'Don't be afraid to pick up the phone or meet with someone you can talk to'

Former Tipperary hurler
John Leahy was among a
number of speakers from
the worlds of sport, policing
and education to give a
presentation to the Abbey
CBS in Tipperary Town last
week on the issue of mental
health awareness.

The event was organised by local sports pundit Stevie O'Donnell, who assembled a range of speakers to share their experiences of gambling, alcohol and drug abuse, the importance of sport for a healthy mind and body, and how some mistakes can have far-reaching consequences.

The event was attended by hundreds of students from Tipperary Town's secondary schools-the Abbey, St Ailbe's and St Anne's, as well as Rockwell College in Cashel.

Opening the event, past pupil David Condon warned of the dangers and consequences of online bullying, particularly given that it can take many forms and is accessible with the opening of an app on a smartphone, which makes it hard for the target to escape.

Following him was Limerick hurling manager and principal of the Abbey CBS

John Kiely, who took up the theme of bullying. He advised students that bullying should not be hidden and that they should not be afraid to reach out for help when times become difficult.

The experiences of members of An Garda Síochana were also at hand. Tipperary Town's Community Garda John Hennessy shared his experiences of being bullied when he was in school, while Garda Niamh Dooley from the Road Policing Unit in Cahir shared how she has experienced members of her own family being verbally attacked online. She also outlined how, when someone is targeted for bullying, entire families can be affected.

Garda Anastasia Murphy from Thurles Garda Station is a forensic collision specialist who is based in Thurles. She described how, through her profession, she has witnessed the devastating consequences of speeding, failure to wear a seatbelt, as well as drink and drugdriving.

The ease with which people can acquire and become dependant on drink and drugs was a topic that former Tipperary hurler John Leahy dealt with. He spoke of how easy it is to get

someone hooked on either intoxicant, warning that it is then that people's troubles can start.

A firsthand account of the addictive and destructive nature of gambling was given by local man Brian 'Boca' Glasheen. Brian became addicted to gambling at a young age, and he told the students present of how "money became my God" and resulted in him stealing from his employer to support his habit.

He described the "dark road" that he embarked on at that time in his life, and of how his family also bore some of the impact of his addiction. But by seeking help and attending a treatment clinic in

Cahir, a happy ending ensued as Brian has gone four years without a bet, and life is good.

Sport was a common theme throughout the day's presentations. Games development administrator for Tipperary GAA Kevin Halley highlighted how an involvement in sport contributes to good mental and physical health.

Finally, local councillor Donna Bergin left the students with some valuable advice. "If you're worried, reach out for help. Don't be afraid to pick up the phone or meet with someone you can talk to."





High speed broadband for 29,647 Tipperary homes

The Government's €3 billion national broadband scheme approved on Tuesday will see €118 million invested in Tipperary to deliver high speed broadband to 29,647 homes in the county.

Ten locations have been identified in the county that will be connected during 2020 to enable communities to quickly get free public access to high speed broadband.

These extend from Poulacapple in the south of the county to Aglish near Roscrea in the north.

Mayor of Clonmel Garret Ahearn has described the announcement as a landmark day for Tipperary.

The plan is to roll-out high speed broadband to the 1.1million people living and working in the nearly 540,000 premises nationally, including 100,000 businesses and farms, and over 600 schools, where commercial operators will not commit to deliver the service.

Mayor Ahearn said the work will start immediately, with roll-out of broadband within eight weeks of the contract signing.

Over 90% of premises in the State will have access to high speed broadband within four years.

"Quite simply this means rural communities in Tipperary will not be left behind. All of rural Ireland will get the same access to opportunities offered by high-speed broadband as those in urban areas," he said.

"Fine Gael is delivering on transforming the country for the better and providing more opportunities to all. We have prioritised rural broadband as others, including Fianna Fáil, did everything they could to attempt to derail the plan in a bid to score political points.

"Unlike Fianna Fáil and others, Fine Gael is working to ensure rural Ireland is to the fore of the country's progression and development.

"Whereas we have a plan for the country, opposition and critics like Fianna Fáil provide only obstacles. They have no plan, no solutions and no policies for broadband for Ireland," he said.

As an initial step, the Government has published a list of approximately 300 community centres, schools, library hubs and local GAA halls

in every county that will be connected to high speed broadband during 2020, to enable communities to quickly get free public access to high speed broadband. The Tipperary locations are:

"The ultimate goal here is to deliver high-speed broadband to homes and businesses all across the country. The delivery of high-speed broadband will be hugely beneficial to economic development and job creation in Tipperary," Mayor Ahearn continued.

"It will open up a whole range of possibilities, including flexible and remote working; smart health with online GP, nursing services and medical monitoring: cloud-based services and connected devices; smart farming opportunities; digital learning; and reliable electronic payments and bookings for businesses.

"We want to ensure that people who wish to live and work in Tipperary are supported in doing so. It is so crucial for balanced regional development that everyone in the country does not have to go to Dublin to work, study or start an enterprise," he added.

'Heroic efforts helped keep us going'

Clonmel Rowing Club has survived civil wars and world wars, and much more besides, to reach its 150th birthday.

It's a remarkable achievement for the club and one that was celebrated in style by members at a glittering anniversary bash in Hotel Minella.

'The Island' club has a special place in the town's history and folklore and is justly proud of its century and a half on the river.

And it has no plans to rest on its laurels, or lift its blades from the water for a final time.

Instead, it is driving ahead for an equally ambitious future as it further cements itself in the town's sporting and social fabric.

Success on the water has been central to the club's ethos and it can boast 15 national champions in this most competitive of sports, as well as many more wins at regattas across the country and internationally.

And central to most of those in recent decades has been coach Jimmy Fennessy, who was honoured at the celebrations for his immense contribution to the club, accepting a beautiful framed photograph of 'The Island' president Brenwen from Kelly and captain Pat Kinsella.

It is Jimmy's legacy that

will help the club maintain its pre-eminent position in the years to come as new emerging talent carry great hopes for further glory.

However, the club has now many members of more mature years who are also helping to keep the sport alive in the town. Some are returning after an absence, many more taking it up for the first time, and they are also key to what president Brenwen Kelly describes as the four pillars required to keep the club strong and vibrant as it looks to the future.

The club has done brilliantly to reach such a milestone, but the hard work must be maintained to keep things afloat. She described the executive branch as the first pillar and pointed out that the club would not survive with the input from of-

The second was youth rowing, such a vital element of the club. "We put a lot into this section but we get so much back," she remarked.

The third pillar are the active adult members, the 'engine room' of the club, with a diverse range of vital skills and talents.

And finally there's the affiliated supporters, including parents who are always ready to drive to an event or bake a cake for a fundraiser.

"There are so many others in town, business people and former members, who are so good to us as they have fond memories of the club. Without their goodwill we would have a hard time surviving," she added.

What had helped the club reach its 150th anniversary was a combination of a number of factors, including location and community.

'The Island' was symbolic in Clonmel and much loved by everyone. And the sense of community has always been

strong and helped to establish the club on the social fabric of the town.

"It was hanging by a thread at times, but the heroic efforts of so many people helped to keep it going. People stepped up at different times and some are not with us any more but we should remember them," she said.

"The history of the club would be very different without them. Remember your heroes," said the first lady president of the club.

Club stalwart Dermot Dougan read excerpts from old minute books and remarked that the concerns of

the 1970s were very similar to those of today.

Club captain Pat Kinsella went back a little further in time and recalled how Clonmel raced Waterford in an annual event and in 1878 the prize was £100, which would equate to about €13,000 in today's money.

They were some of the glory days for the club, with up to 20,000 people attending regattas and often a brass band and a big crowd waiting for the crew at the railway station when Clonmel returned after a big win.

Raw sewage seeping into river at Grangemockler

The pressing need for a waste water treatment plant for Grangemockler has been highlighted by local councillors, who have complained to County Council management about raw sewerage from houses in the village entering the Linguan River, which is a key source of Carrick-on-Suir's water supply.

The complaints made at Carrick-on-Suir Municipal District's monthly meeting, which also heard the village won't be able to expand further until this infrastructure is put in place.

Several councillors spoke at the meeting about raw sewage from a housing development in Grangemockler going into the Linguan River. Mullinahone Cllr Kevin

O'Meara (Ind) said there were people interested in building houses in Grangemockler in the future but they are currently restricted from doing this because there wasn't a waste water treatment plant, which was "urgently needed".

Cllr Kieran Bourke (FF) said he spoke to a property developer who has put in a lot of work and paid a lot of money out of his own pocket in relation to a proposal for a new housing development for Grangemockler.

He said the village was currently depending on privately owned septic tanks but it really needed a waste water treatment plant if it was to grow and progress.

He appealed to the Council to start the process of securing this infrastructure.

As a Carrick-on-Suir resident, Cllr Bourke said he was very concerned about waste seeping into the ground and going into the Linguan River.

He pointed out that the Linguan was the source for a large percentage of Carrickon-Suir's water supply.

Carrick-on-Suir cipal District engineer Willie Corby assured councillors the water treatment plant in the area was well capable of handling pollution from the Linguan River.

James Murray, senior executive engineer in the council's planning department, said he had been in contact with the owner of the housing development in Grangemockler that was causing problems.

He reported this owner seemed genuinely interested in sorting the issues out

"I think we will get some sort of agreement before the end of the year," he told councillors.

Director of Tipperary County Council's planning and water services department Marcus O'Connor said

the Council petitioned Irish Water on several occasions for a waste water treatment plant for Grangemockler and would certainly do so again. Irish Water was saying it didn't have money in its capital programme to provide this type of infrastructure in smaller villages.

"We will certainly push the issue and hopefully we will get it done in a future investment programme."

Planning sought to build homes in Carrick-on-Suir and Clonmel

Two planning applications seeking the green light to build 68 new homes in Carrick-on-Suir have been submitted to Tipperary County Council in the past few

M2B Developments Ltd. lodged an application with the Council on Monday, November 4, seeking permission to build 25 houses on the Waterford Road, Carrickbeg.

The estate would comprise a mix of 13 three-bedroom and 12 two-bedroom two-storey terraced houses.

The council is also considering an application lodged by Pierce O'Loughlin, Paul Joy and Peter O'Loughlin to build 39 houses at Sir John's Road, Ballynagrana, Carrickon-Suir. The application was submitted on October 8. The houses proposed include one detached four bedroom house, 16 four bedroom semidetached dwellings, 18 three semi-detached

homes, and four terraced dwellings with three bedrooms. The council is due to decide on whether to approve, refuse or seek further information on this application on December 2.

Its decision on the M2B Developments application is due on January 4 next year.

GLENCONNOR HOMES

A proposal to build 77 new homes in Clonmel is also being considered by Tip-County Council's planning department.

The planning application for the mixed estate of houses and apartments on a site at Glenconnor was lodged by

Clonmel-based Homes on October 8. According to the applicathe development would comprise 28 semi-de-

tached houses, two detached houses, 33 terraced houses and 14 apartments. The council is due to reach a decision on the application on December 2.

It's time to put up a nest

I don't mind working out-

With the breeding season

I often hear from schools climber.

Back in my garden, the first box I took down had been used by a great tit during the summer. I had watched them early in the year checking out the bird box. They cautiously peered in and popped inside for a quick look. This went on for a few days and then all went quiet.

could see the female bringing in nesting material. Later in spring the male would appear at the entrance with a beak full of fat caterpillars, for his hungry family. He had gathered these from the nearby oak, alder and hawthorn trees.

The nest now in my hands, was really well made, and lined with soft hairs to keep the chicks warm. I carefully put this into a box, and it will be used at nature walks and talks.

Cleaning the boxes is really easy. Don't use any harsh chemicals, and I just give the box a good scrub with a wire brush and some hot water. I leave it in the sun to dry out with the lid open for

back up within a week or I usually forget about it. Before I would have nailed or screwed the box onto a tree. This can create an open wound on the tree that allows diseases in. Current best practice is to use tving wire or cable ties and this allows this material expands with the tree rather than cutting into it. For tidy towns groups the adjudicators also frown on nails and screws in trees.

I also have a few opened fronted nest boxes, and these attract birds like robins and blackbirds. Last spring I moved one to a spot, where blackbirds have nested in a low hedge at the base of the trees. The male took the hint, and he was showing great interest until the resident robin intervened.

There was great chackling from the blackbird, and a few scuffles, and my money was on the larger blackbird. But to my surprise the robin prevailed, and they raised two broods of chicks there through the summer. The blackbird occasionally passed by, landed on the box, did his business and with a loud call flew away.

I have already planned to put up a few new boxes, and the local men's shed are building these. Sheds have been a brilliant support to tidy towns and schools, and many communities have their boxes proudly displayed on trees.

Medical Negligence -What makes a case?

If you are to succeed in a claim you have to show both negligence

In other words, you have to show that there is a duty of care : that there has been a breach of that duty; and that such breach caused your accident and your injuries.

WHAT IS MEDICAL **NEGLIGENCE?**

Medical Negligence is an act or omission by a health care professional which is below the accepted standard of care and which results in injury or death to a patient.

There are four main components in medical negli-

Duty of Care - a legal duty is owed whenever a health care provider or hospital undertakes to treat a patient.

Breach Duty of Care – it must be shown that the health care provider in question failed to follow the relevant standard of car.

Causation - the breach of duty must have caused injury

Damage - Regardless of whether or not the health care provider was negligent, there is no basis for a claim in negligence without damage, be it monetary, physical or emotional.

WAS THERE A BREACH OF THIS DUTY?

A case in medical negligence can be made if you can prove that a medical practitioner acted in a way that no medical practitioner of equal standing would act.

The fact that the medical practitioner did not follow an approved practice is not enough in itself to prove your case.

Even though a medical practitioner followed an approved practice, liability may arise if this practice has inherent defects which ought to have been obvious.

An honest difference of opinion between doctors is acceptable unless it can be proven that the course of treatment followed did not comply with the careful conduct of a medical practitioner of like specialisation and

EXAMPLES OF WHERE THIS STANDARD WAS APPLIED

Diagnosis

These types of cases usually occur when a Doctor or GP does not act in a timely

Early detection is vital as it enables timely medical treatment, and in many cases the patient can have a positive outcome.

There are unfortunately many cancer sufferers who are misdiagnosed as not having cancer.

Our experience in dealing with these cases shows that there are several reasons why a cancer misdiagnosis can occur-

Many of them as a result of human error or a lack of skill.

A doctor may not respond appropriately when a patient presents displaying symptoms of cancer.

There may be a failure to thoroughly examine or a failure to recognise the symptoms and signs of cancer.

There may be a failure to refer to a cancer specialist or a failure to appropriately monitor a patient who has a family history of cancer.

In a great number of cases that have come before the Courts, it has been shown that laboratory results and scans are often misinterpreted by technicians.

Treatment

The manner in which a patient receives treament can give rise to a case in negli-

By way of an example, a patient had surgery to remove a tumour in their throat. On the second night after the surgery the tracheotomy tube was knocked out of place. By the time the airway passage was established the patient was brain dead. A case was brought on the grounds that the surgeon allowed the patient to recover in ICU where there was no-one trained to replace tracheotomy tube.

The Court found that the failure to have a person, nurse or doctor, in the ICU who was trained in the replacement of a tracheotomy tube, under the circumstances, was an "inherent defect". The surgeon was found guilty of negligence because the deceased would not have died if a trained person been present in ICU.

Disclosure

The question may also arise as to whether or not a patient received suficient information to help them understand and therefore $consent \ to \ treatment \ .$

An example of a case due to a failure to disclose arose in 2000. The Plaintiff underwent a bone graft for a dental implant procedure. Before the operation the practi-

tioner told the Plaintiff there was no guarantee unforeseen complications arise. However, he did not disclose that there was a risk of chronic neuropathetic pain which the patient subsequently suffered. The Courts found that the injury was a known and foreseeable consequence of damaging a nerve and that the standards of disclosure for medical practitioners should be set by patients and not by doctors for doctors. Doctors must consider the severity of the consequences and frequency of risk to the Plaintiff's particular circumstances prior to the surgery.

DID THE BREACH CAUSE YOU HARM?

Once you can establish a duty and a breach you must then prove that this breach caused harm to you.

Medical negligence cases are very complex because the cause of the harm suffered can be difficult to pinpoint.

In most cases, the person is sick before they ever get to hospital, or they are suffering from a serious underlying condition, which can complicate the after effects of tratment.

One of the tasks which we as solicitors face is to identify what the outcome would have been if it was not for the negligence of the healthcare professional.

The other side will almost always argue that either the harm caused was a result of the illness the patient had before they ever attended the doctor.

They often argue that in the case of a mistake in surgery, that the mistake was within the realm of acceptable error.

This makes the sourcing of suitably qualified experts a key component of the investigatoin of any case.

Getting a detailed history with the necessary records and supplementing it with accurate testimony is essen-

One of the crucial element to a case is taking it in time. You have two years from the date of the treatment to take your case. This date can be extended to a later date if you can prove that you did not know or could not have know that you had an injury caused by negligence within the first two years.



There is no sign of the acute beds returning'

Campaigners seeking the return of acute psychiatric beds to Clonmel and South Tipperary have expressed their disappointment that no progress has been made following a meeting with Minister Jim Daly on Tuesday in Clonmel.

After a one hour meeting with Minister Daly, consultants and elected representexpressed their disappointment that no progress had been made on the return of acute psychiatric beds to Clonmel.

Minister Daly did announce the establishment of Jigsaw in Thurles with outreach centres in Clonmel and Nenagh, the filling of three crucial nursing posts associated with the mental health services and progress made on the building of a crisis house for mental health care in Glenconnor, Clonmel. But Minister Daly had no news to impart regarding the return of acute psychiatric beds to Clonmel.

On his last visit to Clonmel in February 2018, Minister Daly said the closure of St. Michael's unit in Clonmel in 2012 was wrong and he wanted to put that right.

There were hopes that Minister Daly would on Tuesday be able to inform the meeting on progress made but there was none to report.

"Following the meeting it remains we have no acute psychiatric beds or no immediate prospect of acute psychiatric beds," said retired psychiatric consultant Alan Moore, who spearheaded a three-year campaign to save St. Michael's before it closed in 2012

"While the minister had positive news on the crisis house and nursing posts, I am very disappointed on the key issue that there is no sign of the acute beds returning," said Mr Moore.

"The most severely and acutely ill patients do not have a voice, and these are the people who remain badly served by the services that does not have local acute admission beds, their voices need to be heard."

Seamus Healy of Save Our Acute Hospital Services Committee also expressed his disappointment that Minister Daly had nothing to report on the return of acute psychiatric beds to Clonmel and South Tipperary. "A 20-bed acute psychiatric bed unit should be located on the grounds of South Tipperary General Hospital. We have made some progress on a number of issues but none on the acute psychiatric beds which is a disappointment," said Deputy Healy.

Clonmel priest Fr. Michael Toomey expressed his disappointment that Minister Daly did not meet service users or families during his visit. Fr. Toomey welcomed the Jigsaw announcement. He hoped that proper adequate availability of the service will be made to all young people across the county, with specific hubs. "While Thurles is the central location of the county, there is no easy public transport facilities for people to get there from Clonmel. Cahir or Carrick on Suir so I hope that those who really need the service will be supported with this issue," said Fr. Toomey.

Mayor of Clonmel Garret Ahearn said it is now confirmed that jigsaw in Tipperary will be up and running in the first quarter of 2020. "The two outreach hubs will work in tandem with the central based in Thurles. I welcome that the Government see the Tipperary as a special case. I will continue to fight for adequate services for mental health patients in Tipperary."

Deputy Mattie McGrath also voiced his concern regarding access to the base in Thurles given the poor public transport links to Clonmel and other South Tipperary towns. "We know that Jigsaw caters specifically for young people between the ages of 12 and 25. These are the groups who are being particularly affected by the scourge of rampant drug use in the county, so it is vital they have accessible services," Deputy McGrath.

The Jigsaw announcement was also welcomed by Deputy Michael Lowry. "It is of great significance that the service is based in Thurles as it is the most logical and sensible location from a geographical point. There will be numerous regional outreach centres to compliment the service," he said.

Cllr. Richie Molloy, Family Carers Ireland area manager in Clonmel, said it was absolutely vital that outreach hubs are developed on a parallel basis throughout the

'Patients, families and staff are under enormous pressure'

Independent TD Mattie McGrath wants to know when the new beds for South Tipperary General Hospital (STGH) will be ready for use. He has written to the Minister for Health Simon Harris and the Director General of the HSE Paul Reid asking for a clear and

around the opening of the 40-bed modular unit.

Deputy McGrath speaking after Minister Harris informed him through a parliamentary reply that contractor payments for the project, certified November 1, already stand at €8.628 million.

He said it is clear from the recent Irish Nurses and Midwives Organisation (INMO) analysis that overcrowding in hospital emergency departments has exceeded 100,000 nationally and that STGH is one of the top five hospitals worst affected. He said this

only confirms the priority that needs to be given to the delivery of the 40 bed-modular unit.

Yet here we are today with definitive opening schedule despite the explicit confirmation I have received from the Minister and the HSE that it has given Extraspace Solution Ltd almost €9 million," he said.

"We have no clear idea what the total financial cost is going to be, but the emotional and mental cost of the failure to deliver the project in a more urgent manner is already certain. Patients, families and frontline staff

are under enormous pressure. This is surely going to increase in the winter months. That is why I am asking the Minister and the HSE to provide clear guarantees around the opening of the modular unit," concluded Deputy McGrath.

Burglars steal €6,500 worth of cigarettes in Clogheen shop raid

Gardaí have issued an appeal for witnesses and sightings of a getaway car in their investigation into a late night raid on a Clogheen shop by a masked gang, who stole an estimated €6,500 worth of cigarettes.

The burglary of Browne's XL Store on Clogheen's Main Street occurred between 3.15am and 3.30am last Thursday, November 14.

A Cahir Garda Station spokesman said four men with their faces masked were

involved in the raid. One member of the gang $stood\,up\,on\,a\,post\,box\,outside$ the shop and interfered with a CCTV camera.

Three of the men entered the shop by forcing open the front door and one stood as look out outside.

The burglars stole a haul of Benson and Hedges, John Player Blue and Silk Cut ci-

garettes as well as tobacco and a small sum of cash. They left the premises around 3.30am and escaped in a dark coloured Audi car in the direction of Ballyporeen.

The Garda spokesman said gardai have carried out house-to-house enquiries and sought footage from CCTV cameras in the locality as part of their investigation into the burglary. He appealed to anyone who witnessed anything suspicious in the Clogheen area that night, in particular people such as delivery drivers travelling on approach roads to the village between 3am and 4am to contact Cahir Garda Station at (052) 7441222.

He also appealed for assistance from people with dashcam or private CCTV footage in the Clogheen area.


A regular guest of the society over the last few years, Margaret grew up on the Clogheen Road and she revisits this period of her life with relish, compassion and forensic curiosity.





retiring, Bill After Vaughan continued support and serve his club. Lance and his older brother, Michael took up the reins in the 1950s and 60s. Lance played minor, under 21 and senior football for Tipperary, winning nothing with them and little with Mullinahone. He played in an era when the footballers of Mullinahone Tipperary unsuccessful.

Win or lose Lance Vaughan always gave of his utmost on the field. He was captain of the first Mullinahone team to win a county juvenile title (U-15) in 1962. This achievement was not repeated by the club until 1994. Lance was a midfielder on the Mullinahone team of 1973 when they won the Tipperary Junior Football title, the club's first county win in 44 years.

Lance's father, Bill, had been a member of that team of 1929. Lance's genes and those of his wife Alma passed on to his son Kyran, who played hurling and football for Tipperary winning an All-Ireland junior football medal in 1998. His father must have been proud, but my own opinion is that his proudest moment came in 2002 when he saw his son receive the Dan Breen Cup on behalf of Mullinahone, following the replay with Thurles Sarsfields after a week of unbelievable anxiety. Lance's loyalty, to old family values, to Tipperary and to Mullinahone, makes him a most worthy recipient of a Laocra Gael award.

John's first appearance at competitive level was playing wing back for Callan CBS senior hurling team when still only 14 years of age on a team captained by Richie Hogan's grandfather, who was a Kilkenny Minor hurler that year.

In 1956 John was a member of the Killenaule minor hurling team defeated by Carrick Swans in the South Final. Also in 1956 John and 7 other St. Patrick's men helped Mullinahone to victory over Cahir Slashers in the South Tipperary minor football final. John and his colleagues continued to play junior football and hurling. The hurlers were eventually rewarded for their efforts with a South Final victory over Moyle Rovers in 1963 when John scored the all important winning goal for a team captained by his lifelong colleague Ned Barnable. As chairman of Avonmore and later Glanbia John was instrumental in securing that firm's sponsorship of the Tipperary Hurling Championship for several years although he often found those matches being played at times that unsuitable for his nolders, the dairy were shareholders, the farmers. John served St. Patrick's as a selector at Juvenile, Minor and Junior level. Now he enjoys watching the next generation with his grandchildren featuring prominently for St. Patrick's in South Tipperary and Butlerstown in Waterford. John was always and is still a regular attendee at matches in Thurles, Cork, Limerick, Nowlan Park and of course Croke Park. Pakie Hyland became chairman of the Cahir GAA club in 1996 and remained until 2004, having been the Juvenile chairman from 1991 to 1995. This period proved to be one of the most successful in the club's history, with the first County Senior and Under 16 football titles and the first County hurling title coming to the parish. In all 13 County titles and 27 Divisional titles were won.

Also during his term as chairman, much development work was carried out, including the purchase of a new field as part of the Duneske Project and the building of new dressing rooms and a stand in the Park.

When it came to fundraising Pakie and his wife, Mary were not found wanting and he is still one of the top promoters of the County Draw in the club. He also encouraged the founding of the Cahir Ladies Football Club while chairman.

He was a playing member of the Club in the 1950s and 1960s and went on to become a team mentor on many teams and was manager of the county. minor winning team in 1996.

Johnny Murphy, who was born on April 20, 1936, started his hurling career with Cashel C.B.S. and won Rice Cup medals in 1948 and 1949.

Johnny soon came to the attention of the county selectors. He got a trial for the minors in 1952 but was badly treated and failed to make the team. He was on the All-Ireland winning team in 1953, when they beat Dublin, and in 1954, when they lost the final to Dublin.

There was some consolation for Johnny in 1954, when he was on the Cashel junior team that won the 1953 county final, which wasn't played until October 1954. The team included his father, uncle and other relations.

Johnny progressed to senior ranks in the county, played National League in 1956 and 1957, and having played in the early stage of the 1958 championship, was dropped from the panel. In that year he went to Dublin and played with the Faughs, while working in McBirneys on the Quays. He was picked on the Dublin panel in 1959 but emigrated to New York, where he has lived since.


He played on the Tipperary/NY hurling team from 1959-1977, winning New York championships in 1962, 1974 and 1976. He started playing football with the Cork team and, when they disbanded, with Kilkenny and won a New York

championship with them. He played with New York from 1959 to 1969 and this involved a number of trips to Ireland to play in the National League. The best result he enjoyed was achieving a draw with Waterford in 1965.

Probably the highlight of his playing career with New York was a trip with the team to Australia and New Zealand in 1968.

Johnny may have retired from hurling in 1977 but he is still active in the Tipperary Hurling club as well as the Tipperary N. & B. Association of New York. He has never lost touch with Cashel and returns there a few times a year. Married to Eileen, the couple have two sons and a number of grandchildren.

Paddy Ryan (Coole) played with Sean Treacys from the 1960s to the 1990s. He won a county junior No. 1 hurling championship in 1966, and was on the first Sean Treacy team to win a West senior championship in 1968, and had further wins in 1973, 1974, 1977, 1978, 1979 and 1982.

Paddy also won three Crosco Cups, the prestigious Gold Watch tournament in Doon in 1967, the Butterkrust Cup tournament organised by Erin's Isle GAA club Dublin in 1967; as well as many other tournaments throughout the county.

Paddy served as secretary of the club for a period of time and was a selector for 18 years on juvenile and adult teams. He managed Sean Treacy-Aherlow combination in under-21 hurling, winning two West championships and

a county hurling championship in 1990.

Following his retirement from hurling and official duties, he took on the onerous task of compiling the history of hurling in the parish of Kilcommon, Hollyford and Rearcross. The book took seven years to write and sold out in five weeks.

Paddy was one of seven boys, six of whom played for Sean Treacys, and the second in the family to receive a Laochra Gael, as his twin brother Dinny got the award in 2017.

John Darmody's career as a player and officer of the Cashel King Cormacs is one of the most distinguished. It began back in 1957 as a juvenile player with a West title and thereafter as a player, selector, club officer and supporter. To this day John is never far away when his beloved Red and Green are in action.

In 1960 and 1961 he was part the Cashel minor team that captured West titles. In 1962 he won a Munster title with Tipperary. Graduating to the under-21 ranks John won a West championship in 1964 and went to win West senior titles with Cashel KC in 1965, 1971, 1975, 1976 and 1980. John also added four Crosco Cup titles won in 1975, 1976, 1979 and 1981. His senior playing career came to an end in 1982, spanning impressive 19 years.

After John's senior days had come to an end he continued to play on with the juniors and in 1984 was part of the team that won the West

championship, and also added a football title for good measure in 1986 before calling a halt to his playing career.

While still playing he became involved in club administration as committee member. vice-chairman and club treasurer. To this was added many years as a selector, which began with the very successful minor under-21 sides in the seventies and eighties and culminated with the seniors' first county success in 1991.

In a long career of generous service to the club as a player, selector, administrator and supporter, John has always put the club first and continues to serve it today. Married to Bernie with three children, John, Niamh and Claire, he is a model of a great G.A.A. man and is totally deserving of a Laochra Gael award.

Christy Ryan, Pubblehill, first came to prominence with Kickhams juveniles in the early 1960s. In 1967 he manned the goal with the Kickham under-21A team that won the county hurling title. He played with such distinction in the West final against Cappawhite that 'Araside' in his report in The Nationalist described it as a 'magnificent exhibition.'


During the next forty years Christy played many starring roles on Kickhams teams and collected two county junior football titles along the way. The first of these was in 1981 when he captained the side to the first county title in the grade, and a

second in 1992 a sub-goalkeeper.

When Christy finally hung up his boots, he managed Kickhams to eight county titles and over fifteen West A titles from under-12 to minor. He became an umpire to Sean Bradshaw, and later Fergal Horgan, officiating at every county hurling final, including the senior final of 2009 and the Fitzgibbon Cup final of 2018.

Christy also administered at all levels within the club. As late as September 2019, he was a selector on the Kickhams under-16 winning team. He is a grandfather figure to the younger members of the club. With fifty years of unbroken service to his beloved Kickhams, Christy shows no signs of leaving the fray. He is a deserving recipient of a Laochra Gael award.
