New machine to crackdown on Tipperary property crime

A revolutionary device designed to combat property theft has entered the rural crime fray in County Tip-

A community-led property marking machine gramme for the Carrick-onSuir Municipal District has been declared as a "significant step" towards reducing crime.

The technology works by engraving the property for up to five items. Tipperary County Council purchased the machine through the joint policing committee structure for approximately €5,000 from Killenaulewill hammer the idea that property can be stolen and sold on. Cllr Kennedy, who was chair of the joint policing committee from 2014-2019, said it will be rolled out in the Carrick-on-Suir Municipal District and then in the other four municipal districts over the coming months for the public to use.

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'Property marking machine to reduce crime'

Cllr Imelda Goldsboro, whose joint council motion with Cahir's Cllr Andy Moloney brought the machine to fruition, said property theft is a "significant challenge".

She highlighted: "Unfortunately, the impact of rural crime can be devastating for older people in our communities and vulnerable people living alone. Those people become increasingly isolated and afraid."

Cllr Goldsboro said community groups will be trained to use the property marking machine. "It will make communities safer. The programme also provides signage to highlight that the property marking machine is in place, deterring criminals from being active.

"It certainly isn't the answer to all rural theft, but it is a step towards safeguarding property, increasing security and supporting the gardaí in securing detections. The system should reduce overall crime," she added.

Cllr Goldsboro, who is the new Carrick-on-Suir Municipal District chairperson, also acknowledged Tipperary County Council director of services Pat Slattery and administrative officer Margo Hayes for securing funding for the machine.

Members of An Garda Síochána including chief superintendent Dominic

Hayes, superintendent Willie Leahy and Carrick-on-Suir gardaí along with Tipperary councillors and council officials supported the launch. Among those was Sinn Féin's Cllr David Dunne, who told South Tipp Today that rural crime is a "big issue" and that there is a "major fear" within the elderly community living in Carrick-on-Suir. "We recently ran a petition to get more gardaí into the town and people came up to me and said they wouldn't sign the petition because they are afraid of what's happening here," he said.

Cllr Dunne emphasised the machine's game- changing role in identifying retrieved lost or stolen property. "People can mark their lawnmowers and equipment using their Eircode. Gardaí recently had a warehouse full of equipment that couldn't be identified and given back. Two people could have the same size and model lawnmower with no identification mark on it, which can't be returned because you can't prove it's yours," he continued.

Cllr Dunne urged the public to report all property theft, regardless of the value of the items stolen. "This device is a double-edged sword - it will help get property back to owners and it will prevent criminals from stealing.

committee induction meeting today (June 28) and the gardaí said burglaries are down 60%, which is good. However, we know that there is a lot of crime out there that is not being reported to the gardaí. People might say 'it's only a lawnmower worth a €100', but they need to report everything so gardaí can get a better grip on the statistics," he added.

James O'Neill of Property Marking Ireland said the crime prevention property marking machine programme has been piloted over the last three years to great effect. "We started the pilot in West Cork, where property theft was a challenge, particularly boating equipment. It reduced crime dramatically once we started to mark the property and put up the signage. It was also piloted in Monaghan over an 18-month period, with the findings also showing a huge reduction in crime," he explained.

Mr O'Neill, whose property marking machine invention has seen him shortlisted for a Social Entrepreneurs Ireland award programme worth €40,000, said the device will tackle the fear of crime and the costs associated as a result of it. "There has been a 38% increase in property theft in the construction industry over the last two years. 14,000 bicycles have also been stolen in the last two years, which is mainly an urban challenge in cities such as Cork, Dublin and Galway. College students have had their bicycles, laptops and mobile phones stolen. Theft has become a big challenge, especially with

our ageing population. People are going through the rituals of checking doors and windows over and over again," he said.

Construction businesses and farmers who use the property marking machine, which is currently based at Property Marking Ireland in Killenaule, will have to pay €2 per marking. "The money will go back into the community group that delivered the programme, so it will generate a small bit of revenue for them." he added.

Eoin goes the extra mile to inspire pupils

Clonmel primary school principal Eoin Morrissey went to great lengths, over 26 miles in fact, to inspire and encourage his pupils to be active.

The St.Mary's CBS principal in Irishtown took on his

It took Eoin over five hours

"I was delighted to finish it. It was a personal best on the day as it was the only marathon I've ever run," he said

Eoin was inspired to motivate his pupils by watching a YouTube video of Chinese school principal, Mr. Zhang Pengfei, leading his pupils through a dance routine every morning to promote fitness and health.

Eoin was naturally apprehensive before the run. Normally, marathons are run through 26 miles of changing cityscapes. Running 26 miles in 87 laps of the same circuit brought greater psychological and physical burdens.

Eoin advised the children that "whatever task you do, it's giving it your best that counts". He cautioned that being too focused on perfectionism "can stop us from getting going and starting a

March4Tipp to monitor N24 traffic pollution

The March4Tipp group has commenced a programme of measuring the adverse environmental effects from the heavy N24 traffic through Tipperary Town.

Padraig Culbert, an activist with March4Tipp, said: "on a number of occasions over the years, former councillor Denis Leahy asked Tipperary County Council to out environmental monitoring of the pollution levels being caused by the N24 traffic through our Council did town. The nothing about it, so we decided would We

something ourselves. Using our own resources, we have purchased scientific monitoring equipment. The equipment will measure noise pollution along the route of the N24 through the town, as well as traffic-related forms of air pollution such as particulates, nitrogen dioxide and volatile organic compounds.

"Recently, concerned residents from O'Connell Road and other areas affected by the intended diversion of N24 traffic through residential areas asked the council about monitoring the environmental and health impacts of this diverted traffic. Again,

nothing happened. The World Health Organisation has pointed out the serious health consequences from noise and other pollution from road traffic. The 7,000 traffic movements through Tipperary Town are leaving a health impact behind them, but nobody in the council or Government seems to want to know about this. Tipperary Town needs an outer relief road in the short term, to rid the town of this health-impacting traffic as soon as possible."

March4Tipp county councillor Annemarie Ryan said that the economic impact of the N24 on the town is well

known, "but we don't know the health impact of the traffic, and we need to know. It is too important an issue so that is why we decided to get our own monitoring equipment. I have children who live, shop and go to school in this town and I want to know what impact the heavy traffic might be having on them. People are living all along the N24 route through town and we deserve to know what price we might be paying for the failure to bypass the town. The Government has failed to get the traffic out of our town and, while I hope that the results of our monitoring show that everything is

ok, I have a feeling that we will end up with evidence that proves the urgency of getting this awful traffic out of the town. At the very least we need an outer relief road to get the heavy traffic away from residential areas. The previous so-called solution by the council was an inner relief road that would have just moved the traffic and the pollution to other residential areas. There has to be an outer relief road soon because the town can't wait 10 to 15 years for a bypass."

March4Tipp will be engaging with businesses and residents along the N24 route through town to identify suit-

able premises and houses to install the monitoring equipment. The plan is to install the equipment in a range of locations, probably for a day at a time. It is also intended to install the equipment along O'Connell Road and O'Brien Street to examine the impact of the N24 diversion that will commence shortly. The results from the monitoring will be referred to pollution experts for an opinion on any health impacts before the results are published. Recording and monitoring will take place over the coming

Council to locate air monitoring unit in town

Tipperary County Council recently confirmed that funding was approved for the procurement of technical advisers for phases 1-4 for the N24 Cahir to Limerick Junction road scheme.

The multi-million euro project will involve preliminary design, route options and planning stages.

The council recognises the ongoing traffic congestion in the town, and a project brief will be prepared to appoint consultants to examine route options for a new inner relief road. In planning an inner relief road for the town, the council stressed that the new route must not undermine the economic case for the

new N24 motorway, i.e. 'funding of two by-passes is not an option'.

In response to suggestions for air monitoring, the council pointed out that the design work on the inner relief road will involve working with the Environmental Protection Agency and the council's environment and climate change team in respect of air quality monitoring. Public consultation will be a critical part of the process for both schemes and will provide an opportunity for the public to highlight aspects of concern or special interest before a route is finalised.

In advance of that work, Tipperary County Council and the Environmental Protection Agency have jointly completed a project to install an Ambient Air Quality Monitoring Station in Tipperary Town. The air monitoring unit was installed at a pilot site at the end of May and is equipped with a FIDAS air monitoring system which monitors and records particulate matter. The unit measures air quality and transmits

the data in real-time, which members of the public can access on the Environmental Protection Agency website. It is intended to relocate the unit to a new location in the town centre area where there are high volumes of traffic throughout.



Great Famine activist to lead Ballingarry walk

The annual Famine 1848 Walk will be led this year by prominent Great Famine activist Michael Blanch.

The walk takes place in Ballingarry on Saturday (July 27) at 3pm. The walk begins at the Young Ireland 1848 and national flag monument in the village of The Commons and proceeds to Famine Warhouse 1848, the OPW state national heritage site and museum

The distance is one and a half miles over gently ascending ground and is usually completed in 45 minutes.

The walk commemorates the million people who died during the Great Famine of 1845-50, the million who fled into exile at the same time and the 1848 Rising which took place in Ballingarry in response to the Famine.

The walk remembers the locals who died or were jailed and the leaders of the Rising, William Smith O'Brien, M.P., Thomas Francis Meagher, Terence Bellew MacManus and Patrick O'Donohoe who were captured, tried in Clonmel for High Treason and sentenced to death. They were subsequently transported to Van Diemen's

Land (Tasmania, Australia).

This year's walk leader is Michael Blanch, chairman of the committee for the Commemoration of Irish Famine Victims. Mr Blanch, a Dubliner, founded the committee in 2003 to campaign for a dedicated national famine day in the Irish public calendar. He maintained that the greatest disaster in Irish history should be marked by the State by a national day.

After a long and strenuous campaign, his efforts were crowned with success this year when the State named the third Sunday in May as the date on which the annual national famine commemoration will be held in future. go the date has been arbitrary.

In 2017, the national commemoration was held at the Famine Warhouse in September.

The walk, an annual act of witness and remembrance, is organised by the Ballingarry 1848 Society, a voluntary society which promotes the Famine Warhouse as a tourist, heritage and education attraction mid-way between the Rock of Cashel and Kilkenny city.

The walk takes place whatever the weather.

Muamba praises 'life-saving' Boston Scientific

A retired Premier League footballer experienced firsthand the "life-saving" work being carried out at Boston Scientific Clonmel.

Former Arsenal, Birmingham City and Bolton Wanderers central midfielder Fabrice Muamba was the special guest at Boston Scientific's annual Everybody Makes an Impact Day.

He was given a guided tour of the Clonmel site, which employs approximately 1,000 people, before delivering a short speech to employees.

Muamba was forced to retire from football after suffering cardiac arrest during a FA Cup match between Bolton Wanderers and Tottenham Hotspur at White Hart Lane in 2012. The ordeal saw the then 23-year-old's

heart stop beating for 78 minutes.

A native of the Democratic Republic of the Congo, he had moved to England at the age of 11 and went on to play for England up until under 21 level

Muamba has the Boston Scientific Clonmel-developed subcutaneous-implantable cardioverter defibrillator (S-ICD) system inserted in his body, providing protection against sudden cardiac death while avoiding risks and complications associated with transvenous leads. According to Boston Scientific, the evolutionary device particularly works well for younger people who have had a sudden cardiac arrest and are at risk of it happening again.

With an electrode placed under the skin, the S-ICD system delivers therapy without the need for wires implanted in the heart, leaving the heart and blood vessels untouched and intact. The battery usually lasts between five and nine years before it needs to be replaced.

Muamba paid tribute to the Clonmel employees who worked on his device. He talked about how difficult it was when his dream of playing professional football came to an abrupt ending, but highlighted how grateful he is to still be alive and to be able to play with his kids.

"I had a lovely day at Boston Scientific Clonmel seeing all the hard work and how pacemakers and ICDs are made. I'm extremely thankful and grateful for these people and the work they do. The more devices are made, the more lives can be saved," he said.



he sun came out Knockanrawley Resource Centre Waste Festival, and there was a real sense of community throughout the day. The workshops were excellent, and gave people, the skills and knowledge, to better deal with the growing mountains, of waste that seen to accompany our modern lives.

I took a stroll around the garden with Timmy Whyte, and every place was full of colour and life. Poppies were the real stars and these attract in natural predators like hoverflies and ladybugs that deal with most garden pests. After such a challenging year, it is a credit to everyone's hard work, and dedication and the garden has peaked, just at the right time.

There were several stands, and I first met two young ladies, who were demonstrating, how to make a bag out of old clothes. They showed me how to make a very sturdy bag, using an old

t-shirt. Also the varied uses of an old sock, for a draught excluder, to a toy for your cat. I have drawers full of old clothes, and this would be a very creative hobby, for my kids on a rainy day.

Nearby there was a buck-

etful of assorted bottle caps, and these were been patiently, stuck onto a large sheet of chipboard. Flowers and insects were emerging from the chaos, and what a great use of an item, we discard each day.

I was eager to learn more, and the next stand was advertising, natural period products. With my young lady hitting the teenage years, this is important awareness for any dad. It also starts to normalize the conservation, and also to be aware that period poverty, is a real issue in today's world.

The ancient art of willow making, always draws a large crowd. People got the opportunity to make a willow fence, and working with willow, is such a natural process.

The urban co-operative

from Limerick, stocks an amazing range of fresh organic produce. They had a glass container full of mealworms. These are the larva of the darkling beetle, and they can eat plastic. Rather that pass it out as pooh, they convert it into carbon dioxide that plants like trees, use to

Homemade fire lighters using egg cartons, and melted candle wax, are a brilliant idea. They burn for far longer, and use can also use waste cooking oil, soaked in paper.

Derry from the Cashle zero waste project, can a very informative talk, and the lessons for this project, can be applied in any community.

I did a walk with Timmy, where we looked at insects as recyclers, and the different plants found in the garden. We handle our waste so badly, and yet nature produces millions of tonnes of leaves each year, and none of it goes to waste. An army of bacteria, slugs, snails and worms all help, convert this material back into the soil.

Tasty food, good company, excellent ideas and sunshine and I came away with a better understanding and appreciation, of how important the human story and supportive communities are in dealing with waste.

The Social, Therapy and Horticultural group meet every Thursday morning at 10am in the round room of the organic garden in Knockanrawley Resource Centre. The Ana Kriegel case has once again highlighted the need for Defamation Law reform after a boy was wrongly identified as one of the teenager's killers, with his picture and personal details shared online and on various messaging apps.

While the internet and the use of social media has given us a world of content and freedom, with that come the risk of slander and defamation, but what can you do if vou are defamed online?

1. WHAT IS DEFAMATION?

The traditional definition of defamation was publication of a false statement which subjected a person to hatred, ridicule or contempt. That rather archaic definition has given way to a more $modern\,one; according\,to\,the$ Defamation Act 2009, a defamatory statement is one which tends to injure a person's reputation in the eyes of reasonable members of society.

Defamation has traditionally been divided into two forms: libel and slander. Historically, libel was the written form of defamation, while slander was the spoken form. The advent of modern technology has made those definitions obsolete. Even though broadcasting is, in one way, a more transient medium than newspapers, the invention of tape and video recorders and the internet means that a false statement can now be

preserved in the same way as a newspaper cutting. So today, a defamatory statement broadcast on radio or television or the internet would be regarded as libellous, rather than slanderous. The 2009 act abolishes the separate torts of libel and slander and replaces them with the "tort of defamation".

An actionable defamatory statement has three ingredi-

it must be published, it must refer to the complainant and

it must be false.

2. DEFENCE TO AN ACTION OF **DEFAMATION**

Justification: Truth is always a complete defence to an allegation of defamation. The defence of justification will succeed if the gist of the statement is true, even though certain details may not be accurate

Privilege: The law recognises that on some occasions an individual's right to free expression should not be inhibited. Where a potentially defamatory statement is made on such occasion, the maker of a statement will be granted immunity from an action in defamation. There are two forms of privilege in Irish law: absolute privilege and qualified privilege

Publish interest: statement must be made on a matter of public interest

Fair comment: In order to plead fair comment, the publisher must establish that the comment was made in relation to a matter of public interest, that what was said was comment and not a statement of fact, and that the comment was fair, in other words, it was honest

Apology: The law of defamation does not recognise defence based on apology or offer of apology

3. WHO IS RESPONSIBLE IF YOU ARE DEFAMED ONLINE?

Material created by users is known as user-generated content (UGC), as distinct from material created and published by the Service Provioder itself, eg Twiiter, Facebook etc. The question for Service Providers is whether they can be liable for UGC that they themselves have not created.

The EU legal framework governing these sites liability for hosting defamatory comments is primarily governed by the so-called 'notice and takedown' mechanism. In principle, service providers such as Google will avoid liability when they react quickly to a complaint of defamatory content by removing it.

This immunity from de-famation liability is described as a "safe harbour". Because member states are prohibited from compelling providers to proactively monitor all material they host, the extent of their duty is limited to reacting to complaints.

However, recent judicial decisions have blurred the boundaries of the 'notice and takedown' safe harbour and there is now evidence of a trend across Europe whereby courts are imposing greater responsibility on these sites, as we have seen in the Ana Kriegel case.

4. WHAT YOU SHOULD DO IF YOU ARE DEFAMED ONLINE

In order to make successful claims for defamation on the Internet, a lot of pieces have to fall together. In certain cases this means that you may be able to restore your reputation through legal action, but might not be able to recover compensation.

'Make life-changing Boston Scien

Deep Brain Stimulation: Dylan White reports on Boston Scientific's Everybody Makes an Impact Day

A "life-changing" device being developed in Clonmel needs to be made available to patients in Ireland.

That was the fundamental take-home from Boston Scientific Clonmel's annual Everybody Makes an Impact Day.

More than 5,000 personalised Deep Brain Stimulation (DBS) devices are made in Clonmel every year by a team of up to 130 people. DBS devices last 25 years and have proven effective in managing Parkinson's disease and other neurological conditions such as essential tremor, dystonia, epilepsy, Tourette syndrome, chronic pain and obsessive compulsive disorder.

DBS involves implanting electrodes in certain areas of the brain. The treatment comprises of an implantable generator surgically inserted under the skin, usually just below the collarbone. This stimulator produces small electrical signals which pass along fine wires, positioned in the subthalamic nucleus of the brain. The electrical currents abnormal brain activity, triggering blood flow and a series of chemical reactions that lead to the release of neurotransmitters. Together, these actions malfunctioning correct reactions in the brain.

Boston Scientific Clonmel is the only site within the Boston Scientific network that manufactures neuromodulation IPGs for DBS

Speaking to South Tipp Today at Boston Scientific's Everybody Makes an Impact Day last Friday, Parkinson's Association of Ireland director Gary Boyle called on the Government to make DBS

surgery available in Ireland.

"At present, the devices are manufactured here in Clonmel for export. Everyone in Ireland who has availed of DBS surgery has had to travel abroad," Mr Boyle, who has been living with Parkinson's disease for 10 years, said.

Mr Boyle estimated that there are approximately 18,000 people living with Parkinson's disease in Ireland, many of whom could benefit from the surgery. "We need to action the HSE now, particularly given the wonderful work that Boston Scientific is doing," he said.

"Not everyone is suitable for DBS, but it has been life-changing for those who had the surgery. Without it, they would be constantly shaking."

In 2012, the Health Information and Quality Authority published the results of a health technology assessment for a national DBS programme for adults with movement disorders. Despite numerous benefits being identified, the assessment found that the cost of a DBS programme in Ireland would exceed the cost of continuing to fund DBS through the Treatment Abroad Scheme (TAS) by approximately €21,000 per

patient over 10 years. Over five years, the total cost of a national DBS programme is estimated at ϵ 1.84 million more than the ϵ 4.29 million required to treat the same number of patients through the TAS, according to the report.

"The HSE is currently funding patients travelling abroad for surgery along with other costs such as their accommodation. However, it does not fund a carer or partner accompanying the patient for what is a major operation that takes up to 10 days. It can be quite traumatic if you are on your own," he explained.

Mr Boyle said surgeons in Ireland need to become skilled in DBS surgery. "The best way to do it would be to facilitate the surgeon coming over here and doing surgeries, which would help build up our local knowledge of the procedure. The surgeons in the UK have been perfecting the technique and there isn't anyone in Ireland doing that. We need a facility and we need to train up our surgeons on it.

"It's quite an expensive surgery and can cost around €50,000, but medication can cost between €20,000 and €40,000 a year so it's very

cost-effective. Our aging population is going to bring with it neurological challenges and the Government needs to invest now. Money it might not have, but it would be far better than spending 10 times that in the future."

A father of two, Mr Boyle worked in a HR director role for an American multinational before Parkinson's disease took its toll. He recalled being "totally blown away by getting an old man's diagnosis" at the age of 44. "It took me a long time to recover from the diagnosis and the way it was delivered. Parkinson's diagnosis is very

upsetting because people are not expecting it, they are normally on their own and it is delivered in a very blasé kind of way.

"The interaction with patients and consultants here is very poor. It's not a very high profile condition, it doesn't have a cure and people living with it are very scared of it. I remember crying my eyes out for day."

He encouraged those living with Parkinson's disease in Ireland to focus on their diet and nutrition, exercise regularly, sleep well, and limit stress. "I ignored exercise at first because I was shaking so much. My

ignored all opportunities that came my way. The stress was affecting the dopamine levels in my brain and my movement.

"Parkinson's disease is life-changing but doesn't have to be life-ending. With the right balance, you can survive Parkinson's and beat it. Families have welcomed their loved ones back into their lives thanks to DBS that's phenomenal," he added.

The HSE was unable to provide the latest figures regarding patients who have travelled abroad for DBS surgery, when contacted by South Tipp Today.

Solar power lights up Clonmel hotel

A Clonmel hotel is now generating 14% of its electricity from solar power.

The photovoltaic solar panels were installed on the roof of Hotel Minella earlier this year

Tipperary Energy Agency vice CEO Siona Daly praises the hotel owners Liz and John Nallen for taking this initiative to move away from fossil fuel usage.

"The hotel had already undertaken some lighting upgrades and this year decided to install the solar panels," she says

Ms Daly says the hotel had plans for further energy-efficient lighting and heating upgrades in the bedrooms. The Tipperary Energy Agency has been responsible for the design, tendering, project management and grant coordination of the sustainable energy improvements at Hotel Minella, and similar projects across the county.

The agency has identified hotels as one of the largest energy users in the community, and says that the improvements at Hotel Minella could be re-applied throughout the county

Grant funding of up to 30% is available for the public and private sectors from the Better Energy Communities Scheme, which provides 50% funding to charities and community facilities.

"The Tipperary Energy Agency is trying to encourage the county to become carbon neutral, while moving away from fossil fuel usage. The upgrades carried out by Hotel Minella are a good example of a business doing just that," says Ms Daly.

The Tipperary Energy Agency, which has offices in Cahir and Nenagh, says it has been successfully supporting Tipperary to reduce its energy demand for 20 years.

Dedicated to looking after the River Suir

The River Suir was the focus of attention as river experts, agency staff and local authorities from across the South East gathered to discuss and work out solutions to water management challenges in the South East.

SuirCan, Clonmel's local environmental NGO, was on hand to show the visitors the River Suir and the recent recreational developments and conservation efforts that have been taking place.

Dr. Fran Igoe, who is the Local Authority Waters Pro-(LAWPRO) gramme Southern Regional Coordinator for the Water Framework Directive, said that it was a great opportunity for the visitors to see first hand all of the great work being done in Clonmel and allow an exchange of knowledge between the agency staff themselves and the local volunteers. "The management of rivers is never straight forward as we try to balance sustainable development with environmental objectives. The River Suir is a Special

Area of Conservation for many species of wildlife and also an important drinking water source and an amenity for a range of recreational users from anglers to kayakers," he said.

The group went onto to Suir Island to look at all of the work being done by SuirCan and Tidy Towns volunteers to remove the noxious invasive plant, the giant hogweed. The group also looked at the new car park on the island and discussed options to mitigate against surface waste run off and climate change.

Tipperary County Council heritage officer Roisin O'Grady gave an overview of the heritage of the river and the work being done by the council to develop it. Projects such as a potential forest project in Kilcash were also discussed along with Tipperary's Well or Arra project in which Paddy O'Dwyer of Tipperary County Council has been heavily involved with colleagues in the council and Tipperary Chamber of

Commerce. This would see river walks, biodiversity improvements and habitat restoration take place in Tipperary town.

According to Dr Igoe, this new collaborative approach to water management has been welcomed by the public. Alan Moore and Theresia Guschlbauer from SuirCan were delighted to be able to showcase all of the great work being carried out by volunteers on Suir island and look forward to the eradication of the hazardous giant hogweed without using chemicals.

Working closely with LAWPRO, this is the first project of its type in the country and avoids any potential run off of herbicides into waterways which could impact on water quality. Theresia stated that she was "very pleased to be able to share our experiences with these agency staff who clearly care about our natural waterways."

New park plan to link Rock with town centre

Tipperary County Council is pushing ahead with plans to develop a new recreation area and town park in Cashel.

The aim is to link the Rock of Cashel with the town centre.

Over the years, concerns have been raised that many visitors to the iconic rock do not come down into the town centre.

The council recently appointed landscape artists Paul Hogarth and Company, along with other consultants, to explore how to tap into getting tourists to spend more time in Cashel.

An initial plan for a new park was unveiled recently at an information day where the public were invited to give their views on the proposal.

"We wanted to know what people thought of the potential for a town park between the Rock and the town centre," said Anthony McGuigan of Paul Hogarth.

"There is a green field there and we want to see how we might link the two car parks, the Bishop's Walk together," he said.

The proposed site is to the back of the Cashel Palace Hotel. Mr McGuigan pointed out that there had been talk of such a plan for a number of years and now they wanted to see what its potential was. "This would be a win-win for the town," said Mr McGuigan.

The proposal has been welcomed by district cathaoirleach Cllr Michael Fitzgerald, who said that while it was at the early stages, he welcomed any development that would be positive.

"It is only a proposal at the moment, but when you have the amount of tourists that Cashel gets, you need to keep them in town," he said.

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


