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'Scandalous driving test waiting times hammering Tipperary'

Young people in Tipperary are being forced to emigrate over "scandalous" driving test waiting times, "draconian" driving laws and "astronomical" insurance premiums, according to Mayor of the Clonmel Borough District Cllr Richie Molloy.

Average driving test waiting times (in weeks) for County Tipperary include Tipperary Town (15.2), Clonmel (16.7), Thurles (20.2) and Nenagh (17.6). Some drivers in County Tipperary have waited 28 weeks to sit their test, according to Road Safety Authority (RSA) figures

Mayor Molloy says driving test waiting times and insurance premiums - combined with new legislation meaning that an unaccompanied learner driver is liable to have their vehicle impounded, in addition to up to four penalty points and a fine of up to €120 - are hindering young people entering the workforce.

"Young people and their parents are coming to me saying that the waiting times

are stopping them taking a job. It's impractical and draconian to think that a learner driver must be accompanied by a full licence driver all the time," Mayor Molloy says.

Mayor Molloy is calling for a system where driving test

waiting times are "two to three weeks maximum", continuing: "Minister for Transport Shane Ross should have made sure that more testers were in place before he brought in the unaccompanied learner driver law. If someone fails their test, they have to sit back and wait months to do it again. It's penalising young people! Almost every job nowadays requires a full driving licence."



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Annette's Sea of Change cancer choir secure place at Ireland's Got Talent live shows

A County Tipperary mother currently undergoing breast cancer treatment for the second time has made it to the live shows on Ireland's Got Talent.

Clerihan's Annette Hahessy was part of the inspirational Sea of Change choir that left the judges in tears when they auditioned for the talent show in November.

The Dublin-based female choir - which is made up of cancer survivors and those touched by cancer from across the country- performed This is Me, leaving them "shocked" when they got put through to the live shows thanks to Denise Van Outen's Golden Buzzer.

"The judges stood up with tears in their eyes the moment we started singing. We had the place rocking and everyone was so emotional. We couldn't believe it when Denise pushed her Golden Buzzer because we weren't expecting our story to be that strong. They were all hugging us backstage - it was a really great day," Annette says.

The 45 members of Sea of Change joined forces after meeting at a fundraiser last year for Aoibheann's Pink Tie, a national children's cancer charity set up following the tragic loss of an eight-year-old to cancer. Annette and her friends from Clerihan were among the 2,505 women who travelled to Magheramore beach in County Wicklow, setting a world record for skinny dip-ping while raising over €500,000 to support children suffering from cancer in Ireland and their families.

"It was a very empowering day because a lot of the

women had cancer scars and others had lost a loved one to cancer. Led by Dee Featherstone, a group of the women got together after the Dip in the Nip and decided to start the Sea of Change choir. It all happened so quickly, and now we are rehearsing twice a week up in Dublin for the Ireland's Got Talent semi-fian excited Annette

Similar to her friends in Sea of Change, Annette's journey to the bright lights of the popular Virgin Media One talent show has been heart-wrenching. Her life did a "somersault" in 2016 when she was first diagnosed with breast cancer. "I can't even begin to describe how devastating and shocking it was when I found out I had cancer. It's unbelievable because you never think it's going to happen to you and when it does your stomach flips out and the room starts spinning," Annette recalls.

Annette underwent four months of chemotherapy, followed by surgery and radio-Owner Tumbletots Playschool in Clerihan, Annette was just getting her life back on track when breast cancer returned last November. "Treatment worked very good for me the first time and I got two years of good health.

"I was just starting to build my life again when unfortunately it came back. I was driving up to Dublin to rehearse with Sea of Change for Ireland's Got Talent when I discovered a lump on my neck. Given my history, I was paranoid and got it checked. Î'm back getting chemotherapy down in Cork every Friday now, and I would need a magic ball to know what's going to happen in the future. I'm not planning too far ahead, but hopefully things will go well," a positive Annette continues.

Annette praises her family and friends for their support throughout her journey with cancer, in particular her husband George and their four sons. "George is by my side 24/7 and is living the fight with me. My sons Sean (23), Luke (20), Ben (16) and Michael (8) are amazing. My really close group of friends in Clerihan, and family in Clonmel and Dublin are also a huge support."

Annette says being part of Sea of Change is "a great distraction" as she battles breast cancer and has made her "a stronger person". She adds: "Ireland's Got Talent has come at just the right time for me. There were days after getting the Golden Buzzer that I forgot I had cancer and had to have a reality check.

"Sea of Change has changed my life. Talking to the women about cancer is like talking to someone else about the weather and it has helped me to open up to people without shedding a tear. I don't know where all this inner strength has come from. Two years ago I would have been bawling crying, but I have really toughened up as a person.

"Cancer is becoming my norm. I'm trying to balance having chemotherapy with rehearsals but it's worth it. I'm on a chemotherapy-free week ahead of the live semi-finals so I will have loads of energy. Hopefully we will go all the way to the final."

Hosted by Lucy Kennedy, Sea of Change's pre-recorded audition aired on Virgin

Media One this month, receiving widespread acclaim from the judges. Denise Van Outen described Sea of Change's audition as "so moving and so inspirational", adding: "I've had a very turbulent two years with my best friend who was diagnosed with breast cancer, so what you just did meant so much and really touched my heart. I think you're all fantastic and an inspiration, and you're everything that this show is about.'

Jason Byrne praised the "fantastic" performance. 'You're all such brave women and I absolutely commend you. Denise was dead right to hit that Golden Buzzer - you deserve it."

Michelle Visage said the Sea of Change choir are

"changing lives", adding: "We have all been affected by cancer and I lost my mother to cancer, so this was so moving to me in so many ways and I'm so glad that Denise hit the Golden Buzzer for you. That was such a body positive, inspirational number, so keep doing what you ladies are doing."

Louise Walsh tipped the Sea of Change choir, who will star live on Ireland's Got Talent at the end of March, to win it outright. "That was so uplifting to hear that song being sung by so many amazing people on one stage. It was a brilliant song, you're brilliant people and I'm going to say it now - I think you're going to win this competi-

Step on town plaza problematic for wheelchair users

A "step" on a section of the new plaza outside the revamped Carrick-on-Suir Town Hall is making it difficult for wheelchair users and parents pushing buggies to access the municipal building, according to a local councillor.

Fianna Fáil's Cllr Kieran Bourke called on the council to remove the step in a motion tabled at Carrick-on-Suir Municipal District monthly meeting.

One of the main reasons the County Council refurbished and extended the Town Hall was to make it accessible to people with disabilities. The plaza - a raised platform linking the Town Hall with New Street Car Park - was one of the measures designed to make wheelchair users' journey to the municipal building easier.

Cllr Bourke, whose daughter is a wheelchair user, tabled a motion at the meeting calling on the council to carry out works to ensure all areas of the plaza

were wheelchair friendly. It was seconded by fellow Carrick-on-Suir councillor David

The council responded that all areas of the new Town Hall Plaza are suitable for wheelchairs and buggies, other than a section of kerbing at the exit from the car park

"This kerb was not lowered due to the presence of an Eircom chamber and would have involved excavation of the walls and resetting of a new frame and cover," the council explained.

The statement added:

"The tight work programme during the week of November 19 to 23 last year did not facilitate consultation with Eircom. This matter is now receiving attention as part of snag list items."

Cllr Bourke said he was "disappointed" and "shocked"

at the council's reply. This renovation of the Town Hall had been talked about for years and the project required Part 8 planning permission before it could proceed.

"I don't think it's good enough that you put in a new

structure outside (the Town Hall) and it's not wheelchair friendly. I am calling on the council to get the contractor back as soon as possible."

Cllr Bourke declared the council should admit a mistake was made, face it, get rid of the step and move on.

Concern that Carrick-on-Suir road project won't proceed

The condition of the N24 at O'Mahony Avenue in Carrick-on-Suir was condemned as "deplorable" at a council meeting and it's feared a project to resurface the road in the town won't go ahead this year.

That was the concern voiced by Fianna Fáil's Cllr Kieran Bourke at Carrick-on-Suir Municipal District monthly meeting where he criticised the state of O'Mahony Avenue and declared the crocodile cracks on it were like something from the Stone

The district meeting heard Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII) plans to resurface 3.5km of the N24 in Carrick-on-Suir, but Cllr Bourke said he feared funding won't be allocated to do this project this year because €4m has already been set aside for works on the Clonmel Bypass.

He outlined he was part of a deputation of public representatives that met with TII senior management in Dublin the day before the Dis-

trict meeting. He appealed to the TII for the N24 in his hometown to be upgraded and outlined a shopping list of health and safety projects needed on the route in addition to the main resurfacing project.

APPEAL TO COUNCIL MANAGEMENT

If the TII wasn't going to resurface the N24 in Carrick-on-Suir this year, he appealed to Co. Council management to use whatever influence they had to at least get the health and safety projects carried out. They include

moving the 50km speed sign at Lissadell out as far as the Cottage Boreen on the Clonmel Road, providing a footpath and public lighting on the Clonmel Road out to Cottage Boreen, installing pedestrian crossings at Lidl and O'Mahony Avenue, erect railings under the Pill Road rail bridge, and road safety measures at Scoil Mhuire and the CBS.

District engineer Willie Corby said the council planned to move forward with doing patching repairs on O'Mahony Avenue because

it needed to be urgently carried out. He pledged the council would push hard to secure the improvements to the N24 highlighted by Cllr Bourke.

Cllr Bourke said he was concerned and scared to hear from the district engineer that he was going to move on with repairs on O'Mahony Avenue as this indicated the TII was unlikely to upgrade the N24 this year. He argued the health and safety projects were separate to the resurfacing. He pointed out that he had pushed for the road

safety measures on the Pill Road for five years.

The councillor reminded council officials the Council's former roads director Marcus O'Connor gave assurances in 2015 that funding was secured for this project. There were 800 to 900 children crossing the N24 Pill Road every day, he pointed out.

Mr Corby responded that the TII had a limited budget and the council was in a queue waiting for projects to proceed like every other local authority.

Former Labour councillor Michael Cleere to run for Healy team

A former Labour councillor from Killenaule is to contest the Tipperary County Council election in the Carrick-on-Suir Municipal District as a Workers and Unemployment Action Group candidate.

Former Tipp hurler Declan Fanning from Killenaule launched Michael Cleere's local election campaign in Ardagh House in Killenaule last Saturday, February 9.

Deputy Seamus Healy, who leads the Workers and Unemployment Action Group, said he was delighted to give Michael Cleere his full

support in the local elections.

The Commons native, who lives in Castlequarter, Killenaule, is a former member of the Defence Forces and coalminer at the mines in Ballingarry. He is married to Margaret and the couple have two grown up daughters and four grandchildren. He is well known in Killenaule for his work as a bus driver for the Fethard and District Care Centre for the past 13 years and his community work.

Before joining the Workers & Unemployment Action Group, Mr Cleere was involved in the Labour Party. He contested the 2009 South Tipperary Co. Council election for Labour in the Fethard Electoral Area but was unsuccessful. However, he was coopted onto South Tipperary Co. Council in October, 2013 to fill the council seat vacated by Bobby Fitzgerald from Carrick-on-Suir.

He wasn't elected to the new Tipperary Co. Council in the local elections seven months later.

Mr Cleere said he resigned from Labour on the day of the local election count in 2014 because he felt he got no support from the party during his election campaign. He particularly criticised Labour for running a second candidate, who was geographically close to him, in the Carrick Municipal District election race.

He also felt Labour Party failed to represent working class people when it was in coalition with Fine Gael in the last Government and grassroots Labour activists and councillors like him got the backlash from the voters during the 2014 local election campaign. "Labour were supposed to stand up for the working class but I found out differently," he added.

His top priorities if elected to the Co. Council include development of the mining heritage of the Slieveardagh area for tourism and job creation,

the building of more social housing and maintenance of roads and footpaths. Improving pay and conditions

for members of the Defence Forces and nurses and improving health services are his other top priority issues.

Michael lands post with world mountain group

Clonmel man Michael Maunsell has been elected as the first-ever vice-president for the Union International des Associations d'Alpinisme (UIAA) International Mountain Protection Commission.

The UIAA is the world governing body for alpine climbing and mountaineering. The organisation works for the sustainable development of mountain regions and their communities across the world.

The UIAA, which is based in Switzerland, was founded in 1932 and has a global presence on six continents, working to ensure that the mountain ecosystems are safeguarded for current and future generations, especially in the protection of mountain river catchments that supply freshwaters to societies across the globe.

Last year, Michael was involved with the UIAA in assessing and grant-aiding a Biogas project in the Himalayas, aimed at turning human waste from tourists into gas for local communities. This waste normally ends up contaminating glaciers and local water supplies used by local communities for drinking washing and cooking.

The UIAA co-operates closely with governments

and international organisations - including the UN Food and Agriculture Organisation and the UN World Tourism Organisation - on issues including biodiversity, climate change, ecosystem services and sustainable development.

The UIAA works with scientists on research and publishes papers on environmental issues, and regularly participates in UN and other international conferences.

GUEST SPEAKER AT A UN CONFERENCE

Michael will be representing the UIAA as a guest speaker at a UN conference in

Germany in March and in Azerbaijan in May on global climate change issues and their impacts on society.

In 2014, he became a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society. Michael, who lives in Russelstown, Clonmel, works as a science lecturer in the Department of Applied Science at Limerick Institute of Technology on a BSc (Honours) Environmental and Geographical Science programme.

This time last year, he and Matt Joy from Killenaule conducted the first-ever research on mountain plants and geology on the Howling Ridge approach to Carrantuohill, Ireland's highest mountain.

New spaces earmarked for Clonmel car park

It's hoped that work on the new car park at Davis Road, Clonmel, will start later this year.

The car park, which is part of the overall masterplan for the former Kickham Barracks site, will have 120 spaces. These will include 65 for the new Limerick Institute of Technology (LIT) campus and 55 public spaces.

There will be a single-lane entrance to and a double-lane

exit (so that traffic can turn left and right) from the car park. That entrance and exit are located on the site of the former Burke, Higgins and McNulty steelworks site, opposite The Showgrounds Shopping Centre.

The site covers 1.1 acres and is located 50 metres from the roundabout on the Davis Road at The Showgrounds Shopping Centre.

The project was given the green light at a special meeting of Clonmel Borough

District Council, when district engineer Eamon Lonergan said it was hoped that work would start by the end of the year.

Funding for the car park had been included in the URDF (Urban Regeneration and Development) fund which was made available before Christmas, and they were under a tight timeframe to spend that money, he said.

Cllr Pat English said that while he supported the car park, he had serious concerns about traffic flow and congestion in the area. However, he was glad that the concerns of nearby residents had been addressed.

A POSITIVE DEVELOPMENT

Cllr Michael Murphy said the car park was a positive development and was a sign that the entire Kickham Barracks project was starting to come together. It was important that the sod would be turned on the public realm part of the site Cllr Murphy suggested that a roundabout would be better than traffic lights at the nearby location of The Mall on Davis Road. He said the flow of traffic would be substantially better with a roundabout, which was the case with the roundabout at the end of Parnell Street, where there was an excellent flow of traffic.

Cllr Siobhan Ambrose said the car park was a wonderful development and a very positive message that Clonmel was open for business. It would be a marvellous asset and amenity for Kickham Barracks.

It also had the support of nearby residents, many of whom were elderly, and who had difficulty parking outside of their front doors when there was an overflow from the car park at The Showgrounds.

District Mayor Richie Molloy also welcomed the car park, which he said would be a big addition to the town.

Civic reception to be accorded to Carrick Christian Brothers

Carrick-on-Suir Municipal District has decided to accord a civic reception to the Christian Brothers, honouring their contribution to education in Carrick-on-Suir.

The district's highest honour is being accorded to mark the departure of the last Christian Brothers from Carrick-on-Suir last summer following the sale of their Monastery house on the Pill Road.

Carrick-on-Suir Municipal District administrator Martin Nolan announced plans for the civic reception at the January meeting of the district's councillors. He said the provisional date for the function in the newly refur-

bished Town Hall is May 1.

The departure of the last three Christian Brothers from Carrick-on-Suir last August ended the religious order's 213 years presence in Carrick-on-Suir.

The Monastery on the Pill Road, renamed Brú na Cruinne Cosmology and Spirituality Centre in more recent years, had been the order's Carrick-on-Suir home since 1805. It was the second CBS monastery founded by Edmund Ignatius Rice.

Day was celebrated February 3, and \bar{I} was invited to Cabragh Wetlands to help lead a

I normally wouldn't travel too far on a Sunday, but the centre does tremendous work with schools and communities raising awareness around nature, and it was great to be able to support them. I joined Sean Gleeson, Eamon Brennan, Tom Gallagher, Michael Long and Jimmy Duggan and it was brilliant to be able to learnfrom these very knowledgeand enthusiastic environmentalists.

The wetlands is situated near the town of Thurles on the Holycross road. The first class visitor centre has evolved around the old tail $ings\,pond\,from\,the\,sugar\,beet$ factory and was destined to become a dump. Luckily the values was recognised and the wetlands were protected for future generations. Schools from across Tipperary can know learn about nature and the environment $in \, the \, beautiful \, surroundings \,$ of Cabragh Wetlands.

I arrived early, and over tea and biscuits we sat in the comfort of the visitor centre while watching the birds. Sean had put up feeders along the hedgerow and they were full of birds. A metre long feeder full of sun flower hearts had attracted a charm of goldfinches. Their bright colours were a great boost on a cold spring's day. The nut feeders were guarded by great tits and housesparrows, and there was also a few greenfinches. These species appear to making comeback.

We started off the talk indoors, and the telescope was set up to kid level so that they could examine the birds. Keeping your feeders near the house increases your interaction and enjoyment, and also serves as a visual prompt

for a walk around the wetland. Everyone naturally gravitated towards the lake. It was half frozen, and there were a dozen mallards on the open water. We pointed out the dull brown mammies and the brighter males with their bottle green heads. One young boy spoke up that they were male and female - the awareness of young people through school and home life is another major generational change. I also learnt that it is mainly the females that quack.

Planting for nature will encourage in more birds. A thick hedgerow or woodland and a safe place to hop into if a cat or hawk appears. There are also good native trees suitable for wet ground. Alder, willow and birch will attract hungry flocks of siskins and redpolls, who will search through the branches for seeds and insects.

Tom gave a lovely description of the function of a wetland. They are like the kidneys of the countryside, and help filter out impurities in the water. He also talked about the barn owls, and for the last several years this pair have successful raised chicks in the barn owl box.

Next we headed outside

Celebrating wetlands The new Domestic Violence Act brings a number of changes

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PSYCHOLOGICAL ABUSE REFORM BY THE DOMESTIC VIOLENCE ACT 2018

The Domestic Violence Act 2018 took effect on 1st January 2019 and has brought some welcome reform to the law governing domestic violence.

It provides for additional protections for victims of domestic violence by broadening the scope of Safety, Protection and Barring Orders, reintroducing Emergency Barring Orders and creating a new offence to deal with psychological abuse.

WHAT IS DOMESTIC VIOLENCE?

Domestic violence refers to the use of physical or emotional force or threat of physical force, including sexual violence, in an intimate relationship. As well as physical violence, domestic violence can also involve; emotional abuse, the destruction of property, controlling behaviour such as isolation from friends, family and other potential sources of support, threats to others including children, stalking and control over access to money, personal items, food, transportation and communica-

SO WHAT'S NEW?

The new Act brings in a number of changes seeking to protect the victims of Domestic Abuse. We have previously written on the range and scope of Barring Orders and Safety Orders and the new act has expanded these. In addition we now see the creation of a new offence, coercive control to deal with psychological abuse.

COERCIVE CONTROL (PSYCHOLOGICAL ABUSE):

One of the key provisions introduced by the new act is the recognition that violence is not always physical. To this end the new ofence of coercive control has been introduced which is intended to deal with threatening behaviour, intimidation or humiliamounting psychological abuse.

EMERGENCY BARRING ORDERS:

The act has reintroduced Emergency Barring Order. An emergency barring order requires the violent person to leave the home, and prohibits the person from entering the home. This is an immediate order where there is reasonable grounds to believe there is an immediate risk of significant harm to you or a dependent.

Unlike an interim barring order, the applicant does not have to satisfy the property test to be able to get an emergency barring order. This means the applicant does not need to own, co-own or have their name on the lease of the property. An emergency barring order can last for a maximum of 8 working days. It prohibits the same behaviours as a barring order.

LOOKING AHEAD

Recognising coercive control as a crime is an important step forward as victims suffer great harm by having their self-esteem eroded and living in constant fear. Ultimately the legislation will only be truly effective if the Garda Siochana are given the training and resources to recognise and combat psychological abuse and coercive control.

House pets want to be challenged both physically and mentally, regardless of the weather outside. Disruptive behaviour can be the payback for boredom. So that it doesn't come to this, dog owners can be brought into play. The experts at Maxi Zoo have put together five indoor games for pets.

1. INTELLIGENCE GAME

Nowadays retailers offer a wide choice of board games which challenge the instincts of our four-legged friends for play and food. For dogs there are some really tricky mental

exercise tasks in which they have to solve several puzzles (moving blocks, pushing rollers, pulling out bars) until they find their reward. If you like simplicity: hide a treat under a paper cup and challenge your dog to take it. If that works well, introduce a second cup. Let him watch where you place the reward. Make a fuss of him if he finds the treat first time round. Increase the game to a maximum of three cups.

2. HIDE AND SEEK

animals searching for their master or mistress. So hide yourself in another room and praise your pet when it tracks you down. You can also hide a treat or your pet's favourite toy somewhere in the house and let them find it for themselves. Combine the rewards with specific tasks, like running through a tunnel. You can even construct one yourself using a blanket and two chairs.

3. HUNTING GAMES

Special "play circuits" or ball tracks also challenge all the senses: you let balls speed along them which your cat can glimpse through spyholes. This promotes full concentration, trains reflexes and speed.

4. AGÎLITY COURSE FOR

Jumping over broomsticks, running around some bottles, crawling through a play tunnel, long-jumping over a flat obstacle - just let your imagination run free.

5. CLICKER TRAINING

The so-called "clicking" works with both dogs and cats. The animals learn at the start to connect the clicking, simply a specific clicking noise, with a reward. Thereafter you can teach your fourlegged friend much with the help of a clicker. Instructions on this form of training can be found in courses or specialist

'Horrendous dumping is attracting rats and mice'

The dumping of household refuse and other rubbish near a centre that caters for people with intellectual disabilities has been described as "horrendous".

Colette Basquille, whose 22year-old daughter Sarah is a service user at the Rehab-Care centre at Bridgewater House in Clonmel, says that the problem is getting worse and is a health hazard.

"What's going on is just horrendous", she says.

"The rubbish is attracting rats and mice from the

nearby riverbank, as well as wild cats, and they are all tearing at the bags."

She had recently seen a cat eating a dead animal, although she was unsure if it was a rat, a mouse or another

She says that her daughter has been attending the centre for the past two years. "Her immune system is low enough without the risk that this rubbish is posing to her health."

Some of the service users are wheelchair-bound and the bags of rubbish sometimes block the path that they use to access the centre.

As well as household rubbish, she says that discarded

furniture is also being dumped there.

However, she says that many of the nearby residents are using the bins provided to dispose of their rubbish.

Council staff cleared the rubbish last week, but more dumping took place this week. "Anyone with any consideration for other people wouldn't do that," she adds.

Miriam Cleary, community services manager with RehabCare, agreed that the problem was worsening and was a health hazard for the 32 service users, eight staff and four others who worked on Tús and Community Employment schemes.



Householders to be questioned by inspectors on rubbish disposal

Tipperary householders will soon be questioned by litter inspectors as to how they dispose of their rubbish, heard this month's Cashel-Tipperary municipal district.

Director of environment services at Tipperary Council Sean County Keating said they had adopted new waste management bylaws at the end of last year, and will be carrying out inspections on individual households regarding refuse.

The burial grounds at

Waller's Lot in Cashel and Donohill had attracted illegal dumping. Some six littering fines had been handed out in the district in 2018, combined with anti dog-fouling initiatives in Cahir and Clonmel.

Huge improvements have been seen along the River Ara in Tipperary Town, and County Tipperary has also adopted a new climate adaptation strategy, added Mr Keating.

Cllr Michael Fitzgerald claimed the council is unable to stop the scourge of ongoing littering in the county. He said the Thomastown to Bansha road seems to be a particular target for dumping, with old tyres, mattresses and cookers thrown out.

"It's a disgrace. People indiscriminately doing things like that is not good enough."

Cllr Fitzgerald suggested an initiative whereby one day a week would be designated a 'free day' to legally dispose of rubbish in local waste management facilities.

Meanwhile, election candidates were asked to confine their posters to areas not beingjudged in the tidy towns contests. With 467 complaints, it shows that "people

really do care about their environment," said Cllr Denis

An inspection of the River Ara had found 26 mobile phones in one area. The disposal of old mattresses is especially difficult as they have to be broken up using expensive equipment that the council cannot afford, explained Mr Keating. The mattresses take up a lot of space in local landfills, and space in these landfills is already scarce.

"Some individuals have no sense of community, and are dumping even in the most scenic parts of the Glen of Aherlow," added Cllr Leahy.

Cllr Mary Hanna Hourigan suggested a total ban on election posters. "I think they are a blight to the countryside completely."

Cllr Roger Kennedy said there was a lot of dumping between Dundrum and Tipperary Town. The people who are dumping are not doing so "outside their own door" but travel elsewhere to do so.

Cllr Tom Wood said the only way to enforce the dog fouling laws was to have an enforcement officer catch somebody in the act by patrolling areas where dog fouling is common.

Cllr Martin Browne called attention to certain banned species of dogs being reared in local estates. Some are being walked around "without muzzles".

Mr Keating said they cannot legally ban posters. Posters are considered a form of litter, but there is a special exemption to allow election posters go up at election time.

Mr Keating said that in relation to dogs there is now an awareness campaign to ensure licences are enforced.

Derelict properties in Carrick-on-Suir to be demolished

Tipperary County Council is to demolish two derelict buildings it owns in Carrick-on-Suir and incorporate the sites into two existing local authority car parks.

One of the buildings is located along the Quay next to the Strand Car Park and the town's marina, while the other is located at the rear of Carrick-on-Suir Garda Sta-

tion next to the Greenside Car Park.

Carrick-on-Suir Municipal District engineer Willie Corby announced the council's decision at the monthly meeting of the district's councillors in Carrick-on-Suir Town Hall after Fianna Fail Cllr Kieran Bourke complained again about the derelict council

building near the Strand Car Park. The building was formerly used by the council's roads department.

Last year, Carrick-on-Suir's two councillors condemned the property as an eyesore and called on the council to demolish it.

Mr Corby told them at the time that the council first had to go through a process of offering it for alternative uses within the County Council and then within the public service. He reported back to the municipal district's monthly meeting two weeks ago that this process was completed and no other council department of public service had a use for the building and it was deemed not to be really of sale value.

Mr Corby said the council plan to knock this building and council property at the rear of Carrick-on-Suir Garda Station and incorporate the sites into the adjacent car parks.

The council hopes to fund the demolition work from its 2019 roads programme.

Sinn Féin's Cllr David Dunne welcomed the council's decision to demolish the old roads section building. He proposed the council erect signage to advertise the Strand Car Park as it was often nearly empty of vehicles.

District engineer Willie Corby said he would take note of Cllr Dunne's proposal about the car park signage.

Cashel Chamber of Commerce concerned at rising cost of insurance for local businesses

President of Cashel Chamber of Commerce Martin Lynch has expressed concern at the rising cost of insurance for businesses, following contact from "a number" of local businesses in Cashel over the last couple of months

"A number of businesses have been in contact with me expressing concern and frustration after they have received their Insurance renewals. While these concerns are across all business sectors, they are most notably from a number of local publicans, hairdressers and restaurateurs," he said.

"On a daily basis, business owners are crying out for action on the rising costs of insurance and in particular the continuous rise in public liability insurance. These increases are putting local businesses under financial pressure, with the risk of business closures and job losses a genuine fear for many.

"Herveyen until the Cove

"However, until the Government issues legislation or guidelines to tackle fraudulent insurance claims in a bid to tackle the high cost of insurance, business owners are without doubt facing yearly insurance premium increases."

Mr Lynch said local businesses are the backbone of the economy and provide much need local employment. "The Government's decision to increase the nine per cent VAT rate for the hospit-

ality sector to 13.5 per cent since January 1 was already a serious blow to local businesses. These businesses need support, they need Government to tackle the rising cost of insurance and in particular the need to address fraudulent insurance claims, which has resulted in a profound rise of insurance premiums."

'Fight for the Leaving Cert grade you deserve'

A Clonmel student who discovered that two of her Leaving Certificate examination papers had been incorrectly marked has urged other students to follow her example and get papers rechecked if they think they have been unfairly treated.

Alia Sheikh received five H1s and two H2s, equating to 613 points in her Leaving Cert, enough to pursue her chosen career in medicine.

"A form accompanying the results allowed for the reviewing of marked scripts in the school. Although happy with my grades, I wanted to avail of the opportunity to view my scripts and to analyse where I had been penalised and why," says Alia, who embarked on a lengthy process that eventually bore fruit, bringing her final points total to 625.

And her advice to student now preparing for their Leaving Cert? "If you aren't satisfied with your grade but know that you worked hard and knew what you were doing when you tackled the questions on your exam, then keep fighting for the grade you feel you deserve."

Alia says that after viewing her own scripts, she found that in Maths she had received 89%, and that her German paper had been awarded 86%

"With Maths, I could immediately spot about three mistakenly deducted marks, bringing my percentage up to 89.9%. I needed literally one more mark to secure me a H1, which would have awarded me the total 625.

"With German, it was difficult to know where I stood percentage-wise with the subject as a whole, since the only part of my exam available to me was the written, not the oral.

"It was later that I found that under the GDPR laws, results from the oral exam could also now be obtained.

"Not knowing one's exact mark in a subject can prove difficult when it comes to deciding whether to appeal or not, as a remarking can go either way.

"But viewing my German script with my grinds teacher, we were equally convinced that I had marks deducted for many answers which were, by all accounts, perfectly acceptable.

"We found many questions in which the discrepancies between my answers and those provided in the marking scheme were very obviously not grave enough to penalise me. Yet penalised I was, as indeed were unknown numbers of students across

"By the end of the reviewing period, I had ample evidence that the grades I had been awarded were not those I deserved. I decided to go ahead and appeal the grades I had received in both sub-

"This meant that my

scripts would be sent to be remarked by SEC examiners, the fee for which was €40 per subject. Around the beginning of October, after approximately one month/six weeks wait, the results of this appeal were sent to the school, and I was disappointed to find that neither grade had been changed."

But Alia was not finished yet in her pursuit of justice. She was now able to appeal to independent scrutineers. She filled out the necessary forms and also discovered that the results of the oral examinations can be obtained.

And five weeks later, she received the results of all her endeavours. "Although my Maths script had been previously marked by three examiners and my German script by two, the chief examiner found that errors had been made in marking every single

"Having reassessed my scripts alongside the CV2 form I had submitted, my marks in both subjects were brought up and my grades in both subjects were then upgraded. I now had seven H1s, which equates to the full 625.

'As happy as I was at this news, it came as quite a shock to me that even after five examiners, it took the chief examiner to award me with the grades I had deserved.

"I think back to those long days in June, after each and every paper sat, handing those precious script books over to the superintendent



with a shaky sigh and a sweaty hand. It was an almost necessary comfort, I think, to put our faith in those faceless examiners, to assume that our proverbial blood, sweat and tears would be treated with deference. Appraised justly and fairly, though I see now that comfort was inevitably

Alia adds that she doesn't mean to be too critical of the examiners, but wants to alert Leaving Cert students to the measures that now exist when it comes to challenging their final grades. Alia says that the crux of her advice to all Leaving Cert students would be to take charge, not only of their studies but also of their entitlements as a student.

"Find out all the information there is to find out before you begin your exams. Be aware of the different protocols that exist following the release of results.

"Of course, it goes without saying that the appeals process shouldn't be used as a vehicle for bartering for higher grades, but to rectify unfair dismissal of honest

"I would advise all students to keep pushing forward with their scripts until they have a satisfactory answer. Because otherwise you may end up suffering due to a mistake you never made to begin with.

"I am currently taking a

gap year as I realise that once studies begin again, to have time will become a foreign concept and the opportunities to pursue hobbies and interests will become numbered.

"At present, I am participating in voluntary community work. I am also utilising my time to go traveling and to practice driving.

"As sixth year students now edge closer to their mocks, and closer yet to the final exams in June, I wish them the very best of luck in all their studies.


The Too Much! stand featured figures constructed by the diversity committee to highlight the dangers of excess consumption of foods and drinks that are high in salt, fat and sugar.

RSA statistics show that 35 of the 47 fatal crashes involving learner drivers between 2014 and 2017 involved unaccompanied drivers.

Acknowledging the statistics, Mayor Molloy hit out at Minister Ross for "hammering" rural Ireland and forcing young people to emigrate over the country's driving laws.

"I can see the difficulty of someone going for their test, failing and being allowed to drive having looked at the statistics on road deaths. However, it's scandalous in this day and age to be waiting four to five months to do the test. We are struggling to keep young people in the country! They are starting to emigrate because the process of getting a licence abroad is easier and there are more job opportunities.

"The minister is trying to make a name for himself the

past 12 months by showing that he is passing legislation, but he is really hitting the people of rural Ireland hard. Even with the drink driving laws, people are being breathalysed on the way to work in the morning-that's really getting in their faces! I accept that people shouldn't drink and drive, but half of it seems to be a way of getting word out there that the minister is

cracking down hard on

things." Mayor Molloy wants Irish drivers to be able to get insurance from companies across Europe, suggesting that competition in the market would force Irish insurance companies to give more reasonable quotes. "The cost of insurance for a young person starting off in Ireland is astronomical. Some of the quotes being reported by young people locally are outrageous and even encourage them to take the chance of driving without insurance, but they are almost ruined for life if they get caught because of the fine and endorsement on their licence.

"Claims should be de-

creasing since the new unaccompanied learner driver law was introduced, yet the price of insurance doesn't seem to be coming down. In Ireland, we are hampered that there are only a small number of companies providing insurance. The current system is very unfair," he adds.

Kellie's passion for gymnastics began at the Special Olympic Club in Waterford, which she has been a member of since the age of eight

She qualified for the World Games by winning a gold medal in the national Special Olympics in July last year. She won silver medals in 2006, 2010 and 2014.

Names of gold medal winners are entered into a pool of qualified athletes and only so many are picked out. Kellie was one of those chosen and is thrilled with the news. She is training six days a week for the World Games with a day off on Sundays.

Kellie trains at the Special Olympics Waterford Club two days a week and does two days pilates with Ciara Conway in Carrick-on-Suir, which helps her balance and core muscle strength.

She also does high intensity classes at Carrick's 5 Star Fitness for two days with her mam Tara, who helps her with her bar training.

Kellie also enjoys horse riding, basketball, cycling and walking, and bakes cakes in Waterford three days a week. She is grateful to all who have supported and encouraged her to get to the World Games.
