Dolores statue needs to hit the right note



A year on from her death, it's time to make plans to erect a statue to honour the late Dolores O'Riordan in Limerick but the location and tone needs to be right

DARE we mention the words statue and Limerick in the same breath.

Memorials erected to celebrate the lives of our most accomplished citizens haven't all exactly struck the right notes in the past.

But we have a chance to redeem ourselves.

On the first anniversary of death of Dolores O'Riordan, the question must be asked again, how do we immortalise the one Limerick person who has had the biggest impact around the globe?

It needs to be a landmark statue, a permanent memorial to her sublime talent, a talent that was nurtured in the Model school and Laurel Hill Coláiste and went on to achieve massive international success, selling more than 40 million records worldwide with her band The Cranberries.

A life-size bronze statue of the rock star with her guitar in hand — think of the Phil Lynott statue off Dublin's Grafton Street, but with a bit more edge — should be erected in a prime location.

How about the site of the new Opera Centre?

The €180m development which, at its heart, will have a student campus and multi-million euro library – is a bright new vision of Limerick, and the perfect space to honour and remember the local girl who dared to dream big and conquered the world.

What's your idea of a perfect day, or a perfect weekend, in Limerick?

I climbed Knockfierna with family over the May Bank Holiday weekend last year, in weather that was just perfect. It was one of the most memorable days of the year and we plan to make it an annual pilgrimage. There's nothing quite like sharing a great day out exploring the beautiful countryside we have here in Limerick with those close to you.

What's your first Limerick memory?

Arriving into St John's Church to take up the position of administrator with Island Theatre Company, my first full-time job in theatre! It was not the conventional office – a room fashioned out of the old altar area of a church, itself surrounded by a very evocative gravevard.

What's your favourite part of the city (or county) and why?

I recently had the opportunity to march in the St Patrick's Day Parade and the vista of the Georgian city that is before you as you march from O'Connell Avenue onto the Crescent is a sight to behold. I think our Georgian architecture is a huge treasure that we don't value enough.

What about a favourite walk or view?

The walk up Knockfiema was pretty fabulous, but I also have occasion to be in the offices of Limerick City and County Council at Merchant's Quay from time to time. I envy the employees there who get to look out on the Shannon as it wends its way through the city, across the Curragower Falls towards Sarsfield Bridge. It's a truly beautiful site, in any weather.

What do you think gives Limerick its unique identity?

Limerick is so full of history— the Treaty Stone, the Georgian quarter, St Mary's Cathedral but particularly King John's Castle. That such a well preserved castle is right alongside you as you drive over Thomond Bridge, there's nothing else quite like it here in Ireland.

Do you have a favourite local restaurant or pub?

I don't frequent pubs as much as I used to, but both Bobby Byrne's and Fennessy's would be top of my list. I love the Green Yard which is also close by work, and if bringing a visitor to the city, my first port of call is The Curragower Bar, for that amazing view of the castle.

How would you describe the people of Limerick?

Down to earth.

How important do you think sport is to Limerick?

Those who know me well know that I find it just a little tiresome that we focus so much on our love of sport. It is a great thing that the city and county embraces sport in the way that it does – and I couldn't have been happier at the achievements of Limerick's hurling team last September. But there can sometimes be an over-emphasis on Limerick and how it is synonymous with sport, eclipsing our other great achievements in business, the arts and education

If you could add one amenity to Limerick what would it be?

The city could do with a public swimming pool – I have lived in several towns and cities around Ireland and always used a local authority-run public swimming pool. I've always been surprised at the lack of one here in the city. I'd also love to see the plans for the pedestrianisation of O'Connell Street come to fruition

What's the biggest challenge facing the city (or county) today?

The lack of an evening economy in the city centre. If we could fix that, we could unleash huge potential in the city.

Woman travelled with her ex despite threats

Prosecution: Judge says charges were not proven

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A WOMAN who told gardai she was in fear of her former partner when he called to her home went on a mini-break with him less than a fortnight later, a court has heard.

The 34-year-old was prosecuted after the woman made a formal complaint to gardai that he had breached the terms of a safety order on separate dates last November and December.

The defendant, who has two young children with

the woman, spent a week in custody earlier this month after he was refused bail following a garda objection when he was arrested and charged.

In evidence
during a contested
hearing, the woman claimed
she received threatening
phone calls from her former
partner on November 28,

"He said he was going to slit my throat and that he would come to my property and burn my house," she said.

The second incident, she claimed, occurred on December 27 when he called to her home on the outskirts of the city and began shouting abuse while banging on the door.

"I felt very nervous," she told Inspector Paul Reidy. "I felt like he was going to kick in the door and seriously harm me," she added.

Being cross-examined by solicitor John Herbert, (pictured), the witness accepted she had travelled away from Limerick for a number of days with his client and their children in early December. Mr Herbert

also put it to the woman that she also stayed with his client for several days at his home in the city following their return. While the defendant's mother gave evidence supporting Mr Herbert's contention, she accepted she was not in a position to give evidence in relation to the allegations before the court.

Judge Marian O'Leary was told more than a dozen complaints were made to gardai last year and Mr Herbert put it to the complainant that she has a

propensity to make complaints "when it suits you". The woman denied

that she spends time with her former partner insisting her

only dealings with him relate to their children.

Seeking to have the charges dismissed, Mr Herbert said there was a clear contradiction in the evidence before the court – particularly relating to the second incident as his client denies calling to the house. He suggested the woman had told lies and that "at best her evidence is coloured".

Inspector Reidy said the woman had given evidence of being put in fear by the defendant and submitted there was a case to answer.

Having considered the matter, Judge Marian O'Leary said she was not satisfied the State had reached the necessary threshold to prove its case.

Dismissing the charges, she commented she had seen the pair "more often than anybody else last year".

She also expressed surprise that no formal access arrangements are in place relating to their children.

Average price of a semi-d in the city climbs to €200,000 - REA

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THE PRICE of a three-bedroom semi-detached home in Limerick city is expected to rise by 4% in 2019, according to a survey carried out by Real Estate Alliance (REA).

While in the county, the same type of property will be double that by the end of the year, the report says.

In the city, prices rose by 4.2% to €200,000 in the last 12 months, with no increase between September and December. Prices in the county rose by 8.1% to €160,000 in 2018 – with no change between September and December.

The REA Average House Price Survey concentrates on the actual sale price of Ireland's typical stock home, a

three-bed semi-detached, giving an up-to-date picture of the second-hand property market in towns and cities countrywide.

"Prices have stayed static in Limerick city in quarter four, with its average selling price of €200,000 representing a 4.2% increase throughout 2018, with local agent REA O'Connor Murphy stating that an increase in new developments has stabilised the second-hand residential market," said REA spokesperson, Barry McDonald.

Michael O'Connor of REA O'Connor Murphy in Limerick city predicts an increase in the new homes market, while the second-hand area will behave as in the latter stages of 2018 with sales taking longer to transact.

"The last quarter of 2018 saw a return to a normal market, with sales taking a little longer to transact and purchasers taking a little more time to consider their options. The increase in new developments has stabilised the second-hand residential market.

"Revision of the macroprudential rules, which took effect at the beginning of the year, appears to be having an impact, with price increases starting to slow. We envisage growth in the new homes market, with the second-hand market progressing in the same way as quarter four, 2018," said Mr O'Connor.







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'It would be a fitting memorial to an international star'

BUSINESSWOMAN and councillor Elenora Hogan has called for a memorial to the late Dolores O'Riordan in the heart of the city

On the first anniversary of the tragic death of the Cranberries frontwoman, Cllr Hogan has suggested the Urban Village outside Penney's or Cruises Street would be ideal places to remember one of Limerick's biggest stars.

"It would be a fitting memorial

to an international Limerick superstar," she said.

"Apparently, Dolores's grave in Ballybricken regularly receives visitors from America, Canada and many European countries. The University of Limerick will confer an honorary degree on the Cranberries and I believe now is the time for Limerick Council to erect a suitable memorial."

Cllr Hogan was speaking as she recalled the RTE 2FM Lark in the $Park festivals of 1989, 1990 \, and 1991,$ which she helped facilitate as co-ordinator of the Limerick

Summer Festival.

Based in the Long Meadow of the People's Park, the event hosted the Cranberries in one of their first big gigs, just months after signing a major record deal.

The event was always very popular and very successful. All age groups came," she recalled. "I remember the one in 1991 drew around 6,000 people.

They always attracted a good crowd. The purpose was to give Limerick bands an opportunity to perform in front of large crowds as part of the concert series. It was a good opportunity to make people familiar with their music and songs," said Cllr Hogan.

As for her memories of Dolores, she added: "Even then, the singularly unique beautiful voice of Dolores O'Riordan was a pleasure to listen to."

Poignant scenes as Dolores remembered in her home city

Music: Piano the focal point as crowds pay respects to iconic late Limerick singer

THERE were poignant and emotional scenes at Ormston House this Tuesday as Dolores O'Riordan was remembered on the first anniversary of her death.

The Patrick Street venue was packed throughout the day as men and women, young and old, came to share their memories of the Cranberries frontwoman in her home city, with the event named 'A Piano for Dolores'.

Visitors came to Shannonside from across the world, while there were a large number of local people sharing their thoughts, and entering their tributes to the Ballybricken lady in a special book.

Organised by Mark O'Connor,

Ennis Road, Stefania Bardi and Limerick City and County Council, the piano was the focal point of the room, while it was also adorned with images of Dolores and the Cranberries, plus lyrics from some of their most famous songs.

On top of the piano sat a daffodil, with the famous picture of the Cranberries - captured by former Leader photographer Dermot Lynch when they first signed to Island

Throughout the day, videos of the Cranberries performing were projected on the bare walls of Ormston House, while there were several opportunities for people to take to the piano to perform some classics from the group.

City centre musician Rachel Prior said: "Dolores put Limerick on the map musically. A lot of people tell you that because you're from Limerick, it's not going to happen for you. But she was a prime example that it can happen. She was a very real person, always herself. She never tried to be someone she wasn't."
Paul Russell, Rosbrien, came to

the event armed with a song he wrote in memory of Dolores O'Riordan.

Titled simply 'I wish Dolores was still here', he took many lines from existing Cranberries songs.

"She is probably the most important artist we have ever had, or probably ever will have more than likely. She has been around the world, travelled everywhere. I remember being out in America and looking through the LPs in a record shop and there she was. You have no idea of her reach until you go

travelling," Paul added.

The fact Paul wrote, and performed the song in memory of the superstar, something was particularly pleasing for organiser Mark.

He said: "It's been nice to feel people's response whether it is the fondness for the tune that is on at the time, or looking back at her lyrics and portraits. There is a lot of warmth still there."

Mark added: "I'm glad we did something. We couldn't let the day go by without it. When someone passes, a year later the family gathers, friends may gather, but it dissipates with time. I don't think that's something which should happen with Dolores.'

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
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Will he be back in 2020? Samuel L Jackson at the JP McManus Pro-Am in 2010

ONE of the world's most famous actors, Samuel L Jackson, has spoken about his desire to return to Limerick.

The American actor admitted he would like to return to Limerick for a round of golf, having played in the JP McManus Pro-Am at Adare Manor in 2010.

The Pulp Fiction star was one of several superstars from the world of sport and entertainment to descend on Adare for the invitational tournament which is running again next year.

"I wish I knew. If only I could tell you," Mr Jackson said when asked in recent days if he would be returning to Ireland.

"I've had great times in Ireland. I've also been the sickest that I ever was in my life in Ireland too. Food poisoning from some bad oysters, but I want to go back to Limerick and play that course again," he added.

The iconic actor was speaking to Joe.ie ahead of the release of his new movie Glass on January 18. The next JP McManus

Pro-Am, which promises to be the most star-studded golfing tournament of the decade, will take place on July 6 and 7, 2020 at Adare

The major charity event raised almost €45m in 2010 for local worthy causes. In 2010, many of the world's best golfers, including Tiger Woods and Lee Westwood, took to the fairways for the event, hosted by the new owner of Adare Manor, JP McManus. 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

Tribute: Mass to mark death of Dolores O'Riordan

A DEVOTED fan of The Cranberries travelled from London to Limerick to lay his bandana at the graveside of the band's front woman on the first anniversary of her death.

Enrique Rivas, 32, originally from Spain grew up listening to the voice of Dolores O'Riordan and he wanted to mark her passing on January 15 of last year, in his own personal way.

"I was in St Joseph's Cathedral last year and I decided to come again one year after to pay my respects," said Enrique standing outside St Ailbe's Church in Ballybricken on Sunday morning after attending an anniversary Mass for the late singer.

"Since I was 10 or 11 years old I grew up listening to her music, so yeah, it's really emotional for me to come here. It was kind of like to close the year to come back to this place. I arrived yesterday and stayed in Limerick and I go back this evening," said Enrique.

He hoped to visit Dolores' grave before he departed but wanted to give the family some space first.

"I was there last July. I left some flowers and today I will leave my bandana."

Family, friends and neighbours of Dolores O'Riordan joined Cranberries band members in the pews of St Ailbe's Church for 11am Mass

on Sunday where the singer's three children, who are currently in Canada, were prayed for

"We pray today for the repose of the soul of Dolores and we will keep in our prayers Taylor, Mollie and Dakota, Dolores' children, for whom this time is also a difficult one. "Dolores was a force of nature. Her rise to stardom gave a huge amount of belief to young people at that time. It was reflected in the belief of the Limerick hurling team to win the All-Ireland final last year after 45 years. That belief can also be epitomised in the song Dreams, the unofficial anthem of Limerick hurling, in the words, And they'll come true, Impossible not to do."

Local retailers warned about note 'change' scam

GARDAI are warning retailers to beware of a "change" scam which has come to light in recent

"This is where a person enters a shop and looks to change a large number of notes. Then the person might change their mind and deliberately confuse the member of staff that is dealing with him or her," said divisional crime prevention officer Sergeant Ber Leetch.

"Ultimately they will leave the shop with more cash than they entered it with. Often the scam isn't noticed until the till is

counted at the end of business," she added. Gardai say one local

retailer is at a loss of €250 having been targeted.

These scammers are very skilful in confusing the shop staff so my advice is simply do not change any notes for bigger or smaller notes. If a person is insistent then call a manager or another person," said Sgt Leetch.

House burgled while occupants were at Mass

INFORMATION is being sought in relation to a burglary in a rural community just outside of the city.

A sum of cash was taken after a house at Inch St. Lawrence – between Caherconlish and Ballyneety – was entered last Saturday evening while the occupants were attending Mass.

The culprits - two men - were disturbed and fled when the occupants returned home at around 7.30pm.

"Gardai at Roxboro Road are hoping that somebody local might have noticed something unusual on the road or maybe a vehicle parked where it didn't belong," said Sgt Ber Leetch.

New garda campaign to improve pedestrian safety

GARDAI have launched a campaign aimed at reducing the number of pedestrians who are killed or seriously injured.

Two pedestrians were killed in the Limerick division last year while a number of others sustained serious injuries.

"As pedestrians we are very vulnerable on the road and, of course, we can't be responsible for the way in which people drive but we can take a number of very basic steps to improve our safety on the road," said a garda spokesperson.

Pedestrians are being

urged to ensure they are well lit up, that they don't walk between cars and that they remain alert when out walking.

Pedestrians are reminded they should walk on the right-hand-side of the road against oncoming traffic.

They should also walk in single file when on narrow

'People power' is needed to park plan

Hyde Road Almost 1,000 people sign petition against Council scheme

IT will take civil disobedience to stop controversial plans to build a car park at Hyde Road park, a local activist has said.

Noel Hannan is furious with Limerick Council for introducing plans to do away with part of the grassland in favour of parking spaces, and he has pledged to use "people power" to ensure the plan does not get off the ground.

This comes in spite of the fact Limerick City and County Council has already begun to put in place railings and tools in order to commence work on the project, which comes as part of the Parnell Street improvement works.

For its part, the council has

pointed out its members have already approved the scheme, and the car park will take up less than 10% of the green-space at the junction of Lord Edward Street and the Hyde

Meanwhile, a petition in opposition to the plans established by Social Democrats local election candidate Elisa O'Donovan had reached almost 1,000 signatures by this Tuesday.

Some 30 people were in attendance at a meeting held at the Hyde Road park on Saturday lunchtime by Ms O'Donovan, who is running in City West.

She said: "We believe we need to value our city's green spaces, and the enormous health, social and environmental benefits they bring to Limerick and its citizens. We call for

greater linkage between Russell Park [Hyde Road] and The People's Park. This could also include the use of the iconic park kiosk to be used as a cultural hub for the surrounding

Mr Hannan also made the point that during winter-time, the People's Park closes at nightfall, which can be as early as 5pm, leaving dog walkers with few places to take their pets.

"We say no way," he said in

reference to the plan.

"This is one of the last green spaces in Limerick. Enough is enough."

council spokesperson previously said the development will also see the Hyde Road park landscaped to include new footpaths, walkways and shrubbery, with the car park land not in regular use.

Jail sentence for speeding on motorway

A SPEEDING motorist who was prosecuted for dangerous driving has been sentenced to two months' imprisonment, writes David Hurley.

Kieran Parrott, aged 28, of Cois na hAbhainn, Tuam, County Galway was detected travelling at 164km/h on the M20 motorway at Cloghacloka, Patrickswell, on September 11, 2018.

Inspector John Moloney told Limerick District Court the defendant was stopped at around 7.25pm by members of the divisional roads policing unit who were alerted

Solicitor Darach McCarthy said his client – a father of three young children – was not offering any excuse for driving at such speed on

Urging the court not to impose a disqualification, he said Mr Parrott has no previous convictions for driving offences and that he requires his licence as his partner does not

"I would ask that you take into account his family situation, he needs his licence," he said.

However, imposing sentence Judge Marian O'Leary said the actions of the defendant were "ridiculous and stupid".

She further that commented the lack of any reason for Mr Parrott driving at such speed was an aggravating factor which she had to

In addition to a two year disqualification, she fined him €400 and imposed a two month prison sentence.

An appeal against the severity of the sentence has been lodged.

Pedestrian injured after truck 'swept' into her at station

A TRUCK driver who struck a pedestrian outside Colbert Station has avoided a driving ban.

Padraig O'Halloran, aged 53, who has an address at Quin, County Clare, was prosecuted for careless driving relating to an incident which occurred at the main entrance to the bus station on February 3, 2016.

Inspector Paul Reidy told

Limerick District Court the defendant, who was driving a tipper truck, did not realise he had struck the woman and kept driving until he was informed about what had happened a short time afterwards.

He said the incident occurred at around 4.30pm as the truck was turning into Colbert Station where extensive works were being carried out at the time.

Judge Marian O'Leary was told the pedestrian was crossing the

road when she was hit by the truck and that she did sustain some injuries as a result of being struck.

Details of her injuries, which were not life-threatening, were not publicly disclosed to the court during the brief sentencing hearing. Solicitor John Herbert,

representing Mr O'Halloran, confirmed civil proceedings have been initiated against his client who "failed to see" the woman who was on the left hand side of the

He said the angle of the entrance to Colbert station meant his client had to "swing out to swing back in" as he carrying out the manoeuvre.

He said as the front of the truck was turning, the side "swept into the pedestrian," unbeknown to the driver.

Mr Herbert told the court his client is a professional driver who needs his driving licence and he urged the court not to impose a

driving ban.
After formally convicting Mr O'Halloran of careless driving, Judge O'Leary imposed an €800 fine giving him eight months to pay. Given the defendant's guilty plea and his personal circumstances, the judge said she would not impose a disqualification.

While not a matter for the court, Mr O'Halloran will also receive five penalty points on his driving

Driving ban for addict over pursuit

Danger: Man reversed car at gardai before high-speed chase

MAN who reversed high-powered car directly at gardai forcing them to take evasive action has been banned from driving for three years.

Gerard Ward, aged 43, who has an address at Patrick Street, Clarecastle, County Clare, pleaded to a charge of dangerous driving relating to an incident in the city centre on August 30, 2018.

Garda Shane Kirwan told Limerick District Court that gardai from the divisional drugs unit attempted to intercept a car being driven by defendant at around 6.30pm after he was observed leaving the address of a known drug dealer which under surveillance.

After initially stopping the vehicle at traffic lights at Carey's Road, Mr Ward reversed into another car and "narrowly missed" two detectives who were approaching the defendant's car.

'He almost collided with us, we had to take evasive action," Garda Kirwan told Inspector Paul Reidy.

Mr Ward then drove off and a high speed pursuit ensued.

The defendant -a qualified electrician – was arrested a short time later at Quin's Cottages, Rosbrien, after he was 'boxed in and stopped' by gardai.

Garda Kirwan said the car he was driving had failed to stop for gardai and that there were "quite an amount of vehicles and pedestrians" in the area given the time of day.

Solicitor Caitriona Dwane said her client, who has no previous convictions, was suffering a "very bad drug addiction" around the time and had made a "really very poor decision".

She said previous efforts by Mr Ward to address his addictions had not been successful but that he remains committed and continues to make "genuine efforts".

Judge Marian O'Leary (pictured) was told the defendant is attending a counsellor and that he is also receiving assistance from his GP. "It's a long-standing matter

but he is making very positive progress at the moment," said Ms Dwane who said her client father-of-one - is engaging with the Peter McVerry Trust with a view to entering a residential

detox programme in the near future. "He is probably in the best place he has ever been in to beat his addiction," added Ms Dwane who urged the court to be as lenient as possible.

Imposing sentence, O'Leary commented the defendant was lucky not to be facing more serious charges given the nature of his driving.

"It was very, very dangerous, there could have been far more serious consequences," she said.

In addition to being disqualified for three years, Mr Ward was fined

Noting the defendant's guilty and his circumstances, Judge O'Leary said she would not impose a custodial

Optel writes to Minister over layoffs at city plant

THE MINISTER for Employment Affairs and Social Protection has been contacted regarding the possibility of up to 39 people being let go at a Limerick manufacturing plant.

Thirty-nine jobs at Optel Vision are "at risk" following a "global strategic reorganisation", as the Raheen-based plant has an "overcapacity of production".

In a meeting this Monday at the Raheen plant, Optel informed employees "about a possible 39 layoffs". It is understood that around 120 staff work for the company in the Raheen Industrial Estate.

Desmond O'Sullivan, Optel's director of customer service in

Europe, Middle East and Africa, told this newspaper that the Quebec owner and one of its vice presidents made the announcement directly to staff.

The HR director and an Irish consultant were also present to take questions during Monday's meeting.

"Yesterday, due to reorganisation of the Optel Group, a number of staff have been put at risk on the site here. It means there is a consultation process that will start now, according to the legislation, for the next 30 days. And at that stage, after 30 days, a decision is made how many of the employees that are at risk will be given redundancy notice," Mr O'Sullivan said.

He said that Optel would be sending a letter to Minister Regina

O'Doherty on Tuesday "as mandated by legislation".

The company, which is based in Quebec, said that most employees working in the professional services and customers experience departments that serve European clientele "will not be impacted".

Optel Group president, Louis Roy said in a statement that they "very much regret having to make this decision and wish to pay tribute to the affected staff who have contributed to our success in Limerick through their diligence and commitment".

"We recognise that this is a difficult time for them and assure them of our full support and engagement in the redundancy process." It is understood that around 80 jobs are at risk globally, at Optel bases in Ireland, Canada, Brazil and India.

Hospitals see small drop in waiting lists: NTPF

December: Simon Harris welcomes decrease in inpatient figures

LIMERICK hospitals saw a marginal decrease in the number of patients on waiting lists at the end of 2018, according to a new monthly report.

National Treatment Purchase Fund figures show that there were 42,833 patients waiting for treatment and appointments at University Hospital Limerick, St John's Hospital and Croom Orthopaedic Hospital at the end of December.

That is a 0.3% drop in waiting list figures since November, when there were 42,955 on a waiting list.

All three hospitals saw a considerable drop in inpatient and day case numbers, with 3,366 on a waiting list - a 417-person decrease in the space of four weeks.

Minister for Health Simon Harris welcomed a decrease in national inpatient figures. However, he acknowledged an increase in outpatient waiting lists nationwide.

waiting lists nationwide.

In total, there were 39,467 outpatients in Limerick acute hospitals, an increase of 293 patients. With 1,196 patients waiting for an appointment, St John's saw no change in figures.

There was a 99-person increase in Croom outpatients in December, with

6,708 waiting for appointments with a doctor. UHL also saw a small hike in outpatient waiting lists, with 31,563 patients at the end of last month.

Limerick hospitals saw a 64% drop in the number of inpatients waiting for more than 12 months. There were 195 inpatients waiting for more than a year, all of whom were at UHL. There was no patient waiting for more than 12 months for treatment at Croom and St John's.

However, thousands still remain on a waiting list for more than a year for appointments at the three hospitals.

There were 8,563 patients at UHL, Croom and St John's waiting for more than 18 months for an appointment.

Over 2,600 emergency patients during festive period

MORE THAN 2,600 patients attended the emergency department at University Hospital Limerick over the Christmas holiday period, according to figures released by the UL Hospitals Group.

There were 1,301 attendances at the ED between Christmas Eve and December 30, followed by 1,343 attendances between New Year's Eve and January 6.

A spokesperson said high volumes of elderly patients with medical conditions, in particular

respiratory conditions, had been presenting in recent days and the number of flu cases has also begun to rise.

UL Hospitals Group continues to work closely with HSE Mid West Community Healthcare through the Mid West Winter Action Team to meet increased demand for services in the acute and community settings.

The Christmas period also saw an aggregated increase in injury unit patients between Ennis, Nenagh and St John's Hospital. Injury units are for non-emergency cases, but do not operate on a 24-hour basis.

There were 294 patients presenting to St John's, an increase of 45 patients, which was the largest rise in local injury unit patients in the region.

There was a decrease of 18 patients at Ennis with 245 patients, and a 21-person increase at Nenagh which treated 251 patients in its injury unit.

UL Hospitals Group CEO, Prof Colette Cowan said: Respiratory conditions and flu are on the increase and people attending the emergency department can regrettably expect long waits in many instances as the sickest patients are prioritised. It is encouraging to see the overall increase in attendances to our injury units this year as they are the best option for appropriate cases. People who are seriously injured or ill should continue to come to the emergency department, where they will receive the appropriate care."

Stole from city store three days in a row

A PROBATION report has been requested in the case of a man who stole hundreds of euro worth of perfume from a store in the city centre, writes David Hurley.

David McNally, aged 38, of no fixed abode, has pleaded guilty to theft charges relating to shoplifting offences at Boots, William Street, on three consecutive days earlier this month – January 6, 7 and 8.

Garda Stephen Aherne told Limerick District Court perfume worth €354 was stolen and the defendant, who has 29 previous convictions, was identified as a suspect on CCTV.

Solicitor Darach McCarthy said his client – a father-of-three – had cooperated with gardai telling them, during interview, that he sold the perfume to raise money to "buy some food and smokes".

He said Mr McNally "did his best for his children over Christmas" leaving himself "very very short".

The matter was adjourned to March 13, next.

"Our youth advisory panel is a group of young people who have been to the fore in advocating for and changing attitudes to youth mental health," said LYS' Siobhan Wilmott, youth mental health worker.

'Give gardai more power to seize scrambler bikes'

Nick Rabbitts reports on calls for extra powers to be given in wake of vandalism

THE gardai should be given powers to seize scrambler bikes they suspect of being used for vandalism on private property.

That's according to Fianna Fail councillor Kieran O'Hanlon, who is furious after youths on these bikes did serious damage to the soccer pitch at Geraldines.

Thousands of euro worth of damage has been done to the pitch after someone cut a gap in fencing around the ground, and used a scrambler bike to do 'donuts' destroying large portions of the soccer club's main pitch, which was only upgraded two years ago.

"Legislation certainly should be put in place where gardai should be allowed to go into premises where these are kept and take them away," he said."

Unfortunately, the City East councillor added, the damage to the soccer pitch is not even the most serious issue to occur due to these bikes.

"There was a woman up in a wheelchair in Garryowen near the Market's Field. Someone on a scrambler bike drove down and knocked her off the wheelchair. I was driving on the Dublin Road a few weeks ago, and one of these came along with no lights on it. They are a danger to themselves, a danger to pedestrians and they could cause traffic accidents," Cllr O'Hanlon said.

He also criticised parents who let their children – some as young as 13, he claimed – use these bikes.

"These parents are totally irresponsible allowing their children to put themselves in danger like this. My kids are grown up now, but I wouldn't allow them to get one of these. They could be killed at the speed they travel at," he added.

Some good has come from this says Geraldines PRO Turlough McNamara.

He outlined how offers of free help from groundskeepers to repair the pitch have been forthcoming after Leader sport initially revealed this story.

'Achievement': Woman becomes first Traveller PhD graduate in Ireland

ONE of Ireland's most successful novelists Marian Keyes and musician and activist Bob Geldof were each awarded with an Honorary Doctorate of Letters at a special University of Limerick ceremony this week.

The awards, recognising their major contribution to culture and society in Ireland and abroad, were held on the same day as the annual winter conferring ceremony where 1,715 UL students graduated.

The day was even more special when Dr Sindy Joyce became the first Traveller to become a PhD graduate in Ireland.

Dr Joyce was congratulated for her research into how young Travellers' movements through, access to and use of public and $commercial\,urban\,space\,are\,shaped$ their ethnicity and by anti-Traveller racism.

Speaking at a press conference this Monday, Dr Bob Geldof said he was "honoured" and that UL's campus is "one of the engines" behind Limerick's progress.

He paid tribute to the late Dolores O'Riordan, whose one-year anniversary is being marked this week. Commenting on her influence, he said The Cranberries were "central" to the indie and emo scene at the time of their success.

The Cranberries will also be awarded an honorary doctorate by University of Limerick this week, marking one year since Dolores O'Riordan's unexpected death.

Dr Keyes, whose Limerick father Ted passed away last month, said she was "incredibly honoured". She said her late father "would have been so, so proud of me".

Commending the works of local author Kevin Barry, Dr Keves also

offered words of wisdom on novel-writing.

"Stop talking about it and just do it. It's full of cliches, all my advice, but it really is like 1% incriretion. but it really is, like, 1% inspiration and 99% perspiration. Make time and sit down and do it. When I started writing, I had a full-time job, so it meant I got up an hour earlier every morning and I wrote for an hour before work. It means sacrificing parts of your life in order to write.

Jailed for stealing consaw from van

defendant and another man smashed the window of the van to gain access to the vehicle some time between February 7 and February 8,

The consaw, he added, was never recovered and the owner remains at a financial loss.

Solicitor Tom Kiely said his client is currently serving a lengthy prison sentence and that there was "no reality" to him paying

compensation to the owner of the stolen property. He said Mr O'Neill had a difficult

upbringing and that he first began offending and came to the attention of gardai while still a juvenile.

He said he has underlying mental health issues and that he is easily led and vulnerable.

Judge Mary Larkin imposed a two-month prison sentence which is to be served consecutively to a

four-year prison sentence which was imposed at Limerick Circuit Court last July.

That sentence related to the theft of various items of property worth more than €12,000 during a spate of burglaries at a number of commercial premises in the Ballysimon areas of the city.

'Complete postering ban is draconian'

LABOUR candidate Conor Sheehan has described Fianna Fail's calls for a ban on postering for the local election is "draconian".

Cllr Sheehan, who is seeking a seat for Labour on the northside, wants local election candidates to be limited to 50 posters, as opposed to a total ban, a wish expressed by Fianna Fail leåder Michael council Collins.

He admitted he was "perplexed" to hear the call, adding: "As a first time candidate, posters are a means of getting name recognition and a total ban on them will only serve to favour the incumbents and aid their re-election efforts." Mracknowledged Sheehan there are environmental concerns about over-use of posters - but said their psychological impact should not be underestimated.

"For example, in the recent Presidential election, the lack of posters could be seen as a contributory factor for the low turnout. I would also argue that while social media places an important role in modern day political campaigning, it has a limited reach and a ban on election

posters would only serve to inhibit new candidates and parties who do not have existing brand recognition," Mr Sheehan explained.

Limiting all candidates to 50 posters would stop them plastering" areas placards, he added.

"The election poster is ingrained in the Irish political psyche and an outright ban would be draconian," he concluded.

• Sci-fi series Nightflyers, filmed at a €53m cost in Limerick's Troy Studios, is finally ready for take off, with a February 1 air date on Netflix confirmed this week by the streaming giant.

The 10 part series, following the travails of a group of scientists and a powerful telepath who embark on an expedition to the edge of the solar system, represents quite the culmination of a journey that started when Troy - formerly a Dell factory - was identified for use during City of Culture in 2014. It was broadcast in the US on Syfy.

Universal Cable Productions who produced the series, availed of generous Irish tax breaks while filming, while the production also received substantial funding of €850,000 from the Irish Film Board. Troy is expanding and the whispers are that there will be a second series, while it has been claimed that Limerick has the potential to create up to 1,000 jobs in the screen production sector in the next three to five years. Sounds like action to us.

Show takes flight on Netflix in February

Nightflyers: Big budget series filmed in Troy Studios

NIGHTFLYERS will finally lift off on Netflix on February 1, it has been confirmed.

While the big-budget sci-fi series, which was shot at Troy Studios, has aired on Syfy in the United States, it has not been shown on domestic screens.

Netflix confirmed this Tuesday afternoon that it is "launching in Ireland and everywhere outside of US on February 1".

The series, which is executive produced by George R. R. Martin who also wrote the novella on which it is based, was shot on location at the massive film facility in Castletroy, as well as using a number of outdoor locations around Limerick.

The Limerick facility has said the airing of the series would be a "proud moment for Troy Studios and

hundreds of people from Limerick and the Mid-West who played a role" on its production.

The series, which has been described as "Psycho in space" by Game of Thrones author Martin, follows eight maverick scientists and a powerful telepath who embark on an expedition to the edge of the solar system aboard The Nightflyer – a ship with a small tightknit crew and a reclusive captain – in the hope of making contact with alien life. The season consists of 10 episodes.

The €53m budget production had a 91% Irish crew with an average of 320 employees on site in Limerick

A number of well-known names feature in the series, including Irish actors Eoin Macken and Brian F O'Byrne.

International stars include Gretchen Mol, who has previously starred in Boardwalk Empire, playing Dr Agatha Matheson, while David Ajala, Fast & Furious 6, and Angus Sampson, star of the award-winning Fargo, also feature.

Nightflyers started production at Troy in February of last year, where huge sets were constructed, including a scale set of the ship itself. Large numbers of extras were required.

Troy has since announced a major expansion which could see up to 800 staff working at the facility in Plassey's National Technology Park.

The studio, based at the old Dell building, is adding a fourth sound stage to its offering.

Troy Studios chief executive Siún Ní Raghallaigh has said she hopes the first productions at the extended facility will roll in early 2020. It will see the facility become "the largest international standard film and tv studio on the island", according to Troy chairman Joe Devine.





The Must-Read Guide To Saving Money

First-time buyers need to watch for hidden costs

here are things that will stay with us for the rest of our lives first girlfriend or boyfriend, first kiss, first job. All unforgettable moments, and we can add buying your first property to the mix as well.

Buying a property for the first time is a big deal and is likely to be one of the biggest financial decisions you will make during your life.

One of the biggest mistakes first time buyers make is when they are paying, eg €1,400 in rent each month, to then go out and buy a property where the monthly mortgage equates to €1,400.

Your mortgage repayment isn't the only monthly expense you'll have once you become a homeowner. You'll have additional costs which include life assurance and home insurance premiums, property tax and utility bills. Unexpected expenses are also likely to occur. So, you need to look at your total monthly costs and not just

your mortgage repayment.

I helped arrange a mortgage last year, for first-time buyers who borrowed €300,000 over 30 years, their monthly mortgage repayment was €1,297.

On top of that, their life assurance premium was €50pm, their home insurance cost was €46pm. The property tax attaching to the property worked out at €49pm. I estimated their heating costs were going to be €59pm, electricity costs of €41pm, refuse collection c. €25 pm, and telephone and broadband bills €39 pm. They were also likely to spend on average €50 per month on improvements, additional household purchases and repairs.

The conservative cost of home ownership for them each month was going to be c. €1,656 which was 28% higher than just what their mortgage repayment was. And anyone thinking of buying a property, a good rule of thumb is adding between 25% to 30% of what their mortgage repayment is to get the true monthly cost of home ownership.

The amount you should be paying towards your mortgage, in my opinion, shouldn't be greater than 28% of your net take home pay each month or 36% when combined with other debt.

The reason I'm referencing these numbers, is because evidence from studies would suggest, people with mortgage debt to income ratios greater than 28% are more likely to run into trouble making repayments on time and will suffer more if they are exposed to an income shock i.e. a reduction in their income as a result of redundancy, illness, partner's loss of income etc.

My next piece of advice would be not to start looking at buying a property until you have pre-approval. There's no point. You mean nothing to sellers unless you have evidence you can buy their property. Getting pre-approved will also save you time, by preventing you from viewing properties that are outside your price range.

The amount a lender is willing to advance is determined by how much you earn. Based on current Central Bank regulations, most banks will give you 3.5 times your income or your combined income if buying with a partner. They have scope to increase this by 20% of their new loan issued during 2019, so they might allow 4.5 times your income.

The amount a first time buyer has to contribute towards the purchase price

I appreciate getting to 10% is a very big ask in itself, but when you reach it, don't pay each let it be the trigger that makes you buy a property either. Don't forget to have a contingency fund in place either after you have bought a property. As good as it is to have as big a deposit as possible, you don't want to exhaust all of your savings. The reasons being (a) you may need money to carry out renovations to the property or you may need new furniture, or need funds for new decorations etc. and (b) you should have funds in place, that you can call upon in the event of you losing your job, or your income being reduced.

Think about what would happen if you lost your job a week after buying a property - would you have enough funds until you secured a new job and income? Maybe keep back five or six months' mortgage repayments from your savings, so it's important to factor them into the amount you personally need to save towards the purchase as well.

Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q: Liam, we have identified online shopping as the reason we mainly overspend. Individually, they are not big transactions but when we add them up, they are more than we can afford. We don't want to give up shopping online as it's very convenient, but we don't want overspend either, any ideas?

A: Pre-paid credit cards can be a very effective tool for anyone who wants to get their spending under control each month.

The idea is simple. You can't spend any more than what you load into the card.

It's also been called a pay as you go card which is a good description, because you can't spend more money than you actually have.

It will allow you to continue to shop online but there won't be any surprises at the end of the month in $terms\, of\, the\, amount\, you$ spent. Just work out the amount you can afford to spend each month and put that on the card.

And they don't have to be used exclusively for shopping online either. If you have an issue with any other categories you are prone to spending more than you had planned to i.e. grocery shopping, clothes, eating out etc. they are an ideal solution to consider.

MORE than 9,000 people are working in Enterprise Ireland supported companies in Limerick, the agency


ANN Blake has taken her play The Morning After the Life Before to New York for its American premiere.

HIS weekend in Limerick is a smorgasbord of rap, comedy and the biggest swinger night of the year. There's also some classy classical and you can find out what happened to people who ratted out their friends in the 1920s.

Thursday (Jan 17) **Limerick City Gallery** is hosting an exhibition of work by French-American artist Louise Bourgeois, beginning this week. She's famous for her emotionally-charged sculptures, including a thirty-foot spider that terrified me at the Tate Modern 19 years ago. The Limerick exhibition is her Autobiographical Series of 14 etchings, as well as 11 drypoint prints. The simple drawings are inspired by her own anxieties and vulnerabilities, and includes a cat who plainly needs a hug. It's something of a coup for the gallery to secure, as there hasn't been a major-scale exhibition of Bourgeois work in Ireland since IMMA in 2003. The gallery is also displaying two marvellous recently-acquired sculptures by Irish artist Janet Mullarney for just two weeks, so catch them while you can. Free to see.

If you've every felt like diving (into water, not that you asked) but don't know where to start, this Thursday is your chance to give snorkelling or scuba diving a try for free. The **Atlantic Dive Club** are running a Try-A-Dive night at the UL Arena pool, supplying you with all the gear you'll need and accompanying you into the pool to make sure you don't drown. You'll need to be reasonably fit to have a go (in other words, be able to breathe and don't be ten minutes from death) but you don't need to have had any experience in diving. It's another #WeekendInLimerick — and what a weekend! Seamus Ryan has the lowdown

Friday to Sunday this weekend. The Tom Murphy play, adapted from the book by Liam O'Flaherty, was first performed in 1981 and has lost little of its power in the past four decades. Set in the Irish civil war, it's the story of a lunky giant Gypo who rats out his friend to the police and spends the rest of the show racked with guilt about what he's done. Being classically Irish, he buys a lot of booze. The play has a massive cast - 60 roles - and we are never going to get a professional cast with this show in Limerick, so this is probably your only chance to see it performed. 8pm each night, tickets are €10 for adults and €5 for children.

Prescription and Sesh FM have collaborated with director Brownsauce to make Somewhere In Ireland, a five-part music video and ode to Irish rap. It gets its live premiere this Friday at Pharmacia, followed by performances by artists in the video, including Hazey Haze and Aswell. The first two parts have been released on YouTube and it's worth going along to see the whole thing. 10pm, entry is a fiver.

Saturday (Jan 19) The **Far Flung Trio** are at the **Belltable** this Saturday afternoon, performing a family show of Prokofiev's Peter and the Wolf. It's a 30-minute orchestral piece, with each instrument representing a different animal while the musicians narrate the story. Farmboy Peter tries to defend a duck, a cat and a little bird from a threatening wolf. He has mixed results with the duck, I'm sorry to say. Prokofiev's most-performed work is very suitable for young children as, unlike my childhood $book, the \, wolf \, doesn't \, get \, strangled$ at the end. 2:30pm and tickets are

Comedian Neil Delamere is at

the University Concert Hall this Saturday night. You'll know him from RTE's The Panel, as well as The Blame Game, BBC1's comedy show where people from Northern Ireland blame other people from Northern Ireland for bad things that happen in Northern Ireland. 800 years of history have given them a lot of practice. His Limerick visit is part of his Controlled Substance tour, where he spends two hours corralling an audience and making them laugh. 8pm, tickets are €25.

Not content with one performance this weekend, the Far Flung Trio are back in the **Belltable** on Saturday night with a show just for adults. It's not a $naughty\,show, just\,one\,not\,aimed$ at children. They'll be playing Rossini, a bit of Gershwin and a selection from Dvorak's Slavonic Dances. It's the perfect show for a first date with someone who believes that violins and accordions can live together without killing each other. 8pm, tickets are €18 / €16 concession.

 $\textbf{Kevin}\,\textbf{McGahern}\,\textbf{brings}\,\textbf{his}$ laid-back Irish comedy to the Kasbah Social Club on Saturday, blending stand-up with some

cheerily comedic songs. He's largely the reason that Republic Of Telly managed to stay on the air for five years longer than it should have and his Solo Pollo show is pretty much guaranteed to make you laugh. Especially if he turns up with a chicken. 7:30pm and tickets are €12, half the price of the competing Delamere show. Not that it's a competition, but it is. Experimental music group

Yorkston Thorne Khan are in **Dolan's Upstairs** this Saturday night. They toss Scottish folk, jazz and Indian sarangi music in a blender and play a mixture of the lot. It shouldn't work but it really does. Obviously they've been booked by every trendy kale-quaffing festival in the past year and this is their first Limerick show. It's also the gig you shouldn't miss this week. Doors at 9pm, tickets are €16.





Top Tips

For helping your teen stay healthy

Provide lots of healthy food and snacks

Many teenagers have voracious appetites; it may feel like a full time job keeping them fed. If you have lots of filling, healthy snacks on hand (think fruit, cut up vegetables, hummus and pita, wholegrain bagels and peanut butter, wholegrain pasta with tomato sauce), they will be more likely to reach for these than fill up on junk

Get active together

If your teens see you leading a healthy, active lifestyle, they will be more likely to follow suit. Ask your teen to join you on an evening walk - they might surprise you and actually come, and this can be a great way to connect

Communicate and share information

Many parents find it challenging to discuss some issues, such as sex and drug and alcohol misuse, with their teens. The reality is that teens who can communicate openly and honestly with their parents about these issues tend to make better, healthier choices. So, get in the habit of talking about these issues openly and honestly.

Help them build resilience

Teenagers are under a lot of pressure from school, friends, social media, etc., and many teenagers are struggling with mental health issues such as anxiety and depression. Developing positive coping strategies can help teenagers manage these pressures and improve their overall well-being.

Explore things like exercise, diet, meditation, yoga, breathing, mindfulness, etc. with your child and help them find a strategy that works for them.



Pressing the pause button

Do you ever find yourself on the way to collect the children from school or driving home from work with the endless tick, tick, tick of your endless to-do list churning through your mind; what you need to do, what you need to get, where you need to be churning over in your

Have you ever found yourself trying to make it through the list before you can finally, finally sit down and relax for a few minutes? And, then, well, it's time to get to

Parenting requires us to multi-task like we have never multi-tasked before sometimes, it can become all about getting things done rather than enjoying what we are doing.

Many parenting guides use some variation on the idea of "pressing the pause button".

This means when we find ourselves reacting to our children with anger, frustration or simple exhaustion, that we take a moment before we respond.

This might mean just taking a few deep breaths; it might mean walking in to another room for a few minutes; or, if emotions are running really high, it might mean deciding to address the issue at a later time or date.

It involves acknowledging our own emotions, taking the time to think about how we are feeling and recognising that reacting in anger or frustration won't help us or our child. Taking this time allows us to calm down and react with the love and patience that we and our children need.

This idea can be applied to many situations - not just when your

teenager comes home later again or when your toddler hops out of bed for the 15th time in a row.

It can be useful when that list starts to tick, tick, in your mind on your way to collect the children.

Instead of thinking, "we need to get to soccer, then to music class, ugh, I forgot to bring the raffle tickets, what will we make for dinner, the kitchen is a disaster, lunches need to be done, where is that Irish book...", press the pause button, take a few deep breaths and stay in the moment.

Let yourself find a moment of enjoyment - if you're in the car alone, put on your favourite music.

If you're with the kids, find a crowd-pleaser and all belt along. If you're trying to get the dinner ready, while making lunches and keeping little ones happy and entertained while underfoot, and the chaos threatens to become overwhelming, try pressing the pause button.

Give yourself a moment, acknowledge that this is a lot to manage and let yourself relax.

Think about something positive in the moment - share a joke with the children, give them a hug, savour what you are cooking...whatever you need to do to make this moment enjoyable.

That list will still be there, and there will still be moments when everyone flies out the door with breakfast half eaten and books

Giving yourself time to pause, to enjoy this moment rather than worrying about all the moments to come, however, can make a big difference in how everyone in the family reacts to stress and let you all enjoy your time together.

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Cold and flu support

HIS mild and wet weather is the perfect breeding conditions for bugs, and sure enough, many people suffer with debilitating colds, sinus or chest infections.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) the flu vaccines are only 40% effective in reducing the illness, and even less so with certain types of viruses. Therefore, it is crucial to support your immune system and soothe your respiratory system naturally.

If you feel under the weather at the moment, the best remedy is actually

fasting on bone broth full of healing collagen and immune cells. Take a diverse probiotic at the same time. Over 70% of your immunity is in the gut, and research show probiotics may support the efficacy of the flu vaccine. If you struggle with excess mucus all year round, or get colds and flus very often, contact me to find the root of it. There could be many reasons why the immune system is weakened and unless the cause is addressed it will keep you from recovering fully.

One of the most important steps you can take is avoiding foods that are

suppressing the immune system and cause excess mucus formation. These include sweets, refined carbohydrates (white bread and pasta) and processed foods filled with additives. Instead, focus on foods and spices that would help to dry

up excess phlegm. These include ginger, cinnamon, nutmeg, thyme, turmeric, onions, fennel seed, rosemary, parsley, garlic, raw apple cider vinegar, lemon juice, watercress, celery, artichoke, asparagus, broccoli, and kale.

Liquorice tea is soothing for all mucous membranes and helps to boost local immunity. Bromelain is a protein-digesting enzyme derived from pineapple stem. It acts as both an anti-tussive (cough suppressant) and a mucolytic (reduces the viscosity of phlegm) and anti-inflammatory by blocking both fibrin and kinin, the two inflammatory components causing the tissue swelling and the permeability or leakiness of blood vessels. Enjoy a slice of pineapple with its tougher inner part before your meals or as a nutritious snack with a handful of nuts.

Vitamin A in retinol or Beta-carotene form and Zinc are also helpful in healing the mucous membrane and improving immunity. Eat orange and dark green $\stackrel{-}{\operatorname{colored}}\, \underset{}{\operatorname{vegetables}}, \underset{}{\operatorname{pumpkin}}$ seeds, sea vegetables, fish and take a good quality cod

liver oil - especially if you have hypothyroidism.

The tissue lining the surface of the lungs contains more silica than any other tissue in the body; it is important to supply your diet with silica-rich foods: whole-grains, vegetables, legumes and fruits. The richest sources are the bran and skin of them, so make sure you consume them in whole and unrefined form! Have a wide variety of grains – mostly gluten free, to reduce immune reactions.

You can also get a few powerful herbs to help you along, but these will have to be checked for contraindications if you are on any medication at all. Ivy -Thyme tincture thins the excess mucus in the chest, making it easier to expel. Plantago helps to expel catarrh and promotes healing of the mucous membranes lining the upper respiratory tract.



HEALTHY FATS

Raw nuts (almonds, cashews, brazil, walnuts), avocado, almond butter, coconut oil, organic peanut



Just a few items for trolley this week

Cayenne pepper, chilli powder, Himalayan pink salt, cumin, tumeric.

*Spices can make even the plainest meals taste amazing experiment and find the ones you like best. Add flavour!

These are what I class as "free foods". Foods I add to everything. Some of my favourites are: broccoli, peppers, courgettes, cauliflower, spinach, mushrooms, onions, garlic, green beans, mangetout, bean sprouts, sprouted mung beans, aubergine.

Remember it's not about dieting. You have to find things you like to eat and enjoy to eat in order for it to be sustainable. Yes I 100% agree that eating fresh and healthy foods can cost a little more week to week. But by filling your body full of goodness you may just end up saving a lot more in the long run.



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Healthy eating tips for 2019

F getting fit and eating healthier were top of your list of new year resolutions then fair play to you. You're in good company too because they were right at the top of mine

"I'm going to start eating right this year," is one of those well-intentioned, but too hard to keep new year goals that's often easier said than done. So if you really do want to eat healthier this year then here are some bite-sized healthy eating tips to help you turn resolution into reality.

As with most things in life, a one-thing-at-a-time approach is a great way to tackle your new year goals - or any goal for that matter. When you set one big goal, it can be hard to know where to start or how to approach it, which takes away the momentum you had when you set it. Setting smaller goals and hitting them as you go will get you where you want to be while delivering the feel-good factor that comes with making progress.

Read on for some smart and easy ways that will make your journey to healthier eating a little easier to

CUT DOWN ON SUGAR

Easy to say, not so easy to do. Reducing your sugar intake won't happen overnight, but once you start to cut back on it, you'll start to see that you don't need as much of it as you thought. It doesn't have to be too drastic either, at least not at first. Try cutting the usual amount of sugar you add to tea and coffee by half and wean down from there. Cut down on the fizzy drinks too. Water is best, but if you want something sweet to drink try orange or apple juice. Use fruit instead of adding sugar to cereal or oatmeal, try fresh fruit (bananas, cherries or strawberries) or dried fruit (raisins.

cranberries or apricots). Again, think baby steps rather than cold turkey if you want to stay on track but don't just make a start and stay there either.

SAVE ALCOHOL FOR SATURDAY NIGHT Booze is no friend to the new healthier you. Not only does the demon drink add empty calories to your diet, but it can also lead to poor eating habits and a day or days of inactivity. So save the booze for weekend shenanigans (Sunday is a rest/cheat day anyway) and skip out on alcohol during the week.

TRY EATING MINDFULLY I touched on this in my last

article, when I suggested mindfulness as a way to get you into a better head space for the year ahead. For those who might not have seen it, mindfulness is a form of meditation in which you focus on external phenomena – usually your breathing but you can also use it for walks, working out, sitting in your office, most things really including eating. Most people who lead a very hectic lifestyle tend to rush through their meals and eat in front of the TV. Eating mindfully means taking the time to taste and appreciate everything that you put in your mouth. Food can and should be a wonderful sensory experience so take the time to experience it.

There's also research that suggests that eating mindfully can assist with portion control, weight management and digestion, which are all important factors for your long term health.

INCORPORATE PROBIOTICS AND PREBIOTICS INTO YOUR DIET

Probiotics are active cultures that help to repopulate intestinal bacteria and balance gut flora. Using a daily probiotic will help to boost immunity and promotes overall good health. The best sources are yoghurt, kefir, kimchi, miso, tempeh and sauerkraut. Prebiotics are natural, $non\text{-}digestible\,food\,components$ that promote the growth of beneficial bacteria in your gut. Look to choices like bananas, garlic, onions, leeks, asparagus and soybeans. Or you can just buy both in supplement form in your local health shop. Having a combination of probiotics and prebiotics in your diet improves the health of your gut which is a very powerful step towards improving your overall health.

MEAL PREP

A weekly meal plan will help you to eat healthier, control your portions, save you time and save you money. If it sounds too much like hard work there are some lovely companies that will do it for you. For the last six months, I've been using Clean Cut Meals who deliver a week's worth of healthy meals to my door every Monday morning, saving me time on cooking and on grocery shopping. I've also used a local service called Country Munch who are based on the Ballysimon Road. I really love this service because I regularly have to work late and would always use the excuse that the only places open were the chipper. Now I know that

there's a healthy meal at home in the fridge no matter how late I get

EAT OUT LESS OFTEN

Over Christmas people tend to eat out at restaurants a lot more or eat at other people's homes. When you're cooking for yourself you have a lot less control over what you're eating and all the occasions over the festive period can lead to consuming extra fat, sugar and salt. So make January the eat-in month and focus on serving lighter, healthier fare like roasted veg and soups.

KEEP FEWER SWEETS IN THE HOUSE

Resolving to give up eating sweets completely takes a lot of willpower and can give rise to feelings of deprivation. A more realistic goal would be to create an environment where you can consume fewer sweets without having to rely solely on your own self-discipline. 

The idea behind the project was a way of providing training and experience for those seeking to break into the film industry. Three short films were produced using local filmmakers mentored by industry professionals. Stembridge selected three writers and worked with these writers individually to make each script as strong as possible.

The writers were given maximum freedom to tell whatever story they wanted to tell. The stories had to be contemporary and preferably unfold within a limited time period and Limerick City itself was to be evident as the backdrop. Three teams were put together with everyone who took part gaining invaluable experience from top industry professionals.

Stembridge worked with the directors on casting to secure the best available local talent for the individual films.

He also supervised the filming and mentored the directors on set ensuring the linking elements between the stories were taken care of, so the final product would stand up as a single entity.






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Eclipse Cross is the ideal family car

THE Eclipse Cross is the first of a new generation of Mitsubishi SUVs designed and built to impress, both inside and out.

I was fortunate to try out both the 6-speed manual and the CVT automatic versions of this nicely sized family car. Both were front-wheel-drive models.

For me the CVT automatic edged it over the manual mainly because it was so much easier to drive in heavy city traffic without having to change gears, and the fact it had an electric handbrake as I found the traditional handbrake of the MT version a bit high for me to use in comfort even with my seat cranked up.

up.
This SUV fits into the Mitsubishi range above the smaller ASX but below the larger Outlander.

below the larger Outlander.

In looks, the front is dominated by its high-tech headlight clusters and the big angular front fog light design. A horizontally divided rear window adds interest and didn't impede with my view out the rear mirror. Privacy glass and black roof rails added to the exterior look.

Big front side windows extend far forward and provide a good view out which is especially useful when you are approaching a roundabout. There's a very good reversing camera to help when needed as well and blind spot alerts on wing mirrors to warn of vehicles coming up from behind. These large mirrors also fold in when you lock the car.

The cabin is very spacious with generous leg and head room in the rear. It's just a very relaxing place in which to travel. Leather upholstery adds to the style and seats are comfy

yet supportive. Front ones can be heated. Contrasting orange upholstery stitching completes the smart look.

The silverware, black shiny trim and patterned materials all make for an interesting modern and stylish look.

The CVT spec came with two sunroofs allowing a lot of light in the cabin.

There's lots of smart connectivity onboard and two USB ports in the front as well as a 12v socket.

The dash is dominated by the stand-alone big central touch screen. I'm not a fan of the square shaped control touch pad on the central console as I found it to be very sensitive to touch. I'd previously seen this in Lexus cars and had the same problem with it. It can operate audio functions like radio and iPod as well as the Apple CarPlay and Android Auto. Instrumentation, though, is nice and simple and I always appreciate having temperature controls actually available on the dash.

A stand out feature on the CVT version were the buttons on the steering wheel to give low front side view of the kerb etc. via a side camera. Alternatively, you can also get to see what's out of sight on the other side of the vehicle, as well as

having an all-round birds' eye view of the car and its immediate surroundings. This, to me, is a wonderful feature to have in a car as it aids parking in tight situations or ifyou take the car on uneven terrain or grass.

There's a fine big boot for cases or other 'stuff' but there was no spare tyre in either of my cars.

There's also no diesel offering as power is solely from a new, powerful 1.5 petrol turbocharged engine outputting 163hp and mated to a neat 6-speed manual gearbox or the CVT automatic transmission (both are €390 for annual road tax).

The 2WD 6MT does 0-100km/h in 10.3 secs; the CVT takes 9.3. Combined fuel consumption is 6.6 L/100kms for the MT and 6.7 for the CVT

Towing capacity braked is 1,7600kg

Three trim levels are Invite,

Intense and Instyle, all come generously equipped.

NEW CAR REGISTRATIONS

2018 new cars sales 4.4pc down

NEW car registrations for the year 2018 finished at 125,557, 4.4pc down on 2017 (131,332).

New Light Commercial Vehicle registrations (LCV) finished at 25,561, up 5.55pc for the year in 2018 while new Heavy Commercial Vehicle registrations (HGV) of 2,590 saw a slight decrease of 0.5pc over the 12 months compared to 2017 (2,603).

Meanwhile, imported used cars for the first time in history have reached 100,755 for 2018, an increase of 7.81pc on 2017 (93,454). Used Commercial Vehicle imports dropped in 2018: LCV imports were down 2.9pc and HGV imports were down by 0.5pc. New electric car registrations for 2018 increased with 1,233 registered in comparison to 622 in 2017.

"The pitch was unplayable and dangerous this weekend and thankfully due to the goodness of Richmond RFC, we used their pitch for our game against Janesboro yesterday (Sunday)"

Schedule forcing the magic out of Fitzgibbon Cup

HE Fitzgibbon Cup commences this weekend and should be the centre of attention for hurling enthusiasts.

But in the crazy world that is the GAA Master Fixture list, the prestigious competition doesn't have a clear run – instead it is forced into the schedule between Allianz Hurling League games.

Likewise the Sigerson Cup and the respective secondary competitions like the Ryan and Trench Cups.

The Fitzgibbon Cup is a cracking championship with the best of the best hurlers on display but where does it's future lie.

There are round one games this Sunday, and round two next Wednesday-Thursday and that weekend is round one of the Allianz Hurling League. Hot on the heels of those inter-county games is round three of the Fitzgibbon Cup.

Some could be facing into three games over a seven day period.

And, it continues into the knockout stages – the Fitzgibbon Cup final is set for Saturday February 23, which is the same weekend as round four of the hurling league.

Limerick manager John Kiely is working with a 42-man panel at present and 15 of those will be involved with one of the Third Level Colleges.

While everyone prefers playing to training, a hectic schedule doesn't afford an opportunity to reach potential.

It's the time of year to try and impress management and stake claim on a starting jersey for the season. One wonders are those not involved in the Fitzgibbon Cup in pole position.

Just five of Limerick's starting team from the All-Ireland final will be tied up with Fitzgibbon Cup.
The other 10 Limerick players involved in Fitzgibbon Cup are surely targeting more involvement with John Kiely's team in 2019 but the hectic schedule in the coming weeks appears to hamper their progress.

For all that, the Fitzgibbon Cup is about to get underway and still maintains a magic for hurling followers

There is something special about mid-week games out in UL, LIT or Mary I – often with crowds of up to 1,000 to watch the cream of hurling talent.

Champions UL have just one home game in the group phase but what a prospect of welcoming UCC to Limerick this Sunday (2.30). Six years have passed since the Cork men were last in a final but overturning the 38-time champions is always special.



All-Ireland champions Kyle Hayes, Tom Morrissey, Barry Murphy, Barry Nash and Lorcan Lyons are all in the UL panel, managed by Gary Kirby.

Among those registered in the UCC panel are Cork stars Mark Coleman, Darragh Fitzgibbon and Shane Kingston.

The draw was not kind to UL with games away to NUIG and UCD

to follow.

One home win and one on the road is a must for the champions.

In the post Davy Fitzgerald era, LIT also have three group games but two at home and their group looks a lot more straight forward. They will have mid-week games in Moylish against Garda and Trinity and with the likes of Diarmaid Byrnes, Peter Casey and David Dempsey on board, LIT should advance.

Champions in 2017, Mary I have Aaron Gillane as their star man. They have just two games – home mid-week to Maynooth.

On paper, Sunday's UL v UCC game is the pick of the games to come in Limerick unless one of the trio earn a home quarter final

You have to be happy at work, it is that simple

ewin's equation, B = f(P, E), is a heuristic formula proposed by psychologist Kurt Lewin as an explanation of what determines behaviour.

The formula states that behaviour is a function of the person and his or her environment.

Put another way, a famous rugby player once told me, "You have to be happy going to work every day"

It is a simple statement, but one that might conjure up images of sport in your mind.

Professional sports people are just that. Sports people who make their living from it. Sport is their profession. That can be lost sometimes amidst all the media, the instagram shots, the photo shoots and the pressure to win.

Lewin's formula highlights that people's behaviour can be hugely influenced by their environment.

It's funny to think about actually. Take a few examples. The way you might act at work with colleagues can often be affected by who is in the room at the time.

Friends on a night out can act differently when they are out on their own or with their partners.

For sports coaches, the most important thing to create is a good environment.

Take Manchester Utd as an example. The club has everything that any sports team would want, from private planes to official noodle partners.

However, their last coach, Jose Mourinho, had created a poor environment for his players. They did not respond well to him or the surroundings in which they had been asked to perform.

A change came in the shape of Ole Gunnar Solskjaer and now that the environment has been changed.

Maybe it is time to look at your own surroundings, work or sport, and see if change is needed. After all, if you can't enjoy life, then what is it all for?


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
