Fight for Tipperary's mental health services this Saturday

As many people as possible have been urged to take to the streets in Clonmel's town centre this weekend to highlight what has been described as "the absolutely dire situation" with Tipperary's mental health services.

The group Tipperary's Fight for Mental Health Services has organised a march and rally that will convene at Clonmel's Main Guard at 2.30pm this Saturday after-

noon (September 28).

Speaking at a meeting of Clonmel Borough District, Cllr. Pat English requested everyone to support the march to put pressure on the government to restore the services that had been taken away, most notably with the closure of St. Michael's psychiatric unit in Clonmel seven years ago.

Following the closure of St. Michael's, all acute in-patient services were transferred to the Department of Psychiatry at St. Luke's Hos-

pital in Kilkenny, which is the designated approved centre for the South Tipperary, Kilkenny and Carlow area.

However, Cllr. English said the number of available beds in Kilkenny wasn't adequate.

He also said he was very disappointed with the responses from Health Minister Simon Harris and Jim Daly, Minister for Mental Health and Older People, to the recent representations from Clonmel Borough District.

In his role as chairperson of Tipperary County Council, Cllr. Michael Murphy said he had agreed that hospital consultant Professor Paud O'Regan, and possibly retired psychiatric consultant Dr. Alan Moore would address the next meeting of the County Council in Clonmel on October 9 in terms of the deficit of mental health beds in this area. Cllr. Murphy backed the appeal for support for this Saturday's march.

DMS to create another 50 jobs at its Cashel centre

A financial services multinational company has announced plans to hire an extra 50 staff at its Cashel offices, bringing its workforce in the town up to 100.

Minister for Business Enterprise and Innovation Heather Humphreys officially opened the spacious new offices of DMS Governance covering two units at Cashel Shopping Centre surrounded by senior IDA officials, managers and staff of the company.

Tipperary County Council chairman Cllr Michael Murphy, CEO Joe MacGrath, most of the county's TDs and a large number of local councillors also attended the opening ceremony.

DMS is a global governance, risk and compliance company that is based in Dublin as well as Cashel. It set up its Cashel centre in June last year when it acquired Cashel-based Aviation Corporate Services, which was founded in 2010 by Niall McNamara who lives in Portroe and Frank Dowling who lives in Cashel.

Aviation Corporate Services provided financial and administration services to the aviation industry and employed six staff based on Cashel's Main Street up to the time of its acquisition. DMS

announced the creation of 50 extra jobs at its new Cashel centre when it acquired it last year. It has already recruited a large number of these 50 staff, who moved into the new offices at Cashel Shopping Centre in early July.

The Cashel section of DMS continues to work in financial services for the aviation sector and also in Special Purpose Vehicles (SPVs). The 50 additional financial services jobs DMS announced are scheduled to be created over the next five years, but the company expects this recruitment target will be achieved well ahead of that schedule.

Minister Humphreys said she was delighted to officially open DMS' new Cashel offices and welcomed the announcement of another 50 highly skilled new financial services jobs. "It's great to see more high quality jobs coming into the town and county. It's a sign that this region is really transforming. Thank you for the investment and on behalf of the Government I wish you every success in the exciting chapter ahead," she said.

Frank Dowling of DMS Governance said this was a day of celebration. He paid tribute to the support the IDA and Tipperary County Council gave the company. He particularly mentioned County Council staff who as-

sisted the firm in its search for office space in the Cashel area. He thanked the management of DMS for seeing the potential of a Cashel office.

Mr Dowling praised Cashel as an excellent central location to do business. It is

situated just off the motorway and close to the rail network, he said. Other advantages he cited were the availability of a well trained and highly motivated workforce, access to three third level colleges in the region, and good broadband infra-

structure. Its staff commuted from Limerick, Waterford, Kilkenny and across Tipperary.

Mr Dowling said these were exciting times for DMS Cashel and they look forward to the next steps in the global DMS journey.

IDA head of regional development Ann-Marie Tierney Le Roux described the opening of DMS' new Cashel offices as a really exciting milestone in the growth of the company's operations in Ireland and assured DMS of the IDA's continued support.

Kathy voted as new chair of Irish Dementia Working Group

Inspirational Cashel dementia advocate Kathy Ryan has been voted in as new chair of the Irish Dementia Working Group (IDWG).

The national advocacy group is supported by The Alzheimer Society of Ireland,

which gives voice to the lived experience of dementia and has over 25 active members all of whom have a diagnosis of some form of dementia. Members range in age from 40 to 79 and are from all corners of the country.

Kathy was voted in as the new chair of the IDWG with a two-year term of office from her fellow advocates and members of the group.

Kathy was diagnosed with Younger Onset Alzheimer's in January 2014 at the age of 53 and is a mother of two boys. She got involved in advocacy work because she wants to break down the stigma of dementia and this September

will be taking part in The ASI's Camino Adventure fundraiser after successfully completing it last year.

"I am honoured and humbled to have been voted in as the new chair of the IDWG by my colleagues and friends. I promise to work hard on behalf of everyone who has dementia and will give this role everything for the coming two years in of-

fice," she said.

"The IDWG is a unique group of pioneers and innovators. Ten years ago nobody living with dementia in Ireland was speaking publicly and in less than a decade, with the support of The Alzheimer Society of Ireland, we have changed that.

"Ireland is an international leader in dementia voice – indeed many coun-

tries do not have working groups of people with dementia or formal structures to have their voice heard. I am really looking forward to the coming two years and hoping that I can make a difference to the lives of people living with dementia and to ensure that their voice, our voice is amplified in all corners of the country and all areas of society."

Sharon crowned Ireland's Best Young Entrepreneur

The co-founder of a Clonmel healthcare company that develops pharmaceutical cancer treatments for children and women has been named Ireland's Best Young Entrepreneur for 2019.

Sharon Cunningham, co-founder of Shorla Pharma, was awarded the top accolade and secured a total investment fund of €40,000 for Shorla Pharma, which also won the national category for Best Start Up Business.

Sharon was presented with her Young Entrepreneur Award at a ceremony at Google headquarters in Dublin.

Sharon, a qualified chartered accountant from Stradbally in County Waterford, founded Shorla Pharma in 2018 with Clonmel woman Orlaith Ryan to help improve existing treatments for children's and women's cancers by making them more user-friendly. This included the re-development of a children's cancer drug from a difficult-to-swallow capsule into an oral solution.

Shorla Pharma is located at the Questum Centre in Clonmel. Following the prize giving ceremony, Sharon announced that the company will start recruiting in the coming months, building up

to the recruitment of 14 staff by 2021.

"It is a great honour for the company as it gives us national and international exposure at such a pivotal point in the development of the company," said Sharon.

Sharon and Orlaith set up Shorla Pharma in January 2018. They had both worked together in Eirgen in Waterford. Eirgen was sold in 2015 and they both left the company in 2017 to set up their own company.

They decided on Clonmel because of the presence of the Questum Centre, the fact that Orlaith was from Clonmel and the presence of Tom Brennan who was an entrepreneur in residence in Questum.

"Tom was an inspiration to the two of us. We watched Tom and Patsy Carney start up Eirgen from nothing and turning Eirgen into an incredible success story," said Sharon.

The programme, which is run by the network of local enterprise offices in local authorities nationwide and supported by the Department of Business and Enterprise Ireland, attracted more than 1,600 applicants in 2019, with an investment fund of €2 million. Some 186 entrants secured investments of €3,000 to €15,000 each.

Cllr. Siobhan Ambrose called for as many people as possible to take to the streets on Saturday because there was "an absolutely dire situation" in Tipperary with regard to mental health services. She said there was such inadequacy for pa-

tients who needed acute beds.

"Our hearts go out to all mental health sufferers and their families regarding the lack of available support. If we need to meet Minister Daly again, well and good," said Cllr. Ambrose.

District Mayor Garret Ahearn described the lack of

acute beds in the county as "a real crisis", and he also requested people to support Saturday's march in Clonmel. He praised local priest Fr. Michael Toomey, from St Peter and Paul's, who met with Minister Daly in recent months, for having done a lot of work in this regard. Cllr. Ahearn said he had also met Minister Daly the previous

week and highlighted the situation in Clonmel, where more beds and resources were needed.

The Mayor said that services like Jigsaw (Youth Mental Health) were needed more in Clonmel and Carrick-on-Suir than the rest of the county. He also said that the Crisis House in Clonmel would be very important.

The people of the county have been requested to stand as one with the group Tipperary's Fight for Mental Health Services at their awareness rally and march, which will gather at the Main Guard in Clonmel at 2.30pm this Saturday, September 28.

"The people must send a powerful message to our government that we need proper and acute beds and facilities in Tipperary and we need them now", said a spokesperson for the group.

A similar rally and march held in June of last year was attended by more than 1,000 people, and organisers are hoping for an even bigger turnout on Saturday week.

The Tipperary's Fight for Mental Health Services group was formed two years ago over growing concerns about the high number of suicides in the county.

"In 2012 St. Michael's psy-

chiatric unit in Clonmel was closed down with the promise of a Rolls Royce system to replace it.

"Minister of State and Labour TD Kathleen Lynch said it was set in blood," said the spokesperson.

The group is angry and frustrated that such a system has failed to materialise.

"Outside of Dublin, Tipperary has the highest suicide level in the country.

"The sad fact of the matter is that for each and every one of the people who lost their lives there was not one acute or crisis bed available in Tipperary.

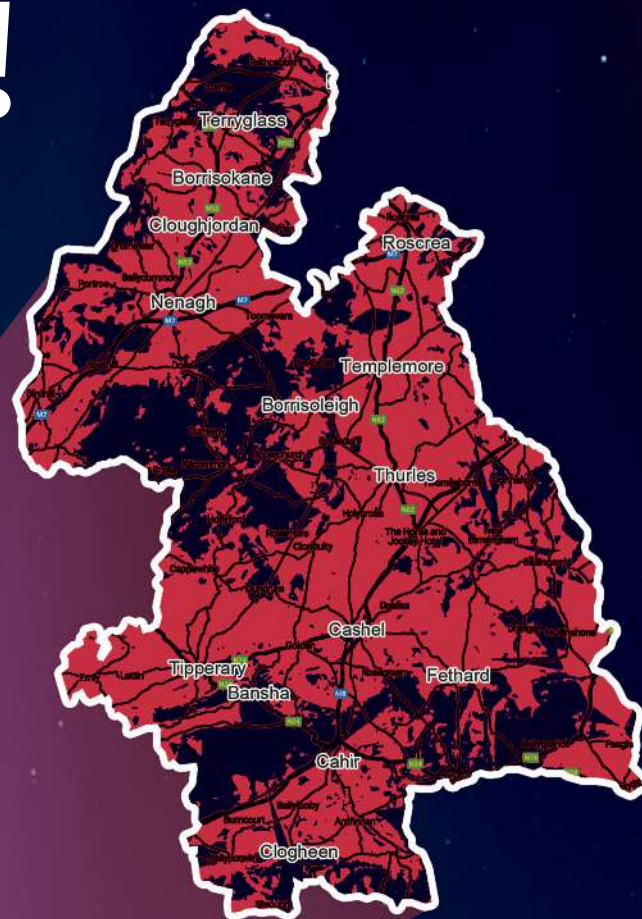
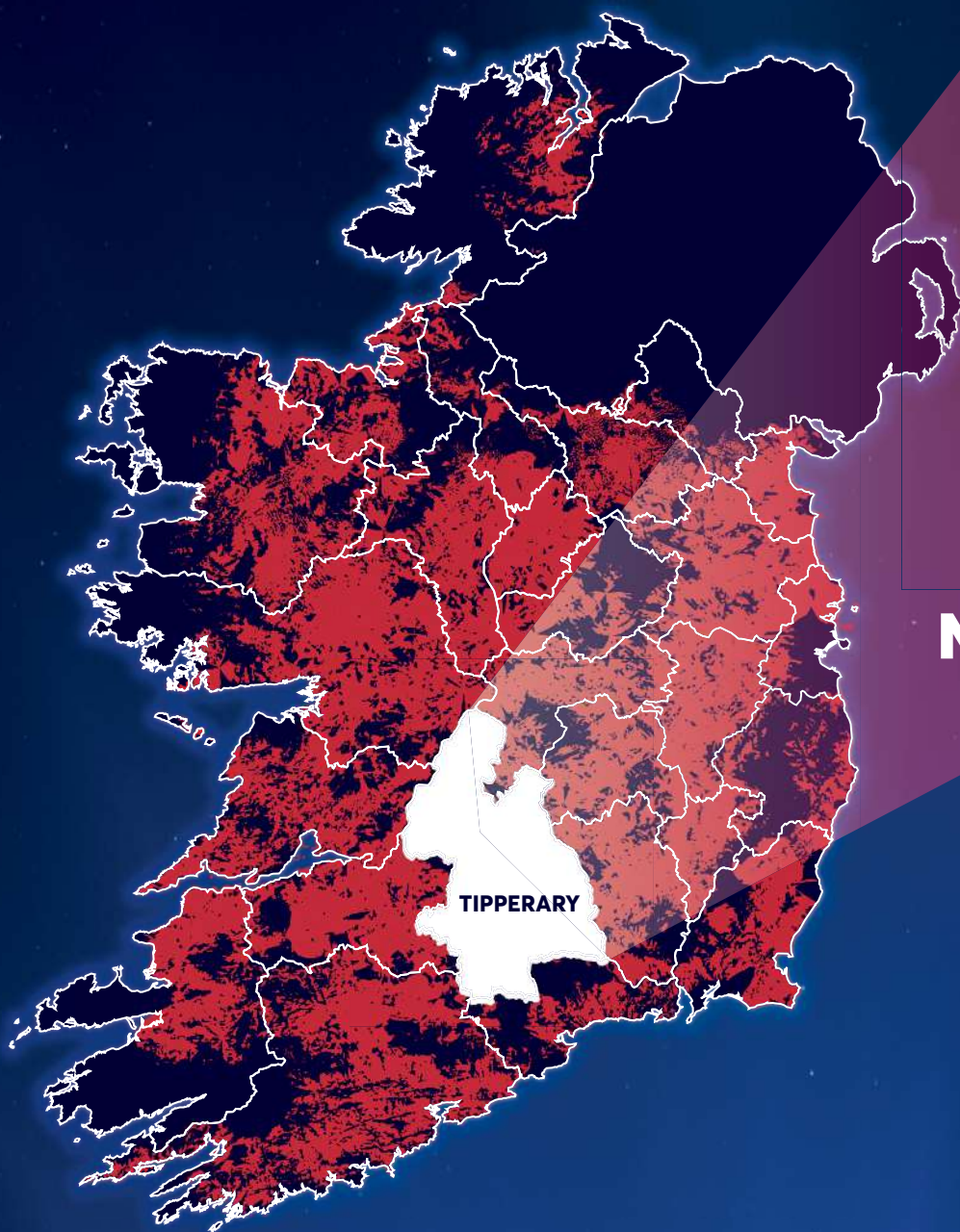
"The people from South Tipperary are being sent to an overcrowded and overworked hospital in Kilkenny.

"The people from North Tipperary are also being sent to an overcrowded and overworked hospital in Ennis, where people are waiting for between four to six months to see a psychiatrist," the spokesperson added.

Happy days again as stolen Duke is returned to owner

A pensioner said getting his four-legged friend back after the dog was stolen from a woman's arms was as good as the All-Ireland win.

Micheal Kearney, aged 71, from Tipperary Town said he hardly slept or ate for a week because he was so worried over his Jack Russell Terrier, Duke.

His beloved pooch was returned to him after he was seen being thrown from a moving car in Caherconlish. Limerick Animal Welfare and West Limerick Animal Aid combined to return Duke, called after John Wayne's nickname, to Micheal's grateful arms.

It all started when Duke wandered from his home on Monday, September 26.

"He strayed up the town which he shouldn't have done. Duke was not too far away from my house but still further than he should have been. This kind lady came across him and knew that he belonged to me. She picked him up in her arms and was going to give me a ring because I have my phone number on his collar," said Micheal.

She didn't get a chance to

contact him.

"This chap came along. He asked, 'Is that your dog?' She said it was. He snapped the dog out of her arms, into a car and gone," said Micheal.

Michael, a single gentleman who is on dialysis, is a diabetic and has arthritis 4 was heartbroken.

"Oh Lord almighty it was like losing a family member when he was gone. I'll never forget the week I put down. I couldn't eat or sleep. I was

fierce worried. I was up every morning at 7am to try and find him. I was driving all around looking for Duke. I was in the worst form possible. My kind friends and neighbours were also searching."

Micheal got a gift of the terrier when he was a little pup. For the next five and half years they have been inseparable.

"Without fear of contradiction he is my best friend.

Outside of human beings you couldn't make a nicer friend."

Just when he was beginning to give hope his phone rang on the following Sunday night.

"I got a call from Limerick Animal Welfare in Kilfinane. A kind lady called Marie O'Connor asked me did I own a little Jack Russell Terrier. Jesus, I jumped! I said, 'I do'. She said they had him in Kilfinane.

"The person who saw my dog being thrown out of a moving car in Caherconlish rang Marita Davis, of West Limerick Animal Aid. She came and collected the dog and brought Duke to Kilfinane. They in turn contacted me to say it was my dog."

COULDN'T SLEEP DUE TO THE EXCITEMENT

The thieves had ripped off Duke's collar and Micheal's phone number. But as Micheal had microchipped the dog Limerick Animal Welfare could contact him.

That night Micheal couldn't sleep but it was due to excitement.

"I go for an auld glass of cider once or twice a week just to put down an hour and I could have gone around the pub kissing everybody. It was

better than winning the EuroMillions. It was as good as Tipperary winning the All-Ireland."

The next morning he set off bright and early for Limerick Animal Welfare's sanctuary where Micheal and Duke were reunited.

"He was a little bit traumatised and still is a little bit but he gave me hugs and kisses. I brought him to the vet straight away to show him his paws. He is licking them because they are scratched after being thrown from the car and landing on the ground.

"What kind of person could do a thing like that? How are people so cruel? I can't understand it. The vet gave him an injection and tablets. He is on one a day for six days."

Micheal wants to thank everyone who helped him get Duke back.

"A million thanks to all the people who helped - my friends and neighbours, the kind person who saw Duke being thrown out of the car and contacted Marita, Marita for collecting him and Marie in Limerick Animal Welfare for returning him to me."

Marie and Marita said they were "so happy to see them reunited".

'Extra hours' a good news story for Tipp Town Library

Opening hours at Tipperary Library are expected to increase significantly by mid November.

The move to extend hours and open the library on Wednesdays has been welcomed by Cllr. Annemarie Ryan and by the Friends of Tipperary Town Library.

Following a meeting between Cllr Ryan and County Librarian Damian Dullaghan, it has been confirmed that the Tipperary Town Library will soon open five days a week, Monday to Friday.

It will also stay open during lunch times and there will be an additional one late evening opening (day to be confirmed).

Further good news followed at the recent Nenagh Council meeting, when County Librarian Damian Dullaghan announced that the Tipperary Town Library has also been prioritised in South Tipperary to be included in the second phase of the Department of Rural and Community Development, 'Open Libraries' initiative. Friends of Tipperary Town Library were also informed by Karl Cashen (Director of Services) that Tipperary County Council are currently awaiting the roll out of this initiative and envisage that it will facilitate Saturday opening in Tipperary Town.

In the meantime, a new manager and a further full-time member of staff are in the process of being recruited. It is hoped that both new staff members will be in place very soon, allowing the improved week-day opening hours to commence mid-November.

Tipperary Town Library is currently open for 26 hours per week. With the increased staffing, the library will now be open for approximately 40.5 hours.

"These new opening hours are a huge improvement on the existing service, allowing the public to use the library during their lunch break and one evening a week" said Cllr. Ryan.

The Friends of Tipperary Town Library welcomed the increased opening hours for the town and said they would continue to lobby Tipperary County Council to deliver library services on Saturdays in the future.

WILD ABOUT SOUTH TIPP

The wildlife of the Irish hedgerow

Tipperary is basking in the early autumn sunshine, and like us wildlife is making the most of the beautiful days. One woman I was chatting to have prematurely packed away her summer clothes, and passed them on to charity. She solved the shorts problem by cutting the legs of her tracksuit, and this is a great idea, for a recycling project.

I try to get out as much as possible, and have been exploring my local Hedgerow. These are vital habitats for birds, insects, flowers and animals, and are bursting with life after a good start to September.

DON'T PRUNE TOO HARSHLY

Hawthorn is the main tree species, and the blood red haws are dripping from the branches. When the weather gets really cold, many species of birds, including migrant redwings and fieldfares, will depend on these berries to help survive the winter. If we prune our hedgerows too harshly, birds are deprived of not only shelter but food.

Other tree species are blackthorn, with its sloes for infusing gin. Snowberry was introduced as cover for game birds, but they never really took to it. The white berries are out and for the first time, I saw a bird feeding on them. Two starlings were eating the smaller berries, and when they perch in another tree,

along the hedgerow, they will help to spread this plant.

Another first was speckled woods, feeding on the flowers of the snowberry. There can be up to three generations, of this shade loving butterfly, in a good summer. With fewer flowers out for these late butterflies, they have to take any opportunity for a sip of nectar.

Knapweed large purple flowers, are just starting to fade, and these have attracted small tortoiseshell butterflies. I already have two hibernating on the roof, of the spare room, while outside other butterflies are still wining and dining.

A few common carder bumblebees were still on the wing. These females have no more work for the colony, and have been released from duties. They will spent their last days feeding on the flowers of knapweed, before the cold and hungry finishes them off.

CLEVER INSECTS

The sun has also brought out hoverflies, of all colours and descriptions. These clever insects mimic the warning colours of wasps, but they have no sting and are perfectly harmless. They darted between the flowering plants, and a few reckless individuals, even toyed with the spiders on the webs.

On the electricity wires above the hedgerow, around 50 Housemartins were perched. They were busy chattering and topping up on

the last of the day's insects. Housemartins can be confused with swallows, but they have an "M" shaped tail, and a white rump on their back.

Each spring a few dozen pairs build their mud nests, on the houses along my road. In all my years living here, they have visited all of my neighbour's houses, but have never come near me.

In the heart of hedgerow I could hear, the settling calls of blackbirds. Their loud indignant calls echo from the trees. They have been busy feeding on the dwindling supply of elderberries, much to the annoyance of the resident robin.

A pair have been arguing over this bush, for the last two weeks. While they have been busy singing, and trying to establish territorial rights, the blackbirds have been stripping the bush bare. Robins switch to a mainly fruit diet in autumn, and the elder berries are the perfect size for its small beak.

The last creatures are a few wary rabbits. They are out enjoying the sunshine and nibbling on the grasses and flowers, found along the base of the hedgerow. They caution is warranted, as I have often seen a fox patrolling along here.

Hedgerows are the last refuge for many species of wildlife, and by managing them in a sustainable manner, we will be helping conserve many different species of birds, flowers and insects.

Your financial and property affairs or

Your health and personal affairs or

All of your affairs (financial, property, health & personal affairs).

You may give your Attorney as much or a little power as you choose, for example:

What to do with your house or investment properties

Where you will live

Who you will live with

Your diet and dress

Other very personal decisions which directly affect you and your future care.

You can nominate another person you would like the Attorney to consult with, so that the Attorney can take that person's views into account.

FINANCIAL AND PROPERTY AFFAIRS

A general power grants your Attorney free rein to deal with your assets in whichever way they choose, subject to the actions being in your "best interests".

You should also remember that, at present, once registered, your Attorney will have little or no supervision.

HOW MANY ATTORNEYS CAN I HAVE?

You may choose one Attorney or more than one.

If you choose more than one, you can specify how they make decisions:

Jointly - that is, they must all act together and cannot act separately, or

Jointly and severally - they can all act together but they can also act separately if they wish.

CAN AN ATTORNEY'S REGISTRATION BE REFUSED?

An application may be refused if:

The Power created by the document is no longer valid

The Donor (you) is not mentally incapacitated or not capable of becoming mentally incapacitated

The Attorney is not a suitable person to fulfil the role

Fraud or undue influence was used to induce the Donor (you) to create the power

IS THERE ANY RESTRICTION ON WHO I CAN APPOINT?

An Enduring Power of Attorney may be granted to individuals or trust corporations but may not be granted to:

People under the age of 18

Bankrupts

People convicted of offences involving fraud or dishonesty

People disqualified under the Companies Acts

An individual or trust corporation who owns a nursing home in which you live or an employee or agent of the owner, unless that person is also your spouse, civil partner, child or sibling.

There are many reasons that might justify you making an Enduring Power of Attorney.

You may have a history of mental illness, alzheimers or pre-senile dementia in the family. You may be involved in an accident or you may have an illness that will leave you unable to look after yourself.

However, the most obvious reason is that we do not know what lies ahead and if you don't have an EPA you will have no one to carry out your wishes in accordance with your wishes.

script development skills. A three of the Walled Town locations number of workshops took place in throughout Munster Vales: But-

will set high standards for all the partners working to revitalise Tipperary Town," he says.

The minister says that Ms. Fox will play a key role in bringing all local stakeholders together to develop an agreed path forward for the town.

The first key step in the revitalisation process will be the production of a Collaborative Town Centre Health Check for Tipperary Town. The Health Check is a pilot initiative developed by the Heritage Council, which brings together the private, public and civic sectors in a town to develop an agreed town centre-led commercial, heritage and tourism baseline from which an action plan can then be developed.

Minister English thanks Heritage Council chief executive Virginia Teehan for facilitating the inclusion of Tipperary Town in the initial pilot phase of the Health Checks process.

He also confirms that the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government is making funding available to assist with the recruitment of a full-time project manager who will work on developing agreed actions and funding proposals on foot of the finalised Tipperary Town Health Check. Tipperary County Council is fully committed to supporting this project and it is hoped that the recruitment process will commence in the coming months.

Fine Gael general election candidate Cllr Garret Ahearn welcomes the announcement, adding: "I want to wish all the participants in this revitalisation project the very best. I know Ms. Fox will meet with Alison Harvey of the Heritage Council early next week to discuss a more detailed timeline for the Tipperary Town Health Check and that this will then inform the timing of the recruitment of a full-time project manager."

CLONMEL STUDENTS JOIN WORLDWIDE CLIMATE PROTEST

Clonmel students joined the worldwide climate protest last Friday, inspired by the example of Swedish student and climate activist Greta Thunberg.

They joined millions of people, children and adult supporters around the world in a global day of action demanding a radical reduction in greenhouse gas emissions and a ramping up of government action to achieve a fossil fuel-free world.

There were separate demonstrations around Clonmel, some at school gates including very lively gatherings outside Loreto and another at the Presentation, as well as a town centre event at the Main Guard.

There, students from the High School, accompanied by teacher Jessica Rowe, created

an interactive demonstration with singing, chanting and a powerful speech delivered by Culann Roche, while fellow pupil Tommy Hanrahan led the chanting.

Positive interaction with the public included passing motorists honking their horns in support and a large group of people gathered at the Main Guard including Mayor Garret Ahearn and TDs Seamus Healy and Mattie McGrath, as well as Cllr. Pat English.

The event was also supported by community bodies including local environment group Suircan.

Placards on display included such slogans as Planet over Profit and demands for Taoiseach Leo Varadkar and Environment Minister Richard Bruton to do more now to combat climate breakdown.

Community rallies behind family to finish dream home

Community spirit is alive and well in Tipperary as tradespeople, suppliers and volunteers turned out over the last nine days in their hundreds to help a Dundrum family finish their house for brand new RTÉ One series DIY SOS: The Big Build Ireland.

Michael and Sinead Barry were like any other family in Ireland, a young married couple in their 30s with three young children - 13, 6, and 1 - and Michael the breadwinner was self-building their home. In January Michael began complaining of vision problems and was diagnosed with Stage 4 Melanoma and passed away just a short time later in March. With no life insurance and no other income, it looked like the house would not be able to be finished.

However, on September 17, the DIY SOS team rolled into town and over 120 volunteers from across Tipperary and from as far away as Donegal, Roscommon, Louth and Mayo, turned up that very first day to try and finish the home.

"We have been absolutely overwhelmed by the support of the Tipperary community who have come together to try and finally get Sinead and her children into this house that Michael worked so hard for. His dream was to give his family a beautiful home and secure future - and through the massive generosity of so many people's time, supplies and resources it looks like Mi-

chael's dream is finally going to be complete," said series producer of DIY SOS Ireland Sharon Newman.

The new Irish Series is presented by Baz Ashmawy and the very first build chosen was the Barry family from Dundrum.

"As a TV Series, DIY SOS is just the catalyst to try and bring people together to help. We rely completely on the goodwill of people to make these build projects happen. Tipperary has done itself proud - we have had huge numbers each day, wanting to do their bit to help this family in need. Though the work is hard, and the hours are long, the camaraderie, cheerfulness and spirit amongst

everyone is unlike anything you have ever seen before."

Thirty-four-year-old Sinéad from Cappawhite met local boy Michael Barry when she was 19. It took just one date to the cinema and they were inseparable.

They settled down and started their family life together and had been renting a house for the last 14 years.

As their family grew, so did their hopes of a home of their own: they found a lovely site to build their dream home in 2014 and raise their children outside of the village of Dundrum. Not wanting to burden themselves with a mortgage, they used any savings or extra money at the end of each month to chip away at each

job that needed to be done.

Michael, who was from a family of nine, was the breadwinner and worked locally as steel erector, but as a talented woodturner and craftsman he undertook much of the work in the house himself, sacrificing his evenings and weekends.

As a family, all their time, hopes and dreams were pumped into the house.... And when they felt that pinch of sacrifice, they would remind each other how "once they are in the house they would start living properly".

Finally they reached a decision to apply for a small loan to complete the house, as they were rapidly outgrowing their rented cottage.

But in the end, they never got to apply for that loan. After complaining of vision problems in his eye over Christmas 2018, Michael was admitted to hospital in January this year. He was diagnosed with a brain tumour and further tests diagnosed it as Stage 4 Metastatic Melanoma. Subsequent scans revealed the disease had spread to his back, liver and lungs.

In a matter of weeks Michael's health deteriorated rapidly. He slipped into a coma on March 23 and passed away surrounded by Sinead and family.

"The house is on a beautiful site, there is something very special about the place and we all hope it will bring Sinead and the children a lot of healing," said Michael's sister, Caitriona, who alerted the DIY SOS team.

Clonmel Show Society launch €15,000 Bursary Awards

The Clonmel Show Society recently launched its 2019-20 Bursary Awards scheme.

A number of bursary grants will be awarded to projects that promote research and development in the fields of agriculture, horticulture, forestry or equine, which reflect the core objectives of the Clonmel Show Society.

Innovative proposals for feasibility studies, study tours and structured academic, practical or market-based research relating to farm enterprises, agri-tourism or home crafts/in-

dustries will be especially welcomed.

At least one bursary will be awarded to projects/studies in sustainability and/or the environment.

The Clonmel Show was first held in 1865 with the stated objective "to improve agriculture in all its branches" and this continues to be its core objective 154 years later.

Applications are invited from those living within a 20 mile radius of Clonmel (eligible areas outlined on its website) who qualify under the criteria outlined above.

Only online applications are accepted, and the closing date for entries is midnight on October 18.

A panel of three adjudicators, totally independent of the show society, will select the award winners, with the results being announced in November. Applicants will be invited to personally present their project to the judges and credits will be given for an analysis of the costs involved in project.

These bursaries were first awarded in 2011, with €107,000 being paid out since then to some 51 recipients.

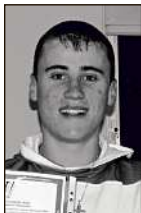

Such was the demand to see the fantasy film about a Carrick-on-Suir family of monster slayers that a special preview screening for the 40 cast and crew members young and old took place at the Nagle Centre last Thursday night.

Linda Fahy of the Tudor Artisan Hub said the Nagle Centre's nuns chapel was packed to capacity for the Culture Night premier. "It received a fantastic reception from the audience and we have plans to screen it again possibly in Brewery Lane Theatre," she said. The 40-minute Culture Night film was written and directed by Daragh McLoughlin from Main St., Carrick-on-Suir and produced by the Tudor Artisan Hub collective. It starred many well known actors from Carrick-on-Suir Musical Society and Brewery Lane Theatre.

The film screening was one of several events staged in Carrick for Culture Night. Different Voices concert at Carrick-on-Suir Library featured an eclectic mix of performances from members of Carrick-on-Suir Musical Society, two Georgian brothers and a local musical duo while Carrick folk singers and musician Kevin Power sang traditional Gaelic songs from his CD 'Ceol na Siúire in Ormond Castle. Brewery Lane hosted a photographic exhibition and screened a documentary

about the Comeragh Mountains hermit Lackendarra.

Heritage Centre

The first phase of the transformation of Carrick-on-Suir Heritage Centre into an interpretive centre showcasing the 5,000 year history of Carrick-on-Suir is on course to be finished in November.

Carrick-on-Suir Development Association, which runs the Heritage Centre, has already obtained €174,000 in grant aid for phase one of the project but needs to raise an extra €50,000 as matching funding for capital improvements, marketing and management.

A fundraising drive, spearheaded by Carrick-on-Suir Tourism & Economic Development Committee (COSTEDC) is underway to raise that money.

Up to 700 local individuals and businesses are being contacted and asked for a monthly direct debit contribution over the next three years.

COSTEDC chairman Tony Musiol said all contributions, not just direct debit payments, are welcome. He explained that phase one of the Heritage Centre's revamp involves refurbishment of the former church's building structure and remodelling of its interior to make it more suitable for accommodating interpretive displays about Carrick's history.

The revamp's second phase that will involve the interior transformation of the building into an interpretive centre will cost about €500,000. Mr Musiol said they are seeking funding for this phase through grant applications. "Tourism and business agencies are working together to attract up to 50,000 visitors to the Ormond Castle each year by the mid 2020s and COSTEDC plans to attract at least 15,000 of these into the town centre to visit the

Heritage Centre.

Mr Musiol said these extra visitors will be worth millions in revenue to local businesses and help create jobs for the town's future generations.

He appealed to local people and businesses to support the fundraising campaign.

"This is a great opportunity to show what people are capable of and a chance to secure the future economy and enjoyment of living in Carrick-on-Suir."

COSTEDC will set up information points in the town in the coming weeks to answer any queries the public has about the Heritage Centre project and fundraising campaign. CAHIR TIDY TOWNS

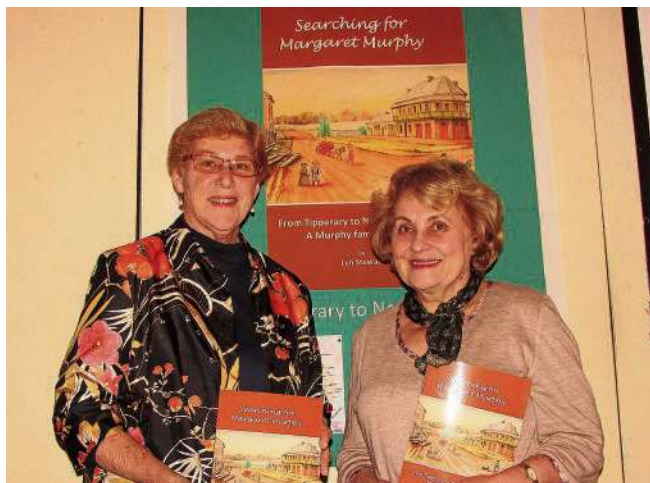

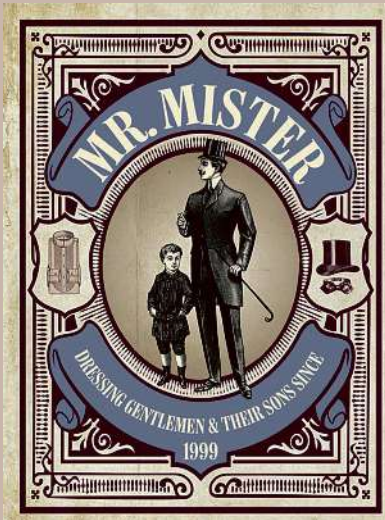
