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
### Former councillor died after laundry caught fire in dryer

THE inquest into the death of councillor Seamus former Houlihan has been told laundry in the drum of a tumble dryer at his home is likely to have "self-heated" and caught fire after the appliance's cooling cycle was stopped or interrupted. The 84-year-old died in the early

hours of June 2, 2018 as a result of carbon monoxide poisoning and smoke inhalation.

Limerick Coroner's Court was



He described how the house at Rose Court, Keyes Park, Southill, was filled with smoke when he entered. He found his father to be unresponsive in an upstairs bathroom and he was pronounced dead a short time later.

The inquest was told a condenser dryer in the downstairs kitchen was quickly identified as the cause of the fire and that it was



taken from the house and technically examined by consultant engineers who were retained by gardai.

A detailed report was prepared and coroner John McNamara read some of the key findings into the record during the inquest.

The engineers' report stated the risk of laundry "self-heating and subsequent spontaneous combustion" is a known safety risk in the laundry industry – particularly if the cooling phase of a cycle is stopped or interrupted.

While the cause of the fire at Mr Houlihan's home could not be definitively established the report states the evidence is "consistent" with such a scenario having occurred.

In his evidence, James Houlihan said the lint filter in the dryer was regularly changed and he insisted

the dryer was not turned on when he left the house at around 11pm.

"I have gone through every second of that bloody day," said the former city councillor.

After returning a verdict of accidental death, the coroner said he was concerned that ordinary consumers are not being made aware of the risk of laundry self-heating and catching fire of the cycle is interrupted.

"People generally don't read the small print in booklets," he commented. "I, for one, didn't know it was a hazard," he added.

# Council spends €75,000 on furniture for ex-courtroom

### **Refurbishment:** Orangebox DO' chairs at €257.37 each part of works for 70-80 staff

LIMERICK City and County Council spent more than €75,000 on new furniture during the refurbishment of the former district court and Courts Service offices at Merchant's Quay, it can be revealed.

The local authority took possession of the former courtroom – next to City Hall – last year after the new multi-million criminal courthouse at Mulgrave Street opened.

The refurbishment works, which were carried over two floors, were completed at the end of October and staff from the council's Design and Delivery department moved in just

before Christmas.

Figures obtained by the Leader under the Freedom of Information Act show a total of €75,715.05 was paid to Gerry Lombard Design relating to the furniture which was bought as part of the refurbishment works which took a number of months to complete.

Invoices from the Limerick-based company show the council was supplied with 38 'Orangebox DO' chairs which cost €257.37 each while 25 'Orangebox Joy-05' chairs, which have no arms, were supplied at a cost of €165.30 per chair.

A further 38 'upcharge aluminium base' office chairs were also bought at a total cost of €967.85.

In addition to chairs, a variety of

desks, screens and filing cabinets

More than €4,100 was spent on 38 'Bisley NOTE pedestals' – small drawer units which fit under desks - while a total of  $\notin$ 9,293.22 was spent on 34 'Bisley ET tambour' storage units.

Six 'AOC4 filing cabinets' were supplied at a total cost of €762.90 while 12 "Rodd suspension file frames" were supplied at a cost of €49 per unit. One 'Newport table' with a white top was purchased at a cost of €242 while a single manager's desk cost €365.62.

A spokesperson for the local authority confirmed the invoices related to the refurbishment of the former district court building.

**The Design** and Delivery department has increased in headcount LCCC SPOKESPERSON

"The building was refurbished to accommodate the Design and Delivery department which has increased in headcount following demands in relation to the national housing crisis," she added.

More than 70 local authority staff are now working in what was the former courthouse.

The refurbishment works also involved the upgrading of fixtures and fittings in the building while toilet and showing facilities were also upgraded.

The former courtroom was revamped and converted into an open-plan office which extends into what was the judge's chambers.

The former custody area is being used as a storage area.

#### Tree Policy is high on the Green Party's agenda

Brian Leddin, the Green Party candidate for Limerick Citv North has called for Limerick City and County Council to develop a Tree Policy for the

effective management and protection of the city's trees. "The recent felling of

mature trees in Castletroy and in Russell Park are a reminder that, unlike local authorities in the UK and elsewhere in Ireland, Limerick Council lacks a defined policy on tree management, auditing and protection." he said.

Mr Leddin (pictured) also pointed out that "trees provide significant



economic, social, environmental, ecological and aesthetic benefits to our communities and to our urban and residential streets, parks and open

spaces" and notes that "it is remiss for Limerick, which has many mature trees, not to adopt best practice in this area. As well as mitigating flooding, strategic tree planting can reduce noise for residents living on busy roads, and can have a positive impact on air quality. A small investment in tree planting and management would prove benefits to residents for years to come," said the Green Party representative.

# **Mayor's office could** cost €450,000 to run

### **Vote:** Plebiscite on plans for directly elected mayor

THE cost of running the office of a directly elected Mayor of Limerick could be up to €450,000 a year, it has been revealed.

The committee overseeing the plebiscite, which takes place on Friday May 24, has launched a public information campaign which will see a printed guide – in English and Irish – being sent to every home across Limerick between now and polling day.

At a media briefing on Monday the chairman of the committee, retired High Court judge Henry Abbott, said any directly elected mayor will be paid an annual salary of around €130,000 – the same as a Minister of State.

He or she will be entitled to recruit two advisers and there will be other costs and expenses associated with the running of the office. The committee's guide states the total annual cost could be anywhere between €313,000 and €450,000 depending on the individual mayor. "There could be some elected mayor

who could decide to do the job on a restrained budget within the parameters of the proposal or there could be another mayor who could have a more expensive budget," said Mr Abbott.

The Government is proposing that any

directly elected mayor will assume some of the executive responsibilities which are currently carried out by the CEO of Limerick City and County Council.

It is proposed that issues relating to human resources, planning permissions and the allocation of housing would remain the responsibility of the council CEO.

In addition to the executive functions, any directly elected mayor would also act as chairman of the full council and would assume the ceremonial duties associated with the office of the Mayor of Limerick city and county. There will be 40 councillors in addition to any directly elected mayor. It is proposed the directly elected mayor

will serve a five-year team running alongside the life of each council although the first directly elected mayor is likely to serve a shorter term - possibly just two years.

Any directly elected mayor will come under the remit of the Standard in Public Office Commission and, in a first for any political office in Ireland, there will be a recall mechanism' similar to that which operates in the House of Commons meaning a new election can take place.

"They are answerable to the electorate first of all, they are directly elected and if they have any interest of being re-elected that's a very serious level of accountability," said Mr Abbott.

In addition to sending an information guide to homes across Limerick, a public information event will take place on May 16 and there will be an extensive media campaign across print, radio and online platforms.

### **FUNDING:** HSE approves €15.8m for 60-bed block after weeks of concern

THE CRUCIAL 60-bed block University Hospital at Limerick that has received its funding go-ahead may not be able to admit patients until late 2020, the UL Hospitals Group has indicated.

This Monday, it was announced that the UHL block received €15.8m in funding as part of the HSE capital plan for 2019, following weeks of widespread confusion and concern over the provision of funding for the project.

The allocated €15.8m will fund the design and building of the 60-bed unit.

"It is anticipated that the design of the main works will commence in late May 2019 once contracts are signed and

an agreed state date is in place. It is anticipated that the design and build phase will take 15 months to complete," a spokesperson for the UL Hospitals Group told the Leader.

"Once the building is handed over by the contractor, the

equipping/commissioning of the unit should take a further two months to complete before the 60-bed block is ready to start admitting patients."

That indicates a delivery time of around October 2020.

The Leader asked if the

first patient will be admitted October 2020. The spokesperson said that they "are working on ensuring the project is delivered as soon as possible".

'The total capital cost of this project is estimated to be €19.5 million. This is a significant project for the Midwest region that will begin to address the acknowledged shortfall in bed capacity and UL Hospitals Group will make every effort to ensure the project is delivered as soon as possible."

Fine Gael senator Kieran O'Donnell said that the HSE issued a letter to the UL Hospitals Group on Friday to confirm the funding.

He said that funding was always going to be in place for the multi-million euro

Asked if concern expressed by other members of the Oireachtas over the funding was merited, Sen O'Donnell said: "For me, the funding was always in place. There was an element of confusion around the capital plan itself.

"For me, it was about getting the 60-bed block, the works underway as quickly as possible and that's why I pushed for the €2m to be put in place. Anyone can go out and physicalyl see at University Hospital Limerick site that works are underway."

It was originally indicated that the project will be completed by June 2020, should construction work start in the immediate future.

from the St Joseph's Health Campus on Mulgrave Street. Announcing the news this Monday morning, Senator





# **Record numbers** sign up for TLC5

### **TLC:** 21,000 set for this year's Limerick Clean-up

NEARLY 21,000 volunteers have signed up to take part in the Team Limerick Cleanup this Friday. Limerick's big clean up, TLC5, is sponsored by the JP McManus Benevolent Fund and is spearheaded by Paul O'Connell and Limerick City and County Council, with the support of Mr Binman, the Limerick

Leader and Live 95. The volunteer numbers are up 2,500 from the 18,500 who took part last year. This will consist of 629 separate groups working to make Limerick cleaner. Last year, 98 tonnes of litter were collected during the TLC4. This is around 3,900 household wheelie bins of rubbish.

There were many areas all over Limerick that were covered for the first time in 2018 and in 2019, TLC aims to cover even more.

Commenting ahead of the launch of Team Limerick Clean-Up 5, which took place in January, Munster and Ireland rugby legend Paul O'Connell said: "While we are of course looking forward to Team Limerick Clean-Up 5, it's also important to reflect on what we have achieved to date.

"We are so thankful to every volunteer who makes TLC what it is and comes out on Good Friday to clean around their locality. We'd urge previous participants to sign up early, and anybody who hasn't yet got involved in TLC, now is the perfect time to start and help us make TLC5 the biggest and best yet and Limerick

city and county the cleanest it has ever been," he added.

The event has been a huge local success since it started on Good Friday, April 3, 2015, as a massive clean-up day in both Limerick City and County. People were urged to sign up and make their community spotless and as a result, over 10,000 people participated in what turned out to be Ireland's largest ever one-day clean-up.

Due to the success in the first year, TLC2 took place on Good Friday March 25, 2016. The number of volunteers grew by over 3,000. TLC3 followed and continued the excellent work again on Good Friday, April 14, 2017. As a result close to 17,000 people were out on their streets to participate in the clean up.

### O'Dea hits out at 'shocking' waiting lists

THE DISABILITY Minister needs to set targets to ensure the reduction of waiting lists for speech and language assessment in Limerick, Fianna Fail TD Willie O'Dea has said.

He made the call after receiving new figures from the HSE which reveal that 1,493 people in Limerick are on a waiting list for either an initial assessment, initial therapy or further therapy.

Deputy O'Dea described the

figures as "shocking" and that they "illustrate the seriousness of the crises within our health service".

"These waiting times fly in the face of best practice. It is deeply frustrating for people to be told that they will have to wait months, or even years, before they will be assessed for an essential service. Any delay in assessment will lead to delays in treatment and this could have a detrimental impact on outcomes."

Deputy O'Dea said that while the Government has the biggest budget on record for health this year, "we need to see this money used effectively" and that cutting waiting lists should be a priority.

In a statement this week, Deputy O'Dea said Minister Finian McGrath said he is urging him "to take responsibility for these appalling lists and implement a strategy to ensure that they are dramatically reduced".

### Man arrested following seizure of amphetamines

A FILE is to be prepared for Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP) following a drugs seizure at house in the Castletroy area of the city.



A significant quantity of suspected amphetamines were recovered by gardai who were alerted to an incident at a house at Bru na Gruadan, Groody Road at around 10pm on April 8, last.

A man in his 40s was arrested at the house and taken to Henry Street Garda station where he was questioned about the seizure.

The suspect was later released without charge and

a file will be prepared for the DPP by investigating gardai.

A spokesperson at the Garda Press Office confirmed the suspected drugs have been sent to Garda Headquarters for further analysis.

Subject to analysis, it's estimated they have a street value of around €350. Investigations into the

seizure are continuing.

### Catalytic converters targeted as price of metals increase

GARDAI are warning motorists to be vigilant following a number of reported thefts of catalytic converters.

"Catalytic converters are in high demand for thieves at the moment as they contain precious metals such as platinum, palladium and rhodium. These precious metals have increased dramatically in price recently," said a garda spokesperson.

Catalytic converters, which are located near the rear wheels are an exhaust emission control device that converts toxic gases and pollutants in exhaust gas from an internal combustion engine into less-toxic pollutants.

### Cash stolen from elderly man by bogus tradesmen

A LARGE amount of cash was stolen during a 'distraction theft' on the outskirts of the city.

According to gardai two bogus tradesmen called to a house at School Road, Parteen where an elderly man

resides last Saturday at 1pm. "They showed false ID to the owner of the house and convinced him that he needed trees cut around his house. While one man started a chainsaw the second thief went into the house with the owner to collect the cash for the job," said Garda John Finnerty.



"This thief distracted the owner of the house whilst at the same time the second thief ran into the house and took a large sum of cash from within. At this stage both thieves left the house and the area," he added.

Anyone with information about the incident is asked to contact gardai at Mayorstone station.

#### Warning over 'loan scams'

GARDAI are warning that a number of people have fallen victim to 'personal loan scams' in recent weeks.

"They applied online to a bogus website and were asked to pay an upfront fee to receive a guaranteed loan. They paid this fee and only then realised that the website was bogus when they received no correspondence ever again," said Garda John Finnerty.

# Four year prison sentence for street attack on pensioner

#### **Robbery:**Culprit snatched handbag from 76-year-old

A CHRONIC drug addict who attacked and robbed an elderly woman as she was walking home from her local grocery store has been jailed for four years.

Wayne O'Callaghan, 28, who has an address at Brooklodge Grove, Glanmire, County Cork had pleaded guilty to a number of charges relating to an incident on November 27, 2017.

During a sentencing hearing, Sergeant Barry Manton said the 76-year-old victim was walking near the junction of Summer Street and Cathedral Place at around 7.15pm when she was set upon by the defendant.

He said Mr O'Callaghan, who has a large number of previous convictions, pulled the victim's handbag so strongly that the straps broke.

"She was attacked and thrown onto the ground, she fought as hard as she could," he said.

Judge Tom O'Donnell was told a number of passers-by were alerted to the incident and that one man followed the culprit and "tackled him" to the ground.

While Mr O'Callaghan managed to escape the area, the pensioner's handbag was recovered by gardai at the scene.

Sgt Manton said the defendant's was cut in the struggle (with the man) and that samples

He's not driving around in flash cars or living the flash lifestyle BRIAN MCINERNEY taken from a trail of blood on the foothpath matched his DNA.

Gardai, he said, later obtained CCTV from a number of locations which shows Mr O'Callaghan following the woman "at a safe distance behind her" before attacking her.

Following his arrest, the defendant told gardai that he was out of his head on tablets on the night and that he needed money to feed his drug habit.

In a victim impact statement, the woman, who lives alone, said she could not walk for a five or six weeks after the incident and that it had affected her confidence.

"I don't go out in the dark anymore, my confidence has been totally shattered," she wrote adding her life has not been the same since the incident.

In his submission to the court, Brian McInerney BL said his client has a serious drug problem and has no trappings of wealth.

"He's not driving around in flash cars or living the flash lifestyle," he said. Seeking leniency, he said Mr O'Callaghan

Seeking leniency, he said Mr O'Callaghan has a young child and a partner and that there is a "possibility of stability" in his life going forward.

He added that he hopes to stay in Cork following his release from prison.

Imposing sentence, Judge Tom O'Donnell said the incident was "extremely traumatic and frightening" for the defenceless victim.

He noted Mr O'Callaghan is ashamed of his actions and is making efforts to rehabilitate himself.

The four-four year prison sentence was backed to January 31, 2018 to reflect the time the defendant has been in custody.

A 'PADS and tampons' donation box has been set up in the city centre to help homeless people and those experiencing period poverty.

Rion O'Donovan, a fourth year fashion design student at the Limerick School of Art and Design (LSAD), has launched the first dedicated drop off point in Limerick city for donating sanitary products for the homeless.

The donation box has been installed at the Stormy Teacup Cafe on Foxes Bow. "When you are already in a horrible situation like homelessness and then you get your period, that

can be horrible," Rion said.

She was inspired to launch the initiative after reading an interview with Homeless Period Ireland, who set up donation points around the country for pads and tampons. "I realised that there wasn't

one in Limerick city," she explained. "The homeless crisis is really bad in Limerick so I was surprised there wasn't one."

While there are various donation initiatives underway in Limerick, like toiletry drives for those living in direct provision, this is the first drop-off point for sanitary products to be distributed to homeless shelters in the city centre.

"People have said to me that

everytime they go to buy a box of tampons, they'll buy a second one again and just drop it into the box in the Stormy Teacup," Rion explained.

Once a month, workers from the various homeless shelters make their way to the cafe to pick up boxes to be distributed.

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### Landlords 'hiking rents after RPZ designation'

LANDLORDS across the city have increased their rents following the designation of City East as a pressure zone, a local election candidate says.

Areas like Castletroy, Singland and Southill are now part of the so-called Rent Pressure Zone (RPZ), which means landlords can only increase the tenant's rent by a maximum of 4% annually. However, City North and City West are not subject to these controls.

Housing campaigner Anne Cronin says she is meeting families daily who have faced steep rental hikes as landlords prepare for the possibility of controls coming to their area.

"Each evening in City North, I come across at least one family or young person renting that has a tale to tell about the horrors of renting," Ms Cronin said. "Just last week a woman told me that a couple of days after the rent pressure zone announcement came into effect in Castletroy, her landlord contacted her to advise that her rent was going to increase from €900 to €1,200. This women who along with her partner works full-time and has two children, outlined to me that the rent combined with the cost of childcare each day, means that she and her family are barely getting by. This is a direct consequence of the Minister's shortsighted view to make one side of the city a RPZ and not the other two."

Ms Cronin, who works for housing charity Novas, believes families are leaving the city due to what she describes as "unfair and insecure rent conditions".

"We need the whole of Limerick City declared an RPZ. Otherwise we will continue to see the sharp increases in rent in the areas within the city, which are left behind," she added.

## Crescent takes stand against plastic use

CRESCENT College Comprehensive has become the first school in Munster to launch a single-use plastic-free school programme which sees the school officially stop

the sale of single-use plastic. A recent survey carried out by the school in Dooradoyle found that 2,500 single-use plastic bottles were being purchased by students weekly.

In its bid to become plastic-free, the school has now installed extra water fountains and each student will purchase lifetime, reusable hydro-flasks.

"From our aim to eradicate all single-use plastics from the school we hope that as a knock-on effect occurs, the whole school premises will be cleaner and tidier," Harry, a member of the Crescent Comprehensive Committee said.

From this, we hope to initiate a plastic-free action plan to reach plastic-free status among other city schools, businesses, community groups and authorities.

The school's plastic-free committee has grown from six members to 30 in just over a year, made up of students from first, second, third and fourth year.

As well as setting up recycling bins in the school, students also take part in the Team Limerick Clean-Up. The committee also attended the national climate change strike at Arthur's Quay on March 15.

The group has recently been chosen by An Taisce as one of its first groups of climate ambassadors.

"We are not banning single-use plastic, for the simple reason that banning can lead to a resistant or defensive reaction and it is not the attitude we wish to convey," Harry said, speaking at the launch of the initiative.

"We seek a cultural change based on education and encouragement, not on force or policing.

"We will not use words such as 'rules' or 'banned', when implementing this policy initiative. We believe that it is right and will, in the long run, be a more rewarding approach."

Students, parents, members of the board of management and staff at Crescent were thanked for their work with the programme.

"We have also continued to receive great support from the parents' council, who recently agreed to contribute towards the cost of a drinking foundation for the students." The school also received a grant from Limerick City and County Council to help students purchase their hydro-flasks at a reduced fee.

### Over 200 attend showhouse launch

REA could easily stand for Residing in Exquisite Adare. REA O'Connor Murphy are the selling agents for two exclusive development in the picturesque village – The Heritage and Manor Brook.

The latter was officially launched at the weekend with Limerick hurling captain and Adare man Declan Hannon doing the honours. Manor Brook is a mixture of three bedroom semi-detached, four bedroom semi-detached and four bedroom detached. There are 40 houses in total as well as five service sites.

The homes are described as "modern, spacious, elegant and contemporary".

REA O'Connor Murphy released 22 homes in the first phase of the development built by Torca Homes on Sunday. Construction started about six months ago.

"We had 10 bookings over the weekend - six three bedroom and four of the four bedroom – all semi-detached. We would hope that we will have another five or six sold in the coming week or so from very interested parties. The detached are generally slower but we have a couple of people interested in the €650,000 ones," said Mr O'Connor.

He expects to sell out the first phase within the next couple of weeks. Prices will then be revisited for phase two.

Mr O'Connor said they were delighted with how the launch went.

### Calls to close 'core area' of city centre streets to traffic

### **Local authority:** Pedestrians will help trade, councillor believes

WITH plans underway to reduce traffic

on Limerick's main thoroughfare, the council has been called on to pedestrianise three of the city centre's busiest streets.

Limerick City and County Council has earmarked approximately €9.1 million for the revitalisation of O'Connell Street, which is expected to see traffic lanes reduced by 2022.

However, the council should

consider pedestrianising Catherine Street from Glentworth Street to Thomas Street in the interim, according to Labour councillor Joe Leddin who put forward a motion at this week's Metro meeting.

"The backdrop to this in the city centre is that we have had a number of independent, indigenous retailers close down," Cllr Leddin said. "I am cognisant of the work being done but I believe we need a core pedestrianised area."

Last summer, Catherine Street was closed to cars as Street Feast took place,

Cllr Leddin added.

'You could see people congregating, enjoying themselves. We've seen other examples of it working in other cities as well.

"I think we can, in the short term, create an opportunity on that street, by pedestrianising it and giving the streets back to people to move freely." Cllr Leddin's motion was seconded

by Labour councillor Elena Secas. It was also supported by Fine Gael councillor Elenora Hogan who said she thought it sounded like an "excellent idea".

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### Councillors pledge action on mental health in schools

LIMERICK CITY and County councillors are to call on the Minister for Health to implement an evidence-based mental health awareness programme in all Limerick classrooms.

At a recent meeting of the Metropolitan District of Limerick, councillors voted on a motion pledging to call on Minister Simon Harris to implement a programme in both primary and secondary schools here. "It is well past time that we put children's and young adult's mental health and

"It is well past time that we put children's and young adult's mental health and wellbeing on the priority list," Solidarity councillor Paul Keller said, putting forward the motion on behalf of fellow Solidarity councillor Mary Cahillane.

"Surveys carried out show that an average of three in every classroom have diagnosable mental health problems," he added.

mental health problems," he added. "Depression is the largest cause of disability among those aged between 10 and 24 and suicide is now one of the leading causes of death in Europe," said Cllr Keller

"Schools are in a unique position to promote mental health and emotional wellbeing," the Solidarity councillor said.

The can provide a health-promoting senvironment and identify young people

experiencing emotional stress and being at risk, he pointed out.

The motion passed with widespread support. It was seconded by Fianna Fáil councillor Sean Lynch who proposed it be extended to include primary schools as well.

extended to include primary schools as well. "Limerick has the highest rate of suicide and self-harm," Cllr Lynch said. Early intervention is key, he added.

"I think the project should be started in primary schools. With the pressures of social media, we've seen the effect that has on young children. Parents need to be educated as well."

Metro Mayor Daniel Butler advised councillors that Pieta House is currently working on a classroom-based mental resilience programme.

"I think it's great progress that we are here today discussing mental health openly, when we wouldn't have been six or seven years ago," Mayor Butler said.

Councillor Keller thanked councillors for their support. "I'm glad to see everyone here has an interest. When it comes to mental health, Limerick's young adolescents can't wait anymore."



Beware short-term outlook on mortgage time-span

here are many considerations when choosing the right

mortgage, but one that is often overlooked, and is probably more important than all others combined, is the term of your mortgage.

The majority of people I come across, particularly first time buyers, don't look at the long term savings. They find it hard to get past comparing one monthly repayment against another, and the reason is they don't know what they don't know.

I believe getting people's attention begins with making that connection between their present and future selves and doing so in a way that is relatable and makes sense to them.

So, I start off by looking at a mortgage term, which is half the term they were considering. It doesn't matter for the time being whether they can afford the monthly repayment or not. I want to alter their fixed mindset of choosing the longest term possible for a moment.

Imagine for a moment you are 30 years old, and you borrowed €250,000 and chose a 15-year term, instead of 30. What impact would that have on you now and in the future?

It's a big question, and I'm not sure if many people put much thought into it. Even if they did, what are they looking for? What's their starting point?

The first is obvious enough; you don't need me to tell you, you will be mortgage -free twice as fast but let's make a list of numbers they should know about. €670

The differences between a 15 and 30-year mortgage are (a) the monthly repayment and (b) the total interest paid. With a shorter term, your monthly

repayments will be €670 higher. €72,745

But with a shorter term, you'll pay €72,745 less back in interest. €32.207

The cost of servicing a mortgage over a 15-year period is c. €32,207. That's the gross amount you'll need to take from your salary every year to pay for it. But, when the mortgage is cleared, that's €32,207 you don't need to earn anymore, meaning you can pivot and change careers, or you could earn or work less if you wanted to because you have no mortgage repayment to worry about. 45

The age you will be mortgage-free. If you go for a longer term, you would be 60 before you own your house outright. €468,094

The amount you would add to your pension/savings fund, for those 15 years you aren't paying a mortgage anymore. €18,724

The extra amount you would be in receipt of each year in retirement, from diverting the amount you had previously being paying on your mortgage, to your pension/savings funds.

#### €43,869

The difference between what you owe in year five, based on a 15 and 30-year term. With a 15-year term, you could absorb a drop in value by €51,250 and still have a loan-to-value (LTV) of 80% allowing you to move properties if you wanted to.

If you chose a 30-year term, in year five you still owe €222,869 and if the property fell in value by €51,250, you would still owe 100% of what the house is valued at. So, if you wanted to move,

you're going nowhere for at least 12 years until your loan balance was 80% of the value of the property.

2,427

This is the number of hours you would save from not having to work to pay your mortgage, if you chose a lower term.

A gross income of €71,500 is required to qualify for €250,000 using current 3.5 times income multiple. That means your net annual income is about €47,809. If you work 40 hours per week over 12 months, your hourly rate is €29.98.

The total interest paid for a 30-year mortgage term is €136,763 meaning you have to work 4,562 hours to pay for it. Over 15 years, the total interest paid is €64,018 which is 2,135 hours. 23%

The difference between the amount being applied to the amount owed in year one. With a 30-year mortgage, only 39% of your monthly repayment is going towards reducing the capital, but with a 15-year term, 62% is.

If you are in that mortgage process or are about to embark on it, my advice is to look beyond the monthly repayment and try to see the bigger picture. It's easy to show how good it is to choose a shorter term, but it does come at a price. The term you choose will depend on your personal situation and a shorter one can be the right choice for some, if not for others. But when choosing the term of your mortgage, the key is to take your time, don't let yourself default into the longest term possible.

Evaluate your finances first and look at all options and know the impact they can have on your financial situation now and in the future.



Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q: Liam, the company I work for are closing in the first half of 2020. I'm wondering if I'm eligible to claim tax back once I'm redundant and if so, what do I do? Thanks

A: Where a person is made redundant during the course of a year, they have probably paid more tax than they are liable for.

The reason for this is because tax credits are calculated on a yearly basis and a person's tax credits are divided over 52 weeks, therefore if a person works for, say, 26 weeks and is redundant for the rest of the vear, they will have 26 weeks of tax credits to claim back against the tax they have already paid.

The amount you will be entitled to get back will depend on the amount of tax you paid from the beginning of the year, and the amount of tax credits you used during the year, up until you were made redundant.

If you are in receipt of job seekers benefit, you'll have to wait eight weeks before you can apply, otherwise the waiting period is about four weeks after your exit date.

When you are applying you complete a form P50 and include parts two and three of your P45 and submit to your local tax office or apply on-line.

# **Frank talk** on Limerick strives to break mould

### Vision: Well-known leaders give empowering insight into success

THE PLANT general manager of Edwards Lifesciences which chose Limerick over other major cities for their new manufacturing base says he really believes "that Limerick is set for some amazing growth and expansion".

'It's just a very, very attractive place. I don't know that you realise how attractive it is - maybe you are just too close to it to see it but from my perspective it's a great place."

Nathan Tenzer was speaking at Breaking the Mould, an evening of frank panel discussion and chat, designed to empower the city of Limerick and its business people.

In its second year, Breaking the Mould which was hosted at Gardens International on Henry Street in the city is the brainchild of three Limerick business players, Mazars, Collins McNicolas, and Sellors.

The panel was moderated by former secretary general at the Department of

Finance, John Moran who shared his vision for Limerick, along with the two panellists, Nathan Tenzer and sports psychologist, Caroline Currid.

Two years ago Edwards Lifesciences, which is the global leader in the science of heart valves, began its search for a city to build its latest plant. Limerick came out on the top of the list over Dublin, Cork and Galway. "As a city it had everything going for it," Mr Tenzer said.

During the questions and answers section John Moran was asked by a member of the audience if "in the depths of the Custom House and the departments of State and the Department of Finance there a genuine shift and commitment in favour of development in cities like Limerick and Cork and Galway?"

"I have to be honest when I answer these questions, I worry that there isn't," said Mr Moran.

"For me, the GAA effect (the intense rivalry between counties) has meant that we made it easy on Dublin, so every time there was a decision of State, Cork



wanted it, Limerick wanted it, Galway wanted it, Tipperary wanted it and wherever else, so it was actually easy to make the decision, let's just give it to the place that's got the most people. And when you keep giving all the stuff to the place that has the most people as we see it, then, actually, all of a sudden it just builds on itself."

When asked for her opinion on how this issue could be addressed, Caroline Currid, who was a key figure in the Limerick hurlers' All-Ireland success said, "You get leaders in these different areas that you are talking about to come together and have a value stream team whereby we have these conversations and honest conversations in relation to how we do that.

The Glen becomes the fourth Tidy Towns' fourth winner for 2019, following Mint Boutique in January, Bakehouse 22 in February and Mid-West Lighting in March.







# Learning ways of dealing with intrusive thoughts

HIS week I will answer an email from a reader who is struggling with anxiety all of her life.

#### Dear Eddie,

I have emailed to see if you can help. I am looking for guidance. I've suffered with anxiety all my life but never really knew.

I just thought I was shy until I was about 17. Then it hit me hard and I struggled for two years. I struggled on and went to third level but I never got help and 'grinned and bared' it. Often I was overcome by shame and guilt.

I thought that a new start would do the trick and I went to Canada. Unfortunately my anxiety worsened and I had to come home. I was devastated and it triggered three years of suffering.

I'm almost 30 and just about got my life going.

In the past few months I feel like it's creeping back in on me slowly but surely. I mainly suffer intrusive thoughts which leave me feeling paralysed with shame and guilt. I'm looking to deal with this

problem. I want the life I always dreamt of and know I deserve it, but I can't do it if I don't face this problem head on.

Dr Eddie's Response: Mary, I really appreciate you writing to me and trusting me with your story. A number of things come to mind and I will go through these. You talk about experiencing anxiety all your life and then other moments where you were overwhelmed and then the quality of your life deteriorated.

Too often we can forget that GPs, who are in the community, can play a role in identifying appropriate pathways for help including mental health.

In addition, they can do a physical and blood work up as well. In the context of starting out with mental health interventions, be it psychology, medication or counselling, I think a quality assessment is critical.

THE BENEFITS OF ASSESSMENT Accurately diagnosing mental health presentations can be challenging, even for seasoned clinicians, and this has meaningful implications in terms of providing effective care.

Psychological assessment may be especially useful in situations where diagnosis is not immediately clear and/or may involve multiple clinical considerations.

Psychological assessment can also be extremely helpful with adults who may be struggling in different areas of their lives, particularly in situations where past treatments have been sub-optimal or ineffective.

These evaluations provide important information, not only about where someone may be struggling specifically.

WHAT KEEPS THE PROBLEM GOING Anxiety treatments are really open to Cognitive Behavioural Treatments.

In modern psychology we really like to focus on what keeps the problem going? Targeting the thoughts and

behaviours are key. What are the intrusive

thoughts?

This sounds key to the moods of guilt and shame that you are experiencing.

Remember you are not your thoughts. All human beings have intrusive and upsetting thoughts, however your challenge is to learn a tool kit to manage these via the CBT.

This is where you will learn to recognise and challenge these thoughts, or using some other therapy models you will recognise the thoughts, but don't engage with them.


Mary your thoughts are thoughts, not facts. These intrusive thoughts could be associated with Obsessive Compulsive Disorder (OCD), however I strongly advise assessment. Check out

www.ocdireland.org. For some people with OCD they can struggle with compulsions — i.e. behaviours for example excessive hand washing.

For others, possibly yourself the obsessions are the struggle. These are unwanted and intrusive thoughts. Your challenge is to take back control of your intrusive thoughts.

STEP 1: SEE THROUGH OCD'S SCARE TACTICS

OCD is the fear network of the brain sending a signal that something is wrong and needs to be done now.



Intrusive thoughts can have a huge impact on how some people live their lives. Dr Eddie gives some advice on how to deal with these dark thoughts which can cause huge anxiety

OCD works by feared

consequences that are important to a person. Believe me, somewhere within an obsession is the flip side of a core value. If OCD taunts you with images and thoughts about offending god, then religion must be important to you. If OCD reviews all the ways your family could be hurt, then your family is clearly one of your top priorities. There is checklist of common intrusive thoughts that I find helpful to share with my patients. There are numerous thoughts on this list regarding losing control and acting out violently or sexually. Several research studies found that when this list is shown to a non-clinical sample of people, approximately 90 percent of those surveyed will agree to having experienced some of the intrusive thoughts.

When the non-clinical sample is asked how bothered they are by experiencing these intrusive thoughts, they are most often only mildly bothered by them.

In contrast, when this same list is shown to individuals diagnosed with OCD, a similar percentage of the sample will agree to having experienced these intrusive thoughts, but the big difference is how much distress these thoughts evoke for the OCD sample.

For those meeting criteria for OCD, there will be a much higher level of emotional distress when these same intrusive thoughts surface.

What keeps OCD alive and well is not the experience of intrusive thoughts, but actually one's reaction to them.

The more one dislikes experiencing intrusive thoughts

and then tries to repress or fight thoughts, the greater the frequency of intrusive thoughts one will experience. The very act of trying to "not have" a bothersome thought guarantees its resurfacing.

Finally to be human means one will experience deeply upsetting, intrusive and odd thoughts.

Freedom from OCD is not about stopping the mind from offering up strange and occasionally disturbing thoughts but learning how to recognise spam versus urgent mail versus engaging in the real world.

### For a good nights' sleep

'Sleep hygiene' refers to practicing habits and strategies which promote sleep and improve sleep problems. Poor sleep hygiene is usually indicated by frequent sleep disturbances, daytime sleepiness, and taking too long to fall asleep. Making a few simple changes can hugely benefit your child's quality of sleep.

#### Consistency

Consistent bedtime routines are a proven strategy to decrease anxieties surrounding bedtime. It is important to stick to the same bedtime and wake time every day, even on weekends. Your child should have a predictable series of events which lead up to bedtime. Bedtime routines should be calm and relaxed, as opposed to rushed.

#### Beds are for sleeping

If your child has difficulty falling asleep, they should try getting out of bed and engaging in a calming activity, such as reading a book. As a child tosses and turns in bed more, their negative associations with bedtime can increase. Bedrooms should be kept solely for sleeping so try to avoid sending your child to their bedroom as a punishment or allowing them to complete their homework in their room as they develop negative associations

#### Good sleep environment

Children should have a sleep environment which is consistent, comfortable, and quiet. A relaxed and calm environment is essential for falling asleep easily. A child's bedroom should be cool, quiet, and comfortable. Sunlight should be blocked out in order to help children fall asleep easily.

#### No screen time

Screens are proven to interfere with falling asleep easily. Children should stop all screen time one-two hours before bed.

# What you need to know about your child and sleep

Sleep difficulties in children are very common problems for families. It is very normal for a child to have some aspect of sleep disturbances in their lives.]

Sleep is the foundation for positive physical, mental, and emotional health. Sometimes it can be more apparent when children are getting too little sleep rather than the right amount of sleep. Typically, we can recognise when a child or teenager has not gotten enough sleep if they appear excessively sleepy during the day, irritable, not as alert as usual, or unable to concentrate fully. We are less able to recognise that a child who seems hyperactive may be exhausted. For many children, when they are not getting enough sleep, their body produces hormones (cortisol and adrenaline) in an effort to try and keep them awake. This in turn

gives the impression that children have lots of energy and are not in need of rest.

It can be difficult to know how much sleep is sufficient sleep; different people have different sleep needs. Lack of sleep is considered a problem when: a child is obtaining less sleep than is needed for normal growth and development; a child's emotional and psychological health is affected; if there is an impact on a child's immune system; and/or if it affects the wider family.

There are many practical reasons why a child or teenager may wake during the night or find it difficult to fall asleep, such as illness, hunger, excitement, being too hot or too cold, bad dreams, or needing to go to the toilet. Worrying thoughts occurring in a child's mind when they are trying to get to sleep or waking them up at

night are also very common reasons for sleep difficulties. If your child is finding it difficult to sleep due to worries it may be useful to encourage them to find some way of letting their worries out before bedtime. Depending on the age of your child this might mean writing them down or having allocated 'worry time' for 15 minutes. Another useful strategy for children who find it difficult to sleep due to worries includes breathing exercises. For younger children this can be in the form of 'belly breathing' or teenagers may try it in the form of mindfulness.

Screen time (phones, tablets, TV, etc.) is one of the biggest issues that prevents us from falling asleep easily. The bright light on the screen stimulates our brain and makes us more awake rather than sleepy. We also know that the blue light emitted from our devices

supresses melatonin which is the chemical that regulates sleep and wakefulness. Similarly, the videos or TV programmes that we watch can make us more alert by stimulating and distracting our brain. It is best to stop all screen time one-two hours before bedtime so that our brains have a chance to wind down and prepare for sleep. All stimulating activities such as, screen time, energetic games should be eliminated before bedtime and replaced with calming activities such as, bath time, lullabies, or reading relaxing stories.

# Digital age dating

Now in some cases, you may know the person to some degree or you may have friends in common but it's still important to point out that you don't actually know this person until you've met them. Because so much communication happens in the form of texts, DMs, exchanging photos or snaps, a false sense of intimacy is created before you've met the person in the real world. This form of non face to face flirting can also amplify the desire for immediate gratification and constant access to someone you barely know. The obvious danger here is that you are dealing with someone who's not really interested or just not really a very nice person and things that you said or sent in good faith might be shared with others without your consent. It's not nice, don't do it and don't put yourself in a position where it can be done to you.

BE HONEST (THE TRUTH IS EASIER TO REMEMBER)

Online dating gives people to opportunity to meet people outside of their social circle and because of that, it's much easier to present an idealized fantasy version of yourself on social media and on dating apps. I know someone who has two different profiles on two different dating apps, one for looking for hookups and one for looking for a serious relationship, each listing different hobbies, interests and character traits. The words in your bio and the pictures you present of yourself are what hook the imagination of the person looking at your profile. The fantasy starts before a message is ever even exchanged. Once you step outside the truth it's a slippery slope and if you actually like the person then you will at some point have to come clean whether it be age, appearance or relationship status.

#### HAVE STANDARDS BUT DON'T GET HUNG UP ON BOX TICKING

Single people often talk about wanting to meet someone who 'ticks all of the boxes,' which can include looks, height, job, education, kinkiness and more. The advanced search feature on dating websites and apps can facilitate your search for an ideal partner who meets your specific criteria but it can also amplify a potential flaw in this approach. The sheer volume of people using these apps can lead to an idea that there's always a better one on the way so keep swiping until you find them.

The truth is that the seemingly bottomless pit of potential partners at your disposal makes it difficult to evaluate the connection with the person sitting across from you. Part of the point of going on dates is to figure out if the other person is someone you can relate to, have fun with, respects you and can communicate with you in an open and honest way.

This can take time and if you are entering this with an invisible checklist in hand then you are beaten before you ever leave the house. Having said that, box-ticking and having standards are not the same things. You're allowed to have your ideals and your

"non-negotiables", otherwise, you'd just settle. The key is not getting to a stage where you're completely closed off to the idea of meeting someone who's not "your type".

# Kia Proceed: Versatile model ticks a lot of boxes

KIA'S new Proceed went on sale here in January priced from €28,945.

This is the sportiest iteration of the new Ceed model family and is available exclusively as a GT Line. It provides couples or young families with the space and versatility of a wagon. This hatchback certainly

This hatchback certainly garners a lot of attention with its stunning styling and beautiful proportions. Kia call it a 'shooting brake body' silhouette style. To me it seems a mix of wagon (estate) and liftback with its long length and high-opening tailgate. This car has been designed, developed, engineered and built in Europe for Europeans so it suits our roads.

ProCeed is a mid-sized family C-segment offering with an overall length of 4,605mm and height of 1,422mm. It's somewhat longer and lower than its Sportswagon and Ceed five-door hatch siblings. As with most low slung cars, tall people should mind their heads when getting in and out or when reaching into the car for your belongings.

This model began life as a three-door, but Europe's shrinking market for three-door hatchbacks has resulted in this new ProCeed being fitted with a family-friendly

d, five doors.

Just offered in GT Line, my review car was powered by Kia's new 1.4 petrol engine which produces 140hp and 242 Nm of torque. It was paired to a 6-speed manual transmission (annual road tax €280). A 7-speed double-clutch transmission is also offered. There's plenty of oomph from this sporty engine and it offers an engaging drive. There's nothing not to enjoy about it. Inside, there is big front legroom, however rear leg room would be a tad tight behind a 6ft person in front, and rear headroom may be on the short side for a tall person.

The cabin is of the high standard we have come to expect from this

Korean carmaker; with good quality materials and soft touch surfaces as well as some metallic trim and a stylish horizontal dashboard layout which is well laid out and angled towards the driver.

A user-friendly, 7ins 'floating' infotainment touchscreen dominates here with audio, heating and ventilation controls below. Instruments are recessed while the trip computer shows distance to empty etc.

I particularly liked the sporty upholstery in pale grey and black and quilted like you see on some expensive anoraks. The embroidered GT-Line trim logo adds to the look. Seats have larger side bolsters for that extra snug fit. Metal pedals match the silver

touches throughout the cabin.

My car was very well specced with privacy glass, six airbags, Kia's Vehicle Stability Management which ensures stability when braking and cornering, the sporty D-shaped leather steering wheel, Cruise control, Bluetooth, air con, sat nav, reversing camera, full smartphone integration with Apple CarPlay and Android Auto, and an array of advanced driver assistance technologies and safety features.

Options can include heated windscreen, wireless smartphone charger and heated front/rear seats, and front-seat ventilation.

There are plenty of storage areas including a decent glovebox, big front door bins, a shelf below on the dash and a lidded area which houses a 12v socket, Aux-In, USB etc.

The ProCeed offers more luggage capacity at 594 litres than many conventional compact family wagons and its boot is 50pc more spacious than that of the Ceed five-door hatchback. Rear seats can fold forward with a single touch from a lever inside the tailgate, for an almost flat cargo area. There's no boot lip and the high opening tailgate makes it very easy to load and unload even large items. There are a few sections to the boot floor; one reveals a deep hidden area in which to store smaller precious item out of sight.

Yes, there was a niggle in that the rear windscreen is quite narrow in height due to the car's coupe-like design but I thoroughly enjoyed my time with this car and can recommend it to potential buyers.

ProCeed is covered by Kia's industry-leading 7-Year, 150,000kms warranty as standard.

AUDI'S first fully electric SUV, the Audi e-tron, has arrived in Ireland priced from €101,750 (OTR price). **Deliveries for pre-registered** 

deposit holders begin from April. With a large 95kWh high voltage battery, the Audi e-tron combines enormous power and a long range. It can accelerate from 0-100km/h in under six seconds and is capable of covering up to 391 kilometres on one range. The car can attain up to 30 per cent of its long range through energy recuperation.

Audi say the dual electric motors ensure there's no lag between acceleration and launch resulting in a driving experience impossible to match with a combustion engine.

The car comes with a new generation of the quattro drive, the electric all-wheel-drive. Available

# **'Unfortunately, Saracens are a fantastic rugby team' Champions Cup:** Munster target first final appearance in 11 years

MUNSTER head coach Johann van Graan insists the side cannot get caught up in the province's disappointing record in Heineken Champions Cup semi-finals ahead of Saturday's big showdown with Saracens.

Munster will be targeting a first Heineken Champions Cup final appearance since 2009 when locking horns with Gallagher Premiership giants Saracens at Coventry's Ricoh Arena, 3pm.

The two-time European Cup winners have lost no fewer than six semi-finals since their 2008 semi-final win over Saturday's opponents Saracens at the Ricoh Arena. Van Graan said: "We can't look at the past and what happened in the past. We took what we could out of two semi final losses last season (Heineken Champions Cup and Guinness PRO14), did a big review on that after last season and we believe we learnt out of them.

"If we win on the weekend everybody will say we've learnt our lessons. If we don't win people will say Munster lost another semi-final. Our only focus is what we do in the week and how do we handle Saracens on Saturday afternoon.

"Unfortunately they are a fantastic rugby team. The more you look at them the better they become. It's a massive challenge for us to go and beat them in England. If we want to get past the semi final we'll have to be very good on Saturday afternoon."

With Ireland out-half Joey Carbery 'highly unlikely' to play this weekend due to a hamstring injury, Van Graan looks set to hand the starting out-half jersey to New Zealander Tyler Bleyendaal.

The former All-Black U20 captain has fought back from a serious neck injury in recent seasons to regain full fitness. Van Graan has been hugely impressed with Bleyendaal's contribution to Munster, both on and off the pitch.

Van Graan added: "One of the first people that I actually met when I came here in that first week of the Racing game, two years ago, he was one of the first guys that I met. "His composure and his calmness impressed me straight away and Tyler is a very consistent guy, whether injured or not, he gives the same amount of input every week.

"He sits in on every meeting and he is just one of those guys in the team that is a real energy giver. He doesn't say that much, but what he says has got some real value and he is a massive influence at Munster Rugby.

"There was a lot of questions asked as to why I re-signed him and it is specifically for weeks like this.

"He is a great man, a very good rugby player, he understands the game of rugby and I think we are very lucky to have him." Munster captain Peter O'Mahony believes Munster are a better side than the one which lost to Racing 92 at the semi-final stage of last season's Champions Cup.

"We put in a lot of work over the past 12 months and I think that we are a different animal to what we were; further down the track. Don't get me wrong we are under no illusions as to how it is going to be. We are definitely a better side that we were last year."

Munster have lost nine of their 13 Heineken Champions Cup semi-finals to date.

Saturday's semi-final showdown, which will be refereed by French official Jerome Garces will be televised live on BT Sport and also on Live95.


Among the others to see time in defence during the league were William O'Meara and Barry Nash. In midfield, O'Donoghue,

Everyone is entitled to their opinion, but sometimes the true weight of an event is best looked at in hindsight. That may be 20/20, but no one can wait that long.


