Bridgewater House reopens for asylum seekers

As asylum seekers and refugees direct provision centres around the country are reaching capacity, the decision was made to reopen Bridgewater House which had operated as a direct provision residential centre for 15 years prior to 2016.

A spokesperson for Bridgewater House said that the return of asylum seekers to Carrick-on-Suir will greatly benefit businesses in the town and hinterland as regular orders for food and related services to the residential centre will continue.

Asylum seekers and their children based in Bridgewater House enjoyed a festive visit from Santa over Christmas. They were delighted with the hospitality shown to them, and the young children gathered with their presents for photos with Santa.

Local Electoral Area Boundary Committees invite submissions

Mr John Paul Phelan T.D., the Minister of State for Local Government and Electoral Reform has established two committees to review local electoral areas and to report to him within six months. The Committees' reports will be considered by the Minister as the basis for the revision of local electoral areas under his statutory powers.

The Committees are tasked with making recommendations on the division of council areas into local electoral areas and on the number of members of council to be assigned to each such local electoral area.

The review of local electoral areas is being undertaken in prospect of the local elections to be held in 2019. The Committees will have regard to the results of Census 2016. The policy objectives of the review are to reduce the size of territorially large local electoral areas and to designate urban-focused local electoral areas around the larger towns.

Committee No. 1 will report and make recommendations on every county, other than Cork, Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown, Fingal, Galway and South Dublin and on Limerick City and County and Waterford City and County. For these Councils the number of councillors will be no less than 5 and no more than 7 for each local electoral area, provided that in particular compelling circumstances 3 or 4 seat local electoral areas may be recommended, where otherwise the geographic size of the area would be disproportionately large.

Committee No. 2 will report and make recommendations on Dublin City and the counties of Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown, Fingal and South Dublin. For these Councils the number of councillors will be no less than 5 and no more than 7 for each local electoral area.

Committee No. 2 may also be asked to make recommendations on the division of Cork and Galway into local electoral areas, in due course.

The Committees now invite submissions on the matters referred to above.

Training skills and gap report launched

Months of research, analysis and debate came together in the Anner Hotel, Thurles on Thursday evening, with the official launch by the LEO and ETB of their training and skills gap report.

The report, entitled "Analysis of the Education, Training and Business Support Needs of Companies in County Tipperary" provided a detailed review of employee training and education gaps in the County. The event was attended by over 100 local businesses and agency representatives.

The report was commissioned jointly by the Tip-perary Local Enterprise Office and the Tipperary Education & Training Board. The appointed research agency, Marla Communications, engaged directly with 110 Tipperary companies to identify their challenges, concerns and gaps in the areas of employee training, skills and education. The research focused mainly on companies with over 10 employees, and spanned a wide spectrum of business sectors including manufacturing, tourism, retail and customer services.

Officially launching the report, Roger Kennedy, Leas Cathaoirleach of Tipperary County Council, applauded the local agencies for their initiative in taking this research forward, highlighting the value the insights now bring to all employers and agencies in the County; speaking of access to avail-able and skilled employees, he added "Tipperary has a working population of 700,000 within an hour's commute, and we are within an hour of nine leading 3rd

level colleges. Continuous monitoring of training and development needs is essential to ensure we have an adequate supply of skilled people to meet present and future needs".

Councillor John Hogan, Chairperson of Tipperary Education and Training Board, acted as Master of Ceremonies on the night, introducing those directly involved in the research initiative, including Rita Guinan, Head of Enterprise at the LEO, Eileen Condon, Director of Further Education and Training and Sheila Gallogly, Managing Director of Márla Communications.

'It was an absolute pleasure to call you my brother'

The life of a Clonmel man who battled cystic fibrosis was celebrated at St. Mary's Church in Irishtown on Friday 12th January.

'Courageous and generous' Kieran Hickey was the fourth member of his family to pass away from the genetic disorder, survived by parents Michael and Bridie, brother Michael, sister in law Marie, nephews Brian and Ciaran, niece Ailish, aunts, uncles, cousins and friends.

Kieran's brother Michael paid an emotional tribute to the late 44-year-old, while fondly remembering siblings Kay, Brian and Laois who also passed away to cystic fibrosis.

"We have been close to this a few times over the years, but time after time Kieran completely baffled his medical team in Dublin with his determination and incredible strength in which he possessed," Michael told mourners.

"Kieran fought like crazy to stay with us, and even though he won many battles over the years he was written off on a regular basis. Unfortunately, cystic fibrosis finally won the war. During his most recent 14 week stay in hospital we were told on four occasions that he was finished, but he wasn't and on three of them anyway he managed to fight back to where we really thought he was out of the woods and that he would come back home to us. Obviously the fourth time they got it right, and to be honest I reckon he was feeling sorry for the doctors at that stage and didn't want to keep making them look bad.

"While it's a very sad day for us we cannot begrudge Kieran the peace he finally has. It's not just the last 14 weeks that he was ill, but he struggled to breathe the last 14 years and if you think about it possibly the 44 years of his life. Now, at last, he doesn't have to struggle to fight for every breath which is something we all take for granted. And even though it was a struggle for Kieran to breathe and his quality of life had been deteriorating for many years, I honestly believe that it was his love for Ciaran, Brian and Ailish that kept him with us for so long," Michael said.

Michael praised his "incredible" parents Michael and Bridie for caring for his four deceased siblings - Kay, Brian, Laois and Kieran - over the past 50 years.

"Dad made the point that Wednesday morning was the first time in 50 years that himself and mam didn't have to worry about getting the lads medicines, defibrillators and physios. Imagine, the first time in 50 years that they woke up and just had to think of themselves for a change. But I know, as all of you do, that they would of happily continued doing it. After 50 years you're due a break, you're incredible people".

Michael thanked doctors, nurses, friends of the family and the Tipperary branch of Cystic Fibrosis Ireland for their support the past 50 years, while also reserving praise for the people of Clonmel who aided with fundraisers.

"Over the 50 years the town of Clonmel have been extremely generous and supportive to mam and dad's fundraising efforts for Cystic Fibrosis as there were always neighbours and friends of the family who were available for church gate collections, charity walks, mini marathons, you name it, they were always there to help raise funds," he highlighted.

Michael praised Kieran's generosity, adding: "Every Christmas we would arrive home to bags and bags of presents for the kids. The amount of stuff he would have was unreal. He was like a skinny Santa. He never missed a birthday and his generosity was incredible. He even made sure he got

Christmas presents this year even though he was in hospital fighting for his life". Kieran's burial later took place at Touraneena Cemetery.

Tipperary aid worker describes joy when 'life returned' to the eyes of girl (5) in Somalia

Aid agency Concern Worldwide has heaped praise on the people of Tipperary and the rest of the country for helping save the life of a starving five-year-old girl in war-ravaged Somalia through their generous donations.

Yasmiin Hassan – one of 1.1 million Somalis forced to flee their homes due to conflict - was suffering from severe acute malnutrition and weighed the same as an average two-year-old when she was brought to a Concern nutrition centre on the outskirts of Mogadishu on March 15 last year.

Her condition was so bad that her mother Aamiina believed she would suffer the same fate as one of her brothers, who sadly died with similar symptoms at a time

when they had no access to a health clinic.

However, after 12 weeks of treatment, Yasmiin made a full recovery and Concern's health and nutrition team maintain contact with her to ensure she remains healthy.

"Life and joy returned to her eyes," said Concern's Regional Director for the Horn of Africa, Carol Morgan, who is from Tipperary.

"She increased her weight

from 12.4kg to a healthier 16.7kg, and measurements of her left upper arm also confirmed an improvement to her health.

"It brings immense joy to the staff when you see the recovery of children we care for like Yasmiin. The staff know they saved that child's life.

"Her smile is a great relief just weeks after being in such an emaciated state. It is truly heartbreaking to see any child malnourished.

"You see an emptiness and loss of happiness in their eyes. They stare ahead at nothing, not focusing on anything. They don't play and have no energy – so it is such a relief to see them recover," Carol continued.

Carol and her team praised the Irish public for donating over €1.5 million to Concern's East Africa Appeal last year, which helped fund a greater response to the ongoing food crisis in the region.

The appeal, which involved the use of those first images of Yasmiin, followed the severe drought across East Africa which left an estimated 20 million people facing starvation.

Yasmiin's mother, Aamiina, who has seven children, said she is "very thankful" to the Irish public and to Concern for the "kind support" her family are receiving.

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

Finding peace in nature winter's day. Beside the all-weather

he shortest day of the year found celebrating me Winter Solthe stice in Knockanrawley Resource Centre in Tipperary town.

The weather was very mild and an unexpected dawn chorus gave a feeling of spring, and no wonder the birds were confused.

On this day, I was joining a social, therapeutic and horticultural walk lead by Timmy Whyte. This was a new experience for me and I was really looking forward to seeing the town through a new set of eyes, knowledge and experience.

A cup of tea was the first order of the day and I chatted to Dinny who regularly comes on the walk. He knows my dad and enjoys the outdoors. We left the centre and headed out to explore the town. Our high vis-jackets were necessary as the roads were very busy, and I was surprised by how many drivers ignored pedestrian crossings and green men.

Nothing escapes Timmy's attention, and while I am familiar with wild flower and shrubs, on this occasion I was learning about a completely new set of plants. In front of the nuns house the careful planting of trees and shrubs has created a woodland edge golden privet, pittosporum and cotoneaster with red berries for birds. Dogwoods red stems bring winter colour to any garden, and dozens of moth caterpillars feed on the leaves. Viburnum white flowers graced the hedge and brought a splash of welcome colour.

We walked into Pierce Park where the roadside trees were been pruned, and we saw the sooty black buds of ash. The amazing variety of shrubs in small urban gardens from Yucca to periwinkle, and St. John's Wort which is used to treatment depression. Along by the kerb we found two beneficial wildflowers - groundsel whose seeds were fed to canaries and red dead nettle that was packed full of nectar for pollinators.

As we walked along I got chatting to Ann. She loves the outdoors, and the walks are a social way to get exercise and learn about the environment and nature. Our next stop was by a fine pyracanthas orange glow hedge that has plenty of berries for birds. A singing welcomed us robin to Avondale Crescent.

stopped Timmy and helped us to identify some more urban plants. Enda had the names on the tip of his tongue, and remembering nature takes a lifetime. He tends his own garden at home, and we both agreed that the taste of freshly picked vegetables is something that everyone should experience.

A fine beech hedge still had its leaves and we crushed the fragrant leaves of juniper. The prickly leaves of holly poked out through the hedge but unfortunately all the berries have been devoured by birds.

In the grounds of the sports complex, this woodland consists of alder, sycamore, hawthorn and silver Evergreen birch. trees provide shelter and warmth for nesting and roosting. Mahonia has yellow flowers, and there was plenty of winter colour on the walk to lift spirits and brighten up a

pitches a tall eucalyptus tree is growing. It seemed perfectly happy here in damp Tipperary. Also we discovered silver privet and a low growing cotoneaster. Starlings and robins were singing and we saw a pied wagtail.

The next part of our walk brought us past the scout's hall. We left the church behind and explored the tree lined St. Michael's road. Tall horse chestnut, beech and monkey puzzle rose out from gardens. London plane lined the street, with these trees able to deal with the grime and dust of town living.

In the grounds of Dan Breen house we heard rooks calling in scots pine trees. This was once a thriving rookery but has been in terminal decline for several years. There were other interesting trees in the grounds including a rare mulberry tree planted the day the Great War started; horse chestnut with sticky buds and horseshoe shaped scars on the branches; and holm oak that has an identity crisis and is a deciduous evergreen.

The River Ara was in flood and there was no sign of the dipper. We discussed the best time to see kingfishers and when the young are out of the nest in late summer they are easier to spot.

I had a brilliant time with Timmy and the group. Their work is so important, from sharing knowledge and raising awareness around the environment and nature to the benefits for our mental and physical wellbeing.

It also makes it much easier for friends and family if their loved one leave a will outlining exactly what their wishes are.

When should you make a will?

Everybody should make a will and review a will on reaching certain stages in life, such as:

Becoming the owner of property/cash

Getting married – It is important to know that if somebody has made a will and subsequently marries, that will is then void as if it was never made



Going abroad Getting divorced or separated-Gettingdivorced or separating will not mean that the terms of any previous will made while you were married would automatically change and so it is very important to revise your will at this point

Buying a house Having children

Inheriting property (or winning the Lottery!) Retiring, getting older or

suffering from an illness There is no time like the present to plan for the future and make your will.

Some Facts:

Many people may not be aware but there are legal formalities that have to be adhered to so as to make sure that your will is valid and cannot be subject to challenge.

Somebody who has a will can update their will as many times as they like during their lifetime, but care should be taken to destroy any former wills in accordance with the formalities required by law. This is to prevent the possibility of any challenge to your most recent will. Your solicitor will be able to advise you on this.

It is important to notify somebody close to you of where your will is held so that it can be accessed when you should pass. There is no

central wills register in the country so for the will to take effect its existence must be known. This does not mean that the details of what are in the will should be disclosed however.

People with assets in foreign countries need to make a separate will in that country dealing with those assets as well as having a will here in Ireland for any property in this country. An Irish will is not valid for assets held abroad.

Wills are not only for distributing your assets, they can include wishes. For example, if you have particular preference about how you wish your funeral arrangements to be dealt with (e.g burial in a certain place, cremation etc) these can also be included in the will to prevent any uncertainty.

Single farm payments attach to a farmer, not to their land. If a farmer then wishes to have the single farm payments go to a family member who is to inherit the farm, this needs to be stated separately in their will. Otherwise, the single farm payment could end up in the remainder of the will assets, and could pass to someone who has no involvement with the farm whatsoever.

best for their child, which is why choosing a primary and post-primary school, where they will spend the bulk of their time as children and teenagers, is such a complicated decision. Should you choose a community school or a vocational school? Is mixed better than single-sex? Your local school has great facilities but it's a huge place with six full class groups in each year - would your child be better off in that little private school a bus ride away? 





Heartwise's guide to foods that help manage cholesterol

What is cholesterol?

Cholesterol is a type of fat found in your blood. You need a certain amount to produce hormones, but too much cholesterol sticks to your artery walls to form plaque. This plaque can build up and may block or narrow the artery. This is called atherosclerosis. If an artery becomes blocked the heart muscle becomes damaged, and this is known as a heart attack.

If an artery to the brain is blocked, it may damage the brain and this is called a stroke. Cholesterol has a bad name but it is also vital to your health and well being. Your liver and intestines make about 80% of the cholesterol you need to stay healthy and only about 20% comes from the food you eat, but when you consume too much from your food that's when problems begin. So what foods help us manage our cholesterol?

Oatmeal, oat bran and high fibre foods

Oatmeal contains soluble fibre which reduces your bad cholesterol. Soluble fibre is found in kidney beans, apples, pears, barley and prunes. Fruit such as bananas will add four grams of fibre to your food intake.

Fish and omega-3 fatty acids

Eating fish is heart healthy because the high levels of omega-3 fatty acids can reduce your blood pressure and risk of developing clots. The highest levels of omega-3 fatty acids are found in mackerel, lake trout, herring, sardines, salmon and halibut so get fishing. You should bake or grill fish to avoid adding unhealthy fats.

Walnuts, almonds and other nuts.

Walnuts, almonds and other tree nuts are rich in mono and polyunsaturated fatty acids which can improve blood cholesterol. Eating a handful of nuts a day such as almonds, hazelnuts, peanuts, pecans, pistachio and walnuts may reduce your risk of heart disease. Make sure the nuts are not salted or sugar coated. All nuts are high in calories so no more than a handful.

Avocados

Olive oil

Adding an avocado a day to a heart healthy diet can improve LDL levels in people who are overweight or obese. They are a potent source of nutrients as well as monounsaturated fatty acids. Try adding avocado slices to salads and in sandwiches or eat them as a side dish. Another great source of monounsaturated fatty acids, try adding two tablespoons of olive oil in place of other fats in your diet to get its heart healthy benefits. It can be used as a substitute for butter when basting meat or as a dip for bread. Both avocados and olive oil are high in calories so eat in small doses.

Foods with added plant sterols or stanols

Sterols or stanols are substances found in plants that help block the absorption of cholesterol. Some margarines, orange juice and yogurt drinks come with added plant sterols and can help reduce LDL cholesterol by five to 15 percent.

Although some fats are healthy, you need to limit the saturated and trans fats you eat. Saturated fats like those in meat, butter, cheese and other full-fat dairy products and some oils raise your total cholesterol. Trans fats, often found in store bought cookies, crackers and cakes are particularly bad for your cholesterol levels. In addition to a healthy diet, exercising, quitting smoking and maintaining a healthy weight will help keep your cholesterol at a healthy level.

SHOULDER PAIN WHEN LIFTING ARM UPWARDS

ain at the front of the shoulder that occurs after gardening or any sort of manual work can be often be caused by impingement of the supraspinatus tendon of the shoulder joint.

The following is a typical case of shoulder pain caused by supraspinatus Impingement syndrome that I see on a weekly basis in my clinic.

Signs and symptoms

Pain when doing overhead activity such as cleaning windows;

Driving with affected

hand on top of steering wheel causes shoulder pain; Sleeping on affected

shoulder causes pain; Putting on a jacket or shirt or when reaching backwards with the arm aggravates shoulder pain;


Attempting to place the hand behind your back is quite painful;

Shoulder pain is generally worse in the evening time after a hard day's work;

Symptoms are eased with rest, but reoccurs with activity.

Examination findings

Winging of the blade of the painful shoulder - the shoulder blade is angled to



the front thus having an effect on the overlying acromion bone that overlays the affected shoulder joint.

The humeral head which is ball fitting into the socket of the glenoid fossa can tilt forward in an abnormal position inside of sitting in neutral, thus compromising smooth movement at the shoulder joint and contributing to supraspinatus impingement.

Thirdly, there will be weakness and pain on lifting the arm up from the hip in a sideways movement towards the ceiling. The patient will have difficulty achieving this full movement. The patient will also note pain on bringing the arm downwards towards the hip from an elevated position.

Treatment

The patient's shoulder pain is due to the supraspinatus tendon being impinged or compressed by the overlying acromion bone when the shoulder is being elevated. Shoulder blade winging and humeral head tilting implies that the tĥat move muscles the shoulder blades backwards, namely the serratus anterior and middle plus lower trapezius, are weak. The forward tilting of the humeral head implies a weak stabilising relationship in the rotator cuff muscles that stabilise the shoulder joint.

Treatment should initially target placing the scapula in a neutral position. When the physical therapist holds this scapula in a neutral position, the patient finds that their shoulder symptoms greatly subside. Hence, exercises to achieve neutral shoulder blade position are very important.





'Sometimes it's better to follow an opportunity than pursue a passion'

One trillion dollars. That's the total cost of student loan debt in America - it's the second highest category behind mortgage repayments. Students in England will leave university with an average debt of just over £50,000 per person. Three quarters of these graduates will never be able to pay off what they owe as the interest is so high and can even still be paying off their third level borrowing in thirty years time.

Here in Ireland, the cost of getting a college degree is roughly $\epsilon_{40,000}$ between travel costs, student accommodation and a $\epsilon_{3,000}$ contribution fee that is high by European standards as well as other expenses. There is a hole in funding for third level institutions that needs to be filled-should the by bringing in a graduate tax which will

push students' debt up by another twenty grand? Or increased aid in the form of grants and allowances footed by the taxpayer?

So, what does this all mean? Ever since fees were abolished over twenty years ago there has been a one size fits all when it comes to what a person should do upon finishing secondary school. A college education is accessible now - everyone who wants to go can go - regardless of their circumstances. A positive, universal thought you would imagine. Not so, if you ask me. Even with free fees many people cannot afford to go to college or the costs that arise from it and quite frankly not everyone needs or should have to go to college. If, for whatever reason, a person decides to drop out of a programme they are still liable to pay off any loans they may have taken out and often do not get any money already paid reimbursed. So, a load of debt with no piece of paper to show for it and believe it or not it gets worse

Eventually, you do earn that illustrious piece of paper after three to four years of study but alas no job. That's because you chose to study Philosophy or Ancient Civilwhich izations funnilv enough are not subjects in high demand in today's jobs market. Since the Great Recession of 2008, the world of employment has changed dramatically. It is a buyer's market. Employers either need or want workers with specific, niche skills such as coding, being fluent in more than one language or SEO.

So, you either emigrate or take a job that you didn't need any degree for or you end up on the live register. All the while that college debt prevents you from moving on in life, whether it's getting together a deposit for your first home or starting to make plans for your retirement through a pension.

So, what is it exactly that I'm trying to say here? Well, it's this - college nowadays is expensive, and instead of burdening yourself with a heap of debt that will form a millstone around your neck with no great benefit ask yourself one question: Is it worth it? This applies to everyone whether you're a school-leaver, unemployed, want to progress in your chosen career or a mature student.

Before you apply for the course that you'd like to do, think about it and do some research: Can I afford it? Do I qualify for any financial aid and will it be enough? Is all this time, money and effort going to be worth it in the long run? What job/career will this programme lead to?

If the answer to any of these questions are negative, then consider this: instead of spending time indulging a passion you decide to take an opportunity. You can retrain through the Springboard Plus programme which gives workers the necessary qualifications for skills that are badly needed in the workplace. Springboard places are paid through the Department of Education at no cost to the student.

Local ETBs also provide vocational courses that are tuition free from QQI levels 3 to 5. According to a local newspaper, most students who complete their level 5 studies with Tipperary ETB are now working either full or part time. Colleges of further education are a cheaper and quicker alternative to ITs and universities that provide courses at level 5 and 6.

Another option is to take a gap year. Spend a year travelling and/or working in North America, Europe or Australasia. TEFL in Spain or volunteer on an NGO project in Ghana. Or you could just get a job, gain experience and work your way up the employment ladder seeking all sorts of great and lucrative chances along the way. There are jobs out there. Over 28,000 across the country were available on Indeed at the start of January.

Even during the recession with a 15% unemployment rate, bosses were finding it hard to source people with the relevant tools to work in the growing digital, technology and engineering sectors. One of the reasons for this is that people thought that a passion meant a job instead of a job leading to an opportunity. Maybe it's time for a rethink?

Rockwell College's new €1m sports pavilion to open in April

Visitors to Rockwell College over the last few months will have seen the progress on the new Fr. Aidan Lehane CSSP Pavilion adjacent to the rugby pitches at the college. This development has been in planning for three years and is a project initiated by the Rockwell College Union of past pupils to mark the sesquicentenary of Rockwell

For many years now, the growth in pupil participation in a variety of sports has put increasing pressure on the existing changing rooms facility. Coaches, PE teachers and the student body have all been strong advocates for such a development. Previous modernisation programmes at Rockwell College did in-


The naming of the building in honour of the late Fr. Aidan Lehane CSSP is a fitting tribute to the man who oversaw extensive development of the college sporting facilities. During his presidency of Rockwell College, the agricultural college was constructed, but also was the extensive sports facility comprising of the gymnasium, swimming pool, changing areas and the current weights room.

In addition to his contri-

bution to Rockwell College, Fr. Lehane has the distinction of serving as president of all five Holy Ghost (Spiritan) Colleges in Ireland. It is fitting that this new building is named after the man who, as president, oversaw the last period of new buildings at Rockwell College in the late 1960s and early 1970s.

With a final cost in the re-

gion of €1 million, the pavilion will enhance the extracurricular experience of all the boys and girls who attend and whose involvement in sports and physical activity is wholeheartedly encouraged. Parents and past pupils have generated all of the funds to date for this development, the first new build of Rockwell College in over 40 years.



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
