

Major primary care centre planned for city suburbs

Plans lodged: Facility to serve Raheen, Mungret and Dooradoyle

PROPOSALS have been lodged for the construction of a major primary care centre in the city outskirts, which will serve thousands of residents in Raheen, Mungret and Dooradoyle.

Dooradoyle Primary Care Centre Ltd, which was registered on August 27 last, lodged a planning application to develop the four-story complex, annexed to the popular South Court Hotel in Gouldavoher, Raheen.

As part of the 3,353-square

metre development plans, lodged on December 4, there will be associated works, including a new access road from Patrickswell Road, landscape works, and 120 car parking spaces.

The proposal also seeks permission to change the use of existing ground floor conference centre to new use of primary care centre and GP clinic, consultation rooms, treatment areas and pharmacy on site.

According to planning files seen by this newspaper, the four-storey complex would be located at the far end of the car park of Limerick's South Court Hotel.

David Byrne, director of Averymont Limited, which owns and manages the hotel, wrote a letter on November 20, consenting to the planning application. Mr Byrne, 48, of Ballylongford, Kerry, is also a director of Dooradoyle Primary Care Centre Ltd.

According to Healy Architects, which designed the project, it proposed that the ground floor area of the centre will accommodate a main entrance and reception area, a suite of GP rooms, a pharmacy and "some specific function HSE suites and services".

According to planning files, a decision on the project is expected to be made by February 6, 2019.

It is not known how much the development will cost, but it is likely to be a multi-million euro project.

In February last, the HSE Mid-West launched the Barrack View Primary Care Centre on Edward Street, Limerick, which now serves more than 10,000 people living between the areas of O'Connell Avenue and Southill.

The city project saw funding from the European Investment Bank.

ELLEN McCourt, widow of Angela's Ashes author Frank, has said the return of the musical based on his book to the Limerick stage will "remind audiences of why they loved the book in the first place", writes Alan Owens.

She was speaking after the announcement that the smash hit Angela's Ashes The Musical is to return to the Lime Tree Theatre next summer.

The popular musical comes home for a strictly limited run in July 2019 at the Lime Tree, where it broke box office records in July 2017 on its world premiere. The musical, based on McCourt's Pulitzer prize winning work and brought to the stage by acclaimed producer Pat Moylan with composer Adam Howell and writer Paul Hurt, returns to Limerick for 11 performances only prior to a UK and Ireland tour.

Acclaimed by critics and audiences alike, the Limerick run marks the beginning of the musical's next chapter with performances scheduled for Edinburgh, Dublin, Cork and Belfast. Ellen McCourt said she was "thrilled that the musical will

have another life.

"Adam Howell's glorious music deserves to be heard by a wider audience and Frank's humanity and humor, so deftly translated to the stage by Paul Hurt, will remind Limerick audiences of why they loved the book in the first place. Delighted it's coming back," she added.

The production was received with acclaim on its first run in Limerick, with playwright Mary Coll among those who said it was "terrific". It went on to the Bord Gais Energy Theatre, Dublin and the Grand Opera House, Belfast in

All the hallmarks of local life are present in the musical, South's pub, where Frank famously had his first pint, Leamy's school, St Vincent de Paul, the damp descending from the River Shannon, and even the Limerick Leader gets a notable mention.

The musical tale of McCourt's memoir was a "gamechanger" for the Lime Tree, venue boss Louise Donlon has said. It returns to the Lime Tree from July 18 to 27, with matinee shows on July 20 and 27.

Rent in Limerick city grew the fastest in the country

Limerick city rents jump by nearly 12%

RENTS in Limerick city rose the fastest in the country, jumping almost 12% in a year, new figures show.

The latest Residential Tenancies Board (RTB) Rent Index found that renters in Limerick city now pay €928 on average per month, compared to €830 during the same time the previous year.

The latest figures also show there was an almost 3% increase in rents between the months of April, May and June, and July, August and September 2018.

"Affordability remains an issue for the rental market with continued economic, employment and population growth contributing to rising demand across the country," RTB director Rosalind Carroll said.

"We can also see rents across the country have continued to increase year-on-year," she added.

The average rent of new tenancies in County Limerick also increased by almost 9% when compared in 2017, the RTB Rent Index found.

New tenancies in County Limerick increased to €941 from €865 during the same time last year.

The RTB Rent Index, which is compiled in conjunction with the Economic and Social Research Institute (ESRI), also shows that although rents are now at a record high, the number of landlords is falling.

According to the RTB, there are now 1,778 fewer landlords nationally than in 2015. This is a "matter of deep concern" to the RTB, according to Ms Carroll. "If we are to meet demand and ensure a well-functioning rental sector, then we need more landlords and different types of landlords to offer market options." Landlords leaving is increasing pressure on the market, she added.



Fundraiser for vital community 'lifesavers'

LIMERICK'S only community first responders urgently need to raise funds for essential lifesaving equipment.

The Ennis Road Community
First Responders are volunteers,
linked to the National Ambulance
Service, who are dispatched by that
office to cardiac emergencies
within their communities.

The group was founded last

April given the aging profile of the population in the surrounding estates between the Strand Hotel to the Greenhills Hotel, according to volunteer Noel Kerley.

"Currently, cardiovascular disease is the most common cause of death in Ireland, accounting for 33% of all deaths, early response is essential in helping to save some of those lives," Mr Kerley said.

With all of its members trained in CPR and other live-saving measures, the Ennis Road Community First Responders are typically the first on the scene, working on call 24/7 to respond to cardiac arrests, chest pains and suspected heart attacks, strokes and choking emergencies.

While the Ennis Road CFR group is supported by the HSE and the National Ambulance Service, they do not get any funding to buy their own equipment, including AEDs (Automated External Defibrillators) or to provide accredited training and purchase

training equipment.

A major fundraiser for this equipment is to take place this Thursday, December 20, in Dunnes Stores at the Jetland Shopping Centre, Ennis Road.

"We are appealing to the people living in the area to support our fundraising next Thursday because we need this money to help us buy this essential equipment and also to provide ongoing accredited training for our volunteers," Mr Kerley said.

The Castletroy Local Area Plan runs to hundreds of pages

Castletroy Local Area Plan gets green light

Planning: The wide-ranging plan will run until 2025

THE Castletroy Local Area Plan was adopted by members of the Metropolitan District despite opposition from several councillors.

The wide-ranging plan, which runs to hundreds of pages, envisages the population of Castletroy increasing from 14,700 to almost 27,000 by 2040.

Tens of thousands of people, who either live or work in Castletroy or who attend the University of Limerick, will be affected by the plan which will feed into the County Development plan and the National Planning Framework which was adopted by government earlier this year.

There are detailed proposals relating to transport, industry and retail within the Castletroy and Annacotty area which encompasses

11.2 square kilometres.

Following a public consultation process, a number of amendments were proposed by planners and the final plan was before Monday's meeting of the Metropolitan District.

Cllr Seighin O'Ceallaigh, who was one of three members to vote against the plan said it was "Celtic Tiger stuff" which will ensure the housing crisis continues.

While supporting the Local Area Plan, Cllr Marian Hurley said there are continuing concerns in relation to the lack of infrastructure in the Castletroy and Annacotty areas given the daily volumes of traffic.

A number of councillors welcomed the plan saying it will allow for the development of the so-called Parkway Valley site as well as the proposed Educate Together secondary school at Groody Link

Cllr Joe Leddin said the plan is "hugely important" in the context of giving certainty in relation to the development of the area while Cllr John Gilligan noted there was "absolutely no guarantee" that zoned lands would be developed during the lifetime of the plan.

During the discussion, senior planner Maria Woods confirmed the Northern Distributor Road was not considered in the plan as it does not pass through the Castletroy area.

She added the Local Area Plan will be reviewed in two years in the context of the new County Development Plan.

Following a lengthy discussion, a vote was called with 14 members voting in favour of the plan and three voting against it.

Those who voted against were Cllr Seighin O'Ceallaigh, Cllr John Costelloe and Cllr Malachy McCreesh.

Council accused of 'ignoring' local knowlege

Councillors in the Metropolitan District say they are disappointed that several submissions relating to draft special speed limit by-laws have been rejected by council engineers.

The draft by-laws were published earlier this year following a review which was carried out by the local authority.

once adopted, the new by-laws will prescribe where special speed limits, such as 30km/h or 60km/h will

submissions
were received

from councillors, members of the public and other bodies, only a small number of changes have been proposed.

Councillors from the Castletroy area were unanimous in their criticism of the decision not to reduce the 60km/h limit which currently applies at Mountshannon Road.

Cllr Joe Pond, who made a formal submission, told Monday's meeting the road is being used as a "rat run" by commuters and that people in the area are very concerned.

In its report to councillors, the local authority stated that under national guidelines reduced speed limits are "not appropriate" for rural roads such as Mountshannon Road.

Expressing his disappointment at the response, Cllr Pond said local knowledge should "trump national guidelines" while Cllr Marian Hurley agreed saying people are "taking their lives in their hands" when travelling on the road.

"It's a nightmare, it can't be left at 60km/h," she said adding that she was disappointed that her submissions in relation to stretches of road near Ahane and Drombanna were dismissed.

The council was also criticised for its decision to retain the 50km/h limit which is inforce on Condell Road.

reasoning for maintaining the current limit is due to the presence of a cycle lane which is not separated from the main carriageway.

is not separated from the main carriageway.

Cllr John Gilligan said the 50km/h limit is "ridiculous" while Councillor Malachy McCreesh said the limit "does not make sense".

Cllr Paul Keller expressed his frustration that more than half of the submissions received in relation to the draft by-laws were rejected and he called on council officials to give more consideration to local knowledge rather than national guidelines.

A detailed submission from the operators of the Limerick Tunnel calling has been referred to Transport Infrastructure Ireland.

'Europe's first university town'

Third Level: Mixed local reaction to UL and Clare County Council 2021 proposal

PLANS to build 'Europe's first 21st century university town' on the Clare side of the University of Limerick campus have been met with a mixed response in Limerick.

Construction on the €2 billion project is expected to begin in 2021, and is expected to create 3,500 jobs.

The proposal is "an opportunity" for Limerick and Clare to create a "strong urban counterbalance to Dublin", according to Limerick city TD Jan O'Sullivan.

"I do believe, however, that there

needs to be widespread consultation and cohesive planning," the former Education Minister added.

Environmental and heritage charity An Taisce Limerick is cautiously awaiting further information on the details on the proposal.

New chairperson Dr John Logan believes there is currently a "deficit" of concrete details in the public domain.

"An Taisce is very, very keen to find, just as everyone else is, the details of this plan."

"An Taisce isn't opposed to development and it isn't necessarily opposed to this particular development but we need to know what it entails."

"Too often citizens and citizens groups are operating in an information deficit. We'd like to see maps, we'd like to see projections and so on."

An Taisce Limerick works closely with An Taisce Clare and will be monitoring the project together, he added.

Mayor of Limerick city and county cllr James Collins believes the plan is not likely to be in place in the immediate future.

"Clare County Council seem to be proposing a special development zone around land that will be opened up by the Northern Distributor Road, whenever that might be." "As Mayor of Limerick, director of 2030 and a member of the UL governing authority, the focus of all those three organisations is to have a meaningful UL presence or campus in the city centre. I'm confident they will come into the city centre and that UL are serious about a city centre campus."

Clare County Council plans to apply for a special designation for a large scale strategic zone to bring further development to the Limerick Shannon Metropolitan area. The site's industrial focus would be on working with Europe, the United States and other international partners, the plan proposes

"On previous campaigns, I have dropped bags of clothes down. But these only go so far. I thought doing a sleep-out would be a good next step We have it so easy in comparison to those who are homeless," she said.

Dr Una Burns, the policy head of Novas, said having high-profile figures back their main fundraiser is a huge boost to the charity.

a huge boost to the charity.

"We don't have the same profile as other large homeless charities. We don't have a fundraising department or an advocacy department, so it's wonderful for us that these grass roots events do get out there and allow us to help more people," she said.

Flagship festivals cost €460k to run

Funding: Councillors express concerns about cost

CONCERNS have been expressed about the funding model for two of Limerick's flagship festivals.

Briefing members of the Metropolitan District on Monday, Sheila Deegan, arts and culture officer with Limerick City and County Council said the cost of this year's St Patrick's Festival was €284,808 while the cost of Riverfest totalled €174,615.

She said around 160,000 people attended both events and that it is planned to increase the budget by 5% in 2019.

The figures drew a mixed reaction from members with some saying they fully endorsed the proposed

increase in the budget while others asked whether money should be spent on other events which take place at other times of the year.

Cllr Seighin O'Ceallaigh said he was unhappy that members of the Metropolitan District were being asked to "stump up" €30,000 in discretionary GMA funding for the two festivals.

Mayor of Limerick, Cllr James Collins called for greater detail to be provided to councillors as to how the money is being spent.

In particular, he noted the cost of the 'Creative Programme' for the St Patrick's Festival was €94,205 and that no other details had been provided.

Cllr Joe Leddin expressed concern that too much money is

being spent by the local authority and he asked if sponsorship and commercial partners had been sought.

Cllr Michael Sheehan said he is not happy that local companies and traders cannot afford the cost of pitches at Arthur's Quay Park during Riverfest.

He said the cheapest pitch in 2018 was ϵ 738 compared to ϵ 200, pre-2016. The most expensive pitch, he said, is ϵ 3,800.

"People are spending their hard-earned cash and the money is going all over Ireland," he said.

In response, Ms Deegan said that more than €30,000 in revenue is generated from traders and that this is put towards the budget for

Limerick Sports Partnership get €76K boost

SPORT IRELAND has announced that over €70,000 in dormant accounts will be distributed for sport and physical activity projects in Limerick.

With €5 million from the Department of Transport, Tourism and Sport dispatched across the country, Limerick Sports Partnership (LSP) will receive €76,200 from the overall budget.

LSP will receive €6,200 for Youth Leadership, €20,000 for their Community Sports and Physical Activity Hub in Croom; €15,000 for the Volunteer Training and Support Programme, and a further €35,000 will be allocated to the Garryowen Get Active initiative that was launched last year.

Senator Maria Byrne stated: "This initiative will see over €76,200 awarded to projects locally as well as significant funding for national projects such as coaching for young people and coaching for people with disabilities.

"This work is making a

substantial contribution to the health and welfare of individuals, communities and the nation," Senator Byrne concluded.

Only eight counties received over €100,000 in funding, Waterford being the only Munster county, receiving a bursary worth €131,555.

The highest earner in the country was County Dublin, which was divided into four areas: Dublin City, Dun-Laoghaire-Rathdown, South Dublin and Fingal earning €377,370 collectively.

GARDAI are warning of a new scam whereby fraudsters gain remote access to the electronic devices in the hope of getting access to their online banking details.

In one recent incident, a young woman received a phone call from a man who informed her that her Antivirus protection had expired on her laptop and that there was a €20 charge to reinstate it.

"The young woman agreed and followed some instructions on her laptop which unknown to her had given the caller control of

"She was then asked to enter her bank details into her computer so that she could pay the €20 but because the caller now had access to and control of her bank account he helped himself to her money," she


Be careful on social media

Bail: Man charged with robbery released despite objection

A MAN who gardai allege is a "career criminal" has been ordered to stay away from every off-licence in Limerick as a condition of his bail.

Kevin Noonan, aged 30, of Pineview Gardens, Moyross was brought before Limerick District Court after he was charged with robbery relating to an incident at Fine Wines, Thomondgate on November 19, last.

Opposing bail, Garda Shaun O'Hagan said it will alleged the defendant entered the premises at around 9.30pm and took two bottles of alcohol before leaving without

He said it will be further alleged that when he was confronted by a young worker, he gestured towards an 'object with a white top' and said he had a knife in his pocket.

Garda O'Hagan said two bottles of alcohol - matching those which were taken from the off-licence-were recovered when the defendant was arrested by gardai a short time after the alarm was raised.

He told Judge Marian O'Leary that CCTV has been obtained as part of the garda investigation and that it is the State case that Mr Noonan was "caught red handed".

He said it will be alleged the defendant is a "career criminal" and he expressed fears that Noonan would engage in further criminality if released.

"I believe he will commit further crimes to fund his lifestyle," he said adding that he was also concerned Mr Noonan would not appear in court if granted bail and would not abide by any conditions.

Barrister David McHugh rejected this assertion saying his client was willing to abide by any conditions imposed by the court.

the circumstances, submitted it was an "appropriate case for bail to be granted".

He noted the value of the alcohol which was allegedly taken was €25 and that it is likely the matter will ultimately be heard before the district court rather than the circuit court.

He said his client is not charged with possession of a knife and that there is no evidence that the culprit actually had a knife.

Having considered the matter and noting the assurances of the defendant, Judge O'Leary said she was granting bail subject to a number of conditions including the lodging on an independent surety with the

In addition to staying away from off-licences, Mr Noonan was ordered to live at his home address in Moyross and to obey a nightly curfew.

He must sign on at his local garda station three times a week and surrender his passport to gardai.

A file is being prepared for the Director of Public Prosecutions and the matter was adjourned for directions.

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'Acorn' to enhance seniors' web skills

UP to 40 elderly people in Limerick are to benefit from a pilot project which will see them given help to get online.

them given help to get online.
Early in 2019, a group of so-called 'silver surfers' are being selected to take part in the 'Acorn' project.

This will see them being given and instructed in a tablet computer device.

Codenamed 'Acorn', the product is a specially designed computer tailored to address the needs of seniors in a closed secure network.

It's designed to encourage elderly people to engage and interact online at both a social and commercial level; the design has the aim of enhancing seniors' independence, and helping them look after health, finance, communications and security concerns online.

Speaking at this week's home and community strategic policy committee, Anne Rizzo of the community development department, revealed Limerick is only the second local authority to trial this project, as part of its local Age Friendly Initiative.

"This has huge potential, and I think it could be huge both across Ireland and across the world. I'm delighted to be on the ground floor with this. It could be a new buzz in 2019," she told members.

The local authority is working with the older person's council on the scheme, which will see technical support afforded over a six month period.

"There will be no out-of-pocket expenses," she insisted.

Ten people on this committee have been given the tablet, and will be asked for feedback, while another 30 people are also in the process of being identified.

Asked by committee chairman Cllr Marian Hurley how this will be done, Ms Rizzo said there have already been 60 expressions of interest in taking a tablet.

After the six month period,

After the six month period, those taking part will get to keep the tablet, and will only have to pay the cost of getting online – with the Age Friendly Network bidding to negotiate preferential rates for connecting to the internet, with either An Post, Vodafone, and Tesco Ireland.

"It's a three horse race, with An Post in the lead," Ms Rizzo disclosed.

Supermac's chief signs deal on Limerick hotel

Castleconnell: Castle Oaks House Hotel bought for €3.5m

SUPERMAC'S supremo Pat McDonagh says Limerick is on the "up and up".

The Galway man was speaking after he signed a deal to purchase the Castle Oaks House Hotel in Castleconnell. It is understood the sale price is in the region of €3.5 million.

CBRE Hotels, who handled the bidding process, were guiding the 64-bedroom hotel on extensive grounds at $\epsilon 2.5$ m to $\epsilon 2.75$ m.

Mr McDonagh said it is an excellent location beside the Shannon in the picturesque village of Castleconnell – and in close proximity to Limerick city.

"That area of Limerick, the east part of the city is thriving. A lot of new industries and new jobs are being created there. Business is growing in the area - you have Troy Studios expanding, that is creating a lot of jobs. Plassey Business Park is there, the university, obviously, and a lot of major employers like Northern Trust. Limerick is on the up and up," said Mr McDonagh.

He describes the Castle Oaks as a beautiful old period house that has been converted in to a hotel.

"There is a lot of history attached to it. It's a nice hotel. We're delighted. It is ideal for weddings and functions. We are very happy with it," said Mr McDonagh.

Castle Oaks House has all the architectural characteristics that were predominant during the late Georgian period (1780 to 1830). The first known owners of the house were the Rich family. Lieutenant John S Rich and his family took up residence there in 1815. In June 1945, the property passed into the hands of the Presentation Sisters.

The sale will be now referred to the Competition and Consumer Protection Commission (CCPC).

Mr McDonagh plans a "major investment" into the hotel.

"We probably won't get possession for two or three months. It depends on the competition authority. Hopefully we will get possession in March and start fairly much straight away. We will be investing to upgrade the facilities over the next 12 months," said Mr

McDonagh, who moved to assure those who have weddings booked in 2019 and beyond.

"It is going to be business as normal. All bookings will be honoured and whatever price has been agreed with the previous management, we will adhere to that," said the Supermac's

The hotel has established itself as a superb wedding venue, known throughout the Mid-West region and further afield.

It is understood that approximately 70 couples will have had their big day in the Castle Oaks this year.

The elegant Stradbally suite, with its unique stained glass windows, parquet dance floor and picturesque garden views can host up to 280 guests.

The Integration Through Football futsal tournament finished strong as teams from Limerick's Direct Provision centres, local communities and other minority groups battled it out for the top prize last Friday night at University of Limerick Sport Arena.

The aim of the league organised by the Football Association of Ireland (FAI) in partnership with Limerick Sports Partnership, West Limerick Resources and Doras Luimni, is to encourage the integration of Limerick's refugees and asylum seekers within their local community.

Mayor of Limerick City and County James Collins was on hand to present the winners of the six-week long tournament with their prizes.

"People, of all different grades and skills and abilities have been coming for the last couple of weeks," he explained. "There's a lot of commitment there's a lot of of commitment, there's a lot of encouragement coming from the sidelines and it's great for connecting people and doing it in a

While the participants from the Direct Provision centres didn't go home with a trophy, the main focus wasn't on winning or losing, West Limerick Resources Development Officer Project Edward O'Shaughnessy said.

"That's not the point," he explained. "They are mixing, talking, reacting, laughing, burning

energy and its all those things that you need for good mental health.

"It's about socialisation, conversation, simple tasks in life, but if you're not actually doing it, it can be a hugely daunting task," Mr O'Shaughnessy, who provides employability training to residents at the Mount Trenchard centre,

Also in attendance was Sergeant Shane Davern from Henry Street Garda Station, who organised for a team of gardai from the station to take part in the integration programme. Sgt Davern said that the league gives refugees and asylum seekers the chance to break out "from the walls around them to a certain degree and I think it's only

important that they see the police force as being open, as being normal and that we are there to help them - that's the idea behind it."

Youssef, who is an asylum seeker and resident at Mount Trenchard, has been coming to the league every Friday for the past six weeks and said he has thoroughly enjoyed the experience.

"I have really enjoyed it and I have learned so many things and met friends," he explained.

"I would love to play again and meet other people and challenge

each other to do something and spend time together," he said.

Plans are underway for a second tournament on similar lines, with the hope that it will take place in February or March of next year.

Chinazo John Nnaya who is the main organiser of the tournament and is also a former asylum seeker currently studying to become a sports coach at LIT said he would like to see more local teams, businesses and partners getting

involved in the next tournament.

"I'm really looking forward to the next time and to widen the network," Mr Nnaya said of the programme that is funded by the EU Asylum, Migration and Integration Fund (AMIF).

He says he is proud of the level of integration achieved and was also pleased to say that two of the participants have been signed to local football clubs as a direct result of the league.

National Coordinator of the FAI Intercultural Football Programme Des Tomlinson said: "We are going to sit down and review with Chinazo and the partners involved and hopefully we are going to have a second series."

• Comedian Jimmy Carr raised eyebrows and hackles with a tweet about the ancient Treaty Stone at the weekend.

The London-born comic, whose parents hail from Limerick and who has family still living in these parts, was in the city for a four night stint at the South Court Hotel, performing a self-professed "Best Of, Ultimate, Gold, Greatest Hits Irish Tour 2018".

Carr queried of the Treaty Stone to his almost seven million followers on Twitter: "I've been performing in Limerick this weekend. Check out this stone on top of another stone...if you know of a s***ier monument please get in touch." Renowned for his acerbic, withering wit, Carr has a vast repertoire and lightning-sharp delivery all qualities that seemed lost in this strange tweet that is unlikely to draw favour from tourism bosses in the region.

The responses on social media were largely unkind to Carr's wit, and quick to point out that there is "a lot of history behind that stone", while another said: "It's important to us." Another added: "Hope you enjoy paying roaming charges next time you come to Limerick." A comic should know his audience, as they say.

● Last year in Northern Ireland the government was brought down by the so-called 'cash for ash' scandal, in which **DUP** leader Arlene Foster played a central role.

We had our own cash for ash story in Limerick last week, and while no government will fall, this story is equally gobsmacking in its own way.

A boy, who had taken the Ash Wednesday anointment but had difficulty washing the mark away for a time, was awarded €5,000 in court after his father took a claim against the church over the "unsightly" material that lingered.

How either the church or the insurance

company didn't tell the claimants to go and jump beggars belief, and would appear to show that people making claims have far too much power in Ireland.

If an insurance company runs scared and doesn't stand up to defend such claims as this, then we are in the realm of farce.

Spartacus was contacted by an angry landlord who made reference to a story in our sister tabloid paper on Monday.
The Leader reports that

although rents are now at a record high and the Irish rental market is experiencing unprecedented demand, the number of landlords in Limerick is actually falling with a decline of 8,829 tenancies and 1,778 fewer landlords than in 2015.

"Landlords get a lot of bad publicity and are seen as tycoons who continually put up rents. But the reality is that many purchase a house or an apartment as a pension or for their children. I can see why there are fewer landlords. You pay massive tax on your rent, and I personally have had tenants cause a lot of damage and do a runner without paying rent. There are two sides to every story, and if there are fewer landlords surely the politicians should be

asking why?" We won't hold our breath on behalf of this and other angry landlords in expectation of a response from the general public.

The snow-topped log cabin with fenced garden, piped Christmas music, icicle lights, and more has returned to O'Connell Street to add to the festive atmosphere of the city.



'An accident just waiting to happen'

PEOPLE walking or cycling down the lower Golf Links Road are "taking their life in their hands", according to Labour Councillor Elena Secas.

Cllr Secas has called on the Council to lodge a part eight planning application for the proposed road widening scheme to upgrade the road near O'Shea's Pub as soon as possible.

"This section of the road is totally unsuited to the volume and type of traffic using this route and people dread this road, in particular in the winter. Almost nobody walks or cycles down that road as by doing so you are taking your life in your hands. This road carries a high volume of traffic from Castletroy to the Ballysimon Road and is effectively little more than a country lane," Cllr Secas said.

The councillor says that funding has already been approved to carry out an overlay and road widening project at this location.

"I welcome the fact that consultants have been appointed. I am now calling on the Council to

lodge a part eight planning application which would avoid any further and unnecessary delays in getting the necessary work done," Cllr Secas added.

Development carried out by a local authority is often referred to as 'part eight" development. This includes the construction of houses, roads and public toilets.

"This is an issue that I have been working on since elected and, as I have said before, is an accident just waiting to happen," Cllr Secas concluded.



"Being here this evening is very special for me. We know that the grieving process is a difficult and lonely journey for children and their parents. This remembrance area will be a place where families can remember and reflect on their child."

The project was the concept of parent Theresa Noonan, whose daughter Katherine was under the care of Hilary Noonan, Children's

Seven tips to avoid a big overspend this Christmas

t's nearly upon us. Only a few more sleeps to go. And whilst Christmas for most is a great and exciting time of year, from a financial perspective it's a notoriously difficult one.

The month of December is when our finances take the biggest hit, where we will spend on average €866 more, than at any other time of the year.

Wondering how you are going to fund and face the aftermath of raiding savings accounts, and or the amount you racked up in debt, just to get through Christmas could lead to a long

and miserable January.
Putting that question off, isn't a good strategy either. A money hangover is much worse than an alcohol one - it lasts much longer, and a couple of, paracetamol, won't make it go away.

So, I'm going to share with you seven practical tips I have used, read about and heard of and I thought you might find them useful also, and they are:

USE THE 10-SECOND RULE

Financial blogger Trent Hamm says if you're in a shop, and thinking of buying an item, hold it for 10 seconds, and during that time, ask yourself if that money could be put to better use on something else? Hamm says, in 10 seconds your sanity will come back on line and you'll find yourself putting back the item, and you'll walk away delighted you didn't waste your money.

PRACTICE THE STRANGER TEST

If you're thinking of buying something, before you go to the till, imagine that a stranger approaches you with the item in your hand and offers it to you or the cash equivalent - your choice. If you'd take the cash, put the item down and move on.

MAKE PURCHASES ONLY USING CASH

Consumer studies have revealed that we can spend up to 25% more if we use debit or credit cards instead of cash. So, if you want to rein in those impulsive purchases, leave the cards at home, and only bring cash with you.

Also try get the crispest, newest notes you can get your hands on. Because research again shows we are less likely to spend them than we are, dirtier, older ones.

LINK YOUR PURCHASES TO THE AMOUNT YOU EARN PER HOUR

When I say the amount you earn per hour, I'm referring to the net amount after taxes, you earn. You can't spend the amount you give away in taxes, so we're looking at the amount that lands in your account each month. If that amount is €3,000 per month, and you work 40 hours per week, your hourly earning rate, based on a 46-week working year is €19.56.

Next time you are tempted to buy something for €100, ask yourself is it worth five hours of your time and income? Using this method puts the item you are buying into perspective and can lead to you thinking twice about whether you want to buy it or not.

WORK OUT THE COST PER USE

If you look at the cost per use of an item, you are considering buying, rather than the price, you could save yourself a fortune, and not be suckered into buying things impulsively, whether they are on sale or not.

If you are going to buy something, you should give it a value of €1 for every time you use it. So, if you are considering buying a new shirt for say €50 whether it's on sale or not, you

should ask yourself, would I wear it 50

It may just help you think twice about spending money on something you end up never using.

IGNORE THE TIME LIMITED OFFER

Stores use time limited offers to get you to spend money, by creating a sense of urgency into making the purchase because if you don't, the price will increase. They want to create the illusion of a great sale. I saw this ploy recently where a DVD of the film Frozen was being sold at €8.99 but underneath it was a sign saying that after Xmas, it would go back up to €12.99 – I'm wondering will it really go up? I doubt it.

DON'T SPEND WHAT YOU DON'T HAVE

The financial author, Suze Orman puts it best when she says; "People have got to learn; if they don't have cookies in the cookie jar, they can't eat cookies."

So, please be careful using your credit card to fund nights out, presents etc. over Christmas, because any debt like it that goes unpaid, is one of the most corrosive things you could do to your financial well-being. If you aren't 100% sure you will pay off in full what you used over the Christmas period, then please don't use it.

That's about it. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who wrote to me over the year with their questions and feedback.

ASK LIAM

Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q: I need to buy some last, minute Xmas presents and I'm thinking of buying some gift vouchers anything I need to be aware of, if I do? Peter

A: I would probably choose one that allows them to buy from any number of stores, simply because of the choice it gives them.

But, also, if you give them a gift card exclusively for one store, and it closes down before the card is used, the card holder becomes an unsecured creditor and if they want to get the value of their card back, they first have to register with whoever is appointed to wind up the company, and after secured creditors are paid, they're next in line, and the $likelihood\, of\, them\, getting$ anything back at that stage, isn't very good.

Also, be mindful of expiry

If it goes over an expiry date, the card may not be unusable, but a late fee may be applied to it for every month, it isn't used, which could seriously devalue it's worth.

Finally, take care of your gift voucher, because if you lose it, the store or issuer of the card isn't obliged to give you a replacement card. Losing a card is like losing cash, so keep it safe.



Shopping: Petrol station is all set to remain open on December 25

A LEADING city retailer has revealed he has been over subscribed with offers of people wanting to work on Christmas

Shane Gleeson will open his petrol station next door to the Hurlers Pub on December 25, and he says ten of the 100 people his family employs at all the city Spar stores have offered to work on the big day.

"People need to be conscious that there are quite a few people living in single person households now and don't necessarily have anywhere to go on Christmas Day," he said, "We put a note up that we were happy to close on Christmas Day unless we had people who wanted to work. We needed six people. Ten applied to work."

Those people, Mr Gleeson added, were consulted with on a confidential basis, before management assessed who would most benefit from working on Christmas Day.

"Most of the lads are single, and are in single person households. For them, Christmas Day can be quite a lonely experience," the retailer said.

It's the second year in a row that the Hurler's petrol station opened on Christmas Day, with Mr Gleeson saying last time, there was "great craic" in the station.

"People are coming in with very good cheer. They are interacting with people all day. We also give a bit of a bonus for working the day," he said, "We were quite busy. There are quite a few people who have to work Christmas Day anyway. You're talking about gardai, we had customers from the army, the fire brigade and orders for Limerick prison."

Mr Gleeson added he was expecting to close the petrol station for the first time ever.

Meanwhile, shoe shop owner Michael Gleeson has urged people to buy from local outlets this Christmas instead of online – in order to keep independent local trade alive.

"As a city centre retailer, there are three things which are mitigating against retailing. Obviously, the number one is parking difficulty. Number two is out of town shopping. Now, the more important one is online shopping," he said, "It's a struggle for city centre retailers to keep the show on the road, that's what I would say. Independent and family businesses are the worst hit, as we're not strong enough for online businesses."

Michael Gleeson says independent traders have been the "lifeblood" of shopping in Limerick through the years

"It's going to be too late when many of them do not survive. People will say what a shame it is to see a nice operation close. But then it's too late when they are gone," he added.

"Now is a time to ease off on the online shopping," Michael Gleeson concluded.

Including this Wednesday, there were six shopping days until Christmas.

Website speed warning

A LEADING digital agency headed by a Limerick man has warned of the loading times of business web sites across Ireland.

Agent Digital, anchored by Kevin Meaney, has created a web site speed report, surveying the page loading times of over 1,000 individual Irish web sites.

The survey highlights the average web site loading time in the domestic e-commerce sector was the slowest of all sectors looked at.

Web sites take on average 10.35 seconds to load fully on a mobile device.

Mr Meaney said the research represents a wake-up call for all Irish businesses online.

"Average load time for Irish websites is over three times the recommended standard. Research shows 53% will leave a mobile page if it takes longer than 3 seconds to load," Mr Meaney said.

Quality seal for new local business

EIGHT WEEKS after their launch, EcoStraws.ie, a firm based in Hospital County Limerick have already received a seal of quality, writes Anthony Geoghegan.

The local distributor, founded by Brian O'Callaghan, Sarah Keyes and Anthony Egan have been awarded an All-Ireland Business All-Star accreditation, a standard mark only given to indigenous companies with a quality standard of business practice.



A LOCAL charity is set for a year-long boost as Sarsfield Credit Union seeks a 'partner' for 2019.

'If we received €1,000 prize, it would save a child's life'

ONE thousand euro from the Sarsfield Credit Union would ensure the Bluebox Creative Arts Therapy Centre can support one child for a whole year.

The centre, based in the LEDP building at Roxboro, exists to support children and youngsters who have been traumatised and are from disadvantaged or marginalised communities.

They use a unique type of therapy, that of creative art, using art, music, play, drama, dance and movement to help a youngster achieve their potential.

Bernadette Kenny, its chief executive said: "If we got €1,000, it would mean a child would get therapy for the year, and that could save the child's life.

"It would give that child the best

chance of having a one-on-one with a therapist who would help them work through all their feelings and emotions.

"It would give them a voice that in the future could help them develop a resilience to whatever

Some 17 professionally qualified therapists are employed by Bluebox each year, and the organisation works mainly at schools in disadvantaged areas.

Last year, more than 3,000 hours of service was given to 300 families.

The publicity will really help showcase the Bluebox Creative Learning Centre, which has been in existence for 20 years.

Hopefully, Ms Kenny says, it will inspire other smaller companies to

contribute and invest in the charity, and also raise the awareness of the benefits of using creative arts therapy.

One of city's most respected charities bids for €1k boost

BASED at the Dock Road, Limerick Marine Search and Rescue would greatly welcome the €1,000 prize.

Established in 1986 by sports divers Tony Cusack and Jimmy Connors, the charity keeps Limerick people safe from the unpredictable waters of the River Shannon.

It was founded after the pair were asked to search for a young boy who had lost his life in the waters at Parteen

It was 32 years ago this month that Limerick Marine Search and Rescue was formally founded.

Their base at Atlas Avenue in the Dock Road houses state-of-the-art equipment which help keep Limerick people safe in choppy waters.

Thomas Cusack, who is the charity's chairman this year, said the €1,000 would mean an immense amount to them.

"It will all go towards the upkeep of our equipment. We have a lot of maintenance needing doing, be it boats or diving equipment, plus general wear and tear on our own personal equipment," he explained.

With 26 volunteers on board, Limerick Marine Search and Rescue donate their time to aid their community. They also hold summer camps to teach children and adults about water safety in a positive environment.

Award would help keep a vital medical support service on road

IT costs thousands of euro to keep the one van and three motorbikes of Blood Bike Mid-West on the road each year.

Based at St John's Ambulances offices at the Crossagalla Industrial Estate at the Ballysimon Road, the charity provides out-of-hours emergency support services to front-line medical workers.

Pat Murphy of the group explains: "We provide transport of blood products, patient records, and any other equipment we can fit on a motorbike, essentially. We do our best to make a small bit of a difference. But it's only possible through the generous funding from the general public."

The bike service is the sole transporter for the breast milk bank in Ireland. Despite having more than 40 volunteers in the saddle, Blood Bikes Mid-West receives no public funding.

Asked what €1,000 would mean to the charity, Mr Murphy adds: "It will go a long way towards the maintenance of our vehicles. As you can appreciate they are not the cheapest to keep on the road. With three motorcycles and a van, the insurance costs can be quite high.

"This money will go to the upkeep of the service."

Mary Queen of Ireland students put together more 150 Christmas than shoeboxes this year, filled with presents to be sent to less fortunate children in other countries.


The school even had a visit from local hero Sigi Murrihy, a German native living in Caherdavin, who has sent hundreds of shoeboxes as part of the annual appeal.

Apple cider vinegar for the holidays

INEGAR has many uses in our house besides sharpening the taste of salads. The cheaper ones are great to soak vegetables in them or use as antimicrobial cleaners around the house, adds extra shine to glasses and windows.





Surviving Christmas Without a loved one - Part 2

N last week's Man About
Town I described my own
experience of facing the first
Christmas without my
parents. Recently, I've felt as
if my thoughts were always
engaged in battle. Every bit of joy
or Christmas cheer was trumped
by the fact that my dad was not
there to experience it too or even
guilt over the fact the I was
allowing myself to be happy when
I should be feeling sad.

And whenever I became aware of the sadness I would very quickly shut it out for fear it would overcome me. I was struggling internally with my grief and the fear of feeling my grief so I started going to counselling again and I started talking to people who've been through this already. If you've lost a loved one and you're facing your first Christmas without them, here are some tips that I've been given that could help you cope.

ACKNOWLEDGE YOUR FEELINGS

In my mind, it was best to push all the pain away and block out any feelings of sadness. Burying your feelings, or trying to ignore your grief will work for a little while but I knew that it would actually make things more painful in the long term. In the last eight months, I've found that the anticipation of an occasion can be harder than the day itself, just because you don't know how we're going to cope, or what the day will bring. So, by acknowledging your loss, acknowledging your grief, and allowing yourself to go gently into Christmas, it can sometimes ease the stress of the big day itself.

HONOUR THEM

Although your loved one may not physically be there at Christmas, you can still make them a part of the day. A symbolic gesture like lighting a candle, or placing one of their fayourite items on the

Christmas table, can help everyone feel like loved one is 'there' with you. Sharing memories, or toasting to them can be a lovely way to keep them involved. Some people I've spoken to still set a place at the table for the person they've lost and some still buy a gift for that person. While these are lovely traditions that work for them, I can honestly say it wouldn't work for me and would really upset me but I'm aware of that so I'm not going to attempt it. And it's important to state that if you don't feel you can cope with doing any of these things, then don't. Really it's about what you can handle on the day, and you call the shots. It's common to feel guilty if you have fun moments, or if you don't think about the person who has passed as much as you believe that you should. But you really don't have to feel guilty about anything.

You are allowed to do, or not do, whatever you want.

MAKE NEW TRADITIONS

Sometimes new traditions arise from loss. It could be visiting their grave after dinner, asking everyone to dress a certain way or wear a particular colour, playing a new board game with the kids, or watching a movie together that has special meaning. Sometimes this can be a way to bring some of that spark back into Christmas. It may be a different kind of spark, but still meaningful nonetheless.

BUT DON'T SKIP ROUTINES

The first Christmas without a loved one will make you want to just skip all the usual routines of the day. But keeping at least one core routine (i.e. get up, have breakfast, go to Mass, prepare the dinner) can be very helpful in coping with your grief and in putting one foot in front of the other. The actual celebration of Christmas Day might not be the same without that person, but if you at least have a basic routine in place, and you know what's coming up, it can help you emotionally survive the day.

ACCEPT HELP

Many people, including myself, fall into the habit of responding with, "No, I'm grand," when asked if they need help or if everything is alright. While I've been battling my own feelings lately, I also withdrew from my social circle a little and the only people I confided in about how I was feeling were my siblings and my two closest friends. In some ways, that's more than most would but I would say to anyone who's going through a similar experience that during this vulnerable period, talk to your friends and family and take all the offers of help you can. Christmas can be a stressful time of the year at the best of times, the first Christmas since you lost your loved one can be even more so. Having people to talk to or take things off your to-do list, can ease the burden for you. It can also allow you to take some time out to process what's gone on.

Christmas might never be the same when you've lost a loved one, but it can take on new forms and new meanings for you and your family. My Mam and Dad are never far away from my thoughts and I know that despite all of the work I've done lately, it remains almost unavoidable that this Christmas will be one that's filled with moments of sadness. But I take comfort from the fact that my Christmas spirit is still alive within me and in the years to come when I have a home and a family of my own I can resume some of our family Christmas traditions without feeling the sadness or guilt that currently surround them.







Mathewson would love a chance to stay at Munster

Rugby: Scrum-half made All-Blacks debut at Thomond Park in 2008

MUNSTER'S New Zealand-born scrum-half Alby Mathewson has revealed his desire to remain at the province to the end of this season and beyond.

Mathewson, who made his All-Blacks debut against Munster at the official opening of Thomond Park in 2008, was recently granted a three-month extension on his contract having arrived at the province last summer.

Mathewson had joined Munster for four months initially as injury cover for the fit-again Conor Murray. The 33-year-old Kiwi will

The 33-year-old Kiwi will provide cover through the 6 Nations as the extended deal will keep him in Limerick until the end of March.

Mathewson said he would love the opportunity to remain at Munster until the end of the season and beyond as he has lived in five different countries over the past two years, including England with Bristol, France with Toulon and King County in New Zealand.

Speaking ahead of Munster's Guinness PRO14 interprovincial clash with Ulster at Kingspan Stadium on Friday night, 7.35pm, Mathewson said: "A long-term (contract) would be ideal. It has been tough the last two years for me. I have lived in five countries the last two years, just as I said picking up contracts here and

"I am looking for

something long-term. It is tough on my family, my oldest son is eight, he has been to five different schools in the last two years and this is probably the toughest period, I have never been away from him for this long and obviously over Christmas it makes it even tougher, but I sort of said to him that it is not forever, just for myself and for them, long-term (contract) is the plan.

"It is tough with the rules here, or everywhere I guess, but whether it is here or somewhere else, long-term. Yes, 33-years-old, people might say it is old, but I look after myself and I know I can keep proving to myself and people that it doesn't matter where I go, I can play and perform at a high level and I

know I can do it for at least another couple of years."

Mathewson, who has impressed for Munster since his arrival, scoring two tries in six appearances, two off the bench, has fond memories of his 2008 visit to Limerick with the All-Blacks.

Making his Munster bow against Ulster at Thomond Park in late September reminded him of the night 10 years ago when the All-Blacks escaped with a narrow 18-16 win.

"It had been 10 years, but it was exactly the same as I remembered from 2008, just how loud the crowd was, but then how quiet the crowd was (for goalkickers), obviously coming from the Southern Hemisphere, I had never experienced anything like that.

the game of Rugby Union has always held itself in high regard when it comes to the officiating

One will often be told, "they are not rules, they are laws"

The issue for rugby now is how long can they keep people coming to

The game of rugby is slowly realising that with increasing supporter base, comes increased scrutiny, both on and off the paddock.

Fans want to know more about the

game, the players, the relationship with legal and illegal drugs and the laws of the game.

As the interest increases, the players are becoming more guarded, the ex professionals are learning that their thoughts on the 'medicalisation' of the game are now front page news. (Just ask Brian O'Driscoll)

However, one of the biggest challenges facing the game is the variance in which the laws are interpreted from week to week.

A game that confuses fans is not going to sell well in 'new markets'

A lack of understanding of what is going on at any one time, is one of the main reasons Baseball and American Football have been slow to catch the

attention of a Worldwide audience.

Should rugby wish to grow the game globally, they first need to learn how to referee the game with more

consistency.
Limerick has, over the years, boasted some of the best referees in the World. Joy Neville, George Clancy and Peter Fitzgibbon have all refereed at the top level, so 'we' do know our rugby.

The problem now though is that rugby is becoming harder to understand for the fans, the players and the coaches worldwide.

Wayne Barnes, the man in the middle for last weekend's Castres v Munster battle, came in for a lot of criticism this week and rightly so.

There was so much off the ball stuff missed last Saturday in Castres, that is it hard to figure out what the TMO and the touch judges were actually there for.

Missing flagrant fouls both on and off the ball are inexcusable. They are the high end of refereeing failure.

The inconsistencies surrounding ruck clear outs, players not supporting their body weight or side entry into rucks and mauls are where the real issue lies for rugby, week in, week out.

Every single ruck, of which there can be over 300 of in a game are becoming a lottery.

If people see the game was lawless, they will move elsewhere, quickly.

A minor matter of GAA age levels

T'S all becoming confusing with regard to Lthe varying age grades in

Limerick GAA had a club championship review meeting last week and the status quo is to remain for 2018 with regard the minor and U-21 grade.

So the Limerick club championship will have a minor (U-18) grade and an U-21 grade.

But at inter-county level, minor is to continue at U-17 level for 2019, while the U-21 grade is no-more with that now an U-20 championship for both hurling and football.

On top of all that, the Post Primary Schools Senior Championships (Harty Cup etc) have now moved up to U-19 from U-18 1/2.

So, there is U-17, U-18, U-19, U-20 and U-21 grades between club and county.

And, all that is on top of

Bord na nOg competitions up to U-16 level.

I can see the reasons for the Limerick and other county board decisions to remain with U-18 and U-21 but surely if GAA authorities in Croke Park are to change age levels, that they should insist it becomes the norm across the country.

Personally speaking, I still feel U-18 is best suited to the minor grade.

Watching inter-county minor championship games throughout 2018, they didn't have the same standard as previous years with players clearly not as mature, mentally or physically.


