

Masks on statues and ban on cups

AMID growing fears surrounding the spread of COVID-19 (coronavirus) in Limerick, the city's iconic statues took extra precautions by donning face masks this weekend.

The humourous sight was spotted by a number of people, including Twitter users who then circulated the images.

Statues such as that of Terry Wogan, the Dockers Monument and the O'Connell Street hurlers statue were all snapped wearing masks similar to those worn by millions in recent weeks worldwide.

According to the HSE, "using masks is unlikely to be of any benefit if you are not

"Sick people will be advised by their doctor when to use a mask," it has been stated.

"Healthcare workers need masks and other personal protective equipment to protect them from infection during their work."

A council spokesperson said: "Limerick City and County Council is not aware of who put the masks on the testing. The Council would statues. The Council would remind members of the public that the public statues around the city are an important cultural, societal and tourist resource that needs to be minded."

Meanwhile, a number of Limerick cafés and coffee shops have imposed a temporary ban on customers using their own reusable coffee cups in attempts to contain the spread of the

The ban is said to have been imposed to limit the spread of a contaminated person's body fluids (ie. saliva) from their own personal cup to the equipment that's used to prepare other people's beverages, as well as to café employees.

Limerick braces itself as coronavirus takes a hold

Covid-19: Further restrictions and cancellations are expected

LIMERICK is already feeling the impact of the worsening coronavirus outbreak with further cancellations and restrictions of movement expected.

With the number of confirmed cases of Covid-19 in Ireland now in the mid-20s, measures to combat the spread of the virus have intensified with a cabinet sub-committee taking the lead.

While Ireland remains containment phase, public health experts are predicting that in a worst-case scenario, there could be more than 70,000 cases of Covid-19 in Limerick.

Members of the public are being encouraged to heed the public health advice such as regularly washing their hands and exercising proper sneezing and coughing etiquette.

In addition to the cancellation of the

St Patrick's Festival, which would have drawn up to 80,000 people to the city centre, a significant number of smaller community events have been cancelled across the city and county.

Mass-goers are being encouraged not to shake hands while visiting restrictions have been introduced at almost all nursing

The UL Hospitals Group has extended the cancellation of almost all elective surgeries and outpatient appointments across all six of its sites while a visitor ban is also in place.

A number of those who have contracted the virus in the west of the country, remain in isolation at UHL.

Pharmacies across Limerick have been struggling to secure fresh supplies of hand sanitiser while some have begun the process of stockpiling medications.

"We don't know what's going to happen so we are looking at having

enough supplies to last three or four months but you can't have everything," one pharmacists told The Leader.

The hospitality sector has been significantly affected by Covid-19 with many bookings for large groups at hotels and restaurants being cancelled - to the disappointment of some.

"The risk of contracting Covid-19 remains very very low. Of course, at risk groups should stay away. The rest just need to wash our hands and go about our business. It's a shame people love to be dramatic, and secretly long for panic," said Pat O'Sullivan of Masterchefs in a post on social media.

Meanwhile, it's business as usual for schools and colleges in Limerick although contingency plans are being drawn up in the event of closures being required.

The Department of Education and Skills said any decision to close schools will be made on public health advice and that no such advice has been received.

Family tell of self-isolation fears

A FAMILY awaiting COVID-19 test results have spoken to the Limerick Leader about their experience since they began self-isolating last week.

The family of four are in self-isolation at home following one member, the father/husband, being in contact with a confirmed case of the virus last week.

The man, who is a member of the gardaí, was instructed by his workplace to self-isolate after coming into contact with a later-confirmed case of the virus last Tuesday, March 2.
The wife, who works

in the hospitality industry in Limerick city and has also been told to self-isolate by her workplace, said how if it wasn't for social media, the family would be unaware that they were in contact with the confirmed case

until this weekend. "This individual was identified to us via Twitter and Facebook on Wednesday evening around 8pm after RTÉ broadcast the confirmed cases in the West," she said.

"If we hadn't found out via social media who the confirmed case was, my husband would have come into contact with potentially hundreds of people over the week."

On Thursday, the couple were both told to self-isolate by their employers, and chose to keep their two children home from school and university.

The family made

contact with the national helpline that evening, with the HSE unable to confirm nor deny that contact had been made with a confirmed case.

"We were told to stay home, wash our hands and relax," she said, "and that if my husband was in contact with the confirmed case that they would be in touch.

On Friday night, the

family were tested at home for the virus by a paramedic, and as of this Monday, were still awaiting results.

'On Sunday we were called by the contact team who told us that my husband had been in contact with the person who had a confirmed case. This was four days after we made contact ourselves with the HSE to tell them this. They are

about as useful as a chocolate teapot.

"So either the test comes back negative and everything goes back to normal, or it comes back positive and my husband is admitted to UHL and kept in isolation. From which point I will have to self-isolate for a further 14 days with the two kids and disinfect the entire house."

Late Late Show set for UCH has been postponed

The Late Late Show, due to be broadcast from Limerick this Friday, March 13, has been switched back to Dublin instead.

The director general of RTE told the Limerick Leader, "As we are now unable to bring you the show that we had hoped, with great regret it has been decided that the Late Late Show due to be broadcast from Limerick on Friday March 13, will be postponed until a later date. "Ryan, the Late Late Show team, and all at RTÉ and Fáilte Ireland are disappointed that the broadcast from University of Limerick cannot proceed this weekend, but we do look forward to rescheduling this event at a later date," the statement added.

The television show's production team tweeted on Tuesday, "We cannot wait to be able to bring the #LateLate to Limerick in the future."





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Should St Patrick's Day events be cancelled?

MORE than eight in every ten people who took a survey on the Limerick Leader Twitter page have agreed with council's decision to cancel the St Patrick's Day celebrations next week.

Early on Monday morning, this newspaper's Twitter followers were asked the yes/no question as to whether the event should be cancelled over the outbreak, which has caused chaos globally.

Some 606 people voted by teatime on Monday, with 81.7% going in favour of the cancellation.

No advice to close schools, says Dept. of Education

The Department of Education and Skills has responded to speculation on social media that schools across the country are to close for a number of weeks from this Friday in response to the coronavirus outbreak.

In a statement, issued this Tuesday afternoon, a spokesperson said the Department is liaising closely with the Department of Health on a continuing basis.

'Any decision to close schools will be made on public health advice. There is no such

advice at this point.
"It is essential that any decisions regarding responses to Covid-19 are proportionate, necessary and based on specific public health advice. No other response is appropriate."

Prior to the statement being issued, several messages were circulating on WhatsApp and on other social media platforms, suggesting an announcement was "imminent" that all schools and third-level institutions would not reopen after St Patrick's Day due to the Covid-19 situation.

The Department of Education and Skills is urging all schools to remain calm and to listen to the advice they are given.



"Public health professionals will contact schools if there is any action to be taken. Schools should not take unilateral action. Schools, pre-schools and higher education settings have been provided with advice and guidance in respect of Covid-19," said a spokesperson.

The Department says it is deeply conscious of the significance of decisions concerning school closures, and the potential impact any such decisions would have on parents, families and the wider community.

"This is an evolving situation and the health advice is being updated on a daily basis. The Department of Education and Skills and Department of Health will continue to work closely together on this issue," reads the statement.

Saint Patrick's parade axed as virus spreads

Celebrations: Festival was set to draw thousands to city

LIMERICK'S Saint Patrick's festival has been cancelled due to the outbreak of the coronavirus, it was confirmed on

The move, which comes as a huge blow to city traders, takes place on foot of the spread of the flu-like disease.

It was announced following a meeting of a cabinet sub-committee which is dealing with the Covid-19 situation.

Tens of thousands of people had been expected to attend the Limerick city parade on March 17 while large crowds were also expected to attend the 50th International Band Championship this coming Sunday afternoon.

In a statement, confirming the cancellation of the St Patrick's Festival, a spokesperson for Limerick City and County Council said public health and safety has to be paramount.

We would like to apologise to all the community clubs, community groups and organisations, bands and street theatre entertainers and businesses affected by this decision but we are following the guidelines set down by the government and health officials and acting in the best interests of public health and safety,"

Mayor Michael Sheahan added: "We sincerely regret that we have to cancel this year's parade and band championship but the health and safety of our thousands of participants, visitorsand volunteers is paramount.

"We believe they are the correct $decisions\ based\ on\ the\ current\ situation$ and most recent risk assessment which

considered the volume of visitors expected to Limerick city and the duration of the event."

Dr Pat Daly, the chief executive of Limerick City and County Council, said the decision was not easy.

"Cancellation is not an easy thing to do and this will bring disappointment to many who had been working very hard behind the scenes and were looking forward to marching down O'Connell Street with pride next week, but we have taken this decision due to the possible threat to public health from Covid-19."

Labour councillor Conor Sheehan, who first called for the cancellation of the parades over the weekend has welcomed the move.

However, he feels it doesn't go far

"We don't know how serious this situation is going to be. We don't know how badit's going to get, and I think we're not taking it seriously enough," he said, "Some people thought I was being alarmist making the call. But I wasn't. It is a worsening public health situation."

It is with this in mind the northside $member\,has\,confirmed\,he\,will\,ring\,local$ authority boss Dr Pat Daly requesting the suspension of all council meetings for the next fortnight.

"What I am also looking for is the council to put in place measures so its staff can work at home," he told The Leader.

Some individuals with coronavirus attended Blindboy podcast in Clare

The individuals attended the podcast at the Glór theatre in Ennis, on the night of February 29.

The HSE has subsequently been in touch with those audience members whom they have deemed may be impacted, and have advised on precautionary measures.

In a statement from Glór, a spokesperson said: "Glór can confirm that there were individuals who subsequently tested positive for Covid 19 in attendance at a performance of the Blindboy Podcast which took

place in the venue on Saturday February 29 at 8pm.


"In line with HSE protocol, Glór made immediate contact with health authorities once we were made aware of the situation and shared all relevant information with them.

HSE "The has subsequently been in touch with those audience members whom they have deemed may be impacted, and have advised on precautionary measures.

"Operations at Glór continue as normal after management sought advice from the HSE, additional hygiene measures and handwashing advice are in place at the arts centre, and we ask all our staff and customers to follow HSE guidelines on handwashing and respiratory etiquette. Further information is available on the HSE website.

Blindboy confirmed to the Limerick Leader that he was not one of those told to isolate. "I wasn't considered close contact by any measure. I've to carry on as normal."

Gardai launch probe into online 'abuse' of councillor

Web: City West member calls in gardai as she falls victim to cruel internet bullies

SOCIAL Democrats councillor Elisa O'Donovan says the online abuse she has suffered has become so bad, she's reported it to the gardai.

The City West member confirmed she has reported "professionally damaging" and "targeted" abuse to the law. She says although she has "thick skin," there are limits as to what she can take in terms of commentary online.

"I have started to call it out. There was one comment made a few weeks ago, and I did have to report it to the gardai because I felt I had to. The comments were quite professionally damaging to my career outside the council," she told The Leader.

"I'm fine with people critiquing my work as a councillor. But for people to spread personal things about me is just not nice."

about me is just not nice."

In a lengthy series of Tweets over

the weekend, Cllr O'Donovan, who works as a healthcare professional, wrote: "Earlier this week, I was sent on a thread on an online forum about Limerick which I'm the only politician referenced in. I shouldn't have opened it and read it, but I did. In this thread over many months, I am called unstable [and] a c****".

She was referred to as "a complete crackpot and verging on bipolar".

"It's the most horrible, vicious thing to read about yourself. I have no problem if people have issues with my work as a councillor, please call me out on this, but I am finding it very difficult to hear completely untrue and nasty comments about me since last May. Please stop," Cllr O'Donovan added.

The member, who was first elected last May, believes part of the reason she has fallen victim to internet abusers is because she is a female.

"I don't think a male politician

"It's the most horrible, vicious thing to read about yourself" would get that written about them. On this thread, not one other councillor is mentioned. A lot of it is misogynistic in tone, there's no doubt about it.

"Ithink if I was a man, I don't know if I'd be getting this kind of targeted abuse," she said.

"There needs to be a shift in how we look at women councillors and how they are represented in society."

Previous to this, Cllr O'Donovan said she was used to comments online about her appearance - something she feels has become normalised, and something she is "fine" with.

"Usually people talk about my appearance, which is absolutely fine. You get used to this. I'm a tall woman – when you're a six-foot one woman, you get a lot of comments," she said.

Off the back of her tweets, Cllr O'Donovan did receive support from many quarters, including her own party's co-leader Catherine Murphy.

In a response, she wrote: "Elisa, I know you cannot unread this nonsense but it's important you know so many including myself think you are inspirational. Just keep doing what your doing."

Former Labour TD Jan O'Sullivan added: "Stay strong Elisa, these people are abusive cowards, don't let them occupy any of your head space."

Another Labour councillor Conor Sheehan also reflected on his own experience of being targeted online.

Over the weekend, he felt forced to 'lock' his Twitter account, so only approved followers could see what he posts about.

Despite this ordeal, Cllr O'Donovan says she's not going to change the way she acts.

"It was really nice – people from different political spectrums came to me. It's lovely the support I was given. I am not going to change what I am doing," she concluded. Woodie's

Concerns voiced over build-to-rent model

Housing: Huge development set for Pa Healy Road

A GREEN Party councillor has criticised the number of buy-to-rent apartments in a planned housing development in the city.

City East councillor Sean Hartigan was speaking after members received a presentation of the proposed Pa Healy Road housing development, which could see almost 450 homes constructed along the Canal Bank.

In plans exclusively revealed by our sister newspaper, the Limerick Leader, Revington Developments has sought planning permission to build 442 units, comprising of 363 build-to-rent apartments in a mix of studio, one bedroom and $two\text{-}bedroom\,apartments.$

There will also be 61 student apartments in a mix of two, three and four bedroom apartments, totalling 189 student bed spaces.

And as part of the huge proposal, 18 dwelling homes will be constructed, according to the plans which were shown to members of the metropolitan district this week.

But Cllr Sean Hartigan feels the buy-to-rent element of the plans will lock any young couple out of owning their own home.

"I'd have serious reservations around the build-to-rent scheme," he said, "This will take away people's chances to own their own homes. A site like this is an area where the council should be building public homes."

And he warned that many of the apartments lie idle, with an institutional landlord only letting them out if they can extract the maximum value from them.

Cllr Hartigan also warned that the site is "challenging", as it contains "contaminated soil" and is also a known habitat for otters.

Cllr Kieran O'Hanlon expressed concerns around the traffic on the site, pointing out that vehicle use on the Pa Healy Road is already high.

"Lots of students will also be using the canal and walkway. Unfortunately we are without a cycle-way and footpath," he noted.

Planning official Stephane Duclot said that 10% of the homes will be designated as social housing.


Roadshow to get girls back on bikes

The Christian Evangelist was laid to rest in Mount St Lawrence after removal from Thompson's funeral home this Tuesday afternoon.

The 81-year-old was survived by his wife Myrna, son Jason, and daughter Natasha.

After the Leader broke the sad

news on Monday morning, tributes flowed in for Frank. He was a little part of every sporting fan.

Originally from Borrisokane he made his home in Castletroy and over the last three decades he followed Limerick through the good times and

Sadly as his health failed in recent years, Frank was not able to attend the All-Ireland final between Limerick and Galway in 2018.

Prior to his John 3:7 sign, Frank had a John 3:16 sign. John Cregan, chairman of Limerick GAA, said wasn't it ironic that Limerick scored 3-16 in that game.

John 3:16 states: "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal

That All-Ireland final win did give eternal life to so many.

Mr Cregan said as long as he is going to matches he can "vividly remember seeing Frank and noticing him on the train because he had the big long placard with him".

You would always see him. He persisted. Some of these things come and go but he was a constant. He persisted in spreading his message in a very novel kind of way," said Mr Cregan, who on behalf of Limerick GAA expressed his sympathies to the $Hogan\,family.$

"He was somebody who was always there. He always managed to get that shot on camera. Even if you weren't at a game you would see him because he was always picked out from the crowd. He obviously believed very much in spreading his message.

"It was an ideal way of doing it, travelling the length and breadth of the country. From our point of view he was quite an iconic figure, standing with his placard all of the time. It is sad that Frank has passed to his eternal reward but he will be fondly remembered by everybody in Limerick GAA and, indeed, the wider sporting community throughout the country," said Mr Cregan.

Frank's memory was honoured at the monthly Limerick GAA County Board meeting on Tuesday night. In a moving graveside oration, his

long-time friend Gerry Nugent said: "Frank Hogan, a husband, a father, a brother, and for many years a loyal servant of his Lord and saviour Jesus Christ has gone home to heaven and is in God's wonderful presence right

Woman 'seriously assaulted'

INVESTIGATIONS are continuing following what has been a described as a "serious assault" in the city centre at the weekend.

While gardai have not released any specific details of what is alleged to have happened, they have confirmed they are investigating claims that a woman was assaulted in the early hours of Sunday morning.

There was a garda presence at either end of a laneway connecting Michael Street and St Michael's Court near Watergate on Sunday as gardai carried out inquiries in the area.

The area was also cordoned off for a time with public access being restricted to facilitate forensic examinations by members of the divisional scenes of crime unit.

"Gardaí are investigating an alleged serious assault of a female that occurred in Limerick city in the early hours of Sunday morning, March 8, 2020. No arrests have been made at this time and investigations are continuing," said a spokesperson for the Garda Press Office in statement which was emailed to The Leader.

Having been alerted to the incident, a number of people who live in the area took to social media to express their shock at

what happened.

"It's scary," posted one woman while another stated that what happened was terrible.

It's not known if the woman, whose aged has not been released, required medical treatment and the nature of her alleged injuries has not been disclosed.

However, there is no suggestion that her condition is life-threatening.

Man arrested after €45k drugs seizure

Gardaí have arrested a man in his 50s and seized €45,100 of suspected drugs in the Moyross area of Limerick on Monday evening.

As part of an ongoing operation targeting the sale and supply of drugs in Limerick city, Gardaí from the divisional drugs unit in Limerick, assisted by the armed support unit, executed a search warrant at a house in Moyross shortly after 7.3 opm.

During the course of the search Gardaí seized €42,000 of suspected heroin and €3,100 of tablets believed to be alprazolam.

Mobile phones, bags and a weighing scales were also seized. The suspected drugs will now be sent for analysis.

A man in his 50s was arrested at the scene and brought to Henry Street Garda Station.

He is currently detained under Section 2 of the Criminal Justice (Drug Trafficking) Act, 1996.

'Children getting lost in potholes'

SOME of the potholes in a northside community are in such a bad state "children are getting lost in them". This claim was made, only half-jokingly, by Sinn Fein councillor John Costelloe, who is furious about the craters in Ballynanty and its surrounding areas.

During a discussion on the schedule of works for the city in the next 12 months, Cllr Costelloe urged the fixing of potholes.

He said: "Some of the craters are in such a bad condition, children are getting lost inside of them, they are so big. People are paying road tax and the Local Property Tax and are not getting a proper service. It doesn't matter if it's Caherconlish, Ballynanty, Moyross or Thomondgate, a pothole's a pothole. They need to be dug up and filled in properly, not to have litigation against the council. There should be a thing so they are addressed immediately."

In response, council

official Hugh McGrath said a new machine is to be brought on stream soon, with members set to get a sneak preview.

He said it will be a "one stop shop" in the filling of potholes. But Cllr Costelloe urged care, saying: "Some of the holes need to be properly resurfaced, not just a quick barrel of stuff here, and barrel of stuff there. Whatever material is used in some communities, it's very poor. It feels like the roads haven't been relaid since the homes were built in the 1950s."

Fine Gael councillor Sarah Kiely said at times, you need an SUV or Land Rover to drive through the Carey's Road.

"At the moment, you can go down with a bucket and spade and start digging," she said. Council official Kieran Lehane said he'd look into it

Burglar fled after being found in hallway of home

Community service for abusing gardai

Intoxicated: Alcohol and drugs were consumed

A MAN who was aggressive and abusive towards gardai during an incident near his home has been told he will avoid a prison sentence if he completes 80 hours of community

Bobby Moran, 31, who has an address at Johnsgate Village, pleaded guilty, at Limerick District Court, to a number of public order offences relating to an incident on March 11,

These include engaging in threatening or abusive behaviour and refusing to obey the direction of

Inspector Padraig Sutton told Judge Marian O'Leary that gardai were in the area when the defendant approached them.

He said he became aggressive and

abusive towards gardai and that he subsequently resisted arrest. "He was extremely intoxicated at

the time. He was threatening and abusive," he said. Mr Moran, the court heard, has

more than 70 previous convictions including one for escaping lawful custody last July. Judge O'Leary was told the

incident occurred less than a year after Mr Moran received a suspended three month prison sentence in relation to a separate public order

Seeking leniency on behalf of his client, solicitor Tom Kiely said he had consumed both drugs and alcohol on the night and that he wished to apologise for his actions which, he accepts, were unacceptable.

"He was heavily intoxicated," he said adding that the defendant spent a number of months in custody following the incident. He also told the court that he previously pleaded guilty to charges relating to other incidents which occurred around the same time.

After being informed that Mr Moran is a suitable candidate to carry out community service, Judge O'Leary directed that the complete 80 hours in lieu of a three month

The community service, which will be overseen by the Probation Service, must be completed within 12

Used forged prescription to obtain drugs

A YOUNG man has admitted using forged prescriptions to obtain high-powered painkillers from a number of pharmacies in Limerick, writes David Hurley.

Tomaz Uliasz, 24, who has an address at Bruachlan, Westbury, Corbally pleaded guilty, at Limerick District Court, to a number of charges relating to offences which happened on dates between May and

After he entered his plea, Judge

Mary Larkin was told the defendant, who had been

prescribed Oxynorm following a road accident a number of years ago, had copied the original prescription which was written by a doctor in

He then presented copies of the prescription at a number of different pharmacies in Limerick city to obtain various quantities of

Solicitor Tom Kiely said there is a

"sensitive background" to the matter and he submitted the court would benefit from a probation report before sentence is imposed.

Sergeant Michelle Leahy said told another individual is also before the courts in relation to the offences and that it is the State case that she was operating in "joint enterprise" with Mr Uliasz.

Judge Larkin adjourned the matter to May to facilitate the preparation of a probation report.

Anger after giant flag burnt outside school

Match incident: Principal says it is public order issue for gardai

RIVALRY between two city schools went too far when a massive flag was taken from near Thomond Park and allegedly burnt by supporters of St Munchin's College outside Ardscoil Ris, before Wednesdays big rugby junior cup semi-final in Thomond

"I put up this massive sign 20 foot by 10 foot at Hassetts Cross at 6.15am on the morning of the match. It was in the schools (Ardscoil Ris) colours and just said Believe," explained David Crowe, father of Eavan who was playing scrum-half for Ardscoil. He said that he was told prior to the game that the flag was taken by supporters of St Munchin's who took it up outside Ardscoil.

"One of the teachers rang me and told me they brought it up to the school and burnt it there outside

using a flare," said Mr Crowe. He said that they burnt the flag as the Ardscoil team were getting on a bus to go to the ground.

The Munchin's supporters destroyed my inspirational sign as a tool to intimidate the players getting onto the bus at Ardscoil Ris as they were going to play in the semi-final,"

he added.

Asked if he had reported it to the gardai, he said: "I have not yet, I have the number plates of the car, but I don't want to ruin the career of some young lad, but what happened was wrong." Mr Crowe was at this stage near the grounds and approached some workmen at Hassetts Cross, and asked them if they had seen anyone take the flag.

They told me they had, and pointed to these guys in a car. I went $over\,to\,them\,and\,I\,asked\,them\,about$ the flag," he explained.

He said that he took a photo of the number plate of the car..."then this guy lunged at me and tried to take my phone. They surrounded me," he said.

David Quilter, principal of St Munchin's College, said that he spoke to the parent who made the complaint about the flag. "We would not condone in any way what happened and we would consider this a Public Order Offence and something that would need to be dealt with by the gardai." He said that there was a very good relationship between both schools and they would cooperate with any Garda investigation. "Inside the ground there was a great atmosphere and the game was played in great spirit," he added.

First public women's caucus in Limerick

Cllr Kiely added: "When you put your name on a ballot paper, for that period, for that election-time, you are public property. The media can be harsh towards women. We are all human at the end of the day. We are not here because we are women or men, we are here because want to represent people."

And Cllr O'Sullivan said the tide can quickly change

"It can change very quickly from being, oh my goodness, you're one of the few women doing this to you're one of that useless shower of councillors now," she explained.

Save money by making your mortgage green

INCE December '19, two banks, AIB and BOI have launched green Omortgage products, and they are mortgages which offer lower interest rates, if a properties energy ratings are an A3 or better.

The reasoning behind the product is to encourage people to become more energy efficient by rewarding them with a lower interest rate.

A BER (building energy rating) rating is an indication of what the energy performance of your home is. And the calculation is based on the energy used to heat your home, water, ventilation and lighting, levels of carbon dioxide emissions from your home, number of people living in the property etc.

The rating goes from A to G, with A1 being the best rating you can get, and G rated houses having the worst energy

efficient rating.
One of the institutions who are offering this discount is Bank of Ireland, and if you qualify, you can reduce any fixed rate product between one and ten years by 0.2%, but it only applies to people who are buying or building a property for themselves, and those buying a property for investment. In both instances the mortgage has to be drawn down by the June 30 next.

It doesn't apply to existing mortgage holders, unless they are borrowing additional monies which will be used specifically to achieve a BER rating of A3 or better. The 0.2% discount is only granted on the new monies borrowed, and not on any existing mortgages secure on the property.

The discount only lasts for as long as the fixed rate chosen i.e. after the fixed rate period expires, you revert to what their variable or fixed rates are, without any further discount applying.

So, what does this discount mean in Euros' and cents.

BOI's current standard 5 year fixed rate is 3%, which means you can turn it

If you borrowed, for example €300,000 over a 25 year term, rather than paying €1,422.63 per month, you'll pay €1,391.62, which is a saving of €31.01. And over 5 years, the saving amounts to €1,860.60.

Before I tell you more about AIB's green mortgage and how you get your properties energy rating assessed and what it will cost, I want to make quick reference to BOI's offering for first time buyers, because it's very good, and I say that for three reasons.

First off, if they are buying a new

property, under regulations that came into effect in November last year, the energy rating of a new build has to be A2. So, if they were choosing a fixed rate, they can request that their mortgage is set up as a green one and avail of that 0.2% discount.

My second reason is when people are saving for their 10% contribution, if they save into BOI's mortgage saver account, and save continuously for 6 months' at a minimum rate of €250 per month and a maximum of €2,500, and have €5,000 in this account when they come to drawdown their mortgage, they will be awarded a bonus payment of €2,000.

 $FTB's \ are \ always \ asking \ meif there$ is a particular account, they could save into so they could get a decent return, and my answer is always no, not if they want to save into capital guaranteed accounts which is the type of account they should save into. But with this account and the bonus payment it gives, you're effectively getting a guaranteed return of 45%, because if you wanted to turn €5,000 into €7,000, that's the net return you'd need to

And finally, if a, FTB uses BOI for their mortgage, they will qualify for

The process of moving to this green 2.45% fixed rate is very simple

their 3% cashback offer. 2% on drawdown and 1% in 5 years' time.

From a monetary perspective, what these three offerings mean to a, FTB borrowing €300,000 over a 25 year term, with the first 5 years' fixed is as

Mortgage repayment reduced by green discount (0.2%) = €1,860.60

Mortgage saver, bonus payment =

Cash back = €9,000.

Total = €12,860.60

The only drawback to the above is you have to use BOI for your mortgage, but if you were going to anyway, then I would certainly take advantage of these bonus payments and monthly repayment discounts.

Okay, back to green mortgage's and

AIB's offering.
They are offering a discount of
0.10% but it only applies to their 5 year
fixed offering. Which means if you wanted to avail of AIB's green mortgage discount, you have to choose a 5 year fixed rate and the rate they'll will offer you is 2.45%, which is excellent by the

This offering doesn't just apply to first time buyers, any existing client of AIB's can avail of it provided their primary residence has a BER energy rating between A1 and B3 and they have more than 5 years' left on their existing mortgage.

The process of moving to this green 2.45% fixed rate is very simple. You need to complete and sign a mortgage amendment form and return it to AIB along with a copy of your BER certificate, that's it.

If you don't know what your properties energy rating is, the first thing you need to do is go to the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland's website www.seai.ie who have a list of BER assessors in your area. Contact a couple of them, and get a quote, because there is no set fee. I'd expect it's going to cost you somewhere between €150 and €300. The type and size of your property influences the cost. The SEAI also provide a grant of €50 which can be used towards the cost for homeowners who are applying for it for the first time.

If, for example, your property has an energy rating D, is it worth the investment of improving it to an A. And the answer is yes, even with no impact on reducing mortgage repayments, because according to the SEAI, you would reduce energy bills on a typical 3-bed semi-detached property by €1,500 every year.

ASK LIAM

Our personal finance expert answers your questions ...

Q. Liam, every month I still get a payment into my account which is Mortgage TRS. I use it to help with my repayments. I'm not sure how long I will continue to get this for. Any ideas?

A. You're going to have to plan on making your repayments without the assistance of this payment because it will stop at the end of this year.

The payment was actually due to finish at the end of 2017 but was extended for a further three years.

In order to qualify for this continued payment, you would have to have taken out a mortgage which was used to buy your primary residence between the January 1 in 2004 and December 31 in 2012.

And if you bought a property (your family home) for the first time between 2004 and 2008, you'd also qualify for this payment until the end of the year as well.

The amount you're in receipt of will depend on when you bought your property and whether you were a first or second time buyer. If you bought between 2004 and 2008, your mortgage interest relief is calculated at 30% of the amount of interest you'll pay this year. So, for example let's, assume the amount of interest you pay this year is €2,500, you will get 30% of this i.e. €750 and €62.50 will be either credited to your account each month or your mortgage repayments are reduced by this amount.

If you're a first time buyer and took out a mortgage between January '04 and December '12, relief is calculated at 20% up to a ceiling of €2,500 if you're single and €5,000 if you're married. Which means the maximum you are allowed receive each month is €41.67 for a singe person and €83.33 for a couple who are married or in a civil partnership. For non-first time buyers,

the rate of relief paid is 15% with the ceiling set at €750 for a single person and €1,500 if you're married or in a civil partnership.

'Businesses won't survive this outbreak'

Coronavirus: Call to support local companies facing into tough period

A CALL has been made to support local businesses left facing difficult weeks due to the outbreak of the coronavirus.

With the number of cases of the flu-like disease on the rise, leading to the cancellation of Limerick's St Patrick's Day events, hospitality firms across the city in particular are set to be counting the cost.

"Some of them won't survive this," was the stark warning from Helen O'Donnell, who runs the cafe at the Hunt Museum.

Already, she has seen a party of 60 people booked in for this Wednesday lunchtime cancel.

"It's very difficult," she said, "If people are thinking of supporting local businesses, if they can, it's very important they do this. Business won't survive this, and that's unfortunately the bottom line."

With people concerned about eating out, Ms O'Donnell has started offering food to take away in tin foil.

Elsewhere, publicans are set to be out of pocket this weekend following the cancellation of the Six Nations rugby tie between Ireland and France.

But after the city's St Patrick's Day parade was axed, it remains to be seen whether people will congregate around bars, or stay at home next Tuesday, a public holiday.

Fianna Fail councillor Jerry O'Dea, the local representative of the Vintners Federation of Ireland, says he has upped safety measures in his Mulgrave Street

"We have to take it seriously as a business. It's clear there will be more cases announced in the coming days. It's very worrying for older people, and those who have underlying conditions, he told Leader Business.

People are being careful of shaking hands, and we are encouraging people to be respectful of others, not to hug people, that kind of thing," said Cllr

"We are also respecting the metre of

between space customers ourselves," he added.

Arguably the real losers from the shelving of the parade - which would normally draw tens of thousands to the city centre - are local retailers.

James Ryan, who runs Centra branches in O'Connell Street and William Street, hopes the council can perhaps recreate the St Patrick's festival in the autumn when, it's hoped the worst of the coronavirus has passed.

"I know people are erring on the side of caution, but it's a pity to see an event like St Patrick's Day cancelled. You'd love to see an alternative plan.

"For example, let's create a unique St Patrick's festival in October," he

We should do something different to make sure we can capitalise on a good event at another time," he explained.

Like other retailers, he hasn't been able to source hand sanitiser.

"It wasn't an overly popular product - it is now," he exclaimed.

Council to lobby on Arise

MEMBERS of Limerick's metropolitan district are to write to the new Enterprise Minister when they are appointed over the closure of a call centre in Raheen.

At this month's metropolitan meeting, Labour councillor Conor Sheehan proposed the letter asking them to intervene in relation to the job cuts there.

He said new business must be found for the Arise call centre, which is to fully close down this summer with the loss of 140 jobs.

The move has come about due to the decision by Vodafone not to renew its contract with the centre.

Cllr Sheehan said: "The vast majority of these workers are low paid working slightly above the minimum wage. We need to see if we can secure alternative contracts for this

Flat and Green cafe, signage suggests, is coming soon to the site.

Although, the development may still be some time away, given the fact the unit is still to be fitted out for a cafe, and a planning application has yet to be made for the development.

Despite this, the news has been welcomed by Limerick City West Social councillor, **Democrats** O'Donovan.

She said: "I'm really delighted. I think it's great. It will mean a lot more people are going into the building. A lot of the 2030 plans have been in relation to office space.

Previously, prominent former city developer Robert Butler had sought to develop office accommodation on that

Project Opera, in Patrick Street was given the go-ahead last month.

It's hoped this will create 3,000 new jobs in total.

Put your best skin forward

What time do you get up?

I normally get up about 6:30, the kettle goes straight on and I start into some admin work for an hour or so, so at least I feel I've a head start on the day.

What is your normal breakfast?

I usually have fruit and yogurt, but if I know I won't have time for a lunch break that day, I will normally have some sort of protein breakfast such as eggs and spinach.

Do you go for a walk or to the gym before/after the office?

What time do you finish up at? I tend to finish up between 6

Some of my formal training as a clinical psychologist was focused on deficits, disorders and when things go seriously wrong where there is harm or hurt to self and others.

What a contrast. I believe for change to happen we need to embrace strengths, resilience and resources. Additionally I believe we need to be scientific in this endeavour.

So I am happy to be called the Positive Psychologist based on the

Drawing on an evidence-based psychology allows us to more confidently use these tools to get the desired outcome of a life filled with meaning and engagement.

Let's look at some of the key areas that you can use to make change straight away.

The Power of Connection

You don't have to look that far. It's not about new people it's about connecting with the people around you. With family, friends, colleagues and neighbours. At home, work, school or in your local community.

In Ireland we are blessed with GAA, soccer, rugby sporting, church and civil society groups who all seek help and support. They are all made up with people. Think of these as the cornerstones of your life and invest time in developing them.

Building these connections will help support and enrich you every day. The bottom line is that relationships are the most important overall contributor to happiness. 
We don't all need to run marathons - there are simple things we can all do to be more

This is a great opportunity to walk, develop friendships, give, learn and help cure and control cystic fibrosis.



It's better to have a series of shorter talks over time than to overwhelm your child with information

Talking to your children about coronavirus

IF you keep checking your phone for the latest coronavirus updates, chances are your kids have noticed. Parents should be ready to answer kids' questions about coronavirus. If they don't seem interested or don't ask a lot of questions, that's OK too. Just follow their lead. Here's how to help kids understand the news about coronavirus.

1. Choose the Right Time to Talk

Try to avoid distractions. Is there a time each day when you check in with your child and ask how their day is going? Maybe it's on the way to music practice or after childcare pickup. If it's a time when you and your child can focus, use it to talk about coronavirus. But try not to have the conversation too late in the day. You don't want your

kids lying awake at night feeling

2. Find Out What Your Child

Already Knows
Ask questions geared to your child's age level. For older kids, you might ask, "Are people in school talking about coronavirus? What are they saying?" For younger children, you could say, "Have you heard grownups talking about a new sickness that's going around?" This gives you a chance to learn how much kids know - and to find out if they're hearing the wrong information.

Let your child guide the conversation. Be prepared for kids to ask questions, but don't offer information before they ask. It's better to have a series of shorter

talks over time than to overwhelm your child with information.

3. Offer Comfort - and Honesty

Focus on helping your child feel safe, but be truthful. Don't offer more detail than your child is interested in. For example, if kids ask about school closings, address their questions. But if the topic doesn't come up, there's no need to raise it unless it happens.

If your child asks about something and you don't know the answer, say so. Use the question as a chance to find out together. Check www.hse.ie for up-to-date, reliable information about coronavirus. That way, you have the facts and kids don't see headlines about deaths and other scary information.

Speak calmly and reassuringly. Explain that most people who get sick feel like they have a cold or the flu. Kids pick up on it when parents worry. So when you talk about coronavirus and the news, use a calm voice and try not to seem

Give kids space to share their fears. It's natural for kids to worry, "Could I be next? Could that happen to me?" Let your child know that kids don't seem to get as sick as adults. Let them know they can always come to you for answers or to talk about what scares them.

Know when they need guidance. Be aware of how your kids get news and information, especially older kids who go online. Point them to age-appropriate content so they don't end up finding news shows or outlets that scare them or have incorrect information.

4. Help Kids Feel in Control

Give your child specific things they can do to feel in control. Teach kids that getting lots of sleep and washing their hands well and often can help them stay strong and well. Explain that regular hand washing also helps stop viruses from spreading to others. Be a good role model and let your kids see you washing your hands often!

Talk about all the things that are happening to keep people safe and

healthy. Young kids might be reassured to know that hospitals and doctors are prepared to treat people who get sick. Older kids might be comforted to know that scientists are working to develop a vaccine. These talks also prepare kids for changes in their normal routine if schools or childcare services close in the future.

Put news stories in context. If they ask, explain that death from the virus is still rare, despite what they might hear. For older kids, watch the news with your kids so you can filter what they hear.

Kids and teens often worry more about family and friends than themselves. For example, if kids hear that older people are more likely to be seriously ill, they might worry about their grandparents. Letting them call or Skype with older relatives can help them feel reassured about loved

Let your kids know that it's normal to feel stressed out at times. Everyone does. Recognising these feelings and knowing that stressful times pass and life gets back to normal can help children build resilience.




Importance of switching

ARCH 6 was the National Unplug day ⊥in the US, encouraging people to turn off their electric appliances and phones and re-connect with others. 
deep sleep, between the hours of 11pm to 3am.

Peugeot launches electrified range

PEUGEOT Ireland has launched a number of cars under its extensive electrification programme which includes hybrid, plug-in hybrid and the brand's first fully electric car.

Peugeot took a large cohort of motoring journalists to BrookLodge Hotel at Aughrim, Co Wicklow to test drive the new 208, 2008 SUV, together with the new e-208, 3008 Hybrid4 (AWD) and 508 Hybrid range. It proved a busy two days of motoring.

days of motoring.

First up was the stylish 208 which we drove from Peugeot HQ at Gowan House on the Naas Road in Dublin to our hotel in Macreddin Village and returned to Dublin in the new 508.

In between we fitted in a local loop from the hotel to Aughrim in the hybrids and the new e-208, the brand's first electric car. It retails from €27,334, inclusive of SEAI grant and VRT relief, and comes with a 100KW (136hp) electric unit with 50kWh battery developing 260Nm of torque for instant response. It can do 0-100km/hin 8.1 secs and has a range of 340kms. The battery is guaranteed for 8 years or 160,000 for up to 70pc retention certifiable by the Peugeot dealer network. The has the same interior and boot space as the petrol and

diesel versions as the batteries are under the floor. The e-208 is the only electric car in its segment which includes Polo, Yaris, Fiesta, i20, Micra and Clio.

The new 2008 really impressed. It is one of the most stylish cars on the road as well as being extremely spacious. Prices start at €23,900 for the 1.2 PureTech 100bhp. There are also 130bhp/155bhp petrols; the diesel is a 1.5 BlueHDi 100bhp from €25,900. The brand's excellent Grip Control is offered and Peugeot have kept a spare wheel in all their passenger cars, except for EV models. An electrified 2008 is due in April with a range of 320kms WITP

Built on Peugeot's EMP2 platform which is designed for both ICE and electrified powertrains, means boot volumes of the 208 and 2008 are the same as the ICE versions (487 litres for the 508 and 530 litres for the SW). New driving modes are a Zero Emission 100pc electric mode; an exhilarating Sport mode; a Hybrid mode; and Comfort mode.

The Hybrid4 version of the 3008 and 508 ranges have passed stringent certifications tests under the new WLTP protocol and qualify for the newly calculated grant thresholds now applicable; under new rules, plug-in hybrids must now emit less than 50g/km Co2 and

travel more than 50km in all-electric model to qualify for the €5,000 SEAI grant and €2,500 VRT relief schemes. The 3008 2.0 180bhp automatic is from €42,250, the PHEV 225hp is from €37,995. The 508 2.0 180hp is from €38,100 and the PHEV 225hp is €38,900. Both include SEAI and VRT grants and rebates.

The SUV 3008 Hybrid4 300bhp AWD model, available in the top of the range GT Line and GT trims, achieves 29g/km Co2 (1.3 L/100kms) and a 59km range in 100pc electric mode. It combines a 200hp PureTech petrol engine with two electric motors and can do from 0-100km/h in 5.9 secs. The battery capacity is 13.2kWh for a 100pc electric range. A full charge takes 1h45 when using a Wallbox. AWD mode provides improved traction on roads or difficult terrain.

In April, it will be joined by a 225bhp 2WD Hybrid version combining a 180hp petrol engine with a 110hp (80kW) electric motor located at the front of the car coupled to the e-EAT8 8-speed automatic gearbox.

The 508 fastback achieves 29g Co₂/km and 54km in all-electric mode.

The new 508 Hybrid and SW estate Hybrid combine a 180bhp petrol engine with a 110bhp (80kW) electric motor for a combined power of 225bhp. Charging also takes 1h45 with a

Wallbox (optional 6.6 kW charger, 32A).

An eBoxer LCV will arrive mid this year and an ePartner/eRifter will follow next year.

By 2023, 100pc of the Peugeot passenger car and light commercial vehicles range will offer an electrified version.

Commenting on the brand's performance, Colin Sheridan, Peugeot's Sales & Marketing Director said: "Yesterday we were at 81.6pc of the market, today we're operating at 100pc."

Speaking on electric car sales and the confusion among the general public concerning them, he said: "The Government needs to give us clarity re the extension of both EV and PHEV grants going forward; on how it intends to treat the taxation on cars when the full WLTP regime comes into force at the end of this year because we will need to make decisions on model allocations."

allocations."

He also said that the last Budget, which removed SEAI grants to companies for electric cars, has proved counter productive and quoted sales figures for electric cars year-to-date of just + 100 units (1,084 vs 984 / +10.16pc) to 20/02/2020 which he said should have been higher.



MUNSTER Rugby is facing the prospect of not playing a competitive fixture for at least five weeks with confirmation that the fixture against Benetton Rugby that was due to take place in Musgrave Park on Friday, March 27 has been postponed.

Guinness PRO14 confirmed that all Round 14 and 15 fixtures involving Benetton Rugby and Zebre have now been postponed due to restrictions enforced by the Italian government that will prevent the teams from travelling.

Munster's scheduled PRO14 tie against Benetton Rugby at Stadio Monigo on Saturday, March 21 had earlier been postponed due to fears over the spread of the coronavirus.

The Munster squad, who returned to training at their High Performance Centre in UL on Tuesday, last played a competitive fixture on Saturday, February 29.

Should either of Munster's postponed fixtures with Benetton Rugby not be refixed for April 3-4, the weekend of the Champions Cup quarter-finals, then Munster are not due to play again until Saturday, April 11 when Cardiff Blues are due to visit. Thomond Park

Meanwhile, Munster have also confirmed that prop Dave Kilcoyne and hooker Kevin O'Byrne have signed contract extensions with the province.

Kilcoyne has signed a three-year extension with the province, while O'Byrne has penned a two-year deal.

On the club front, the Energia All-Ireland League is due to resume this weekend.

In Division 1A, second-placed Garryowen will look to get back to winning ways after their derby defeat to Young Munster, when travelling to Ballymacarn Park this Saturday to face basement side Ballynahinch.

Is Rugby in danger of losing its unique selling point?

uring an interview process you will often be asked about your strengths and weaknesses as well as your 'unique selling point' or 'point of difference'

This is something you can be proud of, something you can laud over others and set yourself apart from the crowd.

Rugby Union has several unique selling points, may of which are alien to fans of other sports.

Clapping opponents off the field in a tunnel format, silence for kickers and scrums, to name just a few.

One of the most stand out differences however has always been the relationship between players and the referee.

Not only is it a unique selling point, rugby fans would have you believe that it is 'the' unique selling point. Lording it over every other sport and even to the point where they will constantly remind those looking on that this is 'not soccer'

Rugby referees the World over enjoy a safety net of respect. One that comes with years of tradition and values of the game.

A referee, at any level, can walk on to the field and know he will get the respect his position deserves. Contrary to my 'forward orientated' friends who believe you cannot play rugby without the big men, you can't play anything without a referee.

The man in the middle has more often than not received the respect his position deserves on the rugby field, more than any other sport.

However, that respect was built on a two way street. The referee was front and centre in terms of being open to chatting with the captain and vice versa.

In the last number of seasons however, this tradition is being eroded. The 'art' of being a captain is becoming less and less important.

The advent of 'ref mics' has only highlighted the amount of opinions being given to the referee at any one time. Too many.

Munster fans will remember, not so fondly, the interactions between Paul O'Connell and Romain Poite over the years, which by the end were more one sided than a conversation.

The same can be said for last weekend as Alun Wyn Jones so articulately put it in his post match



press conference.

"I've got 138 Tests for my country. If I react, I get a red card. It's tough, isn't it? Hopefully World Rugby have a look at it. Joe's a good bloke, lots of things happen on a rugby field.

"It's difficult as a captain these days because you can't speak to a ref about anything, it feels. There's a lot of footage that has been shown, it seems like a lot of supporters saw what happened. It's very frustrating that we talk a lot about TMOs and footage reviews, yet there doesn't seem to be a lot of it happening."

The key line there is the line about the referee. Jones, who had his genitalia grabbed by another player, felt he couldn't talk to the referee. That should be a watershed moment for rugby.

Already you can see some of the more 'vocal' players are being named captain, in a round about way of allowing them to voice their opinions, but the referees need to play ball too.

Too often we hear over the commentary, 'get back, get back' as the referee dismisses the captain.

We have seen over the years (Conor Murray) that some of the players are more in tune with the laws than others and they can often spot a referee error before others, even the referee can.

Rugby's unique selling point is in danger of being lost. The respect on the field, like respect in all walks of life, is a two way street.

Rugby is trying to fix new issues arising from CVC money, paywalls and tackle height, but they must not forget the age old policies which made it different to begin with.

Perish the thought but could coronavirus scupper the GAA championship?

HE Sunday newspaper headline looks to be a real game changer for Irish sport. Irish health authorities predict 1.9 million people will fall ill with coronavirus' - screamed the headline on the front of the Sunday Business Post.

The startling headline is enough to stop anyone in their tracks. It amounts to 40% of the Irish population contacting coronavirus.

Lest newspapers be accused of scare-mongering or exaggeration, the Health Service Executive later tin the day said that it cannot dispute those projections.

It's important to remember that the vast majority of Covid-19 cases are mild and people make a full recovery.

Expects say around 80% of cases of Covid-19 are a mild to moderate illness, close to 14% have severe disease and around 6% are critical.

In the face of the current global threat to human health, it might seem somewhat trivial to be contemplating what the impact might be on sport in Ireland in the coming weeks and months.

However, for



many, sport provides an escape from the concerns people fretting over what impact the coronavirus potentially will have on their health, their work duties and the economy as a

At this stage, the chances of major sporting events in Ireland not be impacted in a big way in the coming months look slim.

What will happen in the case of big GAA championship games, scheduled to start in just over two months time?

Tens of thousands of people are due to attend the big provincial championship fixtures

Generally, you need to be 15 minutes or more in the vicinity

of an person infected with coronavirus, within 1-2 metres, to be considered at-risk or a close contact.

Obviously at 70-minute long championship games the distance between spectators is smaller than that.

Could the GAA championship be postponed for 2020? It seems like a real possibility, unfortunately, as we have seen from the major disruption to Italian sport in recent weeks.

It would be hard to see major GAA fixtures being played behind closed doors. A summer without the GAA championship in Ireland would be hard to contemplate.




