as opposed to €134,085 had he opted for 26 years. By paying 16% more in monthly repayments, he will end up saving 34% in total interest payments, which was an eureka moment for him. When people see this for themselves or it is pointed out to them, it only confirms they are making the right decision.

the numbers, because the decision was going to save him €33,879.

We then spoke about fixed or variable rates, and his inkling was to choose a three-year fixed rate. He looked at me nervously, was it the right decision?

It wasn't a bad one. But not one I would have chosen.

What about part fixed and part variable? He looked at me as if I had just replied to him in Swahili. He didn't think you could do this, no one told him you could, but when we talked it through some more, it made huge sense to him.

We ended up with a 70% fixed and 30% variable rate split.

We also spoke about how he could accelerate the repayment of his mortgage further by overpaying each month. Opting for the 20-year term and overpaying by €150 each month, would reduce the term by two years six months, saving him €11,465 in interest.

Before we met, he was probably going to instruct the bank to proceed with a 26-year term and fix the amount he was borrowing for the first three years.

After a 20-minute chat, all that changed, because now he had a plan in place where he would become mortgage -free in 2035 and not 2044 as he had assumed. Most importantly, it all made sense to him - his decision was going to save him €45,344 in interest payments, and he was going to be 56 years old, not 65 when he was mortgage-free.

The moral of the story is to make a plan while you are going through the process of getting mortgage approval, get help if you need to, and educate yourself about what you can and can't do. As you can see the difference can be significant over time.

ASK LIAM

Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q: I bought an item online with my credit card from a certain site but am worried I may never receive it, or if I do, it's not what I ordered. If either happened, can I get my money back?

A: Yes, you can. There is a form of consumer protection known as chargeback which helps people get what they paid for, or their money back.

It allows for the return of funds from transactions processed through a credit or debit card, if there was a problem with the goods or

services they purchased.
All suppliers, accepting debit and credit card payments are liable for chargebacks in such instances, so if one of these happens to you, you should first contact them and seek a refund. If they will not refund your money or have gone out of business, you should then contact the issuer of the card vou used and instigate the chargeback process.

A chargeback request can be made up to 180 days after the card transaction. In the $case\, of\, goods\, or\, services$ being delivered, a chargeback can also be raised up to 180 days from the agreed date of delivery. The supplier/ retailer has 14 days to respond to the chargeback request, otherwise the money you paid them is debited from their account, returned to yours.

Senator hits out at slow movement on Opera site

Senator: Byrne says 'city has gone through an awful lot of change'

A GOVERNMENT senator has blamed council management for not moving fast enough in transforming the proposed Project Opera site in the heart of Limerick city.

Fine Gael senator Maria Byrne made the remarks at the launch of her general election campaign at Bobby Byrne's pub last week.

Former Minister for Finance Michael Noonan launched her candidacy on Thursday night, after she was selected to run in the next general election in December 2017.

During a 16-minute speech, addressing more than 100 supporters, Sen Byrne commented on Limerick's economic comeback since the financial crash of 2008.

"Limerick has gone through an awful lot of change, especially in the last 10 years but we have a lot more change to go. I know when Michael [Noonan] was Minister for Finance, he gave money for the purchase of the Opera site, below at the bottom of Patrick Street."

Sen Byrne added: "While, you know, it's not the councillors' fault, I do blame management that they haven't moved fast enough in terms of changing around the unit. It is something that we need to do, it is very much part of the regeneration of the area."

Project Opera is a €180m development that aims to bring upwards of 3,000 people to work in the city centre.

In a recent Limerick Leader report, some 60% of the site will provide for office accommodation/innovation/education space, with 15% set aside for residential, comprising upwards of 100 units between residential and an aparthotel.

In late August, University of Limerick and Limerick Twenty Thirty, which is overseeing the project's delivery, held high-level discussions with a view to the college having a "significant" presence in the city

A spokesperson for the University of Limerick confirmed it is "continuing to explore ways to develop a presence in the city centre area".



Sen Byrne says council management 'haven't moved fast enough' in delivering Project Opera. She made the remarks at the launch of her general election candidacy last week Speaking to The Leader last week, Sen Byrne said that, following Limerick's economic success in recent years, "we cannot afford to go back to where we were 10 years ago, certainly".

She said that since being elected to the Seanad, she has gained "a great insight into the wishes of people". Issues presented to her at her constituency office on Henry Street include housing, medical cards, education grants, overcrowding, and microlocal issues, such as potholes and street lights. "You also have to be a good listener. And no matter how small somebody's problem is, it means something to them."

Deputy Noonan said: "I would like that Maria would be in the Dail, to continue the work for Limerick that I had started. We need someone of confidence and vitality to continue to drive the agenda forward, and I think Maria is the person to do that. So, you have my full support Maria. Collisons' Stripe is valued at \$20bn

STRIPE, the online payments firm founded by Limerick's Collison brothers, has seen its valuation soar to \$20 billion after its latest funding round.

According to reports, Stripe's latest funding round raised \$245 million, increasing its value from \$9bn to \$20bn.

The former Castletroy College students, John and Patrick Collison, are understood to have a combined 25% share in the online payments business, making them the world's youngest self-made billionaires.

Patrick, CEO of Stripe, confirmed the raise, while new customers are understood to include Alphabet Inc.'s Google and Uber Technologies Inc, according to Bloomberg.

Bloomberg reports that the new valuation places Stripe among an elite handful of the world's most valuable private startups, including Airbnb Inc.,

Indeed, the reports suggest, Stripe could have raised more money, but, according to Patrick Collison: "We talked to almost nobody.

"We are lucky in that we've been generating revenue from the start and have never been in the position where we had to raise money. It's more about looking a year or two ahead and deciding if we want to stay on the current track or go big on some things," he explained.

The brothers, who now live in San Francisco, have been making money since their teens – when Patrick won the BT Young Scientist of the Year, aged 16, in 2005.

The online payments firm was established in 2010 and is used by Apple, Twitter, Facebook, and Chinese online company Alipay. After the previous funding round valued the company at \$9bn in 2016, the pair were estimated to be Ireland's youngest billionaires.





Apart from the central message that direct provision is a stain on Irish society comparable with the Magdalene Laundries, most of the night will be the sort of performance hoopla that you really

shouldn't miss. It's a fundraiser for the Movement of Asylum Seekers in Ireland, an organisation that aims to improve the lot of refugees and asylum-seekers. Doors at 7.30pm, tickets are a tenner.

The Navarra String Quartet are in the Belltable on Friday evening, playing some Schubert, some Vasks and Haydn's String Quartet in C Major - a cheeky little work that involves a cello battling with a viola for twenty minutes. I $still\,think\,that\,if\,you're\,going\,to$ perform anything by Joseph Haydn you should immediately follow it with something by François-Joseph Gossec. Childish humour, wait for it, it'll come to you. 8pm, tickets are €17/€15 concession.

American singer-songwriter **Joe Henry** brings his gravel-infused voice to **Upstairs Dolan's** this Friday night. He also brings the rest of him, to save you the confusion of staring at a disembodied voice on stage. His style encompasses folk, rock and

blues, making him one of one of the finest exponents of Americana you can have the joy of seeing on stage. Think of him as Nick Cave meets Tom Waits but with better taste in hats. I very much recommend that you see him live. Doors at 9pm, tickets are €18.

Cork alt-rockers The Altered Hours play a gig in Pharmacia this Friday night at 9pm. Somehow, they've managed to make being rough around the edges a $trademark\, of\, their\, sound\, and, with$ ttickets just a fiver, it's probably the best value you'll get from a ticket this weekend. They'll be supported by Casavettes and Galant.

Saturday (October 6) **Lim Brick City** is an exhibition of Lego creations in St John's Pavilion this Saturday and Sunday. It's brought to you by people who love both Lego and terrible puns. They'll have over 100 custom creations and official sets on display, as well as a play area and Lego wall. It had a sold-out

weekend in May so early booking is advised for this one. It runs from midday to 6pm on Saturday and from 10am to 6pm on Sunday. Tickets are €12 for adults and €4 for children. If you're part of an entire family of Lego loons, you can bring two adults and four children for

€25. There's a **Family Fun Day** on Bedford Row this Saturday for Limerick Mental Health Week. You can expect face-painting, live music, an abundance of teddy bears, you know the drill. Compared to last year, there's been a dearth of free family days on Bedford Row in recent months so this one is very welcome. It will run from midday to 4pm.

Quintessence Theatre are at the **Belltable** this Saturday with their acclaimed play Cracks. It's an exploration of mental illness and the aftermath of a suicide attempt. That sounds dark - and it is - but it's also a play littered with enough black humour to easily draw you into the story of a woman

struggling with herself and coping with a mental health system dramatically unfit for purpose. First devised by the Dundalk-based company in 2016, the play is now on a national tour supported by the Arts Council and has had a lot of praise from people who have seen it. Definitely worth a punt. 8pm, tickets are €17 / €15 concession.

Sunday (October 7) **Joined Hands In Freedom** is a performance event at Narrative 4 this Sunday, exploring the links between black and Irish struggles for freedom. Hosted by Chicago-born slam poet Clara Rose Thornton, it will commemorate the visit of abolitionist Frederick Douglass to Limerick in 1845 during An Gorta Mór. You can expect a marvellous afternoon of spoken-word performance. It starts at 4pm and it's a free event.

Emo droop-rockers Pale Waves are in **Dolan's Warehouse** this Sunday night. The Manchester quartet have just released their debut album My Mind Makes Noises, picking up almost-perfect reviews from NME and Dork. They have some distance to go before people who aren't NME or Dork will rise to giving them an unbridled recommendation but it's definitely the best gig in Limerick this Sunday. Yes, that counts as a guarded recommendation. They'll be supported by Swimming Girls and King Nun. Doors at 7pm, tickets are €20.

Y own boy Oisin (10) hops out of the shower, soap suds in the hair shouting Daddy I can't go back in there? Why? Because there is a big spider up in the corner! It was a Daddy Long legs. So I thought I would use Google and we could all learn that Daddy Long legs are called; Pholcus phalangioides.

Regardless, many people are scared of spiders and I will have to do some little treatment for Oisin so he can do a 'Catch and Release' This time of year female spiders come into homes on the hunt for a mate as they normally house spiders usually seek shelter in September, but it seems the arachnids have arrived slightly earlier this year. In fact female spiders can stay in your home for the whole of their seven year life span! Run and get the hoover!

WHY FEARS DEVELOP?

Arachnophobia is the name given to a fear of spiders. The understanding of spiders as bad and scary is not common for all cultures, but is rather usual for us in Irelands, US & UK. The spider gets a bad rap in the media often portrayed as villains in children's books and then as monsters in horror movies. When you look at countries like Cambodia, where spiders are commonly eaten, none of the fear or cultural dislike of spiders exist. So really, you would not be afraid of spiders, if you never had the opportunity to fear

Another possible reason relates to evolutionary psychology where we developed a fear of spiders as a survival mechanism (after all there were no antidotes) built into our minds and that people with spider phobia simply have a greater connection to their survival instincts.

HANDLING SPIDERS

For most people, the thought of handling a spider isn't a pleasant one — but for those with arachnophobia, it's downright terrifying. So it takes a particularly motivated individual suffering from such an intense fear to willingly put themselves into spiders way.

You know if you want you could get rid of this fear in a few hours. I think it would make a good documentary! In such a workshop with tools you would get over your fear of spiders! Instead of the fear avoidance response you would need to learn self-calming techniques so that you can use these to build courage to take back control of your fear based emotions.

TREATMENT

Exposure therapy is a psychological treatment that was developed to help people confront their fears. When people are fearful of something, they tend to avoid the feared objects, activities, or situations, in this case spiders. Although you can replace spiders with dogs, flying, thunder etc. Although this avoidance might help reduce feelings of fear in the short term, over the long term it can make the fear become even worse. In such situations, as a psychologist I would recommend program of exposure therapy in order to help break the pattern of avoidance and fear.

SAFETY - YOU ARE ALWAYS IN CONTROL

We start off by creating a safe environment. The task at the end is to catch and release a spider or even hold a spider, a little one! This safe environment in which to "expose" individuals to the things allows then to confront fear and avoidance. Exposure therapy has been scientifically demonstrated to be a helpful treatment or treatment component for a range of problems, including: Phobias, Panic Attacks, Social Anxiety, OCD, PTSD, & Generalized Anxiety.

THERE ARE SEVERAL VARIATIONS OF

In vivo exposure: Directly facing a feared object, situation, or activity in real life. For example, someone with a fear of spiders would be guided to handle the spider.

Imaginal exposure: Vividly imagining the feared object, situation, or activity.

Virtual reality exposure: Virtual reality technology can be used

EXPOSURE THERAPY CAN ALSO BE PACED IN DIFFERENT WAYS.

Graded exposure: The psychologist helps the client construct an exposure fear hierarchy, in which feared objects,

activities, or situations are ranked according to difficulty. They begin with mildly or moderately difficult exposures, then progress to harder ones.

Flooding: Using the exposure fear hierarchy to begin exposure with the most difficult tasks.

Systematic Desensitization: Exposure is combined with relaxation exercises to make you feel more manageable and to associate the feared objects with relaxation. WHY EXPOSURE THERAPY WORKS

Habituation: Over time, people find that their reactions to feared objects or situations decrease.


Extinction: Exposure can help weaken previously-learned associations between feared objects, activities,

Self-efficacy: Exposure can help show you that you are capable of confronting you fears and can manage your feelings of anxiety.

Emotional processing: During exposure, you learn to attach new, more realistic beliefs about feared objects i.e spiders, become more comfortable with the experience of fear.

The key takeaway message; is that phobia's are very treatable and psychological science gives us the tools to feel the fear and do it

Top Tips

For supporting your teenager with acne

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Coffee - in praise of the dark brew

THE 30th of September was World Coffee day! With the many wonderful coffee shops in Limerick you will be delighted to find out that coffee might actually be good for you. It is loaded with antioxidants and beneficial nutrients that can improve your health including soluble fibre to get your good gut bacteria to flourish! Studies show that coffee drinkers have a much lower risk of several serious diseases. Keep in

mind though that most of these studies are observational, thus they cannot establish causality.

Everyone knows its beneficial effect on energy levels - many use it and abuse it as a pick me up. Thanks to its caffeine that blocks an inhibitory neurotransmitter called Adenosine, which in turn increases adrenalin. noradrenalin and dopamine, leading to enhanced firing of neurons. Many controlled

trials in humans show that coffee improves various aspects of brain function; including memory, mood, vigilance, energy levels, reaction times and general cognitive function. Coffee drinkers tend to have up to a 65% lower risk of getting Alzheimer's disease and 32-60% of developing

When these stress hormones are released, it is a natural response that our blood pressure gets raised. Caffeine cause only a slight incline, but if you are sensitive, under chronic stress or have high blood pressure, be cautious. At the same time, there is some evidence that women who drink coffee have a reduced

risk of heart disease and of stroke, by up to 20%. So if your blood pressure is normal or low. drink away. Longitudinal studies show coffee might cups of coffee are actually sumed in the increase

longevity. Coffee contains many nutrients, including B vitamins, magnesium, potassium and manganese. But it is most famous for its incredible antioxidant content. Antioxidants help to prevent cell damage, thus lower inflammation and have a preventative effect on chronic degenerative diseases. Take Type 2 diabetes for example, it is a gigantic health problem, currently afflicting about 300 million people worldwide. Studies show that people who drink the

most coffee have a 23-50% lower risk of getting this

disease, with each daily cup associated with a 7% reduced risk.

Previously coffee was thought to be bad for the liver, but as it turns out, it may actually protect it

against cirrhosis. People who drink 4 or more cups per day have up to an 80% lower risk. It does contain some acrylamides due to the roasting process, a type of carcinogen that is found in roast, burnt or smoked foods, yet coffee appears to be protective against two types of cancer; liver and colorectal cancer. Just avoid the instant form, which seem to have double amount of this by-product. Get a batch of organic fair-trade coffee beans and enjoy a cup or two... or five!

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Diet foods that have more 'umph'

HE one thing I often hear people say about adopting a "diet" or a starting a new "food plan" is that meals are boring and unexciting. My response is usually – they are only as boring as you let them be.

Yes, sure a couple of meals every day might be straight from a tupperware box and a little less inviting than a four course spread, but adding a little imagination to meals you are taking a little time t prepare means the tastebuds won't suffer. And the good news is - you don't have to add too many calories either. There are loads of flavoursome foods that can be used to spruce up duller dishes and help keep the calories low. Eating clean foods doesn't have to be bland. Here are some ideas to jazz up your food in under 10 calories!

CUCUMBER SLICES

Add them to your water with a few mint leaves and taste the difference. There are also dozens of relay handy water bottles now available on the market that have separate compartments for fruits to add a little flavour. I also love mixed berries, pineapple and kiwis. Try out a few combinations and make your water come alive!

Lemon juice has so many uses when cooking. Squeeze it fresh over salads (mixed with some Olive Oil) or fish or as before – add a few slices to your drinking water. Not only is it flavour-some but it's also extremely

CAYENNE PEPPER

As with the curry powder, the spice of Cayenne Pepper can boost your metabolism. Try pan frying your pre-boiled sweet potato in cayenne pepper and coconut oil for maximum taste.

ONIONS AND GARLIC

Two of the tastiest additions to any meal and all for under 10 calories. Add sautéed onions and garlic to your recipes and taste the difference.

INSTANT COFFEE POWDER

It may sound strange but sprinkling some coffee powder over greek yoghurt or homemade ice-cream will wake up your taste buds for under 4 calories! I sometimes add a little to my Protein yoghurt - it's amazing how a less than 1/4 of a teaspoon can add so much flavour.

If you have a sweet tooth, cinnamon could be your best friend! Add some to oats, yogurt or even your coffee to add flavour for just 2 calories per teaspoon!

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The road to the **Beauty Blog awards**

ve decided to change things up a little this week and talk about The Beauty Blog Awards and the events leading up to it. I'll revert to my normal format next week when things calm down a little but for now, I'm going to tell you about what life has been like since I've started to grow my profile as a social media influencer.

I still feel a little weird referring to myself in those terms but if I've learned anything in the last two weeks, it's that I really do have a following online and people really are invested in my life. This all really began in 2015 when I got a part-time job in Brown Thomas. I started posting pictures on Instagram of the outfits I was wearing to work and by early 2016 my following had grown from around 300 to 3000. In the summer of 2016, I started writing Man About Town in what used to be the Chronicle (now The Leader) and things really took off from there. I started getting more modelling work and big brands started contacting me wanting to work with me. Last year I started judging heats of

Miss Ireland and I won Model Of The Year at the Hi Style Awards. Throughout all this period I really hated when people would refer to me as a 'Blogger' or an 'Influencer'. In my mind, I was neither of these things. I wrote a newspaper article, not a blog and I felt there was a stigma attached to these terms in that if you attached yourself to

either of these terms you were guilty of buying into the hype and you could be accused of having those dreaded notions. Earlier this year I arrived at a major crossroads in my life. My father Sean, who was my best friend and my inspiration, passed away somewhat suddenly. In the weeks that followed, I took a break from writing Man About Town and stopped posting on Social Media. I considered not going back to either of these

that I couldn't justify the time and effort. When my mother passed away in 2013 I wrote a eulogy for my sister to deliver at the funeral. She was struggling to compose something that captured how she felt so I offered to help her. She described her feelings to me and I

it was broken I felt

then put those feelings into words that she could connect with. I take no credit for this as these were her words and her feelings, I simply wrote them down for her and she did an amazing job bringing those words to life. We did agree at this time that whenever the day arrived that someone would have to deliver a eulogy for our father that it would be me taking to the podium. Sadly, that day arrived much sooner than we'd have ever hoped or expected but when it did I poured my heart into what I wrote and even though it was probably the hardest thing I've ever had to do, I felt that I did my Dad proud. In the weeks that followed I received dozens of messages, emails and hand-written letters from people who'd been at the funeral telling me how my words had moved them. This, along with the support of my family and close friends was what inspired me to go back to writing and posting, only now I felt that I needed to take things up a level so I launched a website and started writing blogs about everything from washing clothes to dating to dealing with grief and rejection. My mojo returned in a way and I guess because I was writing from the heart instead of telling people what to wear and what not to wear, more and more people started to take notice of what I was saying. So technically I became a blogger but I still daren't call myself an Influencer. About a month ago I received word that I'd been nominated for The Beauty Blog Awards as Best

Male Influencer and The Blog

Awards Ireland for Best Lifestyle Blog. Now the latter hasn't happened yet and they are judged rather than voted on so I'm still cautiously optimistic that I have a chance there but the Beauty Blog Awards were voted on in an online poll that was whittled down from a long list to a short list to a list of finalists. When I made the long list I was very pleased with myself as I was in the company of names like James Patrice, James Kavanagh and Darren Kennedy but that's as far as I expected it to go because as I've mentioned a time or two, I've never allowed myself to think that I belong in that conversation. I did ask people to vote for me but I was genuinely shocked when I was included in the shortlist. I continued to canvas for votes online and people that I knew (and some that I didn't know) started to campaign for me and ask their followers to vote for me. Some even made my voting link the link on their homepage. With this support, I made the list of finalists, which I'd never have dreamed possible. More and more people started following me and more and more started to champion my cause. The Beauty Blog Awards took place last Thursday night and

I'm still very hesitant to refer to myself as an Influencer as I don't want to start getting carried away with myself but what I have learned in the last few weeks is that there's a big difference between having followers and having a following. Anyone can start a social media account and put up pictures of their bum or their abs and get likes. Anyone can have followers; you can buy them and be really popular in Sao Paulo. But it takes a lot more than that to have a following, for that you need to sit at a laptop and write a blog, edit a blog, edit a YouTube video or run a YouTube channel etc. and people need to be invested in you. It takes work but the support I've felt in the last few weeks and especially the last few days has shown that it's all worth it. 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University of Limerick to host Eurolawyers Football Cup 2019

IMERICK will play host to the 8th Eurolawyers Football Cup 2019 from June 18 - 23, 2019. The venue will be the University of Limerick Conference and Sports Conference and Sports
Campus and the event aims
to bring 45 teams from 20
different countries for the five day festival of football. With approximately 800 sports visitors expected to be in attendance, this event is hugely significant for the sports tourism of Europe with an estimated economic impact of up to half a million euro for the Limerick region.

The University of Limerick was able to secure this sporting event following a bidding process, successfully competing against bids from Lisbon, Copenhagen and Cambrils/Salou. The organising company, Corporate Sport Organisation (CSO) Paris, previously brought events to Limerick including the World Medical Games in 1995 and the Mundiavocat Football World Cup for Lawyers in 1996.

Adrien Delaunay, of CSO Paris said,: "The Eurolawyers is a football tournament dedicated to teams composed exclusively of lawyers from European countries, which takes place every two years."

The Eurolawyers event will take place on the $world\text{-}cl{\tilde{a}}ss\,sports\,facilities$ at the University of Limerick and will utilise the University's new McGuire pitch development. All teams will be accommodated on-campus which will provide an Olympic/World Cup-style atmosphere, with many supporters and families of the teams expected to stay in the key sporting destination of Limerick city.

Karen Brosnahan, of Conference and Sports Bureau, explaine: "This event is a testament to the fantastic relationships between CSO and Limerick spanning two decades. In 1995 and 2015 UL hosted the World Health & Medical Games and no better legacy of success but to have another CSO event in 2019."

Letitia Wade, Business Tourism Officer at Fáilte Ireland tells me: "Not only will this event be worth almost €500,000 to the local region but it also important in terms of leaving a lasting legacy for

Clionas foundation Academic report 'Too Dear to Visit'

LAST week at Trinity University in Dublin, Limerick founded charity Cliona's Foundation launched their academic report 'Too Dear to Visit', which reveals for the first time, the extent of the often-invisible costs of caring for a child with a life-limiting condition.

Cliona's Foundation, a registered Irish charity works to provide financial assistance directly to parents of children with life-limiting or chronic complex care needs across Ireland to help with the

non-medical expenses related to caring for their

The Foundation was set up by Brendan and Terry Ring, following the death of their daughter Cliona, from an inoperable brain tumour in 2006. Since its inception, Cliona's Foundation has raised over €1 million and helped more than 550 families across 29 counties.

There are approximately 4,000 children living with life-limiting conditions across Ireland today. This report shows how non-medical expenses including overnight accommodation, travel costs, additional childcare, and extra household bills can amount to become an enormous financial burden on families already under immense emotional stress.

The report highlights that many families are spending upwards of €10,000 to €11,000 per annum which can represent as much as one-third of their post-tax income. Terry Ring co-founder of Cliona's Foundation tells me, "The report sets out three key recommendations - A

'looking after a child with life-limiting illness' grant set up by the government. A national database on families caring for children with a life-limiting condition. And for, Cliona's Foundation to tailor our support services to meet the unique needs of the families including partnerships with services companies to provide a range of assistance to the families. When you're already in a deep and dark place with a sick child, the last thing you want to worry about is monev."



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
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Post-Brexit dumping ground

UK imports: Industry chiefs call for action to curb used diesel cars flooding Irish market

IRELAND is in danger of becoming a dumping ground for well travelled and dirtier diesel engines from the UK, and it could lead to this country receiving heavy fines from the EU.

With the number of used or second cars and vans from the UK set to hit record numbers this year, the inherent dangers go beyond the loss of sales in garages up and down the country.

As well as a huge loss of revenue to the Exchequer, having dirtier imported diesel cars and vans on the roads will be detrimental to the Government's efforts in curbing carbon emissions which could ultimately lead to the EU imposing fines on Ireland.

"With the unrestricted importation of vehicles, Ireland risks becoming the dumping ground for older, dirtier diesel engines from the UK," insisted Ciarán McMahon, chairman and managing director of Ford Ireland.

He pointed out that a significant number of the vehicles being imported have engines that do not meet the current Euro 6 emission standards.

"That will be detrimental to the Government's efforts in curbing our carbon emissions which can result in hefty fines from the EU," he warned.

The issue of UK imports was a huge one for the motor industry in Ireland, the Ford chief insisted.

"This year we are on course to see imports of second-hand cars from the UK top the 100,000 units milestone," he revealed. "That is a significant increase from the figure of 93,000 in 2017."

The impact of that level of imports was directly affecting new car sales here in Ireland, he added.

"We estimate that new car sales are down by in the region of 30,000 units as a result of the Brexit /weak sterling' situation. As one of the leading car brands in Ireland, of course, we are going to complain about the effect on new car sales.

"But aside from those business concerns, there are wider implications of that level of vehicle imports into the country. And we shouldn't only be concerned about the high level of passenger vehicles, because imports from the UK of second-hand vans has similarly seen huge increases."

This year, he said, Ireland was on track to see an import level of 15,000 vans or light commercials.

"The negative impact of that level of import of second-hand cars and vans from the UK is seen in the drop in revenue to the Exchequer from the resulting decrease in new vehicle sales," Mr McMahon continued.

"But more importantly, and other colleagues in the motor industry have pointed this out, with no framework for checking the environmental performance of the vehicles coming into Ireland, a significant number of them have engines that do not meet the current Euro 6 emission standards.

"That will be detrimental to the Government's efforts in curbing our carbon emissions which can result in hefty fines from the EU if we do not meet our targets. But with this unrestricted importation of vehicles, Ireland risks becoming the dumping ground for older, dirtier diesel engines from the UK."

International trade rules prevented Ireland from implementing an outright ban on UK vehicle imports, he explained.

However the Government

needed to do something to discourage customers from buying older, dirty diesels that will have a negative effect on the country's ability to meet carbon emissions targets and ultimately will have detrimental effects on the environment in Ireland and the health of people.


Society of the Irish Motor Industry (SIMI) director general, Alan Nolan, said the economic fundamentals that underpin new car registrations look set to remain positive, but strong growth in used imports will continue to underline new cars sales here.

"For businesses the impact of low Sterling exchange rates due to Brexit will have driven used car imports to levels close to new car sales total by the end of the year," he

suggested.

He pointed out this would have consequences for the State in terms of tax revenues and the environment as the combined VAT and VRT receipts on imported used cars were significantly less than from new car sales, and their average emissions were higher.

Figures from Motorcheck.ie show that while the most popular car models imported were generally 'mainstream' cars and relatively affordable - the VW Golf, Ford Focus and VW Passat were the top three most imported models - premium cars such as the BMW 5 Series, Audi A4 and Mercedes Benz E-Class figured strongly in the top ten.





Limerick to the core... 🤧

AIL kicks-off away from the fanfare of the Aviva

¬OR a significant number of rugby supporters, the season proper only kicks off this weekend.

For watchers of the provincial game, there's the meeting of arch rivals Leinster and Munster in the Guinness PRO14 at the Aviva Stadium on Saturday, 6pm.

That section of rugby supporters only come alive in October with the traditional meeting of the sides on the eve of the start of the Heineken Champions Cup.

Far away from the glare of the big interprovincial derby clash of Munster and Leinster the All-Ireland League will kick-off for Division 1A and 1B clubs.

The fact will go un-noticed for many rugby fans around the country and the league will have a tough fight on its hands to gain much traction in the media, press and radio next weekend, bar a few sections of the local press and

On Saturday, Young Munster will host Terenure College at Tom Clifford Park, while Garryowen entertain Dublin University at Dooradoyle and last season's Division 1B winners Shannon travel to Temple Hill to take on Cork Constitution.

 $Scheduling \, the \, start \, of \, the \,$ league on the same day Leinster and Munster face-off at the Aviva Stadium is a real shame for the club game.

Munster fans who want to travel to Dublin won't be able to take in a club game earlier in the afternoon.

Those who put their club side first will, of course, be able to attend an AIL fixture as they kick-off at 2.30pm and then watch the Munstergame on TV at 6pm.

But the clash is far from an ideal

The All-Ireland League's top division kicks-off with a whimper - in terms of profile from the rugby public – more than a bang which is a real pity given the quality that is sure to be on show in a lot of the games.

The prospects of gaining greater media coverage for the league is not helped by the fact that, to date at least, the league has no sponsors following the Ulster Bank's decision to step down after nine years.

Ulster Bank began sponsoring the All-Ireland League in 2010, succeeding Allied Irish Bank who $sponsore \bar{d}\,the\,league\,for\,the$ previous 13 years. Insurance Corporation of Ireland were the

original tournament sponsors.

Sources estimate that the sponsorship of the league by Ulster Bank was worth in the region of a low six figure sum to the IRFU per annum.

The scheduling of five rounds of top flight fixtures on successive weekends in the All-Ireland League is going to place big demands on playing squads.

With injuries inevitable given the attritional nature of the game, clubs with smaller squads are going to be stretched to the limit by the time it gets to rounds four and five.

In effect, almost 1/3 of the regular season will be completed after the first weekend in November.

With five Munster clubs, Cork Con and UCC are in the top flight along with the three Limerick clubs, Garryowen,

Shannon and Young Munster, the amount of travel will be reduced for

The big unknown going into the season is just how the return of the Munster A players to their club squads is going to impact on the league.

The British and Irish Cup has been

replaced by the Celtic Cup this season. That competition features the Irish province's A sides and Welsh clubs.

The Celtic Cup is due to end later this month and so free up Munster Academy and some senior players to play with their clubs.
